For A Democratic Primary Election.

It is essentially democratic for the people to rule. In all democracies the will of the majority must control. This is fundamental.

In the absence of an elective system that within itself constitutes a direct appeal to the people with the view of the majority ruling political machines spring up and corruption nourishes.

To relieve the democratic masses of Texas from the corruption rule of machine politics wherein and whereby the will of the majority was often throttled a general primary system was invoked.

In the construction of an honest and fair election law a hard struggle ensued and the culmination of that struggle is registered in the fact that while we have made wonderful progress in the direction of a purification of our ballot system, it is still far from perfect.

An acknowledged and most pronounced defeat in the system is the absence of a provision for an election to be held throughout Texas each four years in which candidates for the presidency and vice presidency are to be nominated in which such primary called by the authority of the democratic party the democratic electorate shall have the right to vote for delegates for presidential and vice presidential candidates.

The absence of such a provision in our elective and nominating systems is unfortunate, and the Statesman is heartily in favor of the democratic state executive committee correcting the defect and supplying the omission in the law by making an order for such a primary election to be held under and by its authority this good year 1908.

To do so is democratic and right. The democratic masses should control the affairs of the democratic party from president to constable. We want and should have no machine rule in the party. Too long the party suffered from machine domination. Its every effort for the past sev-

er years has been in the direction of relieving the state the embarrassment of machine rule. No backward step should be taken. Our voice and our vote is for the democratic primary election to be held throughout Texas to enable the democratic masses of this state to register their choice of candidates for president and vice president, and as well their preference for delegates from this state to the national convention of the party.

There is absolutely nothing in the election laws of Texas against the holding of such an election. For years before we had a legalized primary election system in the state certain counties in Texas regularly year in and year out held nomination primary elections, and in the fewest possible instances fraud was ever alleged to have obtained.

Such primary county party elections were held without expense to the state or the counties in which they were held. So can the election that we urge the democratic executive committee to call be held.

To the Statesman it matters not who may win in such an election. The man or men whom the democratic masses of Texas prefer will, and that is as it should be. The Statesman may be ever so loyal to its favorite candidate, but never at the sacrifice of the democratic principle involved in the issue of the right of the majority to rule. And, moreover, the Statesman has no fear as to where its favorites will land. If the majority of the party be consulted, all will be well. Give us a state democratic delegate primary election, gentlemen.—Austin Statesman.

Killing at Sonora.

On Thursday night, Feb. 20th, Walter F. Fielden, who conducted a beer saloon in the west portion of Sonora, met his death at the hands of Murdoch McDonald a young man of Sonora and Lillie Smith a woman who lived in de-bauchery in that city, the fuss occurred about midnight of Thursday night at the house of Lillie Smith. The officers were summoned and Fielden was taken to jail, supposed to be in a drunken condition as he had been seen in a drunken condition previous to the trouble, after placing Fielden in jail and being gone some time, Sheriff Allison returned to the jail and found Fielden as he thought a sleep, but on returning to the jail Friday morning to feed the prisoners he found the supposed sleeping man to be dead and later in the day the above accused were placed in jail. L. H. Baightman district attorney was wired for and passed through here Sunday on his way there to hold an examining trial, the examining trial was waived by the accused parties and McDonald bond placed at \$2,500 and Lillie Smith at \$100. Fielden is said to have been drinking and then it is said that whiskey was probably the cause of the trouble, and now may be the good people of Sonora see fit to move from their midst such houses as this affray occurred in, as no good ever arrives from any of them.

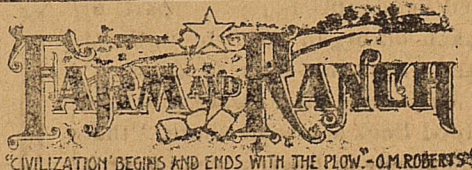

Mr. Bryan's Opinions.

The plans of guaranteed bank deposits has probably found favor, among all classes of people and irrespective of political affiliation, more rapidly than any other public question.

The new state of Oklahoma has already enacted a law taxing state banks, the fund thus accumulated to be used in paying the deposits of any state bank that from any cause becomes unable to meet its obligations. A special session of the Kansas legislature has been called for the purpose of enacting legislation similar to the Oklahoma plan. The governor of Nebraska is considering the advisability of calling a special session of the legislature on account of the growing belief among the people that protection to bank depositors in the form of state or federal guarantees of their deposits will stop the hoarding of money, bring into circulation sufficient currency to conduct the business of the country, and prevent a recurrence of such disastrous panics as the one through which we are now passing.

Mr. Bryan has been an advocate of a law guaranteeing deposits in state and national banks since 1893. The legislature of Ohio has adopted a joint resolution inviting Mr. Bryan to address its members in joint session February 18, 1908, on the subject of Guaranteed Bank Deposits.

Mr. Bryan, in discussing the tariff question, insists that residents of the United States should be permitted to buy home-made goods at home at as low a price as the foreigner can buy American-made goods. He also insists that government should be by the people as a whole, administered in the interest of the new beneficiaries of the system. He believes that proper legislation for the purpose of regulation and control of interstate commerce and common carriers should supplement state legislation, and not be a substitute for state legislation.


