# **Raises, landfill**, **CPS** fees

Items top county proposed agenda

#### By STEVE REAGAN

Howard County commissioners are leaning toward a new budget that features pay raises for all employees, \$500,000 for the county's share of landfill costs and a sharp increase in attorney fees for Child Protective Services cases.

A significant jump in valuations will allow commissioners to cut more than 4 cents from the county's current tax rate and still bring in almost \$900,000 in extra tax revenue in the coming fiscal year, County Auditor Jackie Olson said.

Commissioners are eyeing a tax rate of 31.6 cents per \$100 valuation, which will net the county \$869,000 more in tax revenue this fiscal year than current levies. The expiring county tax rate is almost 36 cents per \$100 valuation.

With that extra revenue, commissioners are planning three major expenses:

• Pay raises — Under the proposed budget, employees (excluding commissioners) will receive a 4 percent increase in salaries this coming fiscal year. In addition, employees will receive an additional \$20 per month for every year of service to the county over

three years, Olson said. • Landfill — Per agreements

ARLINGTON (AP) — The first time Tony Romo set up to pass, he had to twist slightly and move forward in the pocket before zipping a throw to Dez Bryant.

When Romo botched a handoff for a fumble a few plays later, the Dallas quarterback found himself hanging onto Baltimore's Courtney Upshaw with one hand, unsuccessfully trying to prevent a touchdown.

The good news, following surgery for a herniated disk, is that Romo's back held up.

Now he and the Cowboys have to figure out how much he'll play Saturday night in an exhibition game at Miami. That figures to be his last action before the opener Sept. 7 against San Francisco.

"It just feels like playing football," Romo said after a 37-30 preseason loss to the Ravens on Saturday night. "Anytime you come off surgery, I understand the predictions, the process you're going through. Everyone's going to have them. Some people come back stronger, better. Some people come back early, they've got to take more time and then get better. Each guy's different."

## This Date In History

Today is Monday, Au-

gust 18, the 230th day of 2014. There are 135 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On August 18, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson issued his Proclamation of Neutrality, aimed at keeping the United States out of World War I, saying, "The United States must be neutral in fact as well as in name during these days that are to try men's souls."

On this date: In 1587, Virginia Dare became the first child of English parents to

America, on what is now Roanoke Island in North Carolina. (However, the Roanoke colony ended up mysteriously disappearing.) In 1838, the first marine expedition sponsored by the U.S. government set sail from Hampton Roads, Virginia; the crews traveled the southern Pacific Ocean, gathering scientific information. In 1846, U.S. forces led by General Stephen W. Kearny captured Santa Fe, New Mexico. In 1862, Dakota Indians began an uprising in Minnesota (the revolt was crushed by U.S. forces some six weeks later). In 1920, the 19th

Amendment to the Constitution, guaranteeing all American women's right to vote, was ratified as Tennessee became the 36th state to approve it. In 1938, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Canadian Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King dedicated the Thousand Islands Bridge connecting the United States and Canada.

# **Drew Brees returns to** practice for New Orleans

METAIRIE, La. (AP) - Drew Brees walked up to the line of scrimmage early Sunday, taking a snap during the New Orleans Saints' prepractice walk-through.

Though the play was only at quarter-speed, quarterback received a resounding applause from those in attendance at the Saints' first training practice at home since returning from White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia. For the first time since

Aug. 1, when Brees strained a left oblique muscle, he fully participated in a practice. "I've been taking it

very slow, very deliberate," said Brees, who sat out six practices and two games and was limited in two other practices. "No use in rushing something that could get worse. I wanted to make sure it was all good. I'm still not 100 percent, but I hope that by Saturday I am."

While Brees pegged the Saints' game Saturday night at Indianapolis as his date to see his first game action, coach Sean Payton wasn't setting any time-

"I think our plan is that he'll be able to (play)," Payton said. "Like I said earlier, I want to make sure that we're not looking at the date ahead of the injury."

Brees hasn't missed a start due to injury since coming to New Orleans in 2006. The only time he failed to play for the Saints was the season finale in 2009, when New Orleans already had locked up the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs.

He owns NFL records for passing percentage in a season (71.2 percent) and completions in a season (468) and is the only quarterback who has thrown for more than 5,000 yards in a season four times.

His ability to remain on the field for New Orleans was part of the reason the former Super Bowl MVP was on the cover of Sports Illustrated recently. The magazine article touted his offseason workout routine, which focuses on his core muscles.
