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Computer glitch leaves entities scrambling

County recalculates tax rate, sets hearings

Blame it on the computers. Howard County commissioners were forced to refigure the county's proposed tax rate for the new fiscal year Monday morning and the main culprit, it turned out, was faulty software.

A glitch in the computer system at the county tax appraisal district resulted in incorrect information being passed on to the area's taxing entities, forcing all of them to go back to the drawing board and determine new tax rates for the coming 12 months.

In Howard County's case, it meant adding slightly more than a penny to the proposed rate, boosting it to 32.7 cents per \$100, County Auditor Jackie Olson said.

A penny may not sound like much, but the error could have resulted in a major shortfall for the county.

"If we had gone with the (incorrect) rate," Precinct 3 Commissioner Jimmie Long

Tax rate mishap won't derail Howard College

Trustees must reschedule public hearings, however

Call it a do over.

Several Howard County taxing entities received a call Monday morning from the county tax assessor/collec-

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tors' office informing them vigorously put pencil to pathe effective tax rate figures used in determining their proposed budgets and tax rates were incorrect.

"An incorrect number was given to the tax collector's office by the software company for calculation purposes," said Dr. Cheryl Sparks, Howard College president.

That left Howard College officials — who were only hours away from a 2015 budget hearing and board meeting — to per to figure out what effect the new numbers would have on the proposed budget.

According to the Texas State Comptroller's truth in taxation website, the effective rate is a calculated rate that allows the taxing entity to raise about the same revenue as last year. Entities are limited in setting a tax rate above this number to raise more tax revenue before going over the roll back rate. That could

subject the tax rate to a voterapproved election.

According to Sparks, the new effective tax rate for maintenance and operation is 12.6092 cents per \$100 valuation up from the original 12.3832 cents per \$100.

However, Howard College officials said even with the new number, the impact on the taxpayer's purse strings is relatively unchanged. The college expects to raise 3.76 percent more in tax revenue this next year, about what officials originally project when

the budget was constructed. To raise that project revenue, officials are working off a tax rate of 17.6620 cents per \$100 valuation, up from 17.3457 cents per \$100 valuation. That breaks down to 13.6171 cents per valuation \$100, up from the original rate of 13.2730 per valuation

(though Raku firings can last

up to several hours depending

on the individual pieces and their firing requirements). The result is often a metallic

appearance in the glaze. "We are very grateful to Mr. Fowler," said Slaten, who said she is looking forward to hosting the workshops. "As soon as we get them scheduled we will let everybody know the details."

Most of the increase in tax revenue will come from the hike in mineral values, Sparks said, with just a percentage impacting residential property owners. An owner with a home valued at \$100,000 will see an estimated \$14.71 decrease in their tax bill from the college district if their home value stayed relatively the same as last year.

With that knowledge in hand, Howard College trustees approved the 2015 Howard College and SouthWest Collegiate Institute for the Deaf budgets Monday afternoon following the close of the hearing which drew no comment from general public.

Howard College, which includes monies for the Lamesa and San Angelo campuses, will work on a projected \$39.8 million budget in both restricted and unrestricted funds with a projected deficit of \$163,242. The SWCID budget stayed relatively flat from last year, \$4.8 million in restricted and unrestricted funds.

"He was his own worst enemy tonight," Seattle skipper Lloyd McClendon said. "He battled all night with his stuff, his command. I'm not sure what's going on — can't quite put my finger on it, but we've got to get it straightened out."

Rougned Odor padded the lead with an RBI groundout in the seventh, scoring Leonys Martin from third.

Baylor Bears

Once the league's perennial last-place team, Baylor has four consecutive winning seasons for the first since 1985-88. with four consecutive bowls after 16 seasons in a row without a postgame game.

Quarterback Bryce Petty, now a legitimate Heisman candidate, and a talented group of receivers led by Antwan Goodley (1,339 yards receiving with Big 12-high 13 TDs) are back on an offense that led the nation with 619 total yards and an NCAA-record 52.4 points per game last season.

Petty threw for Big 12-leading 4,200 yards with 32 touchdowns and only three interceptions. He also led the league with 14 rushing TDs.

Iowa St. Cyclones

Even Iowa State knows that it probably won't win the Big 12 this year. The Cyclones just want to win a bowl game.

Iowa State went to three bowls in its first four years under coach Paul Rhoads. But the Cyclones fell apart last season, losing seven straight Big 12 games and finishing 3-9 — by far their worst mark for Rhoads.

Iowa State has predictably been picked to finish ninth in the 10-team league, ahead of only Kansas. But Rhoads has set the bar at a postseason victory.

There are some reasons to believe that the Cyclones can be better than most people think.

They've brought in Mark Mangino, one of the brightest offensive minds in Big 12 history, was held to 21 points or less six times last season. The former Kansas coach and Oklahoma offensive coordinator will have the luxury of using a returning starter at every spot if he chooses.

Kansas Jayhawks

Kansas coach Charlie Weis settled into a seat behind a small table, pored over the sheet of paper in front of him the tentative two-deep heading into fall camp and offered quite possibly the most accurate assessment of his pro-

"When we hand out a roster," Weis said, "this is the best we feel by a wide margin about the talent we have here. But that being said, we've done very little to back that up, me included."

Weis is entering the third year of his fiveyear contract with the Jayhawks.

Weis made a bold move in the spring of naming Montell Cozart his starting quarterback, rather than let the competition carry over into the fall.

Kansas St. Wildcats

The cliche runs off the tongue of quarterback Jake Waters, one that is used in everyday life by millions of people but perhaps most accurately reflects that situation at Kansas State.

"What a difference a year makes," he said.

Indeed, a year ago Waters was the junior college transfer in a heated battle with Daniel Sam to win the starting job. The Wildcats were replacing nine starters on defense. And after a loss to lowerdivision North Dakota pectations were hitting a nadir.

Now, a full 12 months later, Waters is firmly entrenched as the starter with Sams having transferred to McNeese State. The defense returns a bevy of talent led by All-Big 12 defensive end Ryan Mueller. And after winning six of their final seven games, including a blowout of Michigan in the Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl, expectations are once against soaring.

Okla. St. Cowboys

Oklahoma State coach Mike Gundy is about to find out how far his program has come.

When Gundy took over in 2005, little was expected of the Cowboys, especially during rebuilding years. Now, the Cowboys are still considered dangerous by many experts, despite returning just six starters on offense and four on defense from a team that went 10-3 and lost in the Cotton Bowl.

Some of that optimism comes from Oklahoma State's 59 wins since the start of the 2008 season — eighth most in the na-

be," quarterback Trevor Knight said.

There's plenty of reason for confidence. The Sooners capped off a strong finish to last season with a win over Alabama in the Sugar Bowl that energized the rabid fan base. Oklahoma now must back up the excitement it has generated. starting Aug. 30 at home against Louisiana Tech.

Tight end Blake Bell said the Sooners have put in the time to be great.

"This year seems like it could be a special year," he said.

The Sooners could be tested Sept. 13 at home Tennessee, against but play most of their toughest Big 12 games at home.

TCU Horned Frogs

After four conference losses by three points or less last year, including three losses the final month by a combined eight points to cap a 4-8 season, Gary Patterson knew it was time for "truly a change of philosophy." He hired co-coordinators Doug Meacham from Houston and Sonny Cumbie from Texas Tech to give TCU its own version of a faster-paced spread offense.

While the Frogs have put up big offensive numbers in the past, and scored at least 27 points seven times last season, the changes come heading into their third Big 12 season after a dominating run in the Mountain West.

Texas Longhorns

Texas New Charlie Strong wasted no time delivering fans a mands from his players.

Way back in April, on the first stop of a statewide introductory tour, Strong told Longhorns fans Texas "will not be in the national championship game."

Wait. What? Talk about a culture change. Strong promised one and he plans to deliver. Until Texas sheds its

entitlement image even after four years of mediocre football can't expect to play for any kind of trophies.

Few outside of Texas would presume the Longhorns could even argue their way into the Top 25 after four years without a Big 12 title and a paltry 18-17 record in league play. Those results ended the 16-vear tenure of Mack Brown and when Strong was hired from Louisville, he promised a return to championship form the first day he was on campus.

Texas Tech Red Raiders

Coach Kliff Kingsbury and his quarterback are in similar territory entering their second seasons at Texas Tech.

Both say they've have put last year behind them, especially after the Red Raiders (8-5) had five straight losses to close the regular season and finished near the

bottom in penalties and turnovers.

Progress is needed in several areas and mistakes lessened, Kingsbury said.

"That's going to happen with young quarterbacks," he said. "If we improve upon that, then things will be looking up."

For the first time in vears Texas Tech's starting quarterback is already set. Davis Webb will be the one taking snaps for the Red Raiders after competing with Baker Mayfield, last season's Big 12 freshman offensive player of the year. Mayfield transferred to Oklahoma.

WVU Mountaineers

Coach Dana Holgorsen needs no reminder about the lack of success he's seen on the field since ushering in West Virginia's move to the Big

Hired to make the Mountaineers a national fixture, Holgorsen brought immediate success with a Big East title and resounding Orange Bowl win over Clemson in the 2011 season. But the last two years mostly have been a disappointment and Holgorsen is hoping some changes to his defensive staff can help bring immediate results.



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
