
Break out the black and gold, Big Spring High School alumni are returning home this week for 2014 homecoming festivities.







Fort Worth boy, 14, drowns trying to recover dove

ALVARDO, Texas (AP) — A 14-year-old North Texas boy has drowned in a stock pond while trying to retrieve a dove that was shot during a hunt-The Johnson County Sheriff's Office on Mon-

day identified the victim as Joseph Lopez of Fort

Lt. Tim Jones says the boy was part of group hunting on Sunday in a rural area near Alvarado. Jones says the boy entered the pond to recover

a dove but then he never resurfaced. Emergency personnel who responded to a report of a possible drowning used a boat to search for the teen. Divers from the Cleburne Fire Department recovered the body Sunday night.

Further details weren't immediately available.

Coast Guard rescues 3 stranded boaters off Texas

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Three people who reported being stranded and disoriented in their disabled boat off the Texas coast this weekend later turned up on land in a rescue that spanned

The Coast Guard announced the rescue in a statement late Sunday.

The trio called for help Friday night as their 22foot boat was adrift in Matagorda Bay, but were unsure of their location. The boat had launched from Froggies Bait Dock in Port O'Connor in an attempt to reach a cabin on north Matagorda Island, the Coast Guard said. The search continued into Saturday amid rain

and strong winds. Rescuers in an airplane spotted the three people late Saturday afternoon on the beach 21 miles south of the Matagorda jetties after their boat washed ashore.

A helicopter picked up a man, 56, and a woman, 42, who were treated for hypothermia. The third man said he was unharmed and refused to leave the isolated area, the Coast Guard said. The weather worsened and the Coast Guard contacted personnel with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department in an effect to locate the man, who was found safe Sunday.

"We are extremely happy this case had three happy endings," Lt. Cmdr. Nathan Allen said. "We had great teamwork between our air and surface assets to find the three boaters after a long search. The two who climbed onboard our helicopter made the right decision to be taken away from danger."

"The third man is extremely lucky to be found by our partner agencies," Allen said.

Names of the three people were not immediately

Highland Park ISD reverses, drops ban of 7 books DALLAS (AP) — A suburban Dallas school has

reversed course and will let students read seven books removed from an approved list amid some parents' concerns about sex scenes and references to abortion, abuse and rape.

Highland Park Independent School District Superintendent Dawson Orr apologized for the disruption in a statement Sunday.

"All the titles that were temporarily suspended will be restored to the approved reading list," he

Orr decided earlier this month to suspend the books that came under question by hundreds of parents, raising concerns about what their children were reading. He acted in an attempt to de-escalate the conflict but his decision had the opposite effect, he said.

The books that had been banned were: "The Glass Castle: A Memoir" by Jeannette Walls; "Song of Solomon" by Toni Morrison; "The Art of Racing in the Rain" by Garth Stein; "The Working Poor: Invisible in America" by David K. Shipler; "Siddhartha" by Hermann Hesse; "The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian" by Sherman Alexie; and "An Abundance of Katherines" by John Green.

The district will work to provide greater transparency and inclusion of all viewpoints on its literature review committee, Orr said.

"More information will be provided about literature that might contain potentially objectionable content," he said. "In such cases, a parent permission form will be sent home. If a parent expresses concern, an alternative piece of literature will be provided for his/her child."

The goal is to provide all students with excellent reading material that meets the same instructional objections, the superintendent said.

Jury to decide sentence in poisoned doctor trial

HOUSTON (AP) — It's now up to a jury to sentence a Texas cancer researcher for poisoning her colleague and lover by spiking his coffee with a chemical found in antifreeze. Closing arguments are set for Monday in the pun-

ishment phase of the trial of Dr. Ana Maria Gonzalez-Angulo, a breast cancer doctor based at Houston's famed Texas Medical Center. A jury convicted Gonzalez-Angulo on Friday of

aggravated assault for poisoning Dr. George Blumenschein with ethylene glycol in 2013 after he spurned her in favor of his longtime girlfriend. Gonzalez-Angulo could be sentenced to up to

life in prison. On Friday, however, her colleagues and former patients asked jurors to sentence the 43-year-old doctor to probation, describing her as a compassionate person.

2 charged over 3 boys taken from Texas foster home

SEGUIN, Texas (AP) — A South Texas man and woman have been charged with kidnapping after three boys were abducted from a foster home but later rescued and returned. KSAT-TV reports 26-year-old Christopher Jasso

of San Antonio and 28-year-old Judith Reyes of Seguin are each charged with three counts of aggravated kidnapping. Jasso and Reves were being held Monday on

\$300,000 bond apiece. Online jail records didn't indicate attorneys for the pair. Details weren't immediately available about a possible motive. Guadalupe County authorities say Jasso had a

gun when he and Reves allegedly took the boys late

Thursday. The children are younger than 8 years A deputy later spotted Jasso's vehicle, leading to a brief chase and the arrest of the suspects. The un-

harmed boys were returned to their foster family.

Police: Texas 7-Eleven clerk helped plan robbery

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Austin police say a 7-Eleven clerk helped orchestrate a robbery at the store.

Police have charged four people with a first-degree felony count of engaging in organized criminal activity. That includes 21-year-old employee Leah Gonzalez. An off-duty Travis County jail deputy called po-

lice Saturday night to report an armed robbery. Reports say the robbers took \$250 in cash and \$6,000 in gift cards. The deputy followed a gold minivan that con-

tained the suspects until police arrived. They say the suspects led police on a chase through residential streets and on Interstate 35 that reached 120 mph. They say the clerk's boyfriend, brother and friend were arrested and that all four live togeth-

All four are each being held in the Travis County jail on \$125,000 bond. Online jail records didn't indicate attorneys.

Deputy: Family members foil robbery in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — The Harris County Sheriff's Office says a robbery suspect has been apprehended after an armed relative of the victim chased down the man. Deputies say a man and his daughter had pulled

into the driveway of their Houston home when they were approached by three people. They say the trio demanded cash and cellphones before knocking the man to the ground and kicking him.

Several family members heard the scuffle and one ran outside with a gun. Deputies say the suspects scattered and one family member chased down a man and held him until officers arrived. The two others got away.

Police haven't released the identities of the family members or suspects. Neither the family mem-



an opening spade lead by South to score 430 points.

At the other table, with Lorenzo Lauria and Alfredo Versace sitting North-South, the bidding went as shown. Versace's two-diamond bid showed a long major suit, and Lauria did not really care which one it was. Thus the Italians ended in four spades doubled, which seemingly was destined to go down two. Bob Hamman, West, led a low

spade, taken by Paul Soloway with the ace. The defenders could have collected two hearts and a club at that point to hold the U.S. loss to 8 IMPs, but Soloway, no doubt thinking he would have plenty of time to take tricks later, and hoping to stop club ruffs in the dummy, continued with a trump. That gave Versace a chance for a huge pickup.

He won the return with dummy's

king and now had the opportunity for a rare "backward" finesse — leading the jack from dummy, in the hope that East had the queen and West the ten. Given East's one-notrump opening, Versace felt the queen was much more likely to be on his right, so after a long study he led the jack from dummy and, when Soloway followed low, let it ride

This gave Versace five diamond tricks and 11 in all for a score of 690. Added to the 430 registered by his teammates at the other table, the result was a 15-IMP gain for the Italians, giving them a 3-IMP lead with just eight deals to go in the match.

Tannehill leads Dolphins to win in London

LONDON (AP) - All those distractions didn't seem to fluster Ryan Tannehill.

The Dolphins quarterback, who was in the middle of a storm all week because his coach declined to endorse him as the starter, led the way Sunday as Miami (2-2) beat the Oakland Raiders 38-14 at Wembley Stadium.

Tannehill took advantage of a depleted Oakland defense, throwing plenty of short passes for big gains. The third-year quarterback completed 23 of 31 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns.

"I know I wasn't playing up to standards the last few weeks, so I wanted to come out and personally play better," Tannehill said. "My teammates demand that from me and they expect that from me, and to finally come out and do that felt good."

Tannehill threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Mike Wallace and an 18-yarder to Dion Sims. Lamar Miller rushed for two more TDs, and cornerback Cortland Finnegan ran back a fumble 50 yards for another.

But the star was Tannehill.

"I thought he had good rhythm. He had good tempo. He had good command. He was very decisive out there," Dolphins coach Joe Philbin said.

The Raiders (0-4) scored on their opening drive but struggled after that. And starting quarterback Derek Carr was injured in the third quarter, replaced by third-stringer Matt McGloin.

Oakland began the game without linebackers Nick Roach and Sio Moore, who were both inactive. Kaluka Maiava, who started in place of Moore, was then injured on the first Dolphins series, allowing Tannehill and his receivers to take even more advantage of the short pass.

The Dolphins opened the season with a win over the New England Patriots, but backto-back 19-point losses to Buffalo and Kansas City put Tannehill's starting job at stake.

Philbin was repeatedly asked who his starter would be against the Raiders in London, but he declined to utter the name "Tannehill."

That only seemed to spur Tannehill on.

"I felt like, regardless of what people were writing or talking about me for whatever reason, I still wanted to play well,' Tannehill said.

But it was the Raiders who jumped out to a quick lead. Carr completed a 30-yard pass to James Jones on the first play from scrimmage and soon after went ahead 7-0 on a 3-yard catch by Brian Leonhardt.

The Dolphins took the lead for good early in the second quarter, with Tannehill completing six passes in a sevenplay drive that culminated with Wallace's TD.

Miller then scored the first of his touchdowns to make it 17-7, running in from 8 yards out, and Tannehill was soon at it again with the TD pass to Sims for a 24-7 halftime lead.

"Ryan is a guy who rarely shows any fluster, who rarely shows that he is out of his element," Dolphins receiver Brian Hartline said. "He handles everything on the go."
