## Council to consider traffic, garbage, annexation ordinances

At their meeting Tuesday evening, Big Spring City Council members will consider several proposed city ordinance amendments for approval.

The council will meet in its chambers, 307 E. Fourth St., at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday. First on the list, three items in the meeting's Consent Agenda involve second readings of ordinances which the council has already approved once. The Consent Agenda groups routine and/or non-controversial items together for quick disposition, although any council member may request that an item be pulled out for individual consideration.

Ordinances on the Consent Agenda include an amendment to the Traffic Code to allow for enforcement of "No Through Trucks" streets in residential neighborhoods; as well as two ordinances restricting funds donated by the Big Spring Area Community Foundation to be

used for their intended purposes. Earlier this month, the BSACF presented grants of \$37,000 and \$15,000 to the city; the former to be used for the planned Downtown Plaza project, and the latter for the planned Heart of the City Plaza project.

In other business, the council will consider two other ordinances involving the Traffic Code. The first would amend the definition of "truck" as it applies to city ordinances. Where the previous definition in the Traffic Code read "Truck defined. For the purposes of this section, a truck shall be defined as every motor vehicle designed, maintained or used primarily for the transportation of property, which has three or more axles and/or a gross vehicle weight of more than 10,000 pounds.

The new definition up for consideration reads "Truck defined. For the purposes of this section, a truck shall be defined as a single-unit vehicle with a manufacturer's gross weight rating of more than ten thousand pounds (10,000 lbs.), a sing-unit [sic] vehicle with tandem axles, or all truck-tractor/semitrailers. This definition does not include a 'light truck' as defined by the Texas Transportation Code §542.201."

The second new traffic-related ordinance amendment up for consideration by the council would amend the times during which drivers must operate at reduced speed in school zones. The ordinance requires a speed limit of 20 mph during certain times near Big Spring ISD schools. The ordinance would change those times to the following: around Goliad Middle School and Big Spring Intermediate School from 7:15 to 8:30 a.m. and from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m., instead of 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. and 2:45 to 4:30 p.m. as are currently required; around Kentwood, Marcy, Moss, and Washington elementary schools from 7:15 to 8:30 a.m. and from 2:15 to 4:15 p.m., instead of 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. and 2:45 to 4:30 p.m.; around Big Spring High School and Big Spring Junior High School from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. instead of 7:30 to 9:30 a.m., and from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. instead of from 2:45 to 4:30 p.m.; around Anderson School from 7:30 to 8 a.m. instead of from 7 to 9 a.m., and from 3 to 4 p.m. instead of from 2:45 to 4:30 p.m.

The ordinance would make no changes to the school zone slow-down times at Bauer Headstart School Readiness Academy or New Hope Christian School, nor at the bus loading zones on Airbase Road and West 16th Street (7:30 to 9:30 a.m. and 2:45 to 4:30 p.m. for all).

A third proposed ordinance amendment would shift responsibility for inspection of garbage disposal by city residents and businesses from the Manager of Municipal Solid Waste to the City Manager. The duty also comes with the mandate to file complaints against those disposing of garbage incorrectly or using improper containers.

A final ordinance on the agenda would, if passed, annex about 17.58 acres of land northwest of West Seventh Street and Lorilla.

In other business, the council plans to:

\* Consider approval of an agreement with KDC Associates for landscape architecture design for the renovation and upgrade project at the Comanche Trail Amphitheater.

\* Consider granting permission to seek grants for the Amphitheater Improvement Project.

\* Consider approval of an interlocal agreement between the city, county, and other taxing entities for the assessment and collection of property taxes.

\* Consider approval of an amendment to the performance agreement between the city and the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation for rail infrastructure.

\* Hear the Big Spring Economic Development Corporation's quarterly update.

# Iran dismisses Trump's threat to country's leader

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Iranians on Monday shrugged off the possibility that a bellicose exchange of words between President Donald Trump and his Iranian counterpart could escalate into military conflict, but expressed growing concern America's stepped-up sanctions could damage their fragile economy.

In his latest salvo, Trump tweeted late on Sunday that hostile threats from Iran could bring dire consequences.

This was after Iranian President Hassan Rouhani remarked earlier in the day that "America must understand well that peace with Iran is the mother of all peace and war with Iran is the mother of all wars."

Trump tweeted: "NEVER EVER THREATEN THE UNITED STATES AGAIN OR YOU WILL SUFFER CONSEQUENCES THE LIKE OF WHICH FEW THROUGHOUT HISTORY HAVE EVER SUFFERED BEFORE."

Within hours, Iran's state-owned news agency IRNA dismissed the tweet, describing it as a "passive reaction" to Rouhani's remarks.

On Tehran streets, residents took the exchange in stride.

"Both America and Iran have threatened one another in different ways for several years," shrugged Mohsen Taheri, a 58-year-old publisher.

A headline on a local newspaper quoted Rouhani as saying: "Mr. Trump, do not play with the lion's tail."

On Monday, the White House said Trump's tweet shows he is not going to tolerate critical rhetoric from Iran and insisted the U.S. leader isn't escalating tensions between the two countries.

"If anybody's inciting anything, look no further than to Iran," press secretary Sarah Sanders said and added that Trump has been "very clear about what he's not going to allow to take place."

Prominent Iranian analyst Seed Leilaz downplayed the war of words, saying he thinks it was "the storm before the calm."

Leilaz told The Associated Press he was not "worried about the remarks and tweets," and that "neither Iran, nor any other country is interested in escalating tensions in the region."

Citing harsh words the United States and North Korea had exchanged before the high-profile summit between Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un, Leilaz said Trump and Kim got "closer" despite the warring words.

Trump's eruption on Twitter came after a week of heavy controversy about Russian med-

dling in the U.S. 2016 election, following the Helsinki summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin.

The tweet was reverberating across the Mideast. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu praised the U.S. president's "strong stance" after years in which the Iranian "regime was pampered by world powers."

Trump earlier this year pulled the U.S. out of the international deal meant to prevent Tehran from developing a nuclear weapon and ordered increased American sanctions, as well as threatening penalties for companies from other countries that continue to do business with Iran.

With the economic pressure, Trump said earlier this month that "at a certain point they're going to call me and say 'let's make a deal,' and we'll make a deal."

Iran has rejected talks with the U.S., and Rouhani has accused the U.S. of stoking an "economic war."

Rouhani also suggested Iran could immediately ramp up its production of uranium in response to U.S. pressure. Potentially that would escalate the very situation the nuclear deal sought to avoid — an Iran with a stockpile of enriched uranium that could lead to making atomic bombs.

Trump's tweet suggested he has little patience with the trading of hostile messages with Iran, using exceptionally strong language and writing the all-capitalized tweet.

"WE ARE NO LONGER A COUNTRY THAT WILL STAND FOR YOUR DEMENTED WORDS OF VIOLENCE & DEATH. BE CAUTIOUS!" he wrote.

Another Tehran resident, Mehdi Naderi, fretted that the U.S. measures and his own government's policies are damaging the lives of the average Iranian.

"America is threatening the Iranian people with its sanctions and our government is doing the same with its incompetence and mismanagement," said the self-employed 35-year-old.

Trump has a history of firing off heated tweets that seem to quickly escalate long-standing disputes with leaders of nations at odds with the U.S.

In the case of North Korea, the public war of words cooled quickly and gradually led to the high profile summit and denuclearization talks. There has been little tangible progress in a global push to rid North Korea of its nuclear weapons program since the historic Trump-Kim summit on June 12.

Liz and other KBSB members want a cleaner Big Spring, especially in the parks where children

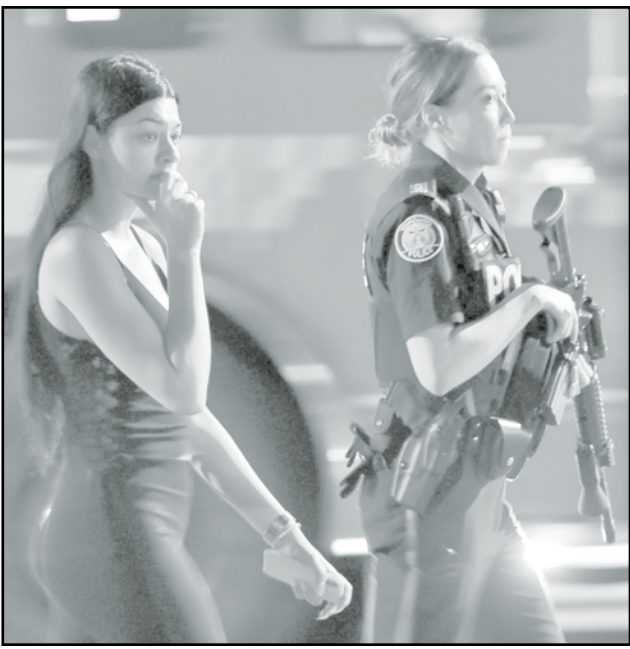
play. They have cleaned numerous locations this year already, and continue to put a dent in the constant battle to pick up litter across town. There will also be prizes given away to attendees.

## Odor leads Rangers over Indians 5-0 in 108-degree heat

ARLINGTON, Texas — Rougned Odor thrived in oppressive conditions.

Odor drove in three runs, Ryan Rua hit a two-run homer and the Texas Rangers withstood the heat on a 108-degree afternoon to beat the Cleveland Indians 5-0 on Sunday, stopping a four-game losing streak.

The game time temperature was 102 degrees — 5 shy of the stadium record set Friday and matched Saturday — then rose in the afternoon sunshine.

"Where I'm from it's really hot like this," said Odor, a native of Venezuela. "So, this is no problem for me playing with this weather. I like playing in this weather."

Yovani Gallardo (4-1) and three relievers combined on a five-hitter against the AL Central leader, which had outscored Texas 25-11 in the first two games of the series.

"I just worked quickly, kept a tight strike zone and get guys to swing the bat," Gallardo said.

That was key for the Rangers.

"I think the biggest part of it was Gallardo, all our pitchers, keeping our guys off the field for extended periods of time," Texas manager Jeff Banister said.

Gallardo allowed three hits and four walks in six innings, his longest scoreless outing since Aug. 22, 2015, at Detroit. Jose Leclerc and Jake Diekmann each pitched a one-hit inning, and Cory Gearrin got three straight outs on seven pitches.

Mike Clevinger (7-6) lost his third straight start, allowing two runs, four hits and four walks in 6 2/3 innings.

"I walked the nine-hole hitter twice and that's just really, really bad baseball," Clevinger said. "It's just not acceptable no matter what the score of the game is."

"In the final meeting between the teams this year, Odor hit an RBI single in the third and a sacrifice fly in the fifth, then added a home run in the eighth against Oliver Perez.

Delino DeShields, hitting .073 (3 for 41) in July coming in, walked twice, stole two bases and scored the first two runs.

"We need for him to be on base," Banister said. "We gave him a day after a rough day to get some work in. It was his speed that created for us early."

### POWER ARM

Joey Gallo has three assists in his first two games in right field. He got one during a rundown play Saturday, threw out Jason Kipnis trying to go from first to third on a second-inning single Sunday and then threw to first base to double up Melky Cabrera, who was running on a fly ball to right in the fourth. Gallo has two assists in 98 big league games in left and center field.

### TRAINER'S ROOM

Indians: LHP Andrew Miller, who hasn't pitched for the Indians since May 25 because of a strained left hamstring, threw 19 pitches and allowed one hit in his third one-inning appearance for Triple-A Columbus, pitching against Scranton/Wilkes-Barre.

Rangers: Gallo left the game in the eighth after landing on first base awkwardly while running out a grounder and spraining his left ankle.

## Spieth's title defense at British Open ends without a bang

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Defending champion Jordan Spieth wasn't the only one struggling to gain traction on the wind-swept final day at Carnoustie.

But he was one of just two in the 79-player field who failed to make birdie, shooting 76 and sliding from a three-way tie atop the leaderboard at 9 under at the start into a tie for ninth by the end. A bogey, double-bogey run at Nos. 5 and 6 let a handful of contenders squeeze past Spieth, who owns three major championships, and bogeys at two of the last four holes killed his chance of catching up.

"When you put yourself in position enough times, it goes your way sometimes, it doesn't go your way sometimes," said Spieth, who wound up at 4-under 280.

"I didn't play the wind the right way on those two holes," he added. "I was trying to fight it instead of accepting that the wind is going to win out here."

Sung Kang shared the dubious honor of carding a birdie-free round.

Spieth, who turns 25 next week, knew fighting the wind would take patience. The Texan felt he passed that test.

"You knew you'd have three, four good looks at birdies, and the rest of the holes, you were just going to try to position it to make par. I knew that going in," he said. "I played patiently. Never got down on myself. Never got angry."

More importantly, Spieth's putting stroke restored his confidence, which should extend through the rest of the bag.

"My game is back. I've had different parts ... being at kind of a low point in my career. Not all at the same time, but enough to where I haven't really been able to compete. It's all there, and it's moving in the right direction," he said. "So I'm actually very pleased coming out of this week."

### 'IT'S A FUNNY GAME'

Eddie Pepperell shot the low round on the final day and held the clubhouse lead until fellow Englishman Justin Rose swiped it.

Not one to look back, Pepperell said he didn't waste time wondering what might have been.

"I was a little hung over. I won't lie. I had too much to drink last night," he said after shooting 67 and finishing in a three-way tie for sixth. "I was so frustrated yesterday (after shooting 71) that today was really, I wouldn't say a write-off, but I didn't feel I was in the golf tournament.

"Whether I shot 69 or 73 today, it wouldn't have been heartbreaking. But as it happens, I shot 67. So you know," he added, "It's a funny game."

### DOUBLE TROUBLE

Padraig Harrington's 2007 win at Carnoustie marked the last time the British Open champion made double-bogey in the final round and recovered in time to hoist the claret jug.

Doubles waylaid a handful of contenders on Sunday, including Kevin Kisner and Xander Schauffele, who shared the lead with Jordan Spieth at 9 under to start the day. Schauffele got back on track with a birdie at No. 14 to pull into a tie with eventual winner Francesco Molinari on the 16th tee, but he fell away by making bogey on the next hole. Kisner and Kevin Chappell both had makeable birdie putts to catch Molinari on the 16th, but both missed and wound tied for second and sixth place.

### LOCAL HERO

Sam Locke got a hero's welcome on his stroll up to the 18th green. Small wonder.

The 19-year-old carried the flag for his native Scotland, being the only Scot and the sole amateur to make the cut and play into the weekend in his first major. He was awarded the silver medal as low amateur, a victory for both Locke and his mentor, Paul Lawrie, whose 1999 win at Carnoustie was the last by a Scotsman at the British Open.

"I've just thoroughly enjoyed being here," Locke

said. "You'll never forget an experience like that."

Locke acknowledged he'd "have to sit and have a think" about what to do next, including whether to turn pro. He planned on trying to make the British side for next year's Walker Cup, a prestigious amateur event, but that could change.

"With my family and Paul ... we'll all sit down and have a chat ... he'll obviously have some great advice and put me on the right path."

### MAMMA MIA

Edoardo Molinari, who plays on the European Tour, hardly knew what to say.

"I can't find the words right now, but one picture would do it..." he tweeted in both English and Italian, attaching a picture of little brother Francesco pumping his fist after winning the British Open.

"You're extraordinary ... The example for all of us," countryman Matteo Manassero tweeted, adding the Italian flag icon. "Thank you."

For all that, Francesco Molinari wasn't sure he'd top the newspapers and broadcasts back home.

"It depends," he laughed, noting that the Formula One race at Hockenheim, Germany, would be bigger news if the Ferrari racing team finished on top. "If they won, they'll probably get the headlines."

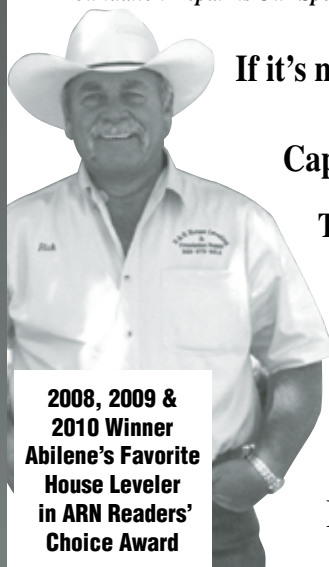

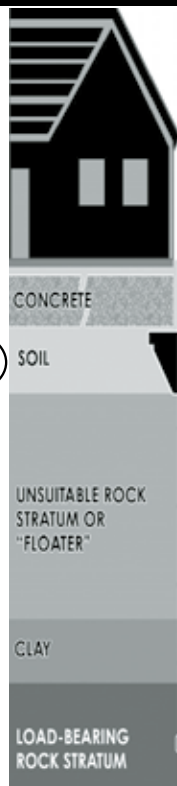

Opening lead — king of spades.  
**Zia Mahmood**, one of the world's top players, is especially noted for his ability to guess the location of missing key cards.

In this deal from the 1984 World Team Olympiad, Zia demonstrated that there is often more to a successful "guess" than at first meets the eye.

Zia, then a member of the Pakistani team, got to four hearts as shown, and West started with the K-A-Q of spades, dummy ruffing the third spade with the heart four. Zia could see that a successful trump

finesse would greatly aid his cause, and he also realized that West did not have to have the queen of hearts for his opening bid.

Nevertheless, at trick four Zia crossed to the club queen, led a low heart and finessed the ten. The heart ace was followed by a club to the ace and the heart king, felling West's queen and giving South 10 tricks — four hearts, four clubs, the diamond ace and a spade ruff in dummy.

How did Zia know West had the heart queen? The answer is that he didn't, but he had good reasons for playing as he did.

First, West's spade continuation at trick three, forcing dummy to ruff, made it seem that he was trying to protect a potential trump trick.

Second, finessing against West was the better technical play. It would bring in the entire suit if West had started with Q-x or Q-x-x, while a finesse against East would pick up the suit without loss only if he had started with Q-x-x.

Third, if the finesse lost to East, West would then become marked with the diamond king for his opening bid, giving declarer his contract with the aid of a subsequent diamond finesse.

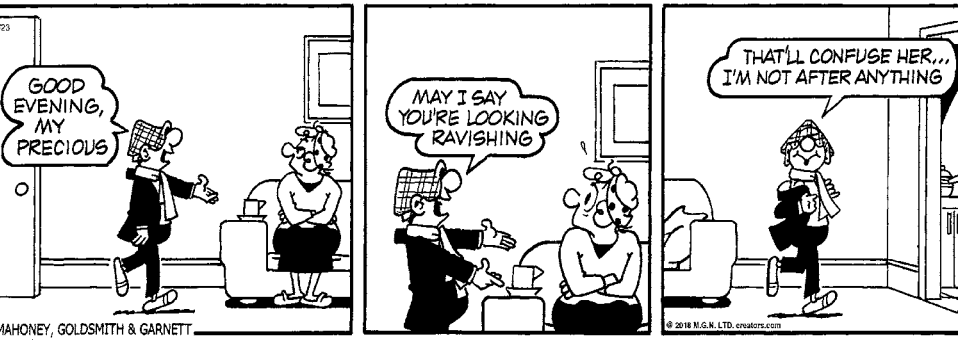
And so, a lot more thought went into Zia's successful "guess" than might appear at first glance, which is usually the case when a player of his caliber "guesses" correctly.

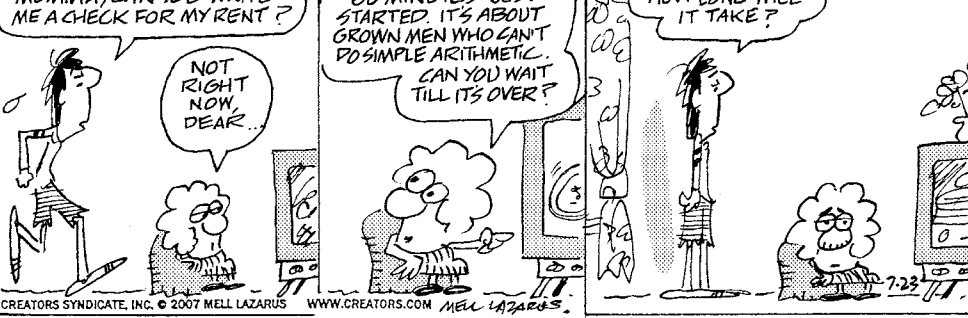

This Date In History

Today is Monday, July 23, the 204th day of 2018. There are 161 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History: On July 23, 1829, William Austin Burt received a patent for his "typographer," a fore-runner of the typewriter.

On this date:

In 1885, Ulysses S. Grant, the 18th president of the United States, died in Mount McGregor, New York, at age 63.

In 1914, Austria-Hungary presented a list of demands to Serbia following the killing of Archduke Franz Ferdinand by a Serb assassin; Serbia's refusal to agree to the entire ultimatum led to the outbreak of World War I.

In 1945, French Marshal Henri Petain (ahn-REE' pay-TAN'), who had headed the pro-Axis Vichy (vee-shee) government during World War II, went on trial, charged with treason. (He was convicted and condemned to death, but the sentence was commuted to life in prison. On this date in 1951, Petain died in prison.)

In 1962, the first public TV transmissions over Telstar 1 took place during a special program featuring live shots beamed from the United States to Europe, and vice versa.

In 1967, five days of deadly rioting erupted in Detroit as an early morning police raid on an unlicensed bar resulted in a confrontation with local residents that escalated into violence that spread into other parts of the city; 43 people, mostly blacks, were killed.

In 1982, actor Vic Morrow and two child actors, 7-year-old Myca Dinh Le and 6-year-old Renee Shin-Yi Chen, were killed when a helicopter crashed on top of them during filming of a Vietnam War scene for "Twilight Zone: The Movie." (Director John Landis and four associates were later acquitted of manslaughter.)

In 1984, Vanessa Williams became the first Miss America to resign her title, after nude photographs of her taken in 1982 were published in Penthouse magazine.

In 1986, Britain's Prince Andrew married Sarah Ferguson at Westminster Abbey in London. (The couple divorced in 1996.)

In 1996, at the Atlanta Olympics, Kerri Strug made a heroic final vault despite torn ligaments in her left ankle as the U.S. women gymnasts clinched their first-ever Olympic team gold medal.

In 1997, the search for Andrew Cunanan, the suspect

ed killer of designer Gianni Versace (JAH'nee vur-SAH'chee) and others, ended as police found his body on a houseboat in Miami Beach, an apparent suicide.

In 1999, space shuttle Columbia blasted off with the world's most powerful X-ray telescope and Eileen Collins, the first woman to command a U.S. space flight.

In 2011, singer Amy Winehouse, 27, was found dead in her London home from accidental alcohol poisoning.

Ten years ago: Hurricane Dolly slammed into the South Texas coast with punishing rain and winds of 100 mph. Democratic presidential contender Barack Obama toured Israel's Yad Vashem Holocaust memorial, laying a wreath in memory of the 6 million Jews who died. U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice met North Korea's top diplomat (Pak Ui Chun) in Singapore, ending a four-year hiatus in cabinet-level contacts between the two countries.

Five years ago: With a high-stakes showdown vote looming in the House, the White House and congressional backers of the National Security Agency's surveillance program warned that ending the massive collection of phone records from millions of Americans would put the nation at risk from another terrorist attack. (The next day, the House narrowly voted against halting the NSA program.)

One year ago: A tractor trailer was found in a Walmart parking lot in San Antonio, Texas, crammed with dozens of immigrants; ten died and many more were treated at a hospital for dehydration and heat stroke. (The driver, James Bradley Jr., was sentenced to life in prison after pleading guilty to transporting the immigrants resulting in death.) President Donald Trump tweeted that he has "complete power" to issue pardons. Jordan Spieth won the British Open for his third career major championship.

# David Bolen Repeats as West Texas Amateur Champion in Dramatic Fashion

Amarillo, Texas — David Bolen wins West Texas Amateur back to back years in a two hole playoff. David Bolen of Lubbock, shot a 68 on the day to force a playoff with Tripp Wallace. Wallace, who is also from Lubbock, forced his way to the top shooting the lowest round of the West Texas Amateur tournament with a 66. Ralph Ellis captured the Senior Division after shooting 4-under 67 in the final round. Ed Brooks used a demanding lead after the second round to cruise to the Super Senior Division title.

"I started off the day great with a birdie putt on one, and had a great feel for my putter" said Bolen. That definitely rang true as he birdied three of his last eight holes to force the playoff.

For the first playoff hole on 18, Wallace attempted to reach the green on his second shot and bounced into the water as Bolen laid up after finding the left rough on his tee shot. Wallace goes on to save par after hitting his fourth shot to four feet. Bolen's birdie putt unfortunately went all the way around the cup to just fall out and force a second playoff hole.

In the second playoff hole, Bolen again found the left rough and was forced to lay up. This time around, Wallace decided to lay up to a comfortable yardage in which both competitors found themselves with a birdie putt. Bolen was up first this go around with a slippery 12 footer down the slope to a tricky back left hole location. Bolen redeemed himself after missing his last two birdie putts going back to the final hole of his round. After Bolen drained his birdie putt, pressure was on Wallace as

he had no more than five feet left to force another hole. Wallace left his putt short and gave Bolen the back to back championship.

"I couldn't believe my putt stayed out on the first playoff hole, but I still trusted and felt good with my putter to sink the birdie the second time around."

Ralph Ellis, an Amarillo Country Club member, started the day two-over tied with Chuck Palmer in the Senior Division, which has been a crowded and competitive leaderboard all weekend. Ellis shot 2-under on the front nine and never looked back as he went on to shoot 4-under on the day and finish 3-under overall.

"This is a big win, and I am really glad I could

help represent this beautiful course in a good way," Ellis said.

Ed Brooks of Fort Worth stayed in the lead for all three rounds of the West Texas Amateur. Brooks, the Texas Senior Amateur Champion last year, shot a 73-70-71 214 overall, to win the Senior Division by a whopping 17 strokes.

"I wasn't happy with my putting all week, but again, my ball striking was excellent", said Brooks. "It was one of those weeks where everything clicked and I stayed consistent hitting the fairways and greens, so I am happy with how I finished".

The defending champion, Patrick Pritchett of Lubbock, finished in second shooting a 77-74-80 231 overall.

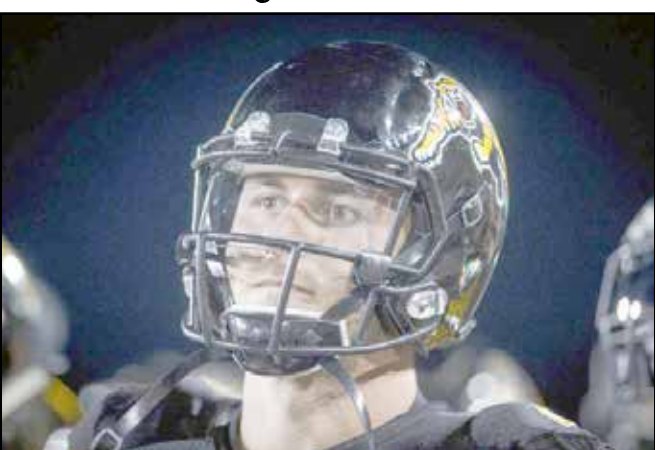

MONTREAL — Johnny Manziel is headed to the Montreal Alouettes in a reunion with the coach

who recruited him to Texas A&M.

The Canadian Football League team acquired the former Heisman Trophy from the Hamilton Tiger-Cats in a blockbuster trade Sunday.

"I look forward to reuniting with Johnny again and working with him," first-year Montreal coach Mike Sherman, the former Green Bay coach and GM who lured Manziel to College Station, told the Montreal Gazette.

Montreal also got offensive linemen Tony Washington and Landon Rice from the Tiger-Cats for defensive end Jamaal Westerman, wide receiver Chris Williams and first-round draft picks in 2020 and 2021.

The Alouettes made the move a day after starting quarterback Drew Willy sustained his second injury of the season. Montreal backup Jeff Mathews also is out with a foot injury, leaving third-stringer Matt Shiltz to play the final three quarters Saturday night in a 25-8 loss at Calgary.

"We have acquired an exceptional quarterback with undeniable talent," Alouettes general manager Kavis Reed said in a statement in a team release. "With his great mobility, his athletic abili-

ties and his instinct we believe that he will have a positive impact on our offence. Landon Rice and Tony Washington are two skilled players that will considerably solidify our offensive line."

Making a comeback after being released by the Cleveland Browns in March 2016, Manziel was unable to get on the field in Hamilton behind starter Jeremiah Masoli. In two preseason games, the former Texas &M star was 21 of 32 for 168 yards and a touchdown.

"Professional salute & respect for @Ticats @ticator Mitchell & Coach Jones for doing the rgt thing. Thank y'all for the opp & great luck in future!" Manziel's agent, Erik Burkhardt, tweeted Sunday night.

Montreal (1-4) hosts Edmonton on Thursday night. The Alouettes have scored a CFL-low 69 points and allowed a league-high 148.

"This is a move both Kavis Reed and I felt we needed to make at this time," Sherman said. "Neither one of us believes in the status quo and felt we needed to shake things up. Johnny is someone we believe can elevate one of the most important positions on our team."
