# **Police** probe **Friday** shooting

19-year-old victim in Lubbock hospital Special to the Herald

Big Spring police are investigating a Friday night shooting that left a local teenager in serious condition.

Police responded to 1606 Kentucky at about 11:40 p.m. Friday in reference to a shooting, a BSPD news release stated.

"Upon arrival it was learned the female victim had been driven to Scenic Mountain Medical Center by her boyfriend in a private vehicle," the release stated. "Officers secured the residence ... while additional officers responded to (the hospital)."

The 19-year-old female victim, who has not been identified, suffered a gunshot wound to the upper torso and was subsequently flown by helicopter to University Medical Center in Lubbock for treatment.

BSPD investigators executed a search warrant for 1606 Kentucky Way and recovered evidence relating to this investigation, the release stated.

Police had not released any acditional information related to the shooting as of this morning.

# Election highlights council agenda

Staff Writer Big Spring's City Council is ex-

pected to approve establishing May 9 as the date for this year's municipal elections when it meets at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday in council chambers, located at 307 E. Fourth St.

Three council seats will be up for election this year — District 2, currently held by Carmen Harbour,

District 4, held by Bobby McDonald

and District 6, in which Marvin Boyd

is the incumbent. None of the three have indicated whether they will seek re-election.

Early voting the municipal election will be held from April 27 to May 5 in the office of Howard County Election Coordinator Saundra Bloom, located on the first floor of the county courthouse.

On election day, polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at Dorothy Gar-







and Visitors Bureau provided the space needed for the two additional staff members, as well as a full-size gift shop and information center. "As we've all noticed, Big Spring is growing and there are some ex-

citing things happening. Being able to have a visitor's center is just one of the ways that we can better serve those who are either coming through town or looking to relocate here," Wegman said. "We have a wide range of brochures in the lobby that provide information on different areas of Big Spring and of course the gift shop which offers a good selection of souvenirs."

The move also allowed the community services department to be located under the same roof. Terri Telchick took over that position and can be contacted at 264-2323 for those needing to schedule use of the city facilities, which include the Dora Roberts Community Center, city parks pavilions and amphitheater, Municipal Auditorium, Roy Anderson Sports Complex and the Russ McEwen Aquatic Center.

"An important thing about the relocation and restoration of this building is that it was funded by the hotel and motel tax, not taxpayer dollars," Wegman said. "That is what those taxes are designated for, any kind of projects that are aimed at bringing visitors to Big Spring. What better way to serve those people than having a visitor's center?"

Opening a visitor's center has been a much anticipated project for Wegman since she stepped into her position and with the growth tak-

being in the middle of the downtown growth and are looking forward to seeing the future of Big Spring," she said.

Some of the upcoming projects include the restoration of the historic Big Spring in Comanche Trail Park.

"We are looking at beautifying the area around the spring which is our namesake — and making it an area where outdoor events can be held, families can go for gatherings, outdoor weddings can be held, etc. The possibilities are endless, really," Wegman said. "The project will allow residents to enjoy the park even more than they are able to do now and help restore and

highlight a huge part of our history." The Texas Historical

Commission has also requested Big Spring's participation in a project that will highlight the Bankhead Highway. "Part of the reason

this relocation is so exciting is that we are right on the Bankhead Highway — Third Street — and Big Spring has been chosen to be one of the three pilot cities in Texas to take part in this project that is focused on bringing attention to the historhighway,"Wegman said.

The Bankhead Highway was the nation's transcontinental highway. It extended from Washington D.C. to San Diego and helped birth a new industry highway tourism.

"Big Spring truly has a lot of history and being able to be part of this project is one more way that we can highlight a piece of that history, while showing off all that our town has to offer," Wegman said.

The focus of the CVB is to spread the word about Big Spring, try to draw visitors and let people know what's going on. The office is also able to provide some financial support for events aimed at bringing out of town visitors.

"The CVB has partnered with several community events that take place each year that have shown to draw people into town. We encourage anyone who is looking to host an event that could potentially bring in outside visitors to contact us, let us

know and we might be able to help," Wegman said.

The official ribbon cutting and open house for the Community Services office and the Visitors Center will take place between 3-6 p.m. Thursday.

"We encourage everyone in the community to stop in and see what we have to offer," Wegman said. "We are looking forward to being able to work with the residents and visitors of Big Spring and surrounding areas."







Opening lead — five of spades. This deal was played in the 1978 World Women's Pair Championship. When Elizabeth Havas and Barbara McDonald of Australia held the North-South hands, the bidding went as shown. The opening two-notrump bid, as played by them, indicated a weak hand containing at least five cards in each of the minor suits. With

her 23 high-card points and excellent

clubs, South naturally carried on to

six clubs, which East doubled. East's double was very questionable. As a general rule, it is unwise to double a slam voluntarily reached when the double might make the play of the hand easier for declarer.

West led a spade, won by East with the ace, and it didn't matter what East did next. In practice, East returned the eight of hearts, ruffed by declarer in dummy. Next came the queen of clubs, and after West showed out, declarer had no difficulty scoring the rest of the tricks.

Mrs. McDonald continued with a trump from dummy at trick four, winning East's ten with the king. She then ruffed the queen of hearts and led dummy's last trump, gobbling up East's J-6 with her A-9 to make six clubs doubled for a top score.

Although East should not have doubled, Mrs. McDonald undoubtedly would have made the slam anyway. The only threat to the contract from the start was the possibility that the trumps were divided 4-0.

If West had all four trumps, the slam could not be made, so Mrs. McDonald would have had no choice but to start the trumps by cashing the queen first.


