# Survey: Gas prices decrease slightly

# Average 1 cent less across state

Special to the Herald

Average retail gasoline prices in Texas have fallen 1 cent per gallon in the past week, averaging \$2.23 a gallon Sunday, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 gas outlets in Texas. This compares with the national aver-

age that has fallen 2.4 cents per gallon in the last week to \$2.43 a gallon, according to gasoline price website GasBuddy.com.

Including the change in gas prices in Texas during the past week, prices Sunday were \$1.04 per gallon lower than the same day one year ago and are 14.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago.

The national average has increased 18.0 cents per gallon during the last month and stands \$1.09 per gallon lower than this day one year ago.

"After March came in like a lion at the pump, things are beginning to cool down, especially in hardest hit areas in the West," said Patrick DeHaan, GasBuddy senior petroleum analyst. "While the West Coast will continue to see relief in the

# Cruz hones pitch to voters

LINCOLN, N.H. — Ahead of his expected presidential campaign, Sen. Ted Cruz is banking on his hopes that rural New Hampshire voters and his home state of Texas share a similarly dour view of government.

He is promising to abolish the Internal Revenue Service and scrap the Education Department. He vows to curtail federal regulators, likening to locusts

that deserve to be killed. And his standard campaign-style speech includes a zinger about the Second Amendment.

"I'm pretty sure, here in New Hampshire, y'all define gun control like we do down in Texas: gun control is when you hit what you aim at," Cruz said Sunday during the first of a two-day visit to New Hampshire.

It's all part of the pitch Cruz is mak-

# Applications for mail-in ballots now being accepted

Applications to receive a ballot by mail for the May 9 municipal and school district elections are now being accepted by the Howard County Election Office.

"Now is the time to request your application for ballot by mail," said Saundra Bloom, Howard County election administrator. "You can request your application by calling Brooke Wells in the election's office at 432-264-2273."

People who qualify to vote by mail are those who will be out of the county during the early voting period and election day; persons who are age 65 years and older; or are sick and disabled or are confined to jail during the early voting period and on election day. The last day to apply for a bal-

lot by mail is 5 p.m., April 30.

"For newcomers to the county or those who have moved since the last election, the deadline to register to vote in this election is April,"

Bloom said. Elections will be held to fill spots on both the Big Spring and Coahoma city councils and school districts. Only one seat is contested in the Big Spring City Council election. Incumbent Carmon Harbour

drew challenger Thomas Pa-

dilla, for the District 2 seat. As for the other two council seats to fill, Steve Wagoner will step into the District 4 seat replacing Bobby McDonald who opted not to seek a second term. Jim DePauw, a certified public accountant, will succeed Marvin Boyd as the District 6 representative. Boyd also announced he would not run again. Three people are seeking

the job of Coahoma City coun-

cil member as two at-large positions are up this election cycle. Incumbents Ronnie Dodson and Jay Holt are joined by Brandy Manning



ing to rural voters, here in New Hampshire and in other early nominating states with vast stretches of farms and forests. All candidates make such efforts, and frequent stops at county fairs and farm stands will be a staple of campaign schedules by the time there are declared candidates.

Even before he becomes an official candidate, Cruz is crossing off one item on every contender's to-do list: make a visit to the sparsely

populated northern onethird of the state called the North Country. The rural region is home to less than a tenth of the state's population.

But candidates — like would-be-aspirants like Cruz — ignore the region at their peril. While there are fewer voters here than in the populous southern tier of the state, they are vocal. Candidates cannot be perceived as writing off the North Country in favor of the southern region, which is home to newcomers from neighboring Massachusetts.

"We will probably have each and every one come through," Grafton County GOP chairman Bruce Perlo said.

Former Texas Gov. Rick Perry visited last week, and Louisiana Gov. Bobby Jindal and businesswoman Carly Fiorina have announced plans to head north, too.

If the trip and its messaging border on pandering, Cruz does not

"To value liberty and freedom above all else — live free or die," he said, channeling New Hampshire's state motto. "That sums up what it means to be an American."

For now, as Cruz is moving toward making official his White House ambitions, he is pitching himself as a Washington outsider and a conservative champion who would scrap federal departments and return control over schools to parents.

"A week ago, I was in Iowa. Yesterday, I was in South Carolina. Today I'm in New Hampshire," Cruz said.

Ahead of an official declaration, he is working to introduce himself to voters as someone who understands their frustrations.

"If you see a candidate who Washington embraces, run and hide," Cruz told party activists at this Grafton County

GOP fundraiser.

Cruz's standard political speech is laced with such messages against government and tailoring it to the local crowds.

"We have seen over the last six years federal regulators descending on businesses like locusts. I was out once in West Texas and I said the only difference is you can't use pesticide on the regulators. And an old Texas farmer said to me: 'Want to bet?" Cruz said. "I have got to admit: That kind of seems like an attitude that folks in the North Country could understand."

When South overcalled in hearts, North realized East's suit was spades, so he cuebid that suit to show interest in game and possibly slam. South made a return cuebid on his spade void, and at this point, West, also realizing East's suit was

spades, began doubling. However, East interpreted the double as showing spades, so he bid four spades. One can only imagine North's unbridled joy upon hearing the four-spade bid, and then his utter dismay when his partner let East off the hook by bidding four notrump.

Against five hearts doubled, West

led the club queen. Declarer won, ruffed a club in dummy and finessed the diamond queen, losing to the king. West cashed the A-K of hearts and led a diamond to dummy's jack. South then discarded his remaining club on the spade ace, but West ruffed. Down two, plus 300 for Ger-

The top-ranked Wildcats (34-0) are the fourth team to enter the NCAA Tournament without a loss since the Hoosiers, under coach Bob Knight, ran the table.

There was Indiana State, led by future Hall of Famer Larry Bird, get1979 championship game — where the Sycamores lost to Michigan State and fellow future Hall of Famer Magic Johnson. That year Rutgers was also unbeaten entering the tournament and the Scarlet Knights lost to Michigan in the Final

Last season. Wichita State had the unbeaten run to the tournament only to lose to Kentucky in the third round.

coach," Calipari said. "I'm happy we won. I'm happy for our guys. And I'm disappointed, because they had a heck of

Now, the Wildcats get the chance to chase perfection and in a real twist of fate, Wichita State is in the same regional.

There are some differences from the run Hoosiers made to the title than what faces Kentucky.

First, obviously, is that the field has increased from 32 to 68 and that means it takes six wins for a seeded team to win it all. And there were no seeds in 1976, either. That process didn't start until the 1979 tournament.

But what has to be considered the biggest obstacle to a team getting through the NCAA Tournament is the difference

in the number of at-large teams in the field.

In 1976, there were 21 automatic qualifiers and 11 at-large teams, 34 percent of the field. The atlarge teams are usually the better teams from the bigger conferences who didn't win the league tournament.

This year, there are 32 automatic qualifiers and 36 at-large teams, 53 percent of the field.
