

Moment of silence Community pauses to remember victims of Paris terror attacks By JULIE BASS

Monday at noon, Big Spring and Howard County community members gathered for a moment of silence to remember those lost in the Paris terrorist attacks last week.

County Judge Kathryn Wiseman met with courthouse employees, veterans, and members of the community in front of the war memorial on the east side of the Howard County Courthouse Monday just before noon.

Consistent with the moment of silence to be held by all 28 nations of the European Union on Monday, Texas Governor Greg Abbott issued a statewide call for Texans to take part and hold a minute of silence Monday to honor the memory of the victims of the Paris terrorist attacks.

"Texas' solidarity and longstanding relationship with France is well established," Abbott said. "When Texas declared its independence from Mexico, France was among the first nations to recognize that independence. We have not forgotten France's commitment to the Lone Star State and Texas will join with other states and nations tomor-

Texas **balks** at refugee plans

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Gov. Greg Abbott says Texas will not accept more Syrian refugees following the Paris terrorist attacks, though an immigration official counters that the governor lacks legal authority to do so.

In a letter Monday to President Barack Obama, Abbott said he directed state health officials not to participate in the resettlement of Syrians. Abbott also urged scrapping federal plans to accept more Syrian refugees anywhere in the country, saying the federal government can't perform proper security checks.

Texas officials estimate about 200 Syrian refugees have been resettled in Texas last fiscal year.

Abbott is among several governors opposing Obama's pledge to accept 10,000 more in the next year.

Lavinia Limon, head of the U.S Committee for Refugees and Immigration, noted the Refugee Act of 1980, saying governors cannot block refugees.

Meanwhile, President Obama argued Monday that

Forsan ISD OKs arming staff members

Forsan Independent School District has joined a growing number of Texas schools that enable certain staff members to carry guns under The Protection of Texas Children Act.

Following a letter sent home by FISD Superintendent Randy Johnson last Thursday, the policy officially went into effect, with signs in front of both Forsan Junior/Senior High School and Forsan Elementary School posted stating, "Attention: Please be aware that the staff at Forsan ISD may be armed and will use whatever force is necessary to protect our students."

Johnson said the idea to Board by several different sources two years ago. Over the past two years, research has been done to decide if it was the right move for FISD. Last spring, the school board changed local policy in orderto bring the act to Forsan.

"This was not a knee jerk-reaction tounrelatedevents such as what occurred in Paris over the weekend. Discussions about

this policy started long before that," Johnson said. "We know that this is an issue with two different sides, so we wanted to proceed carefully and thoughtfully."

Faculty and teachers selected to carry concealed handguns on school grounds are referred to as "guardians," according to the letter sent out by Johnson. The guardians have met certain requirements, including having a Concealed Handgun License (CHL), passing a psychological exam, joint training with local law enforcement, passing random drug tests, qualifying annually on the gun range under the control of the sheriff's department, and being approved by the school board.



"We weren't just pulling staff members that had their CHL," Johnson said. "These are volunteers that were hand-selected and approved by the school board. Not just anyone can become a volunteer."

According to the letter sent home by Johnson, students and staff not participating in the guardian program will not be allowed to carry handguns and Johnson asks students and faculty members to "continue to be aware that any gun rumored to be on campus or seen on campus should be reported immediately."

"We have followed the sheriff's recommendations on where the concealed guns will be stored," Johnson said. "They will not be placed in areas that students can easily find them. We are not introducing guns that can be used in a negative way."



When considering if the policy was right for Forsan ISD, Johnson said law enforcement response time was one of the major factors to consider.

"When looking at school shootings in the

past, it takes less than three minutes for the actual shooting to take place," Johnson said. "Out here in Forsan, it can take anywhere from 15-25 minutes for law enforcement to respond, depending on their location. We need a quick response in case of an emergency."

The decision was reached to move forward

with the policy only after discussion with other districts that have adopted the policy, such as Seagraves and Christoval ISDs, and visiting the Texas School Safety Center in San Marcos, Johnson said.

Other considerations included "consultation with the sherriff, surveying staff members, implementing a committee of parents and staff and consultation with attorneys," according to Johnson's letter.

The Protection of Texas Children Act was passed by the Texas Legislature in May 2013.

the United States needs to allow them because many are fleeing terrorism.

Some state leaders disagree with Obama's assertion the country can simultaneously welcome refugees seeking safety and ensure citizens' security. Several have called for a complete halt to resettlement, others for temporary delays and a few seek more information from federal officials on the vetting process.

The Homeland Security Department says refugees face the highest level of security screen-

Governors in many states, mainly Republicans, are responding to heightened concerns terrorists might use the refugees as cover to sneak across borders. Authorities said a Syrian passport was found near one of the attackers in Friday's deadly attacks, and the Paris prosecutors' office says fingerprints from the attacker match those of someone who passed through Greece in October. The governors of sev-

eral states are calling for the temporary suspension of accepting new refugees. Texas Gov. Greg Abbott ordered Texas' refugee resettlement program not to accept any more Syrians and in a letter to Obama, the Republican also urged scrapping federal plans to accept more Syrian refugees into the country as a whole. He said the federal government can't perform "proper security checks" on Syrians. Arizona Gov. Doug Ducey called for an immediate halt and wrote he was "invoking our state's right ... to receive immediate consultation

by federal authorities"

to address the state's concerns. Iowa GOP Gov. Terry Branstad acknowledged governors might lack authority but added he wants more information about refugee placement and the vetting process.

The Council on American-Islamic Relations, a Muslim civil rights group, called the governors' comments and recommendations "un-American," adding that rejecting refugees projects "our fears to the world."

WHAT DO REFU-**GEE EXPERTS SAY?**

Lavinia Limon, president and CEO of the U.S. Committee for Refugees and Immigration, said under the Refugee Act of 1980 governors cannot legally block refugees. Each state has a refugee coordinator, a post created as part of that law, she said. Funded by the federal government, post coordinates the resettlement efforts with agencies such as hers and directs federal funds for refugees. Westy Egmont, director of Boston College's Immigrant Integration Lab, said the law previously withstood state

cause the federal government has worked equally distribute to refugees being resettled. Some states have worked with resettlement agencies to limit new refugee arrivals to those with family ties to the community while families or individuals with no ties to a specific state have been sent to other locations with better prospects for jobs, housing and integration programs.

WHAT EXACTLY HAS OBAMA PRO-POSED AND HOW **DOES THE REFUGEE** RESETTLEMENT **PROGRAM WORK?**

The Obama administration has pledged to accept about 10,000 Syrian refugees in the next 12 months. The State Department said the refugees would be spread though nationwide, many go on to places where they have family or cultural connections, such as Detroit, New York, Chicago or Los Angeles. According to government statistics, the U.S. has taken about 2,150 Syrians since Oct. 1, 2011 - most in the lastyear. Obama said Monday the U.S. needs to continue to accept refugees from Syria because

many are fleeing terrorism: "Our nations can welcome refugees who are desperately seeking safety and ensure our own security. We can and must do both."

Refugees are generally invited to move to the United States after being referred to a State Department Resettlement Support Center by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. In some cases they can be referred by a U.S. embassy or nongovernmental agency.

In other cases, potential refugees who are close relatives of people granted asylum in the U.S. or other refugees already in the country can apply directly with the U.S. government. The average wait time for a refugee to be cleared to enter the U.S. is about two years, but often longer for people from Syria and elsewhere. The Homeland Security Department said refugees being accept-

ed into the United States are subject to the highest level of security screening of anyone coming to the U.S. It added officials will continue to consult with states to allay concerns they have about security.

Forsan football players honored with postseason awards

After an impressive 8-2 season, their most wins since the late 1980's, Forsan received notice that a handful of players were honored as All-District 3AA D1 selections.

Senior quarterback Jesse Cervantes was selected as District MVP. He finished his 2015 campaign with 27 total touchdowns and rushed for 1373 yards on 176 carries for an average of 7.8 yards per rush.

Senior defensive end Ian Park was named Defensive MVP. Park had 46 total tackles, including 15 for a loss and 10 sacks.

Senior running back Walker Park was selected to the First Team All-District for his explosiveness out of the backfield. He had 10 rushing touchdowns and 813 yards in nine games this season.

Sophomore wide receiver Garrett Evans and junior Blaze Yeater were both selected to the First Team All-District. Yeater and Evans each led the team with 16 receptions, while Yeater had a team-high six receiving touchdowns.

Seniors offensive lineman Braden

East, Taylor Morin, and sophomore Brycson Pineda were all named to First Team All-District. Those three were integral parts of an offensive line that manhandled opponents for most of the year, and helped the Buffaloes to an average of 344.8 vards per game.

Rounding out the selections for First Team All-District were senior lineman Akkey McVae, sophomore defensive end Ehren Hillger, junior inside linebacker Tearell McVae, senior defensive back Hayden Tubb, and junior kicker Lane Schaffer.

On the Second Team All-District

were Buffaloes Tearell McVae at running back, sophomore receiver Austin Darden, tight end Akkey McVae, senior offensive lineman Ben Mikeska, iunior defensive lineman Tyler Westbrook, defensive end Walker Park, inside linebacker Schafer, sophomore defensive back Bryce Hergert, and defensive back Yeater.

This impressive list of Buffaloes show how much the program has improved in the past couple years, and also that there is a stockpile of talent that have not played their best football yet for Forsan.

TJ Yates, Texans knock off previously unbeaten Bengals 10-6





Opening lead -- king of hearts. A fine declarer relies more on consistently sound technique than on fancy or complicated plays. Most deals require merely ordinary care to be successful, and it is in the handling of these run-of-the-mill hands that a player is most likely to prove his worth

Consider this deal where declarer failed to make four spades. West led the K-A and another heart, South ruffing the third round. Declarer saw that he had two potential club losers and correctly decided that the best way to try to avoid them was to ruff

two clubs in dummy. And so, instead of drawing trumps, he cashed the A-K of clubs and led a third club, ruffing with dummy's nine. Unfortunately, East overruffed with the jack and returned a trump, stranding South with the jack of clubs. Eventually, declarer lost the jack to West's queen and finished down one

It is certainly true that South ran into an unlucky lie of the opposing clubs, and he was doubly unlucky that East had the jack of spades Nevertheless, the fact remains that he could — and should — have made the contract. All he had to do was to exercise a little extra care.

Instead of trumping the third round of clubs with the nine, South should have ruffed with the king. He could then have re-entered his hand by trumping a diamond and ruffed his last club with the nine. True, East would have overruffed with the jack but that would have been the third and last trick for the defense.

The principle that emerges is that declarer's primary obligation is to make the contract, if possible, and that he should avoid making any plays that might jeopardize it. Ruffing the third club with dummy's nine placed the contract in at least mild jeopardy, while ruffing with the king would have assured the contract beyond the shadow of a doubt.



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



WATT GETS IN DALTON'S HEAD: Watt's sack gave him 66 1/2 in his career. He also got into Dalton's head by joking postgame that the Texans wanted to turn Dalton — dubbed the "Red Rifle" — into a "Red Ryder B.B. Gun.'

"There are a lot of kids and people who look up to him," Dalton said. "And for him to make comments like that, he's just showing that it's acceptable to say that kind of stuff. It's disappointing for one of the best players in this league to come out and say something like that."

Nowitzki, Mavericks send 76ers to 11th loss to start season

PHILADELPHIA (AP) – It was no surprise to see Dirk Nowitzki come up big late in the game for the Dallas Mavericks.

Nowitzki scored 21 points, including seven during a pivotal stretch late in the fourth quarter, to lead Dallas to a 92-86 victory over the winless Philadelphia 76ers on Monday night.

Jahlil Okafor had 19 points and 11 rebounds for the 76ers, who have lost all 11 games this season and 21 in a row dating back to last season. Philadelphia's last win was March 25 at Denver. and the 76ers are within five defeats of matching the franchise's all-time record for consecutive losses.

Chandler Parsons added 20 points — all in the first half — for the Mavericks, who needed a late push to hold off Philadelphia.

The 76ers trailed by as many as 19 points in the first half but battled back to take an 82-81 lead with 4 minutes, 23 seconds remaining on a free throw by Nerlens Noel before Nowitzki took over.

The 13-time All-Star had seven of nine Dallas points during a 9-2 Mavericks run over the next 2:36, ending with a 3-pointer that made it 90-84 with 1:47 left.

"That was the killer shot for the game," Mays coach Rick Carlisle said. "It was huge Hey look, he's been doing that for almost two decades. You're never shocked when it happens."

turnovers by Nik Stauskas and Jerami Grant. The 76ers ended the quarter with eight turnovers, which led to 11 Dallas points.

They finished with 27 turnovers for the game. "You're not going to win any basketball games with 27 turnovers," Brown said.

The 76ers were down by as many as 19 points in the second quarter before reeling off 25 of the final 36 first-half points to enter the locker room down just five, 49-44.

Parsons had his best game of the season, Carlisle said, while continuing to face restricted minutes following offseason knee surgery.

"It's frustrating, especially in a close game like that when I have it going," he said of watching from the bench. "You definitely want to play more. At the same time, they know what they're doing and it's a process."

PHYSICAL TEAM While praising the 76ers for their effort, Carlisle said Philadelphia is a team that gets rough with opponents.

"They're playing on a go-hard basis," he said. "If guys aren't playing hard, they sit down. They have young, motivated guys on small contracts. . They try to rat up the game and try to get you to retaliate. Our guys did a great job with their composure in the second half."

attacks on America, memories of walking with my friends in Paris and climbing the Eiffel Tower, thoughts of what should be done to terrorists.

My time in Paris was brief, but absolutely unforgettable. My best friend, Zana, and I saved up for two years to go with a group of

kids from our high school and two teachers that would be chaperoning us.

I had just graduated from high school and we headed to Europe for two weeks of traveling and shopping in June of 1998.

Zana and I were giddy and full of teenage girl anticipation of being on vacation together, without parents, to see foreign countries and travel the world.

Our first stop in France was Paris. We visited the Louvre Museum and saw the Mona Lisa, the Venus de

Milo, Winged Victory of Samothrace, the Coronation of Napoleon, and many other famous artwork. There were so much artwork to look at it seemed like the rooms would never end. Bright, vibrant colors graced the paintings on the walls, carefully chiseled sculptures lined the halls and the museum was so crowded as everyone tried to rush about to see the most famous pieces by artists such as Michelangelo and Leonardo De Vinci.

So what do I do now? I will share



Paris returns to work with defiance, determination and worry

PARIS (AP) – After a weekend of horror, Paris returned to the routines of the work week Monday with determination, defiance — and worrv.

Rush-hour subway trains were full, shops were open, and office workers lined up for sandwiches or ate lunch on cafe terraces.

But this is also now a city with dotted makeshift shrines: carpets of flowers and candles, photos of lost loved ones and handwritten notes near the spots where gunmen and suicide bombers killed 129 people enjoying a fall Friday evening in the city.

Parisians stopped by

Paris. "We have just to pray and say we are going to live — more and more and more."

Others worried that the attacks would change Paris forever.

"I was there (in New York) when 9/11 happened, and to tell you the truth it did change my life," said Gary Berrios, a student originally from New York. "It changed everyone's life. We don't see the world the same way anymore."

in the heart of the city, a monument

to France stood surrounded by flowers, candles and notes.

Handwritten cards had been left in French and English, Polish and Vietnamese a reminder that Paris is a city that the world has taken to its heart. "Love will conquer," said more than one sign -avow, or maybe a

wish, from the City of Love.

Outside the Bataclan theater, where 89 people died when attackers gunned down young concertgoers, a banner vowed: "Freedom is an indestructible monument."

There and outside the bars and restaurants where dozens more died, residents paused to lay flowers, light candles or simply stand quietly. Even as the bustle of everyday life reasserted itself, Paris was a city of thousands At the Place de la Republique of silent prayers — and, with

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emotions running close to the surface, hundreds of heated arguments.

The attacks have unleashed a torrent of debate about France's essential values and its self-image.

Nearthe Bataclan, Parisians of all ages and races argued Monday about the role of religion and the limits of tolerance. "Muslim killers!" yelled one man, who was largely ignored. An imam from a Paris mosque arrived to pay his respects, saying Muslims. too, are among the victims of the Islamic State group.

A man cycled by, pulling a baby grand piano. When he stopped to play John Lennon's "Imagine," the arguments broke up.

Paris this week is a febrile place, easily moved to tears, compassion or panic. Late Sunday, the crowds in Place de la Republique scattered in panic, scared by fireworks that sounded like gunshots.

By Monday, the mood in the square was once again resolute.

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throughout the day to honor the dead, many vowing that their city would remain its incomparable self — the sensual, tolerant, life-loving metropolis of the world's imagination.

"I am afraid, but not enough to stay at home, not moving," said Stephanie Cohen, a bank employee from suburban

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
