

#### Area Gets Rain, Hail, Winds

Spring thunderstorms brought gusty winds, light showers of-rain and some pea-sized hail to the Snyder area Thursday afternoon. At the same time, tornadoes were reported southwest of Colorado City, near San Angelo and on the High Plains, but no damage or injuries were reported.

The official rain gauge at the Snyder water treatment plant measured .27 inch of rain during the showers. The small hailstones were mixed with the rain in some local areas.

Most of the rain reports over the region were light, with a few ranging up to nearly an inch. The rainfall here ran the total for the year to 1.51 inches.

#### Lending Rate Goes To 191/2%

NEW YORK (AP)-The prime lending rate jumped today to a record 191/2 percent when Continental Illinois National Bank of Chicago leapfrogged over the 191/4 percent rate established earlier in the day by Citibank in New York.

Citibank, the nation's second-largest bank, led the latest round of prime rate increases by setting the 191/4 percent rate, a record at the time.

#### **ERA Wins Boycott Right**

ST. LOUIS (AP)-A federal appeals court ruled today that the National Organization for Women may boycott states which have not ratified the Equal **Rights** Amendment.

Missouri Attorney General John Ashcroft had filed suit against NOW two years ago, charging that the organization had cost St. Louis \$11 million and Kansas City \$8 million in convention business.

But U.S. District Court Judge Elmo B. Hunter ruled that the boycott does not violate the Sherman Act or other anti-trust laws, and the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals today affirmed that ruling.

Passage of the ERA, which would prohibit discrimation based on sex, requires ratification by 38 states. Thirty five have approved the proposed constitutional amendment, but five states have attempted to rescind that ratification. Missouri has not ratified the amendment.

## **Divers Search For Survivors** In Rig Mishap

STAVANGER, Norway (AP)-Divers hammered on the hull of an upsidedown oil workers' "floating hotel" today looking for survivors of the worst disaster in the North Sea oilfields.

101 men reported missing, the biggest rescue operation since World War II was under way by more than 2,000 people. manning scores of ships, planes and helicopters. Phillips Petroleum Co., which leased the 10,000ton Alexander I. Kielland rig, released new figures showing 228 people were aboard and a lower number of survivors than was first reported.

Spokesman Per Erik. Bjorklund said 101 men were still missing, 38 bodies had been recovered and 89 survivors found. Previously 149 survivors had been reported.

Divers dropped 90 feet to check for signs of life in the platform's subjerged living quarters. They were using underwater television cameras to check the hull.

"They are hammering on the hull, but so far there has been no response," said Per Erik Bjorklund, spokesman for the Phillips Petroleum Co. which leased the 10,-000-ton Alexander I. Killand. "We are giving every priority to the search for survivors."

Tugboats were standing by to latch onto the rig.

It was estimated there were 230 workers on board the rig when one of With 38 bodies found and the five legs collapsed Thursday night during a storm that produced winds up to 60 mph and Brownfield 20-foot waves. The latest figures from. the Norwegian rescue center at this coastal port was 53 men missing, 28 bodies recovered and a total 149 workers rescued. 'We have never had ac-

cidents like this to my knowledge in any part of the world," said Bill Boys, Phillips' Norway manager.

At least 46 ships were deployed in the search over 4,000 square miles in the Edda oilfield on Norway's Continental Shelf. Planes and helicopters from Britain, West Germany, Denmark and Norway joined the rescue.

Most of the estimated Lake View team of Roy 230 rig workers aboard were working, sleeping in the hotel or watching a movie when the rig capsized Thursday night in a storm.

"He won't listen to me, but he will listen to you. Please use your influence to cut the spending of my Uncle Sam.





The money taken from the citizens of this country to support welfare programs is outrageous, but in Europe the situation is even worse. Recent reports suggest that social welfare spending is causing major economic problems in at least four Western European nations. Statistics from these countries show just how quickly welfare spending can get out of hand.

Europeans generally have one national welfare system, unlike the United States, appropriately labeled Social Security. These European systems encompass much more than the pensions and disability payments provided by Social Security in the United States. Most European systems also include complete health and medical payments, unemployment benefits, subsidies to the poor, child payments. and a host of other services. It all sounds good if the price isn't considered.

A quick comparison with their American counterparts demonstrates the cost of the Europeans' social security folly. Last year an American wage earner making \$35,000 paid out 26 percent of his income to taxes and social security. In Denmark that same individual would have paid out 54.1 percent; in Sweden 55 percent; Belgium 38.9 percent; in the Netherlands 33.3 percent. Statistics for lower paid workers are not much better. An American making \$13,800 - paid 21percent in taxes and social security last year while that persons's Danish counterpart paid 41.2 percent and so on.

Economists in Western Europe stunned by the growth of the welfare system, are labeling the economic consequences of all this a disaster. If the current trends continue, by 1990 the government sector in Sweden will control 95 percent of the economy. The situation is not that much better in the other European nations. Social welfare programs in Belgium took 32 percent of all workers' wages only 10 years ago, now it's 46 percent. In the same time period the Netherlands, due primarily to spiraling social security costs, increased the government's share of its economy from 45 to 60 percent.

Predictably, these European nations are beginning to experience the economic turmoil that results from too much government, Last year in Belgium, students and doctors demonstrated in the streets against proposedcuts in their government payments. In the Netherlands the government imposed a three-month freeze on wage increases and put a lid on any increase on social welfare payments. When one considers that 60 percent of that country's economy is tied to government spending the enormity of that decision is apparent.

What happened in these European nations is nothing less than a loss of freedom. No foreign tanks crossed their borders in the last decade, but those people are as enslaved to their own welfare system as they would be to a foreign power. Ironically it was accomplished in the name of the people's welfare. The same thing could easily happen here. Maybe it is happening at this moment.

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Their final judgment, though, was that Reagan would win California, thus giving him a virtua lock on the nomination. That was when Ford called the whole thing off." If California had a proportional representation Republican primary, however, Jerry Ford would be a declared candidate today.
