

Blood drive Friday

According to officials with United Blood Services, the O Negative type blood supply is critically low.

"To help save the lives of trauma patients at Scenic Mountain Medical Center, O Negative is the go to blood type as anyone can safely receive this blood in an emergency situation. Currently, we have less than one half day's supply — well below the needed level of three days" states Linda Grace, Sr. Donor Recruitment Rep with United Blood Services.

A blood drive hosted by UBS and the city of Big Spring has been scheduled for Friday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to bolster the United Blood Service supply through the holiday season.

"December is one of the most difficult months of the year for United Blood Services to maintain an adequate supply of lifesaving blood to save the lives of hospital patients," Grace said. "Most blood shortages happen during or after major holidays. Two major holidays are quickly approaching — Christmas and New Year's. Both are long

Even Santa's helpers need help occasionally.

A lesson on the Holocaust

Patsy Sanchez, Big Spring Intermediate School principal, taught a lesson to all the sixth grade students through their social studies classes based on the Holocaust.

The students were asked to decorate a butterfly and write the name of a child who was sent to the Terezin Concentration Camp, located in what today is called the Czech Republic, between the years of 1942-1944. They were asked to choose a name from more than 100 and decorate the butterfly in their honor.

More than 300 butterflies were placed in the garden. After a few weeks, students were informed about whether or not their child survived. If the child survived, the butterfly remained in the garden. If not, the butterfly was taken down.

Lady Hawks edge out Conference foe Clarendon 72-71

CLARENDON — The Lady Hawks first conference game of the year was a testament to how strong the conference is. The Howard College wom-

en's basketball team won a close match 72-71 over Clarendon College on the road, improving their overall record to 11-3.

Howard had the early advantage, stretching their lead to as much as 16 in the first half.

Clarendon made adjustments during halftime that proved to work, holding Howard College to just five points in the third quarter.

Clarendon made their way to the free throw line often and were effective, sinking 17-of-17 attempts. They also dominated the boards and subsequently second chance points (22-5).

Clarendon fought back and tied the game 67-67 with just over four minutes left to play. Clarendon then went on a 4-0 run the next 4:02 minutes, until Marie Tsoungie made a layup to put the Lady Hawks within two.

Tsongui had a team-high 14 points, shooting 6-of-10 from the field.

Tsoungui was fouled and sent to the free throw line with 12 seconds remaining. She made the first, and missed the second free throw attempt. Madison Brown was there for the rebound and tipin to give Howard College the lead.

The Lady Hawks have now

won four games in a row, and are 6-1 playing away from Howard College.

The win was a total team effort as 10 different Lady Hawks scored.

Howard College shot 51.8 percent from the field and connected 8-of-8 from the charity stripe. The bench contributed 31 points, and it was a bench player in Brown who had the biggest bucket of the night.

Howard College will play this Saturday at Cisco College in their final game of the 2015 calendar year.





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

Opening lead — ace of clubs. The opening lead is often the most critical play of a hand. Over a period of time, most players give away more tricks on the opening lead than on the next 12 tricks combined.

The reason for this is not hard to find; it is obviously easier to defend effectively when you can see 26 cards than when you can see only the 13 cards in your own hand before dummy comes down

The best guide to the opening lead

usually comes from the bidding. In the course of reaching their optimum contract, declarer and his partner frequently exchange revealing information about their hands, which the defenders are then at liberty to turn to their advantage.

Examine this case where West, in considering his opening lead, should deduce from the bidding that North-South are likely to hold at least eight clubs (probably divided 3-5 or 4-4). This reasonable assumption leads to the conclusion that East has at most one club and can ruff the second round of the suit.

Accordingly, West leads the ace of clubs and continues with his highest club — the nine — as a signal for East to return the higher-ranking of the two remaining side suits after he ruffs

Without the suit-preference return of the nine, East would have a difficult guess as to whether to return a spade or a diamond at trick three. But thanks to the nine play, East has no problem returning a spade after ruffing the club.

West takes the ace and leads a third club, and South loses the first four tricks before he can even gain the lead. With anything but the aceof-clubs lead, declarer would have no difficulty making the contract.


