

### No 'grand bargain' budget agreement in upcoming congressional negotiations WASHINGTON (AP) — On this, GOP budget guru

Rep. Paul Ryan and top Senate Democrat Harry Reid can agree: There won't be a "grand bargain" on the budget. Instead, the Wisconsin Republican and the Ne-

vada Democrat both say the best Washington can do in this bitterly partisan era of divided government is a small-ball bargain that tries to take the edge off of automatic budget cuts known as seques-Official Capitol Hill negotiations start next week

but Ryan and Reid both weighed in Thursday to tamp down any expectations that the talks might forge a large-scale agreement where several previous high-level talks have failed.

Long-standing, entrenched differences over taxes make a large-scale budget pact virtually impossible, according to lawmakers, their aides and observers who will be monitoring the talks.

Republicans say they simply won't agree to any further taxes atop the 10-year, \$600 billion-plus tax increase on upper-income earners that President Barack Obama and Democrats muscled through Congress in January. Without higher taxes, Democrats say they won't yield to cuts in benefit programs like Medicare.

### Veteran Tennessee Guard recruiter held in shooting of 2 superiors; wounded had served overseas

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Subdued by fellow soldiers and arrested by local police, a Tennessee National Guardsman was likely to face federal charges Friday in the shooting of two of his superiors at an armory north of Memphis. The sergeant first class, whose name was not re-

leased, had been disciplined before he opened fire with a handgun Thursday at the armory in Millington, Tenn., according to a law enforcement official who had been briefed on the case.

The official was not authorized to discuss the investigation publicly and spoke on condition of ano-

The wounded — a major and a sergeant major who had both served overseas — were expected to be released from a Memphis hospital soon, said Maj. Gen. Max Haston, adjutant general of the Tennessee Guard.

All three of the men were recruiters, and the shooter has been in the Guard about six or seven years, Haston said.

### 5 people injured in mishap on 'Vortex' ride at N.C. State Fair

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — An accident on a ride at the North Carolina State Fair injured five people.

A preliminary investigation indicates that passengers may have been injured when the "Vortex" ride started up again as they were getting off, about 9:17 p.m. Thursday, fair spokesman Brian Long

He said an ambulance was on the scene immediately, and that two of the injuries "appear to be serious; the other three not as serious.' The injured riders ranged in age from 14 to 39

Wake County Sheriff Donnie Harrison told a news conference. Linda Fowler, clinical administrator for WakeMed in Raleigh, confirmed that five people were admitted to the hospital from the fair, but she did not give out further information.

The "Vortex" spins, twirls and flips passengers upside down. Long said the ride would undergo inspection by the state Department of Labor, and that the sheriff's office would also conduct its own investigation and look for witnesses.

### Details of 1999 indictment in JonBenet Ramsey slaying to be released

DENVER (AP) — A grand jury indictment issued in 1999 in the JonBenet Ramsey investigation will be released Friday, and should shed more light on why prosecutors decided against pursuing charges against the little girl's parents. The grand jury reviewed evidence against John

and Patsy Ramsey three years after the 6-year-old beauty queen's body was found bludgeoned and strangled in their home in Boulder on Dec. 26, 1996. A series of possible charges were considered by grand jurors but it's not clear whether they voted to charge one or both parents. The Ramseys maintained their innocence, offer-

ing a \$100,000 reward for the killer and mounting a newspaper campaign seeking evidence.

The district attorney at the time, Alex Hunter, who presented the evidence to the grand jury, declined to pursue charges saying: "I and my prosecutorial team believe we do not have sufficient evidence to warrant the filing of charges against

anyone who has been investigated at this time."

Hunter did not return a phone message left Thursday by The Associated Press.

# Can I (not) help you?

got a call the other morning as I was racing to work from a woman who claimed to work for the "third-party administrator" of one of my health insurers. Yes, I'm one of the incredibly lucky people who actually have two

health insurance plans, one for each of my full-time iobs. The woman wanted to know whether I would like the assistance of an RN on their staff in managing my health care. I knew what she really meant. I said

What she really meant, and what certainly triggered this call, was the two MRIs I have had in the past few weeks, the first of which was denied (and then reversed on appeal) and the second of which was pending (and did get approved). All of a sudden. I was costing a lot. Did she really think I would say, "Who needs the doctors and specialists who have been taking care of me for years and dealing with my family's history of heart issues when I can get advice from an RN who works for the insurance company?" But I was pleasant and just said no.

No, apparently, was not an acceptable answer. A few days later, I got an unctuous letter from the same woman. I'd say it was a form letter, but form letters generally have proper punctuation and sentences that include both nouns and verbs. This one had neither. "I hope this letter finds your

health improving," this person wrote to me. It gave me the creeps. Privacy, anyone? Who was she to be reviewing my records and telling me I was sick? She isn't a doctor or a nurse; she's a penny-pincher. "You have been identified as someone who may benefit from Case Management due to your complex health needs."

BS. You have been identified as someone who has good and dedicated doctors who are making decisions in your best interests, and not the insurers'. You have been identified as someone who is costing us money. "Case Management is a per-

sonalized service that provides you with a Patient Advocate (Registered Nurse) to ensure that your care is being provided timely, appropriately, safely..." Do you see what I mean about the grammar? In fact, the only thing that has of late stood in the way of "timely, appropriately, safely" provided care is fighting with the insurance company to get medically necessary tests performed.

How dumb do they think I am? Do they think I would trust a nurse (I have great respect for registered nurses, except when they are being asked to trim health care costs.) on the payroll of an insurance company rather than the doctors who have taken care of me for decades? Why would I do that?

"Please contact me at vour earliest convenience," wrote the woman I never intend to speak

"I look forward to hearing from you and learning more about how ... our Nurses can help you." Grammar again. She looks forward to learning more about how her Nurses can help me? Maybe she's being honest and

doesn't have a clue because there is no clue. Or maybe they're saving money by hiring people who can't write letters

rather than just paying for the MRI in the first place.

This is not, I should add, Obamacare that I'm talking

I have old-fashioned, pre-Obama, employer-provided insurance. This is the ugly underbelly of managed care, which was destroying the health care system long before Obama got his hands on it.

I discussed it with my doctor of 25 years. He just shook his head. I remember when it first became clear to me, and everyone else, that members of Congress were spending more time raising money than doing the people's business. Now, as every doctor I know who is still in private practice tells me, they work for the insurance companies and some days spend more time fighting with them than taking care of their patients.

I am truly lucky. Blessed. I have insurance. I have wonderful doctors. I know how to stand up for myself. I have problems that can be fixed by the best of modern medicine, and I am in a position to get the best. But I keep thinking of a time, many years ago, when my cousin Irwin was a big-shot doctor at Harvard. When I saw him, it usually was on "private patient" days, with well-to-do patients, no wait, etc. But one time, I had some rash, and my mother was nervous, and so I went in on clinic day. The place was packed. The wait was long. But we clinic patients, all of the poor people and me, got exactly the same care that the private patients did.

My cousin was so proud of that. It was a miracle. We just didn't know it.

# Two good places to rest

o most Spaniards, Christopher Columbus rests where he belongs: in the Gothic Cathedral of Santa Maria in Seville, Spain, the city from where he set sail for the New World in 1492.

But to most Dominicans, Columbus rests

where he wanted to be buried: in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic, where they have built him an impressive tomb — the cross-shaped monument known as "El Faro a Colon" (the Colum-

bus Lighthouse). For more than a century, the people of these two countries have bickered about which one actually holds the bones of the great navigator. And now it turns out that both groups could be right.

Columbus' bones may have been separated, and he could have two legitimate — and welldeserved — burial sites!

Some history: After making four trips to the New World, Columbus died in Villadolid Spain, May 20, 1506. Yet for many years after his death, his bones kept traveling.

For different reasons, including the fear that his remains would fall into enemy hands, Columbus' body was exhumed and reburied several times in Spain, the Dominican Republic and Cuba. It led to a terrible mix-up with another set of bones and to an age-old dispute across the ocean conquered by the great

Although Columbus clearly stated that he wanted to be buried in the New World, at the time of his death it was determined that there was no church of sufficient stature in the Americas to serve as his tomb. He was buried in a Valladolid monastery and remained there for three years, when he was moved to another-

But almost 30 years later, Columbus' daughter-in-law Maria

de Rojas y Toledo, the widow of Columbus' son Diego, was allowed to send the remains of her husband and his father — Columbus — to the cathedral in Santo Domingo. Historians on both sides of the

Atlantic Ocean agree that the remains stayed there for more than two centuries — from 1537 to 1795. But from that point on, there are different theories.

The Spanish say that as they retreated out of the Caribbean islands, they kept taking Columbus' body with them to avoid leaving him in enemy hands, first away from the French and later the Americans.

Before they ceded the island of Hispaniola to France, the Spanish say they dug up Columbus' remains from behind the altar in the Santo Domingo Cathedral and sent him to Cuba, which was another Spanish colony. They say he remained buried in the Havana Cathedral for more than a century, until 1898, when the Spanish-American War forced them to exhume him again and send him back to Seville.

However, the Dominicans say that Columbus' remains never left Santo Domingo.

They say the wrong body perhaps that of Columbus' son Diego — was sent to Cuba and on to Seville. That's because in 1877, when

Columbus' remains were believed to be in Cuba, another set of Columbus' bones were found in the Dominican Republic. Workers digging inside the Santo Domingo Cathedral discovered a box containing

13 large bone fragments and 28 smaller ones. The box was inscribed, "Illustrious and distinguished male, don Cristobal Colon." Because of that discovery,

Spain and the Dominican Republic both have been claiming that they have Columbus for more than 100 years.

But that all was supposed to be over by now, thanks to a group of Spanish researchers who, in 2003, set out to unravel the ageold puzzle of where Columbus is

buried — through DNA testing. They persuaded Spanish church authorities to open a crypt and exhume the bronze chest reputed to contain Columbus' bones, and they sent them — with a police escort — across southern Spain for DNA testing at the University of Granada. They also exhumed two other men: a man thought to be Columbus' brother and one of Columbus' sons, Hernando, whose identity has been confirmed. They compared the three men's DNA.

Yet seven years ago, although great expectations had been built among Columbus historians, the researchers came up with inconclusive findings. While they were able to confirm that at least some of Columbus' remains were buried in Seville, they left open the possibility that Columbus' bones were divided and that the bones now occupy two graves because the Seville crypt contained only 15 percent of a man's remains. "There must be other bones in other places," one of the researchers told reporters.

While giving great evidence to those who argue that Columbus is in Seville, he took the wind out of their sails by explaining that some of Columbus' bones could be in Santo Domingo.

Unfortunately, the Dominican government has been reluctant to allow DNA testing of the bones in the Columbus Lighthouse. Some Dominican scholars still argue that the bones in Seville could have belonged to another Columbus relative and thus still could match the DNA of Columbus' son and brother.

Yet many other Dominicans say they don't mind finding out that the real remains of Columbus are in Spain because then they would demand that Columbus be sent back to Santo Domingo, the place where he said he wanted to be buried.

Stay tuned. More than 521 years after he first crossed the Atlantic, Columbus could be coming back again.

alvin Coolidge was a man of few words.
Historians seem to agree that the 30th
President of the United
States had a knack for
Expecting little and communicat

speaking little and communicating a lot – a rare trait for a politician.

One of the all-time favorite tales about the word-conserving president is an account of his at-

tending church without his wife. When Mr. Coolidge got home from church, Mrs. Coolidge supposedly asked him what the sermon had been about. The president reportedly replied, "Sin."

"What did the preacher say about it," his wife asked?

"He was against it," Mr. Coolidge replied.
Although many researchers have questioned
the validity of the account, it continues to be a
story worthy of repetition – a tongue-in-cheek
rendition about a good natured man.

Another tale, perhaps fictitious as well, recalls that a woman upon hearing that the president had died, asked, "How could they tell?"

In spite of President Coolidge's reluctance to waste words, he did leave a legacy of pithy quotes. Even the most verbose candidates for public office would do well to heed the advice of the former president known as Silent Cal.

In a statement fitting to his reputation, Coolidge said, "You can't know too much, but you can say too much."

On another occasion, the president replied, "I have never been hurt by what I have not said."

In a similar statement, Coolidge advised, "If you don't say anything, you want be called upon to repeat it."

Although Silent Cal wasn't much of a talker, he was a strong advocate for listening. He asserted that it "takes a great man to be a good listener."

He also observed that "no man ever listened himself out of a job."

In evaluating his own presidency, Mr. Coolidge said, "Perhaps one of the most important accomplishments of my administration has been minding my own business."

Apparently, President Coolidge chose his words carefully and applied them sparingly. Sometimes in life, however, we find ourselves short of words to adequately describe a situation. Even in our prayer lives, we struggle to find the appropriate words to tell God what we are experiencing. But there is good news. The Scripture says, "...for we do not know how to pray as we should, but the Spirit Himself intercedes for us with groaning too deep for words," (Romans 8:26b)

Perhaps it doesn't take as many words to communicate with God as we think it does. God listens to contrite hearts instead of eloquent tongues.



says, "Remember, I don't even own a place to lay my head. Foxes have dens to live in, and birds have nests, but I, the Messiah, have no earthly home at

And so it was that one of the leaders of the Jew-

ish nation came "after dark" to Jesus. After all, he did not want to be seen talking with a Man who had no home, who went around with a bunch of ignorant men — some, rough fishermen, some. tax collectors, all unworthy of the friendship of such a man as he.

In the daytime, Jesus, according to Acts 10:38, "went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil...' When He encountered someone who was blind, they went away seeing: when He met someone who was deaf, they went RAINWATER on their way hearing. Jesus passed through a village and there was not one sick person there when He left.

But in John 3 (Living Bible), we read a story. "After dark one night a Jewish religious leader named Nicodemus, a member of the sect of the Pharisees, came for an interview with Jesus."

"Sir," he said, "we all know that God has sent You to teach us. Your miracles are proof enough of this.'

But, instead of Jesus entering into a conversation with him regarding His relationship with His Father, God, He cut right to the chase and told Nicodemus, "With all the earnestness I possess, I tell you this: Unless you are born again, you can never get into the Kingdom of God." John 3:1-3 (Living Bible). Caught completely off guard, Nicodemus began to argue with Jesus that he could not go back into his mother's womb and be born again.

However, Jesus was talking about something totally different; being born of the Spirit of God. When this happens, a person changes their entire way of thinking. Instead of hurrying home from church (maybe even leaving a bit early) to catch the kickoff of the Cowboy's

game, we begin to start focusing our thoughts on things of heaven. Instead of this world absorbing our attention, we start talking with God, getting to know Him and even letting Him begin to direct our thoughts and actions. That is why Jesus said, if we are not born again, we shall not even see the kingdom of heaven.

1. Your first reaction might be to continue with the queen and another trump, planning to run the diamonds later on and in that way avoid the risk of a club finesse if the diamonds are favorably divided.

However, there's a flaw in this plan. Upon winning the jack of trumps at trick five, South might put you on the spot by returning a club. You would then be faced with the

critical decision of whether to attempt the club finesse, or whether to go up with the ace and rely entirely on a 3-2 diamond division. You might make the wrong choice and find yourself going down one.

To avoid this potential dilemma, you should cash the queen of trumps at trick four and then play the K-Q of diamonds. If both opponents follow suit, you can assure the slam by handing South his trump trick and later diseard two clubs on dummy's diamonds. If the diamonds turn out to be divided 4-1 and South has not trumped, you can next concede your trump loser and hope the club finesse will succeed.

2. You can't afford to play the Q-J of trumps at this point, since you would then have no way to reach the J-8 of diamonds in your hand after cashing dummy's A-K-Q.


To give yourself the best chance, play dummy's A-K of diamonds first, hoping North did not start with a singleton or void. If both defenders follow suit, discontinue diamonds and cash the Q-J of trumps, discarding the queen of diamonds from dummy on your last trump. This will allow you to score five diamond tricks. If it were to turn out that South had only one diamond originally, you would of course also cash the queen of diamonds before drawing trumps.

# Cards knot series at 1-all

BOSTON (AP) — One is 22, brimming with vigor and riding a hot streak in the dawn of his career, the other is 36, injected with a painkiller just to make it on the field and refusing to succumb to discomfort during his first and perhaps last chance to earn that

Michael Wacha and Carlos Beltran, both trying to make the most of their first World Series, helped lift the St. Louis Cardinals to a 4-2 victory over the Boston Red Sox on Thursday night that evened the matchup at a game apiece.

"It's the World Series, big-time game," Wacha

Wacha bested John Lackey in a matchup of present and past rookie sensations, Beltran provided a big hit and this time it was the Red Sox who were tripped up by fielding failures.

"Somebody would have to kill me in order for me to get out of the lineup," said Beltran, undeterred by

bruised ribs that landed him in the hospital a night

Matt Holliday tripled and scored on Yadier Molina's fourth-inning grounder, but David Ortiz put Boston ahead 2-1 in the sixth when he pounced on an 85 mph changeup for a two-run homer just over the Green Monster in left field.

That ended Wacha's scoreless streak at 18 2-3 innings — a rookie record for a single postseason – but it was all he gave up. Selected by St. Louis last year with the first-round draft pick received as compensation when Albert Pujols signed with the Los Angeles Angels, Wacha has been so good lately that a St. Louis restaurant he walked into had named a milkshake after him, the "Wacha Wacha."

Wacha, the NL championship series MVP after beating Dodgers ace Clayton Kershaw twice, threw a career-high 114 pitches and allowed two runs, three hits and four walks in six innings with six strikeouts. He improved to 4-0 with a 1.00 ERA in four outings this postseason, matching the amount of regular-season wins he has in his brief career.

"They don't swing at bad pitches, really," Wacha said. "They did a good job tonight grinding out atbats with me and got the pitch count up."

But then Lackey, who in 2002 with the Angels became the first rookie in 93 years to win a World Series seventh game, faltered in a three-run seventh. St. Louis went ahead when Matt Carpenter hit a sacrifice fly that led to a pair of runs, with the second scoring on errors by catcher Jarrod Saltalamacchia and reliever Craig Breslow — both making their Se-

### Romo's 1st 100 starts: Impressive, flawed

IRVING, Texas (AP)

 Tony Romo has the most yards passing in the first 100 starts of any quarterback in the Super Bowl era ahead of Kurt Warner, Dan Marino and Peyton Manning.

The Dallas quarterback takes that impressive stat into Sunday's game against Detroit, which beat the Cowboys two years ago with a huge rally fueled by the downside of Romo's resume — critical turnovers.

Offensive coordinator Bill Callahan, Romo's new play-calling partner after taking over those duties from coach Jason Garrett, says he hasn't "spent a minute" looking at video from that 34-30 loss to the Li-

Callahan showed his faith last week by riding Romo's arm to a touchdown in a 17-3 win over Philadelphia right after an interception that was similar to the 2011 Detroit game.

"Trust is a really, really important word — in any organization, first and foremost," Garrett said. "And certainly you have to have a lot of trust when you're trying to execute offensive ball plays."

The Cowboys trust in

yards against the Eagles to put him at 27,485 as a starter.

That's 44 more yards than Warner and 211 better than Marino. It's nearly 10,000 yards better than Staubach or Aikman, but the number that matters most in that comparison is Super Bowl titles.

Staubach has two, Aikman three.

There will never be a shortage of people to remind Romo how many he has, until he wins one anyway.

"You know that, and that's what it's going to come down to," said Romo, the franchise leader in touchdown passes and second to Aikman in other major categories. "That's

what your goals are."

The Cowboys were on the verge of a 3-1 start in 2011, leading the Lions 27-3 in the third quarter when Romo threw two interceptions that were returned for touchdowns and a third that set up Detroit's winning score.

Dallas went on to the first of consecutive 8-8 seasons, both ending with losses in playoffsor-bust finales. What made it worse was Romo only had seven interceptions combined in the other 15 games, and the Cowboys wasted his only season with a 100-plus quarterback rating.

"There were a lot of good things in that game," Garrett said.

# **Favre dismisses possibility of joining Rams**

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Brett Favre dismissed the possibility of returning to the NFL with St. Louis, and Rams coach Jeff Fisher declined to address reports he tried to lure the quarterback out of retirement to replace the injured Sam Bradford.

Favre told Washington sports station WSPZ-AM he doesn't feel physically able to compete and expressed fear that he has been affected by concussions.

"It's flattering, but you know there's no way I'm going to do that," Favre said. Fisher changed the subject after practice, then said "Nice try" when asked whether the 44-year-old Favre could be ready to play. Bradford is out for the season with a knee injury.

"I don't remember my daughter playing SOCcer, playing youth soccer, one summer," Favre told WSPZ. "I don't remember that. I got a pretty good memory, and I have a tendency like we all do to say, 'Where are my glasses?' and they're on your head. This was pretty shocking to me that I couldn't remember my daughter playing youth soccer, just one summer, I think. I remember her playing basketball, I remember her playing volleyball, so

I kind of think maybe she only played a game or two. I think she played eight. So that's a little bit scary to me. For the first time in 44 years, that put a little fear in me. ...

"I think after 20 years, God only knows the toll."

Rams defensive end Robert Quinn didn't think there was anything to the reports.

"Brett Favre is staying retired," Quinn said. "Brett hasn't played since 2010 and he's comfortable down there in Mississippi on a boat or something. Have fun with it, Brett."

Kellen Clemens, the back-

up the past two seasons, will make his 13th career start Monday night against the Seattle Seahawks. The Rams also signed Brady Quinn and Austin Davis.

Fisher said he wouldn't discuss players contacted after Bradford tore his left ACL on Sunday at Carolina, although he confirmed Tyler Thigpen also worked

TCU players feel much the same way. "It's just a Big 12 game. It's a conference game. It's not really just the fact we're playing Texas," Frogs safety Elisha Olabode said. " No matter who we're playing, we're going to have the same focus."

**AFTER THE BYE:** Texas is 20-5 in games following regular-season bves since Brown took over the program in 1998. The last such loss was the game against TCU last season. It is the second game in a row that the Horned Frogs are playing an opponent that had the previous week off. ## Red Sox Lefty Lester accused of foreign substance

BOSTON (AP) — Jon Lester says there was nothing but rosin — which is perfectly legal — on his glove when he beat the St. Louis Cardinals in Game 1 of the World Series.

A Cardinals minor leaguer posted a screen shot on Twitter showing a green substance on Lester's glove. Tyler Melling, a 25-year-old pitcher in the Florida State League, wrote: "Jon Lester using a little Vaseline inside the glove tonight?"

The Boston Red Sox left-hander said before Game 2 on Thursday night that "I can honestly tell you that all I use is rosin. So, it's obviously frustrating that after a night like last night, we should be having fun and running around with some energy today and I've got to stand here and answer questions about it."

Lester allowed five hits in 72-3 scoreless innings with eight strikeouts and a walk in the Red Sox's 8-1 victory.

Boston manager John Farrell also said Lester uses only rosin, which is provided on the pitcher's mound, to get a better grip.

"If you know Jon Lester, he sweats like a pig and he needs rosin," Farrell said before Game 2. "I don't see this as anything at all."

Major League Baseball said in a statement Thursday that "we cannot draw any conclusions from this video. There were no complaints from the Cardinals and the umpires never detected anything indicating a foreign substance throughout the game."

Section 8.02 of the Official Baseball Rules says a pitcher "shall not apply a foreign substance of any kind to the ball" and says the penalty for a violation is ejection and an automatic suspension.

"MLB has obviously evaluated it and issued a statement," Farrell said. "We consider it closed."

Melling's tweet was later deleted.

"Obviously, when I get a text at 2 o'clock in the morning, it's not fun," a composed Lester said. "I understand. I saw the picture. It looks bad."

He also said he sweats a lot and rosin helps control that.

"I throw rosin in my glove. That's it," Lester said. "I warm up with one hat in the bullpen and then have to change hats when I come in (to the dugout). I've had plenty of games where I've got sweat dripping off my brim. I've put rosin on my hat before to try to stop it."
