### REPUBLICAN STATE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

CECIL A. LYON, CHAIRMAN.

To the Electors of Texas.

In accordance with established custom and in obedience to the instructions of the Republican State Executive Committee, given at their meeting held in Dallas, Texas, on Tuesday, April 14th, 1908, and obeying the instructions of the Republican National Committee, it is directed that a State Republican Convention of delegates representatives of the Republican party of Texas, be held in the city of Fort Worth, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Friday, May 15th 1908, for the purpose of electing four delegates at large and four alternates at large to the Republican National Convention at Chicago and to nominate two electors at large for the State of Texas, to be voted for at the Presidential election, Tuesday, November 3, 1908, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before it.

The basis of representation for the Convention at Fort Worth is hereby fixed at one vote for each 300 votes, or major fraction thereof, provided that 150 votes be considered a major fraction, cast for C. A. Gray for Governor in the election of 1906, provided that every county in Texas is entitled to at least one vote, regardless of vote for Governor.

It is hereby directed that County Chairman immediately issue their calls for meetings of their County Executive Committees and that at such meeting, the first order of business shall be the election of a County Chairman, in the event that a vacancy exists in that office, and if the per on calling the County Executive Committee together is now only acting Chairman, vacandice on County Executive Committee shall also be filled. It is directed that the precinct primaries in each precinct in this State shall be held on Saturday, May 2nd, 1908, and that the County Convention shall be held on Tuesday, May 5th, 1908. The County Convention should be held in the county seat of the various counties.

While the basis of representation is as stated above, it is permitted that any county so desiring may elect four delegates for each vote to which the county is entitled. In addition, each county is entitled to the same number of alternate delegates to the State Con-

vention as it has delegates and on county shall be represented by proxy when any qualified Republican elector from that county is present at the State Convention.

It is further directed that the County convention shall elect delegates to the Congressional Convention, which will be held for the purpose of electing district delegates to the Republican National Convention.

The folloing test for participation in Republican Primary Conventions is hereby ordered: "Every person participating in the Republican Primary Conventions in this State binds himself to support the nominees of the Republican National Convention and the Candidates for Electors chosen by the Republican Convention of Texas."

Notice of all Primary and county convention shall be given by publication in some paper in each county, provided a paper is published in the county, and in the event no paper is published in the county, notice of all Primary county conventions shall be given by posting of notices in at least three public places in such county.

The basis of representation to be used in the County conventions is one vote for each twenty five votes cast for Gray for Governor in the precinct in the election of 1906, provided that every precinct is entitled to at least one vote.

The credentials of each delegate and alternate must be forwarded to the Secretary of the Republican State Executive Committee, at Sherman, Texas, not later than May 8, 1908, for use in making up the temporary roll of the Convention. When more than the authorized number of delegates form any county are reported, a contest shall be deemed to exist; but all notices of contests must be submitted in writing to the Secretary of State Executive Committee not later than May 8th, 1908.

It is requested that the widest publicity be given to the holding of the precinct conventions and every effort should be made to dissuade Republican from getting interested in local contests and entering the primaries of parties other than the Regular Republican organization. We believe that the present disensions in the Democratic Party in this State have brought to hand the time for a largely increased Republican vote in this State, and every Republican is earnestly requested to use his best efforts to see that all persons possible are dissuaded from participating in the Primaries of parties other than the regular Republican party in Texas.

All county chairmen are requested to acknowledge receipt of this call immediately in order that the State Chairman may be fully advised of the intentions of various committees.

For the information of the Republicans of Texas, the following resolution, which was unanimous adopted by the State Executive committee, is given, and it is requested that where this resolution meets the approval of the counties, that the Conventions are asked to adopt similar resolutions.

"The Republicans of Texas, loyal to principles and policies of National Administration, Republican have been unwilling to abandon the that Theodore Roosevelt might again be chosen the standard-bearer of the party in the coming campaign.

"Recognizing, though, that our earnest wish may not be gratified through the action of the President himself in refusing to permit his own renomination, our loyalty to the principle and policies which

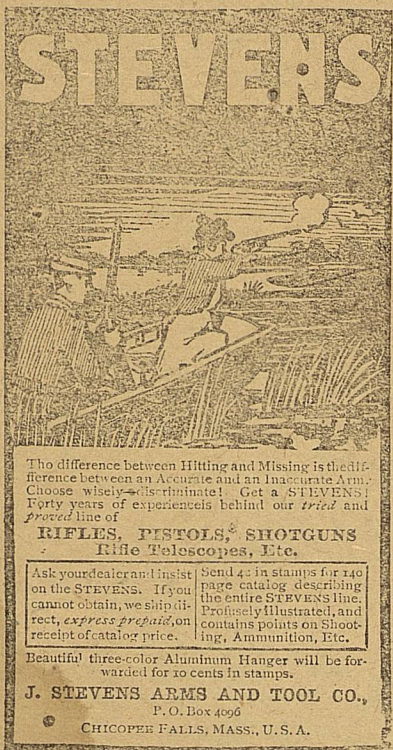

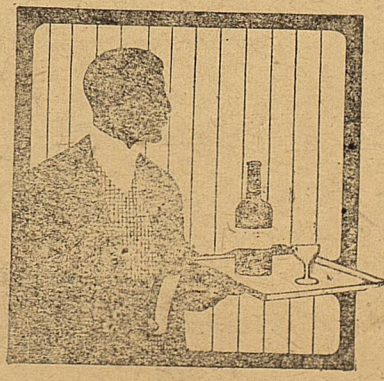
