#### Developing countries on the rise at G-20 summit

LOS CABOS, Mexico (AP) — The scene at the just-concluded Group of 20 summit held in this seaside resort would have been unthinkable a decade ago: Hundreds of dignitaries gathered in opulent Mexican hotels and convention halls to hammer out an economic bailout for Europe. Meanwhile, the leaders of Brazil and China kicked in tens of billions of dollars to the International Monetary Fund to rescue downtrodden Spain and Greece.

Although the gathering didn't produce a solution for the ailing euro zone, it did outline the globe's new balance of power. Developing countries projected optimism and wealth over the summit's two days, while European and U.S. leaders struggled just to stay solvent.

A lot has clearly changed since the 1990s, when Asian and Latin American economies were slogging through recessions while Washington-based power brokers ordered up the very kind of austerity-minded prescriptions now sparking street protests in Europe.

Even during recent economic crises in the U.S. and Europe, China has been posting annual growth rates topping 8 percent. Countries with booming Chinese trade, such as Argentina and Ethiopia, have similarly seen their economies thrive. China's economy surpassed Japan's over the past year to become the world's second biggest; Brazil's overtook the U.K.'s to take sixth place.

"It is a different picture and reflects the fact that (developing) economies are not only the largest and fastest growing economies but are among the biggest economies in the world," said Uri Dadush, director of the international economics program at the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. "Clearly, neither the Americans nor the Europeans are in any position to tell the biggest economies what to do."

#### Investors hoping to see Fed action to boost lackluster economy and spur job growth

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Reserve, meeting at a time of heightened uncertainty, is expected to provide further support for a slumping U.S. economy. But there is no consensus over what form the added support will take.

Some private economists believe the Fed will launch another round of bond buying in an effort to drive longterm interest rates even lower. The aim would be to spur more borrowing, spending and economic growth.

At the very least, many economists believe the Fed will stress its readiness to do more should the economy weaken further.

# Feinstein takes on culture of leaks

t was gutsy for Senate Intelligence Committee Chairwoman Dianne Feinstein to come out against Washington's recent rash of dangerous intelligence leaks last week; she

made criticism of the leaks bipartisan. Flanked by the House Intelligence Committee's ranking Democrat, Dutch Ruppersberger, and GOP committee leaders, Feinstein declared: "This has to stop. When people say they don't want

to work with the United States, because they can't trust us to keep a secret, that's serious."

A week later, Feinstein is more than halfway through New York Times reporter David E. Sanger's book "Confront and Conceal: Obama's Secret Wars and Surprising Use of American Power." She told me Wednesday, "You learn more from the book than I did as chairman of the intelligence committee, and that's very disturbing to me.' The Beltway has become a

giant sieve. News reports outed a Pakistani doctor who had set up a phony vaccination program to obtain information on Osama bin Laden's location in Abbottabad. After an unusual proceeding last month, a Pakistani official found Dr. Shakil Afridi guilty of treason and sentenced him to 33 years.

Another leak revealed that a double agent had obtained a new and improved al-Qaida underwear bomb in Yemen. That leak, Feinstein said, endangered an ally and the individual who

saved American lives by procuring the bomb.

Two recent New York Times stories hyped President Barack Obama's "will," "pragmatism over ideology" and hands-on role in drone strikes over Pakistan, Yemen and Somalia. Those stories also revealed telling details about a computer worm that targeted Iranian nuclear centrifuges and the process used to cull the "kill list."

Former CIA spokesman Bill Harlow told me the two Times stories "left a trail that Helen Keller could follow," one that leads to "a small universe of people." National security adviser Thomas E. Donilon talked on the record, while other officials spoke on condition of anonymity.

The Obama administration has no trouble prosecuting low-level and midlevel leakers.

Obama's feds have prosecuted six cases, double the number prosecuted by previous presidents. Yet the Department of Justice has been slow to respond to spin stories that play up Obama's national security acumen but also give away too much information.

This crusade can't be helpful to DiFi politically. Many in her liberal base regard accused leakers, such as Army Pvt. Bradley Manning, not as security threats but as heroic whistle-blowers. "As we all know," her political guru Bill Carrick conceded, "there are people who think they want to know all this stuff, and they don't want any restriction of information, no matter what the potential damage might be."

Sen. John McCain and other Republicans want an independent special prosecutor to investigate. Feinstein prefers

Attorney General Eric Holder's decision to assign two U.S. attorneys to probe the leaks. For one thing, it's quicker.

But also, it's not clear that a special prosecutor could do much about leaks from political aides. Former Dick Cheney aide Scooter Libby was convicted not for leaking the identity of former CIA operative Valerie Plame but for lying about it. If aides say they didn't know something was classified or if they can show they were authorized to speak, it seems there is no crime.

At Friday's news conference, Obama said: "The notion that my White House would purposely release classified national security information is offensive. It's wrong." But what if aides leaked key intelligence accidentally on purpose?

Feinstein is working on new administrative procedures to curb leaks. Violators, she explained, might lose their security clearance — or their jobs.

The real problem seems to be rot at the top. How do you impose the need for silence about underwear bombs or phony vaccines when White House stars are bragging about their exploits in The New York Times?

Remember the Libby trial. Washington clamored for Libby's scalp for a leak that did less damage than the likely fallout from leaks on thumb drives, double agents and vital assets. Considering what's at stake, there should have been 99 senators and one president standing with Dianne Feinstein.

If, however, you are like me and enjoy discovering little known facts about notso-famous, nontourist-trap-towns, you might actually enjoy reading a little more of this



**PRINCE** 

I am presently composing this week's expedition into literary distinction while sitting in the dining room of one of my alltime favorite eateries. Panera Bread, located in the fascinating

little town of Alton, Ill. Leah and I have been familiar with this neat little place for quite some time since it is just across the Mississippi River from St. Louis where we lived for a number of years before going home to West Texas. Perhaps its greatest claim to fame for the Prince family is it is home to our oldest son's wife, Kristin. She and Matthew pastor a great church in here in Alton, Beltline Christian Center, and our youngest son, Daniel, lives here

But putting personal familial references aside, there is much to entertain the trivia seeker in this fascinating riverside community. I have been privileged to be here a couple of days and once again I have been reminded of some of its history that you might enjoy reading about. It is famous for its limestone

bluffs along the river north of the city, for its role preceding and during the American Civil War, and as the hometown of Robert Wadlow, the tallest man known in United States history, about who I will share more interesting information later.

The city has been labeled "The most haunted city in America" by some paranormal enthusiasts, due to its claimed haunted hot spots, such as McPike Man-

sion and other structures. Most

were built on foundations of stone taken from a former Civil War prison after it was abandoned. Confederate prisoners had suffered severe overcrowding and many died during a smallpox epidemic. The city holds regular "ghost tours" and has been visited by television crews hoping to film proof of the paranormal.

Alton was developed as a river town in 1818 by Rufus Easton, who named it after his son. Easton ran a passenger ferry service across the Mississippi River to the Missouri shore. Alton is located amid the confluence of three significant navigable rivers: the Illinois, the Mississippi, and the Missouri. A monument and multilevel observatory, located at the confluence of the Missouri and Mississippi near the levee in Wood River, has been constructed to provide an overview of the Great Rivers

area. In the 19th century, it was an important town for abolitionists, as Illinois was a free state across from the slave state of Missouri. Pro-slavery activists also lived there and slave catchers often raided the city. Then escaped slaves would cross the Mississippi to seek shelter in Alton, and proceed to safer places through stations of the Underground Railroad. During the years before the American Civil War, several homes were equipped with tunnels and hiding places for stations on the Underground Railroad to aid slaves escaping to the North.

Alton has produced several historically notable persons such as the abolitionist printer Reverend Elijah P. Lovejoy who was murdered Nov. 7, 1837, by a pro-slavery mob while he tried to protect his Alton-based press from being destroyed for the third time. He had moved from St. Louis because of opposition there. He had printed many abolitionist tracts and distributed them throughout the area. When one of the mob made a move to set the old warehouse on fire, Lovejoy, armed with only a pistol, went outside to try to stop him. The pro-slavery man shot him dead with a shotgun, five

rounds through the midsection.

The mob then stormed the ware-

ing press into the Mississippi River. Lovejoy thus became the first martyr of the abolition movement. Congressional representatives came to Alton when they drafted the Thirteenth Amendment of the Constitution, to permanently end slavery

throughout the Union. On Oct. 15, 1858, Alton was the site of the seventh Lincoln-Douglas debate. A memorial at the site in downtown Alton features undersized statues of Lincoln and Douglas, as they would have

appeared during the debate. But, as previously mentioned, I think my personal favorite landmark is a life-size statue of the man affectionately known as "The Gentle Giant" during his brief life. Robert Pershing Wadlow, listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the world's tallest documented man at 8 feet 11.1 inches tall, is buried in Upper Alton Cemetery. The earth over his grave was raised so visitors can compare its length to other graves. Just yesterday I took my 9-year-old granddaughter to see the memorial to him, which includes a life-sized statue and a replica of his chair, which stands on College Avenue, across from the Southern Illinois University Dental School.

His story is absolutely captivating and he was, as you can imagine, quite a celebrity while he was alive. He died in his sleep from an infection in his blood July 14, 1940, at the age of 22 years. More than 30,000 people attended his funeral and he was buried in a 10-foot-long, half-ton coffin which required 12 pallbearers to carry and was interred in a vault of solid con-

Anyway, if you're ever up this way you would really enjoy pass ing a little time in this unique little spot along the Mississippi River. There's so much more to learn about this quaint place like the "river bend", the Piasa bird, and if you're lucky, you might even catch a glimpse of Lewis and Clark's ghosts.

You may not agree with anything I've said, but I column as I see 'em.



The only problem is, Malone doesn't have a clue what the man is talking about, since Cassiopeia has left nothing with him. So begins Malone's most harrowing adventure to date — one that offers up astounding historical revelations, pits him against a ruthless

ancient brotherhood and sends him from Denmark to Belgium to Vietnam, then to one of the greatest archaeological sites in the world: the tomb of China's first emperor, guarded by an underground army of terra-cotta warriors, which has inexplicably remained sealed for more than 2,000 years.

Kristin Hannah is a New York Times Best Selling author and in her new book, "Winter Garden" (F HAN K), she takes on a family story that reads like a Russian fairy tale. Meredith and Nina Whitson are as different as sisters can be one stayed at home to raise her children and manage the family apple orchard; the other followed a dream and traveled the world to become a famous photojournalist.

Finally, she impinged upon my consciousness and I at least know who she is and what she does. And so, is it any wonder, she has not written a book? It is "Unlimited: How to **Build** an Exceptional Life" (158 MIC J). In it, she says that if you have the right attitude and skills, then you can and will accomplish whatever you want (gee, what a concept - I thought that is what Zig Ziglar said). Read this book; take its precepts to your mind and heart and change, brothers and sisters, change!

Canyon Lake Gorge offers summer learning

the footsteps of scientists, eco-tourists and other educators who have explored the landmark, which was created a decade ago by record flooding on the Guadalupe River.

Beyond honing lesson plans on the outing last week, the geography teachers marveled at the idyllic setting.

"It's probably one of the best-kept secrets in all of Texas, in terms of natural beauty," said Greg Hill, a teacher in Mesquite. "Usually when I teach physical geography, we have to talk about somewhere

ment of homes, cars and

water through the spillway at Canyon Lake dam — estimated at one-third the flow of Niagara Falls — carved a ravine more than a mile long, and deeper than 50 feet in spots, in the limestone hillside beside the dam.

By the time the flows subsided six weeks later, an estimated 600,000 cubic yards of rock and dirt had eroded, or enough to cover a football field 30 feet deep.

"One hundred million years ago, this was actually the shoreline of Texas," tour guide Cinde Thomas-Jimenez the educators, pointing out rippled rocks that signify a prehistoric beach.

Boulders washed out of the gorge in 2002 created a blockage below the dam, she said, causing the water coming out of the dam's release valve to back up into nearby neighborhoods.

"It was really, really devastating for the people who lived here."

The flood's scouring also revealed a large seismic fault, two sets of dinosaur footprints and countless fossils, as well

as springs and seeps. The newly formed natural wonder immediately attracted geologists, as well as curious laymen, prompting Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority to establish a touring initiative in conjunction with the Army Corps of Engineers, which owns the gorge property and


manages the reservoir. "It's a fantastic outdoor classroom," said GBRA staffer Jaynellen Ladd, who estimated 10,000 people have taken the \$10-per-person, three-hour tours since

they began in 2007. "Once people go in, a lot of them say, 'I didn't realize it was so huge," Ladd said.

The outings are staffed by GBRA employees and volunteers with the Gorge Preservation Society, a support group of about 75.

The faults, fractures and rock deformations are of great interest to oil companies, which

# Father won't face charges in beating death

SHINER, Texas (AP) Hearing his 5-year-old daughter crying from behind a barn, a father ran and discovered the unthinkable: A man molesting her. The father pulled the man off his daughter, authorities say, and started pummeling him to death with

With his daughter finally safe, the father frantically called 911, begging a dispatcher to find his rural ranch and send an ambulance.

"Come on! This guy is going to die on me!" the man is heard screaming on the 911 call. "I don't know what to

A recording of the tape was played during a news conference Tuesday where the Lavaca County district attorney and sheriff announced that the father will not face charg-

23-year-old father in the June 9 killing of Jesus Mora Flores, a Lavaca County grand jury reached the same conclusion as investigators and many of the father's neighbors: He was authorized to use deadly

In declining to indict the

force to protect his daughter.

"It's sad a man had to die," said Michael James Veit, 48, who lives across the street from where the attack happened in this small community run on ranching and the Shiner beer brewery. "But I think anybody would have done that.'

The family ranch is so remote that on the 911 tape, the father is heard profanely screaming at a dispatcher who couldn't locate the property. At one point, he tells the dispatcher he's going to put the man in his truck and drive him to a hospital.

"He's going to die!" the father screams, swearing at the dispatcher. "He's going to f------ die!"

The tense, nearly fiveminute call begins with the father saying he "beat up" a man found raping his daughter. The father grows increasingly frazzled, shouting into the phone so loudly at times that the call often becomes in-

The Associated Press is not identifying the father in order to protect the daughter's identity. The AP generally does not identify victims of sexual assault.

"He's a peaceable soul," V'Anne Huser, the father's attorney, told reporters at the Lavaca County Courthouse. "He had no intention to kill anybody that day." The attack happened on the

family's ranch off a quiet, two-lane county road between the farming towns of Shiner and Yoakum. A statement released by the district attorney said a witness who saw Flores "forcibly carrying" the girl into a secluded area scrambled to find the father. Running toward his daughter's screams, the father pulled Flores off his child and "inflicted several blows to the man's head and neck area," investigators said.

Emergency crews responding to the father's 911 call found Flores' pants and underwear pulled down on his lifeless body. The girl was examined at a hospital, and Lavaca County District Attorney Heather McMinn said forensic evidence and witness accounts corroborated the father's story that his daughter was being sexually molested.

The father was never arrested, but the killing was investigated as a homicide.

Philip Hilder, a Houston criminal defense attorney and former federal prosecutor, said he would have been surprised if the grand jury had decided to indict the father. Hilder said Texas law provides several justifications for the use of deadly force, including if someone commits a sexual assault.

"The grand jury was not about to indict this father for protecting his daughter," he

Authorities said the family had hired Flores before to help with horses on the ranch. He was not born in the U.S. but was here legally with a green card. Attempts to locate Flores' relatives through public records were unsuc-

On Tuesday, a new "No Trespassing" sign was freshly tacked onto a gate barring entrance down a gravelly, shrub-canopied path leading to the barn and chicken coop

on the ranch, which belonged to the father's dad.

At the father's house, the front yard could pass for a children's playground: blue pinwheels sunk into patchy an above-ground swimming pool, a swing set, a trampoline and a couple of ropes dangling from a tree for swinging. A partial privacy fence is painted powder blue.

No one answered at the father's home. A few miles away, at a home listed as belonging to the father's sister, a woman shouted through the front door that the family had nothing to say. Huser, the father's attorney, told reporters that neither the father nor anyone else in the family would ever give interviews and asked that they be left

Veit, who lives across the street from the ranch, described the father as easygoing and polite — down to always first asking permission to search Veit's property for animals that had wandered off the ranch, even though the families have long known

frequently send workers on the tour. said Ronald McGinnis, a senior research scientist at Southwest Research Institute.

"It's an amazing training laboratory for all scales of geosciences,' he said, "We can study how these fractures and faults control fluid movements. It's basically the inner workings of an aquifer, exposed."

The institute has written dozens of scientific papers on the gorge, where the Hidden Valley fault is of particular interest.

"It's a very unique exposure because of its dimensions," McGinnis said, noting the flooding exposed more than 2,600 feet of the deformation, which is part of the Balcones fault zone.

Bringing groups into

gorge required building paths and steps as well as removing beached boats, downed trees and other debris.

"It was an ordeal," said Mark Henderson, a volunteer who's focused these days on removing silt and invasive plants.

After five years operating under primitive conditions, in December the tour group moved into its own office, in a converted garage on land bought by the GBRA near the dam.

The agency plans to build an environmental learning center featuring exhibits on the Guadalupe River basin, as well as a network of new trails along the gorge.

Fundraising should begin soon for the fourbuildingcomplex, which is expected to cost about

The 2002 flood was fueled by 34 inches of rainfall upstream from the lake over the last week of June, generating a record inflow at the reservoir, which was completed in 1964.

The lake's water had never before reached the level of the spillway down the shoreline from the dam, but in the 2002 storm, water flowed through it at an estimated rate of 67,000 cubic feet per second. Peak flows at Niagara Falls run about 200,000 cubic feet per second.

"The spillway functioned as it was supposed to, to remove the excess water and take pressure off the dam," said Marcus Schimank,

the Army Corps' lake manager.


To prevent future floods from compromising the spillway, the agency spent \$1.5 million around 2004 to install a 20-foot-deep trench filled with reinforced concrete across the entire width of the spillway.

"In the unlikely event we ever had water through the spillway again, it would only erode the rock back up (the gorge) to the cutoff wall," Schimank said.





#### The Secret of Good Defense



eight of diamonds

It is extremely difficult to defend well at all times, yet in most deals the winning line of defense, if there is one, can be found provided there's a strong-enough will to find

Take this case, which illustrates how a determined defender pursues his task. West leads what is obviously his highest diamond, won by East with the ace, and the question is what East should play next.

Since he has only two defensive tricks himself, all of East's thoughts should be directed toward hands his partner might have that could produce two more tricks. Practically all such hands require West to have a trump holding of A-x-x or K-x-x, so East should assume that his partner has one of these holdings. This assumption, however, leads

to only three tricks, so East's next step is to start looking for a means of South's jump to three clubs at his second turn, it seems certain that he must hold either four or five clubs which in turn means that West must have either one or two clubs.

Once East gets this far, all that remains is to try to pinpoint West's actual club holding. East resolves this question by assuming that if West had the A-x-x or K-x-x of trumps and also had a singleton club, he would surely have led a club originally rather than a diamond. East therefore concludes that West started

with a doubleton club. Accordingly, East returns a low club at trick two! No matter how South proceeds from this point on, he can no longer make the contract. As soon as West gains the lead with his king of trumps, he returns a club to East's ace and ruffs the next club to put the contract down one.

# Panel mulls contempt vote against Holder

WASHINGTON (AP) A House committee is poised to vote on whether to hold Attornev General Eric Holder in contempt of Congress for failing to turn over more Justice Department documents on a flawed gun-smuggling probe that resulted in hundreds of guns illicitly purchased in Arizona gun shops winding up in Mexico.

The likelihood of a contempt vote rose after Holder and Rep. Darrell Issa, R-Calif., failed to reach agreement Tuesday in a 20-minute meeting at the Capitol.

Issa wanted the docuimmediately. Holder told reporters he would not turn over documents on the gunsmuggling probe called the controversy over the Operation Fast and Furious unless Issa agreed to another congressional briefing on the Justice Department material. Holder wants an assurance from Issa that the transfer of the records would satisfy a subpoena from the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee.

"If we receive no documents, we'll go forward" with a contempt vote, Issa told reporters.

Holder says he is prepared to turn over documents detailing how the department arrived at the conclusion that federal agents engaged in a risky tactic called gunwalking.

In February 2011, when

law enforcement operation was first disclosed. the department denied that agents had engaged in gun-walking.

"It's a whole variety of material, and it's consistent with what we have already made available emails, documents of that nature — that really go into the way in which the department handled itself from February of 2011 until December of 2011," Holder told reporters.

Ordinarily, such deliberative documents are off-limits to Congress. In Operation Fast and Furious, the Justice Department's initial incorrect denials are seen as providing justification for Congress' document

Issa and the House Republican leadership have asked whether the department's initial denial in a Feb. 4, 2011, letter to Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, was part of a broader effort to obstruct a congressional investigation.

The material "pretty clearly demonstrates that there was no intention to mislead, to deceive," Holder told reporters.

"The attorney general has made an unprecedented offer to turn over documents that are part of the Department of Justice's internal deliberations and work product and to brief the committee on their contents," said Rep. Adam

Schiff of California, one of the committee's Democrats and a former federal prosecutor. "Regrettably, Chairman Issa refuses to take yes for an answer."

"We have offered to make materials available ... to brief on those documents, to answer any questions that might come up with regard to the documents that we produced," the attorney general said.

"The ball's in their court," Holder said. "We made what we thought was an extraordinary offer." Issa took a different
