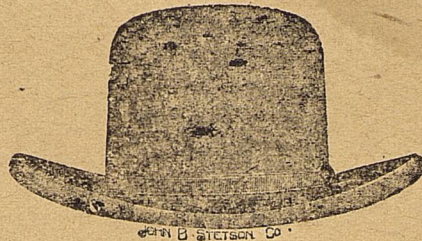

TOM PALMER

Sells His Stock and Leases His Ranch to C. C. West, Stock Valued Near \$10,000 and 3 Year Lease on Ranch \$2,700.00.

Tom Palmer one of the best known ranchmen in west Texas, sold this week to C. C. West another old timer of this county, his entire stock of cattle and horses, and leased his ranch to Mr. West for three years at \$2,700 for the three years. The cattle and horses will probably amount to \$10,000, the horses were sold for \$40 per head and there is 80 head. Mr. Palmer reserved the right to keep five head counting his fine Stallion, there is 15 head of registered Hereford cattle, 3 bulls that Mr. Palmer bought at \$300 each. The registered cattle were put in on the deal at \$100 each, counting 5 calves, the stock cattle

brought \$15 per head and will count out between 300 and 350 head; this is one of the best graded herd of cattle and horses in the county. Mr. Palmer says he aims to take a lay off for three years and have a good time.

He made many friends in the district during his time he spent in behalf of his family who will learn of his death with sadness.

DEATH OF MRS. DELONG.

It becomes our duty again to report the death of a friend. Mrs. Reva DeLong at the age of 23 years, passed to the heaven of rest on Monday after noon at 3:30 o'clock in San Angelo where she had gone for medical purposes her death was met by tuberculosis, she leaves a husband and two small boys, one 3 years old the other 14 years old. These two little ones will never realize the touch of a mother hand, the sound of a mother voice or the teachings of a mother love, as they are yet so small to realize the much need of a mother. Mrs. DeLong was of an affectionate disposition, bright and winning in her ways so that friendship's circle was to her a large one. Indeed, it may be said of her, that "none knew her but to love her." Only a few years ago she was married in our city to Mr. J. H. DeLong who she leaves with two small children, to mourn her loss in this county she developed into girlhood; here she married and helped to establish a home of her own; here her busy life was spent, her battle fought, her faithful service rendered to the world. In the city of San Angelo, among the dearest of friends, she lies down at length to sleep and rest. Her remains were buried in the family cemetery near Christoval, beautifully appropriate such a resting place, where her kindred sleeps and where a few of her life-long friends remains to gather about the dear form with honest tears of bereavement, to lay her away tenderly in the narrow house with its curtains of fadeless green. To her the struggle and burden bearing of earth are ended, and we confidently trust that like one awakes from a troubled dream she has awakened to see life's endless morning break and knows herself at home with all the vast throng of loved ones, missed from earth, safe about her. Her affection for friends and kindred was tender and a biding.

Among us all she ranked always as a woman of culture, refinement, sympathy, a kind neighbor, devoted mother and a true friend, and with all a woman of heroic mould in bravely meeting the requirements and often the disappointments of life. She was the oldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Clark of this county, who were with her during her last hours, and may the power of the one who doeth all things well, come to the relief of the bereft husband, father, mother, sister and brother in this their hours of sorrow. God will certainly care for them, till He shall gather all his children into that "home beyond."


