# 'Affluenza' mom sent back to U.S.

LOS ANGELES — The mother of fugitive Texas teen Ethan Couch, known for using an "affluenza" defense in a fatal drunken-driving accident, has been returned to the U.S. from Mexico minus her son, whose own deportation was delayed by a Mexican judge.

Tonya Couch arrived at Los Angeles International Airport on a flight from Mexico in the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service and was taken in handcuffs through the terminal to an unmarked Dodge Char-





precautions with their pets from the loud noises to the bountiful holiday feast.

"Probably lots of people will be out popping fireworks. It really best to leave your pets inside because they can become very scared of the noise," said Shelbi Whitehead, office manager for Sierra Animal Clinic. "If you do leave them out, make sure you have a secure, fenced yard. Also you may want to put your dog on a leash and secure it to the house because they really get scared with all the noise."

Lost animals can seriously put your pets at risk, Whitehead cautioned.

"When pets run away, they can get lost. They are already scared to death," Whitehead said. "We had one dog come in that ran away and was lost for a few days. This dog was covered in fleas. It was a really serious health issue. And there are some dangerous people out there who could hurt your pet."

With a second winter storm front expected to move into the area Thursday, Whitehead recommends pet owners to keep their animals inside for the next few days as a precaution against not only the New Year's noise but also against freezing tempera-

According to the Na-

- · Create a safe environment. Holiday parties can be fun and exciting but not so to pets who are not used to the noise. If you are having a party, find a secure area for the pet. This will keep both your pets and guests safe.
- Exercise. Vigorously exercise your pets during the

day and they may just sleep through the party noise and fireworks.

· Watch what they eat. You may want your pet to take part in the celebration but be careful of the food your dog or cat eats. Too much unfamiliar food can upset their stomachs and you might have to make a quick trip to the vet.

· Update your pets microchip information. Micro chips information implanted under a pet's skin have been a very good way for pets to be reunited with their family. It would be a good idea to contact the micro chip company to make sure the information it has on file — address, owner's name, phone number — is up to date.

Richard Hunter, chief deputy for the U.S. Marshals Service in South Texas, said during a news conference Houston on Wednesday that a three-day court injunction granted in Mexico to Ethan Couch will likely take at least two weeks to resolve. But the injunction

did not apply to Tonya Couch, who was deported immediately and put on a plane, an official with Mexico's National Immigration Institute told The Associated

EthanCouchwastransported late Wednesday from a detention facility in Guadalajara to one in Mexico City, the official said. The decision to move Couch was made because the Mexico City facility for detaining migrants is larger and better equipped to hold someone for days or

Authorities believe the 18-year-old Ethan Couch, who was sentenced only to probation for the 2013 wreck in Texas, fled to Mexico with his mother in November as prosecutors investigated whether he had violated his probation. Both were taken into custody Monday after authorities said a phone call for pizza led to their capture in the resort city of Puerto Vallarta.

The ruling earlier Wednesday by the Mexican court gives a judge three days to decide whether the younger Couch has grounds to challenge his deportation based on arguments that kicking him out of the country would violate his rights.

basically maneuver takes the decision out of an immigration agent's hands and asks a higher authority to make the deportation decision. He said such cases can often take anywhere

from two weeks to several months, depending on the priorities of the local courts.

"It also depends on the fact the Couches have legal counsel. And it seems to me, if they wanted to, they could pay them as much money as they want to drag this thing out," Hunter

During the sentencing phase of Ethan Couch's trial, a defense expert argued that his wealthy parents coddled him into a sense of irresponsibility — a condition the expert termed "affluenza." The condition is not recognized as a medical diagnosis by the American Psychiatric Association, and its Hunter said the legal invocation during the legal proceedings drew ridicule.

> "Couch continues to make a mockery of the system," said Fort Worth attorney Bill Berenson, who represented one of the victims.

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

"It's easier to play as a team when you're playing hard on defense, because you're getting more buckets in transition." head coach Nicholas Tyerman said. "The harder you work the more points you score so it made it a lot easier for them."

Unfortunately their high level of defense wavered in the second quarter. After holding a 26-9 advantage through the first quarter, Big Spring allowed a 6-2 run in fa-

"That what's helping us more on defense. People are there are certain people who sub in for them. That way it's easier to buy into their role and do it as best they can," Tyerman said.

The Steers won the game 68-45 and improved to 2-1 in the Sandhills Tournament. The Steers play two final games tomorrow Canyon Randall and the host Monahans. The steers will continue to use the games as practice to gear up for district play.

"Mostly on defense is what we are looking at improving on. The better we play on defense the more our offense is going to come. We didn't get much practice over the break so I'm calling more plays so we can get more reps in before district," Tyerman said.

DALLAS (AP) — Even 11. "We had great looks. if Klay Thompson had been making shots with Stephen Curry sidelined by a leg injury, the other half of the Splash Brothers knew Golden State would have a hard time winning.

With Thompson not hitting, the Warriors got blown out in just their second loss of the season.

J.J. Barea scored 23 points in another big game filling in for injured point guard Deron Williams, and the Dallas Mavericks rolled to a 114-91 victory over a Golden State team missing the NBA's leading scorer and reigning MVP.

"That's 30 points and a lot of playmaking, so we've just got to collectively try and chip in," said Thompson, who had 10 points while matching Draymond Green with 4-of-15 shooting, with Green scoring It was just one of those nights."

Curry has a bruised lower left leg and might sit again Thursday at Houston. But the Warriors (29-2) still have the best 31-game start in NBA history — a game better than four teams — after their record 24-0 start.

"They were a little short-handed tonight. Might have made a little difference," Dallas guard Devin Harris said. "The attention that he brings in shotmaking and the way the offense flows with him out there, obviously was a little bit different tonight."

Zaza Pachulia had 14 points and 15 rebounds the Mavericks, who won their fourth straight game without Williams. Dirk Nowitzki added 18 points and eight boards.

be a big issue with cleaning golf balls. Take a wet towel and clean them after you play.



Shoes and gloves used for golfing would best never be taken inside the home, and instead left in the garage or a golf locker. Pesticides are designed to adhere to surfaces, even during rain, and are highly toxic. Their half-lives are decades long. An online search of "pesticide and golf course" will give your readers some education. Thank you.

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

# This Date In History

Today is Thursday, Dec. 31, the 365th and final day of 2015. Today's Highlight History: On Dec. 31, 1879, Thomas

Edison first publicly demonstrated his electric incandescent light in Menlo Park, New Jersey.

On this date:

In 1775, during the Revolutionary War, the British repulsed an attack by Continental Army generals Richard Montgomery and Benedict Arnold at Quebec; Montgomery was killed. In 1904, New York's Times

Square saw its first New Year's Eve celebration, with an estimated 200,000 people in attendance. In 1909, the Manhattan

Bridge, spanning the East River between Manhattan and Brooklyn, was officially opened to vehicular traffic. In 1946, President Harry S.

Truman officially proclaimed the end of hostilities in World War II.

In 1951, the Marshall Plan expired after distributing more than \$12 billion in foreign aid.

In 1969, Joseph A. Yablonski, an unsuccessful candidate for the presidency of the United Mine Workers of America, was shot to death with his wife and daughter in their Clarksville, Pennsylvania, home by hitmen acting at the orders of UMWA president Tony Boyle. In 1972, Major League base-

ball player Roberto Clemente,

38, was killed when a plane he'd

chartered and was traveling on to bring relief supplies to earthquake-devastated Nicaragua crashed shortly after takeoff from Puerto Rico. In 1974, private U.S. citizens were allowed to buy and own

In 1995, the syndicated comic strip "Calvin and Hobbes," created by Bill Watterson, came to an end after a 10-year run. In 1999, Russian President

Boris Yeltsin announced his resignation (he was succeeded by Vladimir Putin).

Ten years ago: In central Indonesia, suspected Islamic militants set off a powerful bomb at a busy market frequented by Christians, killing seven people. Dick Clark, in his first television appearance since his stroke in 2004, helped ring in the new year in Times Square.

Five years ago: Tornadoes fueled by unusually warm air pummeled the South and Midwest, killing a total of eight people in Arkansas and Missouri. The body of federal defense consultant John Wheeler III, 66, was found in a Wilmington, Delaware, landfill; his death, ruled a homicide, remains under investiga-

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# Tips to keep your child with diabetes safe at school



chronic diseases in children, according to Griffin P. Rodgers, MD, MACP, director of the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases of the National Institutes of Health (NIH). Keeping children with diabetes safe during the school day and during school-sponsored activities requires communication and cooperation between the student, their parents or caregivers, the student's health care team and school "Nobody knows your child's day-to-

day needs and how to respond to a diabetes emergency better than you," Rodgers says. "That's why it is so important to maintain open communication with school staff throughout the school year."

Parents and school personnel can learn about effective ways to help keep children with diabetes safe by reviewing the National Diabetes Education Program's (NDEP) Helping the Student with Diabetes Succeed: A Guide for School Personnel. The NDEP is a program of the National Institutes of Health and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The NDEP encourages parents of children with diabetes to follow these tips from the School Guide throughout the year.

- Take action. Notify the school immediately when your child is diagnosed with diabetes. Share your child's medical information with school staff and provide up-to-date emergency contact numbers.
- Work with your child's health care team to develop a Diabetes Medical Management Plan. This plan contains the medical orders for your child. It should be signed by your child's health care team and submitted to the school nurse at the start of

each school year. An updated plan is needed if there are changes in your child's diabetes care plan during the year. A sample plan is included in NDEP's School Guide.

- Meet with the school nurse to review your child's school health care plans. The school nurse will use the medical orders to prepare your child's routine and emergency diabetes care plans at school. You can find samples of these plans in the School Guide. You should also meet with the school nurse and staff to familiarize them with any specialized diabetes equipment that your child uses, such as an insulin (IN-suh-lin) pump and/or continuous glucose monitor (CGM). Remember to provide written instructions about the use of the equipment and troubleshooting guidelines.
- Provide the school with all supplies, medicines, and items needed to carry out your child's health care and emergency plans. These supplies may include blood sugar (glucose) testing items, supplies for taking insulin, urine and blood ketone testing, snacks, quick-acting

Winning a scholarship can be as competitive as gaining entrance to the college of your choice. While academic performance, extracurricular activities and character all matter, your success often boils down to discovering scholarships that fit your credentials and properly promoting your accomplishments.

These tips will help you prepare scholarship applications that get you noticed - and could get you some extra cash to help pay for school.

· Leverage relationships and seek nontraditional opportunities. There are a lot of scholarships out there, and the wider you cast your net the greater your chances are of winning. In addition to traditional avenues such as your basic online search and checking the bulletin board outside the financial aid office, reach out to your network. Ask family and friends about scholarships offered by the companies they work for and organizations they belong to. You may be surprised by all the organizations that offer assistance to deserving students.

example, For Foresters, an international financial services provider, offers the Foresters Competitive Scholarship to its members and their immediate family members, which awards up to 250 scholarships tuition worth up to \$8,000 each to students who demonstrate a commitment to community service and have a strong GPA. Other unexpected sources of scholarship funds may include cultural or religious groups, civic and philanthropic groups in your community, and professional groups or businesses in the field you plan to study. Many banks also handle special trusts or funds with scholarship provisions.

· Showcase your passion, talent and potential. A compelling essay gives scholarship judges insight into what makes you special and unique. If you and another candidate are tied in objective criteria, such as grades, a well-written narrative can set you apart. Not all essays are the same, though; exercise caution to ensure that you are answering the question posed and demonstrating your knowledge of the sponsor, not just copying and pasting from another application. The essay is your opportunity to let your personality shine through in ways your transcript can't.

Showcase your passions and motivations, and be sure to reference volunteer work, extracurricular activities and other evidence that demonstrates your leadership skills.

• Prepare a checklist and gather materials ahead of time. Winning scholarship often comes down to organization; you can't win if you don't complete the application by the deadline. Although each application will have its nuances, there are some standard details that nearly every scholarship requires. Gathering and assembling these materials ahead of time will make the tedious task of preparing each application easier, and it will help you avoid overlooking something important when a submission deadline is looming.

Be sure to obtain extra copies of items such as transcripts that take time to process, and reach out early to
