

Sales tax allocations up in March

Figures released from the Texas Comptroller's office show March sale tax revenue is up across the Crossroads and Permian Basin, a cautious sign the area's economy is starting to recover after a lengthy slowdown in the oil and gas industry.

"I think this is a result of increased activity in the oil and gas industry," said Terry Wegman, executive director

for the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation. "We are seeing a lot more interest in projects in the area. We are receiving Wegman

a lot more inquiries, so I think

that's what attributing to the increase of sales tax rev-

enue."

However, Wegman is cautious about how strongly the economic recovery will pan out in the coming year.

"I think it will be a moderate recovery," he said. "Even though some of these numbers are pretty big, you have to compare them to this same month last year to see what was happening that month."

"I am still concerned," he continued. "The price of oil has been dropping again and has just started to tick back up. We were producing so much oil it looks like we are getting back into having an oversupply issue again. So much of the economic trend is dependent on what OPEC (Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries) does, how much oil the U.S. produces, and many other global factors that effect our local economy."

Yet, Wegman said he was cautiously optimistic that the economy will begin to have moderate to slight growth although there are "still a lot of clouds out there to slow down or delay a recovery."

"We have been busy since the first of the year, more than we have been in the last two years," he said. "People are looking for opportunities

Ribbon cutting for new Humane Society facility is Saturday

The Happy Day Humane Society will host a ribbon cutting and dedication for its new facility on Saturday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

"The exciting part in unveiling this is Big Spring has something — our county has something — they should be really proud of," said Kristen Partee, Happy Day Humane Society board member. The 6,400 square-foot building opened in December boasts indoor, heated/cooled kennels, areas for small dogs that allow access to the outside, a patio area where potential adopters can visit with the animals, a grooming room which can also be used as a exam area for veterinarians, a big outside covered kennel for large dogs near the main building, and a spacious spay and neuter clinic. The cost for the new facility was estimated at a quarter of a million dollars, said Angie Mims, Director of Happy Day Humane Society. The majority of the funds were paid through the Dora Roberts Foundation which has supported the operating costs of the Humane Society for decades. "When we took it over, they very generously added on to that knowing that (old) building needed major repairs," Partee said. "We knew that we wanted something bigger, and our ultimate goal was s spay and neuter facility, and this makes it a reality.'



New York emergency worker run over by stolen ambulance

NEW YORK (AP) — A New York emergency medical technician and mother of five who authorities say was "bravely doing her job" was killed when she was run over by her own ambulance that had just been stolen.

Yadira Arroyo, 44, and another EMT were in the process of responding to a call Thursday night in the Bronx when they were alerted that a man was riding on the back bumper of their ambulance, Fire Commissioner Daniel Nigro said. "So, they stopped the ambulance, they got out to see what was happening. This person, in turn, went around the other side of the ambulance and got into the driver's side," Nigro said. The man then put the ambulance in reverse, striking Arroyo, who fell and got caught beneath the wheels, fire officials said. "They were acting very bravely. They certainly wanted to

continue on their way to the call. This person had no business being in this ambulance," Nigro said.

Video posted on Twitter by a bystander shows the ambulance speeding across an intersection with one of its doors open, its lights flashing and the body of one of the EMTs being dragged beneath the vehicle.

The ambulance then crashed into several parked cars and got stuck on a snowbank. A passing Metropoli-Transportation tan Authority K-9 officer subdued the 25-yearold suspect with the help of a bystander. The other EMT was in the passenger seat of the ambulance as it was being stolen. She was being treated at a Bronx hospital for minor injuries, police said.

The old building is still being used as an intake processing facility for new dogs, Partee said.

2 indicted, accused of cyberbullying 18-year-old to suicide

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — A Southeast Texas man and his girlfriend were indicted Thursday on charges arising from the cyberbullying of the man's ex-girlfriend until her suicide.

A Galveston County grand jury indicted Andres Arturo Villagomez, 21, and girlfriend Karinthya Sanchez Romero, 22, on charges arising from the Nov. 29 suicide of Brandy Vela, Villagomez's ex-girlfriend. The 18-year-old woman shot herself in the chest and died in front of her horrified family at their home in Texas City, about 10 miles northwest of Galveston. The Galveston couple is accused of actions that investigators say drove Vela to take her own life.

Romero is charged with stalking and online impersonation, felonies punishable by two to 10 years in prison. Court documents allege that she, on multiple occasions, made threatening and harassing phone calls to Vela. In interviews shortly after the suicide, Raul Vela said his daughter changed her cellphone number but her tormentors always found her. Romero also is accused of setting up fake Facebook pages in Brandy Vela's name to post content that was embarrassing, intimidating and harassing to the woman.



In particular, Partee and Mims are very proud of the on-sight spay and neuter clinic which should be up and running to take care of the facility's 100- to 120-dog population soon. Partee said plans are to eventually open the clinic to provide low-cost spay/ neuter procedures for pets to the general public.

"Having a facility here to take care of our own dogs will save us immensely," Partee said.

Their ultimate goal, she added, is to help cut down on the population of unwanted animals at the source of the problem through the low cost spay/neuter program.

"We have three vets in town they are all wonderful, but they are all pricy," Partee said. "They are the standard for this area, and the average person on a low income is not going to pay for it, so we end up getting those litters."

Partee and Mims were part of the new management team which took over running the daily operations of the Humane Society in April 2015. Since then thousands of dogs have been adopted from the no-kill shelter.

"This is truly a gift, and I feel like it was a gift from Dorothy Garrett and Margaret Lloyd (founders of the Humane Society in Howard County) and sort of a long time coming," Partee said. "We are able to see their vision come to fruition, and Angie and I are grateful to be a part of that."

Happy Day Humane Society is located at 5710 West Interstate 20, off the north service road. Hours are from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m., seven days

"A lot of heroism was on display amidst a great tragedy."

Jose Gonzalez, 25, of the Bronx, was arrested on charges of murder, grand larceny and driving while impaired by drugs. There was no immediate information on an attorney who could comment on his behalf. Arrovo was a 14-vear

The video posted on Twitter captured both the arrest of the driver, and a scene of anguish as the second EMT kneeled, sobbing, over the body of her fallen partner.

Justin Lopez, 20, told the Daily News that he shot the video of the episode as his brother was driving.

"I was coming from the street, up to the red light and I just saw the ambulance, the sirens and lights, and I told my brother 'Look something's happening,' and then somebody just hopped in, and then he hit two cars and ran over the person," he said. "I realized he was hijacking the car."





The indictment charges Villagomez with unlawful disclosure or promotion of intimate visual material, a misdemeanor punishable by up to a year in jail. Court documents allege that he provided photographs to be posted on the internet that portrayed Vela in sexually graphic poses — images obtained from Vela that were meant to be private.

Romero is being held on bonds totaling \$20,000, while Villagomez is jailed on \$2,500 bond. Galveston County prosecutor Bill Reed said he's not aware of the two having attorneys.

Two days after Vela's suicide, her older sister told KPRC-TV that she

was at home when she "heard someone crying."

"So I ran upstairs and I looked in her room, and she's against the wall and she has a gun pointed at her chest and she's just crying and crying and I'm like, 'Brandy, please don't. Brandy, no," Jacqueline Vela said.

She said she went to her parents' room, "and I just heard the shot and my dad just yelled, 'Help me. Help me. Help me."

"I was almost certain that I could persuade her to put that gun down. It didn't work. She pulled the trigger," Raul Vela told media after his daughter's death.

Brandy Vela's final cellphone text message to her family was: "I love you so much just remember that please and I'm so sorry for everything."

Evidence or experience

brews 11:1, "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (ESV). Another translation of the Bible reads thus, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the

evidence of things not seen" (KJV). We like to use this verse as a quick definition of faith. Faith is more than just belief – it is trusting in something or someone to the extent that you submit your life to them and no longer fulfill your desires first but intentionally seek to do their desires first.

This can be a challenge. Mainly because we rely so much on our own experience. If I haven't seen it, then I'm probably going to be a little skeptical.

We end up putting more "faith" and trust in what we perceive through our senses.

In Matthew 8:5-13, we have an excellent example of faith. It is the account of the centurion's faith. Being a centurion meant that this man was a Gentile, not a Jew. Nonetheless, he had been exposed to evidence. He had probably heard about a man who taught like no one else was teaching. This same man was doing things that others could not do – he was casting out evil spirits and curing the sick and healing the lame and crippled.

So when one of his servants is involved in an accident and becomes paralyzed and is suffering terribly, he knows the person to whom he must go. He doesn't doubt. He doesn't say, "I don't believe all these stories because I wasn't there to witness any of them." No, he considers the evidence (most of it presumably being eyewitness accounts) and it creates an under-girding, a substructure or foundation, upon which trust is built and a hope (not just



wishful thinking but a reasonable expectation) is developed so that when a need is realized in his life, there is no doubt in his mind where he ought to go.

Does that describe your faith or my faith? If not, why not? Many today are skeptical or outright unbelievers because they haven't "experienced" God in their life. They have not seen him with their eyes or heard him with their ears or touched him with their hands. Because of their lack of experience, they refuse to believe. Remember Biblical faith is based upon assurance and substance. It is a conviction based upon evidence.

In a courtroom, members of a jury must make decisions concerning events with which they have no personal experience. They do this based upon evidence submitted by the two parties involved. Some of the most powerful evidence is that of eyewitnesses. With this evidence, the jury comes to a reasoned conclusion.

We can do the same today. The Apostles and other New Testament writers are the eyewitnesses and their testimony is powerful. You, as a member of the "jury", must not rely on your own feelings but reasonably and logically listen to the evidence. 1 John 1:1-3, "That which was from the beginning, which we have heard, which we have seen with our eyes, which we looked upon and have touched with our hands, concerning the word of life – the life was made manifest, and we have seen it, and testify to it and proclaim to you the eternal life, which was with the Father and was made manifest to us - that which we have seen and heard we proclaim also to you, so that you too may have fellowship with us; and indeed our fellowship is with the Father and with his Son Jesus Christ" (ESV).

Reflections: What About **Our Soul?**

ost of our conversation, it seems, revolves around our bodies and money: how we look, how to stay healthy, how to remain young, how to become wealthy.

Concern for our bodies drives a large segment of our economy. United States healthcare expense alone passed the \$3.2 trillion mark in 2015. Most of this, of course, is corrective surgery and treatment, but elective cosmetic surgery totals more than \$13 billion. This includes liposuction, breast augmentation and hair removal. The fitness industry with its books, talkshows, and exercise facilities is enormous. In 2014 fitness center revenues in the U.S. exceeded \$24 billion.

I can understand this. Since my body is the only one I have, I want to take care of it. Of course, I guess there are limits to which I want to do this. I love Blue Bell ice cream and I like to sit in the stands snacking on a hot dog while I watch healthier people compete on the field.

I can also understand our interest in money. We all have to pay our bills, and most of us have ambitions to own our home, drive a nicer car, send our kids to college, and enjoy vacations.

But what happened to the concept of the soul? We seldom hear the word mentioned, including our churches. Jesus taught that, as important as our bodies may be, nothing is as important as our soul.

Regarding the body in comparison to the soul, He said, "Do not be afraid of those who can kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in hell." With respect to money, Jesus said, "What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul?"

Horatio G. Spafford, a wealthy lawyer in the 1860s, seemed to live a charmed life, enjoying both health and wealth. But, in 1870, he lost his son to scarlet fever. The next year he lost most of his holdings in the Great Chicago Fire. Suffering financial loss, he used most of his resources to feed the hungry, house the homeless and comfort the grief stricken. When his wife's health began to fail, he decided to move his family to Europe. Delayed by his commitments at work, he sent his wife and four daughters ahead. On Nov. 22, 1873, their ship sank at sea. Only his wife survived. Returning to the spot where the ship sank, Horatio Spafford stood looking over the swelling seas where his daughters drowned and wrote these words:

"When peace, like a river, attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll;

Whatever my lot, Thou has taught me to say, It is well, it is well, with my soul.'

Mashburn crushed a line drive to right field, bringing in three runs and giving the Bulldogs a one point lead over Seminole.

While the Indians were able to bring in one run, it was not enough for the win and the Bulldogs prevailed with a final score of 5-4.

"We hit the ball very well today, and our pitchers competed very well by not giving up free bases, and kept us in the game," said Ja-cobs. "Overall, it was a solid performance and a good win for us heading into district."

Offensive leaders for Coahoma were Biddison, who went 2-2 on the day; and Mashburn, with all of the Bulldogs three RBIs.

Coahoma was surehanded and did not commit a single error. Gaige Hill made the most defensive plays for the team with 9 total.



Test your defensive play

You are West, and the bidding has gone South West North East 1 ♥ 6 ♥ Pass Pass NORTH 🕈 K 4 2 ♥AJ63 **♣**Ř 10 5 2 WEST **♠** Q J 10 7 ♥ 8 7 4 ♦ J 9 5 2 **4**98 You lead the queen of spades,

won by South with the ace. Declarer cashes the ace of diamonds, plays a low trump to dummy's jack which East follows with the nine and then trumps the queen of diamonds. Declarer next cashes the K-Q of trumps, East discarding two diamonds, and then plays the king and another spade, East and South following suit to both spades. You win the spade with the ten. What would you lead now?

A simple count of the three suits declarer has played thus far tells you that he started with precisely three spades, five hearts and one diamond. His other four cards must therefore be clubs. Although you can't be sure

precisely which clubs South has, you can assume from the bidding that he must have the ace.

Having gotten this far, you can place South with the A-O-x-x. A-J-xx or A-x-x-x of clubs. In the first and third cases it doesn't matter whether you lead a club or give declarer a ruff-and-discard by returning a spade or a diamond. Declarer makes the slam in the first instance and doesn't in the third, regardless of what you do

This leaves you with the remaining possibility - that declarer might have A-J-x-x, in which case his hand originally looked like:

♠A93
♥KQ1052
♦ Λ ⁻

♣AJ74 It is only after you take the time to visualize declarer's possible club holdings that you find the correct play. After winning the spade with the ten, you return the jack of spades (or a diamond).

This allows South to ruff in one hand and discard a club from the other, but he must then guess which way to take the two-way club finesse after he ruffs. He might guess right and he might guess wrong, but that is much better than handing him the contract by returning a club after winning the spade.

Spring Rhule: New Baylor coach ready to finally get on field

WACO, Texas (AP) Matt Rhule has been in perpetual motion since becoming Baylor's coach more than three months ago.

Now, Rhule finally gets to coach football when the Bears open spring practice Saturday.

"I'm unbelievably excited," Rhule said this week in his office as workers prepared the practice field outside the window. "I'm anxious to see what some of these guvs can do. ... I haven't seen a quarterback throw a ball yet. We haven't done any technique stuff."

Rhule took over a program reeling from the sexual assault scandal that cost two-time Big 12 champion coach Art Briles his job last May.

The world's largest Baptist university is facing several federal lawsuits from women who say the school for vears ignored or misagainst football players. Baylor officials have said

an internal investigation found at least 17 women who reported being sexually assaulted by 19 football plavers in recent years, although one lawsuit puts the number of women much higher.

"You have to move forward while acknowledging the past, and acknowledging what's happened. And the best way to acknowledge it is to make sure that it doesn't happen again," Rhule said. "While you'd love for just kind of a new chapter to begin, that's not the reality.'

Knowing that what happened in the past will continue to be talked about, Rhule still tries to put his head down and be concerned about today — the way he approaches football and life. He said the program's reaction to anything that happens in the future "is going to be honest and full of integrity, and it's going to be done the right way."

Returning senior starting nickelback Travon Blanchard is suspended indefinitely from all teamrelated activities after the school was notified that a court granted a woman's request for a protective order against him. According to court records, the woman with whom he had a relationship accused him of multiple acts of violence and threats against her.

Two operation staff members brought to Baylor by Rhule have already been dismissed.

An assistant strength and conditioning coach was fired after being arrested in a prostitution sting last month. An associate director of football operations lost his job this week for sending inappropriate text messages to a teenager, though the person was considered an adult under Texas statute.

"There's a standard we've set and if you don't meet that

standard, action will be taken," Rhule said. "I recognize the scrutiny our program is under. I knew that when I came in. That scrutiny doesn't guide our decisions. We will hold our students and our staff to the highest standards of conduct."

When Rhule took the job Dec. 6, he had to immediately start recruiting. Baylor had only one firm commitment then, but on Feb. 1 had a solid and balanced 27-player signing class that ranked among the upper half of the Big 12.

Rhule also put together a coaching staff. He didn't keep any of the assistants from Briles' staff that had been retained last season to work with interim coach Jim Grobe

Six of Baylor's new assistants were with Rhule at Temple, which was the AAC champion with its second consecutive 10-win season. Two others came from NFL staffs

Baylor goes into the spring with a full allotment of 85 scholarship players on a roster nearing 100 players. They were all split into smaller groups this week for a series of team-bonding challenges, like others throughout the offseason.

"I said when I got the job, I believed that this is where I was supposed to be. ... I didn't say that I believed that it was going to be easy," Rhule said. "I have enjoyed

every moment being here, and I've enjoyed getting to know these players, and I really believe that there's going to be really a lot of success ahead."

FRISCO, Texas (AP) — The Dallas Cowboys have re-signed veteran running back Darren McFadden and guard Jonathan Cooper.

McFadden will go into his 10th NFL season as a backup to Ezekiel Elliott, who has the league's leading rushing as a rookie last season. Cooper gives depth on the offensive line that lost Ron Leary to Denver in free agency.

The Cowboys made the moves Thursday, when running back Lance Dunbar left Dallas for a freeagent deal with the Los Angeles Rams and cornerback Brandon Carr signed for a four-year deal with the Baltimore Ravens.

McFadden joined the Cowboys in 2015, when he ran for 1,089 yards. But he played only three games last season because of a broken elbow suffered in the offseason. He was the fourth overall pick by the Raiders during the 2008 draft.

Cooper joined Dallas before the playoffs this past season but didn't play in a divisional loss to Green Bay by the NFC's top seed.

In sect that shuns medicine, case against pastor is novel

READING, Pa. (AP) - A pastor in a fundamentalist Christian sect that rejects doctors and drugs has been charged in the death of a child - his own granddaughter — from medical neglect. The novel prosecution is raising hopes among some advocates that it might spur change in a church that has resisted it.

Faith Tabernacle Congregation has long told adherents to place their trust in God alone for healing. As a result, dozens of children, mostly in Pennsylvania, have died of preventable and treatable illnesses. Church members reject modern medicine as a bedrock tenet of their faith, even as some have faced manslaughter charges in child deaths dating back 35 years.

Until now, though, no leader in the sect has ever faced charges.

"It could be a new tool to save the lives of these children," said

Rita Swan, one of the nation's top experts faith-based medion cal neglect. She leads the group Children's Healthcare is a Legal Duty, which works to eliminate religious exteachers and other "mandated reporters" to turn the names of suspected child abusers over to authorities for investigation. The law makes no exception for clergy who happen to be related to the abused child, as Foster was to Ella.

Most states have similar laws that require clergy to report abuse.

"He was well aware of the fact that this child was in need of medical treatment and he never reported it, nor do I believe that he ever had the intention to report it," Berks County District Attorney John Adams, whose office is prosecuting Foster, said in an interview.

Cathleen Palm, of the Pennsylvania-based Center for Children's Justice, said she hopes the prosecution, at a minimum, will spur action in the Legislature to protect children whose parents don't seek necessary medical care based on religion.

"What the district attorney has done is clearly pivotal," she said.

Neither the Rev. Foster nor his attorney returned calls for comment. Foster is due in court next month for a preliminary hearing that will likely attract a heavy presence of church members.

Ella's parents, Jonathan and Grace Foster, were charged earlier with involuntary manslaughter and await trial. Police have said Jonathan Foster attributed Ella's death to "God's will."

The reclusive sect, founded in Philadelphia more than a century ago, does not give media interviews. At the Faith Tabernacle church and school campus in Mechanicsburg, where Rowland Foster is the pastor, an Associated Press reporter who entered the building was quickly ordered to leave. An older man who accepted a letter seeking comment from church officials promised to shred it.

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emptions in state laws requiring parents to provide appropriate medical care.

With a routine course of antibiotics, 2-year-old Ella Foster would have almost certainly beaten the pneumonia that took her life in November. But her parents refused medical care. and she succumbed shortly after they asked the Rev. Rowland Foster to anoint her.

Foster, 72, pastor of a Faith Tabernacle Congregation church district in eastern Pennsylvania, was charged with a felony this month under a state law requiring clergy members,





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
