Suspects arrested

Shall we meet you at the fair? The 2015 Howard County Fair, replete with fun and games, food and fine music, opens Thursday and runs through Saturday at the fairgrounds located next to the Big Spring Rodeo Bowl.

Tickets are \$6 for adults, \$4 for children ages 6-12 and children under 5 years of age will be free. Gates are open from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. Thursday and Friday and 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. Saturday.

Many of the regular attractions, such as carnival rides, games, cooking demonstrations and the fair queen contest, are back, but there are some new features, as well, and one of them could bring a person national renown — not to mention a big, fat check.

The Country Showdown, set for Saturday night in the entertainment tent, will pit some of the finest singers in this area in a contest that will eventually land them a

national recording contract and a check for \$100,000. Barney Dodd, entertainment director for the fair, said this weekend's winner advances to the Texas State Fair, where they will compete for a chance to advance to the regional, then national stage of the contest.

The music won't be all country flavored, however. On Thursday will be gospel night, while Scars Entertainment will host a karaoke event Friday, Dodd said.

Thursday's opening night schedule features many fair mainstays, include the fair queen contest and domino tournament.

Nightly features include carnival rides and food vendors.

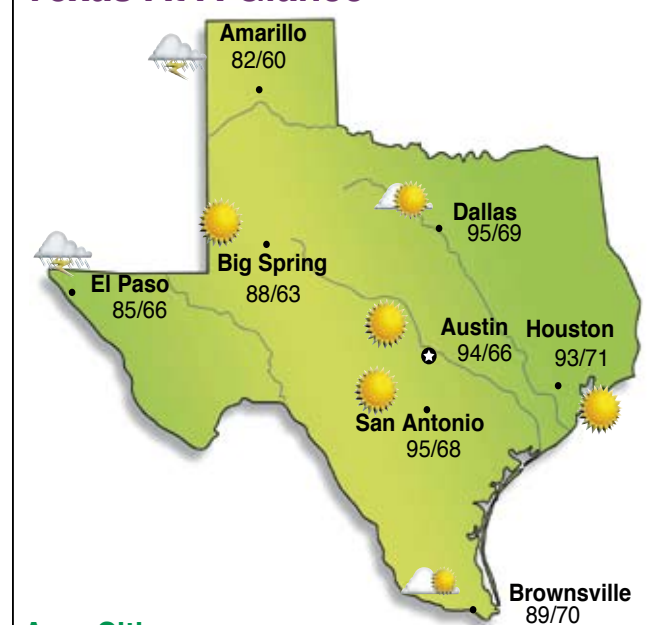

"It was reported that two vehicles were at that location and shots were being fired from at least one of the vehicles," Big Spring Police Sgt. Tony Everett, public information officer, stated. "The vehicles were described as a blue older Buick and a silver Nissan passenger car. As an officer approached the scene, he observed a Nissan leaving the area. He attempted to stop the vehicle and the vehicle began to evade." Mata then attempted to flee police in the Nissan causing a pursuit,

the release said. "The sole male occupant of the vehicle was driving extremely reckless and at one point was driving on Gregg street in the turn lane, not stopping at any traffic control devices," Everett said. "The pursuit ended in an alley near 19th and Johnson." The pursuit continued on foot, the release said, when Mata exited the vehicle holding a handgun in his right hand. Eventually Mata attempted to get rid of the weapon by throwing it away, according to the release, before he was caught by the officer. Mata fought the officer before being subdued, the release

state. The weapon was recovered by police. "He (Mata) was treated shortly after at the emergency room for a minor laceration to his forehead," Everett said. "At the scene, officers learned that between 9 and 13 shots had been fired. It appears that there were three males in the Nissan at first but two left the vehicle before the pursuit began." Two of suspects had been shooting at the blue Buick, which had left scene before police arrived and no witnesses knew who the driver was in the vehicle, the release said. One residence in the 1500 Block of W. Chero-

kee occupied by a woman and her three children had been struck by one round. "The woman did not wish to file any charges," Everett said. "No one was injured in the shooting. The investigation is ongoing and Mata could face more charges." **Assault** Twenty-year-old Victor Castillo and 33-year-old William Morris led police on vehicle chase before fleeing on foot and quickly being caught by officers. The incident began after police responded to the 4200 block of W. Highway 80 — Canyon

Cross Apartments — in reference to an assault about 11:30 p.m., according to police. "Officers were advised that the victim stated he was threatened by a male subject with a handgun," Everett said. "As officers arrived, a vehicle that matched the victims description was leaving the complex. Officers followed the vehicle preparing for a high risk stop. As they activated their emergency lights the vehicle began to flee. "The pursuit began on Airpark Dr. and ended in the 1500 block of Bluebird, when both subjects fled on foot from the vehicle," Ev-

erett continued. "Both suspects were quickly caught and arrested. No weapon was found on the suspects or in the vehicle." Castillo and Morris were both arrested on charges of possession of marihuana and evading police. As of this morning they both remain in custody awaiting arraignment, the release said. The investigation is ongoing and both suspects may face more charges in the future.

Dems face uphill battle

Democratic partisans have been rubbing their hands with glee as billionaire Donald Trump's antics have dominated the Republican primary. I hope they're enjoying themselves, because they soon may find themselves in their own world of hurt.

While pundits have been shaking their heads at Trump's many gaffes, Gallup released a poll that found presumptive Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton is underwater; more Americans view her unfavorably (51 percent) than favorably (41 percent). President Barack Obama also is underwater. The Democratic nominee is no shoo-in.

Democratic graybeard Darryl Sragow sees the Clinton playbook as predetermined: "The fundamental strategy of that campaign has got to be to knock the Republican candidate senseless." To the extent that Clinton has to defend her own avoidable baggage — the controversy over her use of a personal email account as secretary of state only serves to remind voters of the Clinton penchant for highly avoidable scandal over the decades — her team will have less time to clobber the GOP nominee. Quoth Sragow: "For the Democrats' sake, I hope it's Trump."

If Clinton wins the nod, the

Democrats have won the popular vote in five of the past six presidential elections, so you can say the race is theirs to lose. And they may.

2016 contest could be a battle between Clinton and Jeb Bush — which makes both parties look ossified.

But if Bush does not win his party's nomination and Clinton does, the Democrats will be the party of the political past. It could be 2008 in reverse.

All three top-polling Democrats are old enough to collect Social Security. Clinton will be 68 in October. Sen. Bernie Sanders, 74, is a socialist who caucuses with Democrats.

Sanders can win the crank vote, but I don't see a majority of Americans deciding to saddle the economy with a socialist in the Oval Office. Vice President Joe Biden, who may hop into the race, is 72. Biden has a compelling personal story, but he also is gaffe-prone and must carry the baggage of an administration that has many voters clamoring for change.

Trump, 69, was the oldest candidate in last week's prime-time GOP debate. Retired neurosurgeon Ben Carson is 64. Ohio Gov. John Kasich is 63. Bush is 62.

Former Hewlett-Packard CEO Carly Fiorina just turned 61. New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie is 53. Sen. Marco Rubio of Florida is 44, three years younger than Obama when he took the oath of office.

GOP strategist Steve Schmidt had to deal with the age issue in 2008 when he worked for John McCain, then 72. Once voters have chosen a presidential hopeful from a younger generation, Schmidt told me, they're not likely to go back to the previous generation. Though he hasn't picked a favorite candidate, Schmidt noted, "This would seem to bode well for Marco Rubio."

A Trump lead, even as it sags, gives me night sweats. I admit it. But behind Trump, the Republicans have a solid bench. Kasich has set himself up as the swing-state governor who can get things done. Rubio is strong on foreign policy, and he could broaden the party's appeal among minority voters. Fiorina is a fierce campaigner. Bush was a solid conservative governor. Who knows? Maybe Christie can break out.

Check this out: What's at the library

This column will be a mixed bag — equal parts politics, football, White House, Cuba in the late 1950s and a little girl who shamed the CEO of AOL.

In "Girl in the Glass" (618.920 FEI D), Deanna Fei and was just five-and-a-half months pregnant when she inexplicably went into labor. Minutes

later, she met her tiny baby who clung to life support inside a glass box. She was forced to confront terrifying questions: How to be the mother of a child she could lose at any moment.

A year after she brought her daughter home from the hospital, the CEO of AOL — her husband's employer — blamed the now-healthy little girl for a cut in employee benefits and attached a price tag to her life, using a phrase, "distressed babies," that set off a national firestorm.

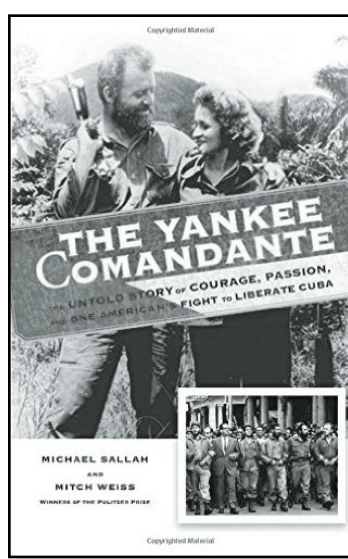
Fei explores the value of a human life, from the spreadsheets wielded by cost-cutting executives to the insidious notions of risk surrounding modern pregnancy; from the wondrous history of medical innovation in the care of premature infants to contemporary analyses of what their lives are worth.

Above all, "Girl in the Glass" is a testament to how love takes hold when a birth defies our fundamental beliefs about how life is supposed to begin.

With resumption of diplomatic relations of the U.S. and Cuba, eyes have turned back to the time of the rupture and "The Yankee Comandante: The Untold Story of Courage, Passion, and One American's Fight to Liberate Cuba" (972.910 SALM) by Michael Sallah and Mitch Weiss tells the story of William Morgan.

William Morgan, a tough-talking ex-paratrooper, stunned family and friends when in 1957 he left Ohio to join freedom fighters in the mountains of Cuba.

He led one band of guerrillas, and Che Guevara another, and



together they swept through the country, ultimately forcing corrupt dictator Fulgencio Batista from power.

In just a year of fighting, the American revolutionary had altered the landscape of the Cold War. But there is more, as there often is: Castro cancels the elections and makes Morgan and his followers wanted men. Drawing on declassified FBI, CIA, and Army intelligence records, Pulitzer Prize-winning authors Michael Sallah and Mitch Weiss skillfully reveal the inner workings of the Cuban Revolution while detailing the incredible love story of a rebel nurse and an American street

hero who left their mark on history.

John Sweeney has written "North Korea Undercover: Inside the World's Most Secret State" (951.93 SWE K). Award-winning BBC journalist Sweeney is one of the few foreign journalists to have witnessed the devastating reality of life in the controversial and isolated nation of North Korea, having entered the country undercover, posing as a university professor with a group of students from the London School of Economics. Drawing on his own experiences and his extensive interviews with defectors and other key witnesses, his book pulls back the curtain, providing a rare insight into life there today, examining the country's troubled history and addressing important questions about its uncertain future.

I found "The Residence: Inside the Private World of the White House" (975.3 BRO K) fascinating, but then I am a snoop. Kate Andersen Brower reveals the intimacy between the First Family and the people who serve them, as well as tension

that has shaken the staff over the decades. From the housekeeper and engineer who fell in love while serving President Reagan to Jackie Kennedy's private moment of grief with a beloved staffer after her husband's assassination to the tumultuous days surrounding President Nixon's resignation and President Clinton's impeachment battle, "The Residence" is full of surprising and moving details that illuminate day-to-day life at the White House.

Football fans will know who the "Gronk" is I didn't until I read the flyleaf of his book. He is considered the best tight end (I do enjoy men is well-fitting Wranglers, is that the same thing?) in professional football.

In "It's Good to be Gronk" (796.332 GRO R), Rob Gronkoski is presented as an all-around good guy. His accomplishments in the football arena are many, a Super Bowl victory under his belt, and a nationwide reputation for a personality that is comedy gold, he continues to win the hearts of fans through his fun-loving attitude no matter if he is in his

football uniform or off the field. It is not all fun and games: he has had four forearm surgeries, ankle surgery, two back surgeries; Gronk also tore his ACL and MCL, prematurely ending his 2013 season.

His many injuries and recoveries made him a key play in Super Bowl XLIX (leading to victory) and gave him the title of "Comeback Player of the Year." In his book, Gronk will take you to the field, his kitchen table where he grew up and to the green room of talk shows, all while showing you the real "Gronk."

In grandeur of Oval Office, president and humble pope to look for common ground

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a moment weaving strands of politics, religion and emotion, Pope Francis and President Barack Obama are set to meet in the grandeur of the Oval Office to advance causes dear to them both.

Eagerly watching will be a nation that cannot get enough of Francis, a humble man rejuvenating American Catholicism while giving heartburn to its conservatives.

The pope was to deliver his opening remarks to the United States on the White House lawn on Wednesday morning and speak to America's bishops later. That speech was highly anticipated, given a certain disconnect between Francis' focus on social justice and a merciful church and the culture wars that America's bishops have waged in recent years over abortion and gay rights.

From the instant the white-robed and broad-grinned Francis landed in the U.S. on Tuesday, doffed his skullcap in the breeze and got into a modest, charcoal-gray Fiat, his visit electrified wonky Washington, which can be jaded about the comings and goings of world figures.

Deeply-divided EU to hold emergency summit on migration crisis

BRUSSELS (AP) — The deeply-divided leaders of the European Union have been called to an emergency summit Wednesday to seek long-term responses to the continent's ballooning migrant crisis, a historic challenge that EU President Donald Tusk said the bloc has failed dismally to meet so far.

Among the outstanding issues that Tusk, the summit's official host, wants addressed: increasing assistance to EU member nations that are receiving the brunt of the migrant influx, and greater cooperation with non-EU countries in the Balkans and Turkey, which is now home to almost 2 million refugees — many of whom have fled Syria's civil war.

Tusk, who recently visited the Middle East, also wants to discuss diplomatic efforts to end the Syria conflict. One issue, the EU president said, requires urgent attention: increasing contributions to the U.N.'s World Food Program to help it provide critically-needed food supplies to 11 million people in Syria and the region.

"There is a long list of issues where we could blame one another, but it will not help us in finding a common solution," Tusk said in a letter to EU presidents and prime ministers. "Today we must absolutely work out policies that we can implement in order to help each other."

On Tuesday, the 28-nation EU took a modest step toward dealing with the issue by agreeing to relocate 120,000 asylum-seekers to ease the strain on Greece and Italy, which are on the frontline of the migrant flood. But the decision bared the wide divisions that Europe's greatest refugee crisis since World War II has spawned, with four eastern European countries — the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Romania and Hungary — voting against it.

Chinese president to meet with American business leaders, investment treaty likely topic

SEATTLE (AP) — When Chinese President Xi Jinping addresses a meeting of some of the top names in Chinese and American business Wednesday, they may be most interested what he says about progress toward a treaty between the nations that would provide a framework for broader investment in each other's economy.

Apple Chief Executive Tim Cook, Microsoft's Satya Nadella, Amazon's Jeff Bezos, investor Warren Buffett and Jack Ma of Chinese e-commerce giant Alibaba are among the 30 top executives attending a closed-door discussion being moderated by former U.S. Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson, who has advocated for such a treaty. All of the American CEOs participating signed a letter to Xi and U.S. President Barack Obama urging them to support an agreement.

Bilateral investment treaties provide the rules of the road for companies doing business in other countries, and can help ensure that the rights of foreign investors are protected and that foreign companies operate on a level playing field with domestic ones. An agreement with China would open up more of that nation's massive market to American companies, provide clearer rules for Chinese investment in the U.S., and create jobs on both sides, supporters say.

Such treaties "can be a powerful catalyst for more economic growth," Evan Feigenbaum, vice chairman of the Paulson Institute, which is co-hosting Wednesday's meeting, said Tuesday.

'Late Show' host Stephen Colbert turns GOP front-runner Donald Trump into straight man

NEW YORK (AP) — Stephen Colbert showered thanks on Donald Trump, his "Late Show" guest.

"I want to thank you not only for being here but for running for president," Colbert told the GOP front-runner Tuesday night. "I'm not going to say this stuff writes itself, but you certainly do deliver it on time every day."

Colbert's gratitude for Trump's comic assistance was well-placed. Peppering Trump with questions and wisecracks during his appearance, the CBS host reduced the usually domineering Trump to

straight-man status, an unaccustomed role Trump performed with rare grace.

Bringing up Trump's proposal to build a wall between the United States and Mexico, Colbert offered his own mocking version of a way to bar illegal immigration: Two walls, and in between them a moat filled with fire and fireproof crocodiles. "Is that enough?" Colbert asked.

Volkswagen shares volatile as future of CEO uncertain amid emissions scandal

BERLIN (AP) — Volkswagen's share price swung wildly Wednesday as the future of CEO Martin Winterkorn hung in the balance amid the company's growing emissions scandal.

Having fallen below 100 euros for the first time in nearly four years, Volkswagen AG's share price recovered to trade 2.5 percent higher at 108.5 euros. Wednesday's gyrations followed declines of 17 percent and 20 percent in the first two days of the week that saw nearly 25 billion euros (around \$28 billion) wiped off the company's market value.

Before the scandal, VW had planned to extend Winterkorn's contract at a meeting Friday of the supervisory board. But the events of recent days have raised questions over his future, and German media were widely reporting that the board's executive committee was meeting Wednesday to

discuss the crisis. Agency dpa and daily Bild cited people close to the committee.

VW is facing the prospect of multiple investigations and lawsuits following its admission that it used software to evade emissions controls in the U.S.

New push to document and possibly protect or recreate Syria's heritage in face of IS danger

BEIRUT (AP) — Scientists are slipping 3-D cameras into Syria to local activists and residents to scan antiquities. A U.S.-funded project aims to provide local conservators with resources to help safeguard relics. Inside Syria, volunteers scramble to document damage to monuments and confirm what remains.

The rush is on to find creative and often high-tech ways to protect Syria's millennia-long cultural heritage in the face of the threat that much of it could be erased by the country's war, now in its fifth year. Giving the drive new urgency, experts are desperate to stay a step ahead of the Islamic State group, which has ruthlessly destroyed and looted sites that fall into its hands as it spreads across Syria and neighboring Iraq.

The efforts are tempered by a recognition of the realities — that in some cases the best that can be hoped for is to document ancient monuments.

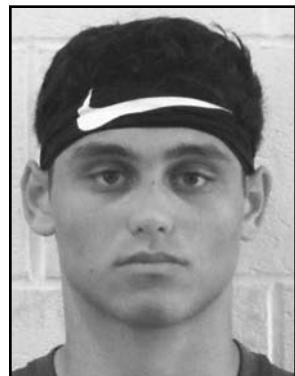

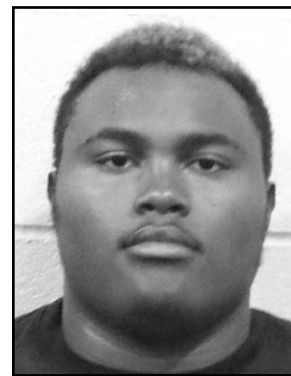

All my son and his wife do is fight and makeup repeatedly. Their constant battles make the kids nervous. It has been horrible. Sometimes, it turns violent and someone gets hurt. My son constantly bullies the kids, his wife and me. I stand up to him, but my grandchildren are too young to do the same.

My son came home drunk one evening and told me to get out of his house. He has no appreciation for how much I contribute both financially and physically to the care of his home and his children. I love my grandchildren and fear that without my presence, permanent damage will occur. I can find another place to live, but I am concerned about the grandkids. -- Out of Options

Dear Options: If your son and his wife are likely to hurt the

children or become drunk and abusive, you need to call the police and Child Protective Services to investigate. You can do so anonymously. If the authorities find there is a danger to the children, then the kids will be removed from the home. If you have already established another place of residence, then it's possible the children will be placed with you or another relative who can take them in. In the meantime, offer to take the kids as often as your son is willing to let you. It will give the parents time to cool off and de-stress, and allow the grandchildren to be in a more stable environment. Please don't hesitate to put the children's welfare first. You may be their last line of defense.

Dear Annie: My son and daughter-in-law were married a year ago. I recently discovered that they have not sent out thank-you cards to any of the guests, many of whom traveled a great distance to attend the wedding.

Is there anything that can be done at his point to make amends? -- Conundrum in Canada

Dear Canada: While thank-you notes should be writ-

ten as soon as possible, it is never too late to make amends. Your son and his wife should write each one by starting out, "We apologize for the tardiness of this note, but we wanted to let you know how much we appreciated your wedding gift." And then they should write something specific about each present they received. Rest assured, the recipients of these notes will be glad to get them, no matter how late.

Many parents decide to take on this responsibility themselves, because their children are not only delinquent, but also unlikely to send any thank-you notes

at all. While it is not the parents' job to do this, we understand those who are mortified that their family and friends have not had their gifts acknowledged and wish to take on the burden themselves. That is entirely up to you.

An apt description of the proper attitude to strive for as a defender might well be expressed by paraphrasing Tennyson: "Tis better to have defended well and lost than not to have defended at all."

Consider this deal from a team contest where both Souths wound up in six notrump. At the first table, declarer won the heart lead in his hand and led a club to the king. East won with the ace and returned a heart to dummy's ace.

With the ace of clubs having turned up in East's hand, South's only chance was to score four diamond tricks. So at trick four he led a diamond to the jack, and after this held, he cashed the A-K. When the diamonds divided 3-3, he claimed the rest of the tricks.

At the other table, East found the way to give declarer a real headache. When South led a club to the king at trick two, East smoothly followed low!

Declarer now had to decide how to continue. He knew perfectly well that East might hold the ace of clubs and duck it, but there was also the 50-50 chance that West had the ace. If West had started with a doubleton or tripleton ace, the slam could be secured simply by leading another club toward dummy.

As opposed to this, there was the 18 percent chance that East held precisely the Q-x-x of diamonds, or that if he held four or more diamonds to the queen, South could still lead a club toward dummy and hope West had started with two or three clubs to the ace.

In the end, South decided to bank on bringing in the club suit, so he went down one after dummy's queen of clubs lost to the ace and East cashed the jack.

East, of course, could not know whether his holdup of the ace at trick two would bear fruit, but it was certainly better than taking the ace and pointing South in another direction.

This Date In History

Today in History
 Today is Wednesday, September 23, the 266th day of 2015. There are 99 days left in the year. Autumn arrives at 4:21 a.m. Eastern time.
 Today's Highlight in History:
 On September 23, 1952, in what became known as the "Checkers" speech, Sen. Richard M. Nixon, R-Calif., salvaged his vice-presidential nomination by appearing live on television to refute allegations of improper campaign fundraising.
 On this date:
 In 1779, during the Revolutionary War, the American warship Bon Homme Richard, commanded by John Paul Jones, defeated the HMS Serapis in battle off Yorkshire, England; however, the seriously damaged Bon Homme Richard sank two days later.
 In 1780, British spy John Andre was captured along with papers revealing Benedict Arnold's plot to surrender West Point to the British.
 In 1806, the Lewis and Clark expedition returned to St. Louis more than two years after setting out for the Pacific Northwest.
 In 1846, Neptune was identified as a planet by German astronomer Johann Gottfried Galle (GAH'-luh).
 In 1908, an apparent baserunning

error by Fred Merkle of the New York Giants cost his team a victory against the Chicago Cubs and left the game tied 1-1. The Cubs won a rematch and with it, the National League pennant.
 In 1939, Sigmund Freud (froyd), the founder of psychoanalysis, died in London at age 83.
 In 1955, a jury in Sumner, Mississippi, acquitted two white men, Roy Bryant and J.W. Milam, of murdering black teenager Emmett Till. (The two men later admitted to the crime in an interview with Look magazine.)
 In 1957, nine black students who'd entered Little Rock Central High School in Arkansas were forced to withdraw because of a white mob outside.
 In 1962, New York's Philharmonic Hall (later renamed Avery Fisher Hall) formally opened as the first unit of the Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts. "The Jetsons," an animated cartoon series about a Space Age family, premiered as the ABC television network's first program in color.
 In 1973, former Argentine president Juan Peron won a landslide election victory that returned him to power; his wife, Isabel, was elected vice president.
 In 1987, Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., withdrew from the Democratic presidential race following questions about his use of borrowed quotations and the portrayal of his academic record.
 In 1999, the Mars Climate Orbiter

apparently burned up as it attempted to go into orbit around the Red Planet.
 Ten years ago: Hurricane Rita, down to Category 3, steamed toward refinery towns along the Texas-Louisiana coast, creating havoc even before it arrived; levee breaks caused new flooding in New Orleans, and 23 people were killed when a bus carrying nursing-home evacuees caught fire in Texas. Embattled FDA Commissioner Lester Crawford abruptly resigned. Puerto Rican nationalist Filiberto Ojeda Rios, wanted in a 1983 robbery of a Connecticut armored truck, died during a gunbattle with FBI agents in Puerto Rico.

Yankees Hall of Fame catcher Yogi Berra dies at 90

NEW YORK (AP) — The lovable legend of Yogi Berra, that ain't ever gonna be over.

The Hall of Fame catcher renowned as much for his dizzying malapropisms as his unmatched 10 World Series championships with the New York Yankees, died Tuesday. He was 90.

Berra, who filled baseball's record book as well as "Bartlett's Familiar Quotations," died of natural causes at his home in New Jersey, according to Dave Kaplan, the director of the Yogi Berra Museum.

Berra played in more World Series games than any other major leaguer, and was a three-time American League Most Valuable Player.

For many, though, he was even better known for all those amusing "Yogi-isms."

"It ain't over 'til it's over" is among eight of them included in Bartlett's.

"When I'm sittin' down to dinner with the family, stuff just pops out. And they'll say, 'Dad, you just said another one.' And I don't even know what the heck I said," Berra insisted.

Short, squat and with a homely mug, Berra was a Yankees great who helped the team reach 14 World Series during his 18 seasons in the Bronx.

"While we mourn the loss of our father, grandfather and great-grandfather, we know he is at peace with Mom," Berra's family said in a statement released by the museum. "We celebrate his remarkable life, and are thankful he meant so much to so many. He will truly be missed."

Berra served on a gunboat supporting the D-Day invasion in 1944 and played for the Yankees from 1946-63. His teammates included fellow Hall of Famers Joe DiMaggio, Mickey Mantle and Whitey Ford.

"No! Say it ain't so. He was a good man, my former manager and friend! RIP Yogi," former Yankees star Dave Winfield tweeted.

Lawrence Peter Berra, the son of Italian immigrants, got his nickname while growing up in St. Louis. Among his amateur baseball teammates was Jack McGuire, another future big leaguer.

"Some of us went to a movie with a yogi in it and afterwards Jack began calling me Yogi. It stuck," Berra told the Saturday Evening Post.

He was a fan favorite, especially with children, and the cartoon character Yogi Bear was named after him.

Until recent years, he remained a fixture at Yankee Stadium and in the clubhouse, where the likes of Derek Jeter, Joe Torre and others in pinstripes looked up to the diminutive old-timer.

In 1956, Berra caught the only perfect game in World Series history

and after the last out leaped into pitcher Don Larsen's arms. The famous moment is still often replayed on baseball broadcasts.

After his playing days, Berra coached or managed the Yankees, New York Mets and Houston Astros. He led both the Yankees and Mets to pennants.

In 1985, his firing as manager by the Yankees 16 games into the season sparked a feud with

George Steinbrenner. Berra vowed never to return to Yankee Stadium as long as Steinbrenner owned the team.

But in 1999, Berra finally relented, throwing out the ceremonial first pitch of the Yankees' season-opener.

"We are deeply saddened by the loss of a Yankees legend and American hero, Yogi Berra," the Yankees posted on Twitter.

Berra, who played in 15

straight All-Star Games, never earned more than \$65,000 a season. He died on the same date, Sept. 22, as his big league debut 69 years earlier.

Growing up, he was anything but a natural.

Chunky and slow, Berra was rejected by his hometown St. Louis Cardinals after a tryout in 1943. But a Yankees scout recognized his potential and signed him.

He reached the majors late in the 1946 season and homered in his first at-bat. The next year, he continued to hit well, but his throwing was so erratic he was shifted to the outfield, then benched.

His breakthrough season came in 1948, when he hit .315 with 14 homers and 98 RBIs while improving his fielding. In 1949, he compiled a .989 fielding percentage and did not make an error in the All-Star Game or World Series.

"I don't care who the hitter is," Yankees Hall of Fame manager Casey Stengel told the New York Journal-American, "(Berra) knows just how he should be pitched to."

Berra was the AL MVP in 1951, 1954 and 1955. He holds World Series records for most hits (71) and games (75).

He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1972.

"You never think of that when you're a kid," Berra said. "But egads, you gotta be somethin' to get in."

Among his boyhood friends was Joe Garagiola, who went on to a career as a major league player and broadcaster. In rejecting Berra at the 1943 tryout, the Cardinals signed Garagiola, another catcher, instead.

Berra was born in St. Louis on May 12, 1925, the son of Pietro, a laborer in a brickyard, and Pauline Berra. He grew up in "The Hill,"

or Italian district, with three older brothers and a younger sister.

Berra was forced to drop out of school in the eighth grade and go to work to help support his family. He took jobs in a coal yard, as a truck driver and in a shoe factory.

He continued to play amateur baseball, which brought him to the attention of major league scouts.

In 1943, his first professional season with the Yankees' farm team in Norfolk, Virginia, was interrupted by World War II.

Berra married his wife, Carmen, in 1949. The couple met in their native St. Louis. Carmen died in 2014. Yogi is survived by their three sons.
