

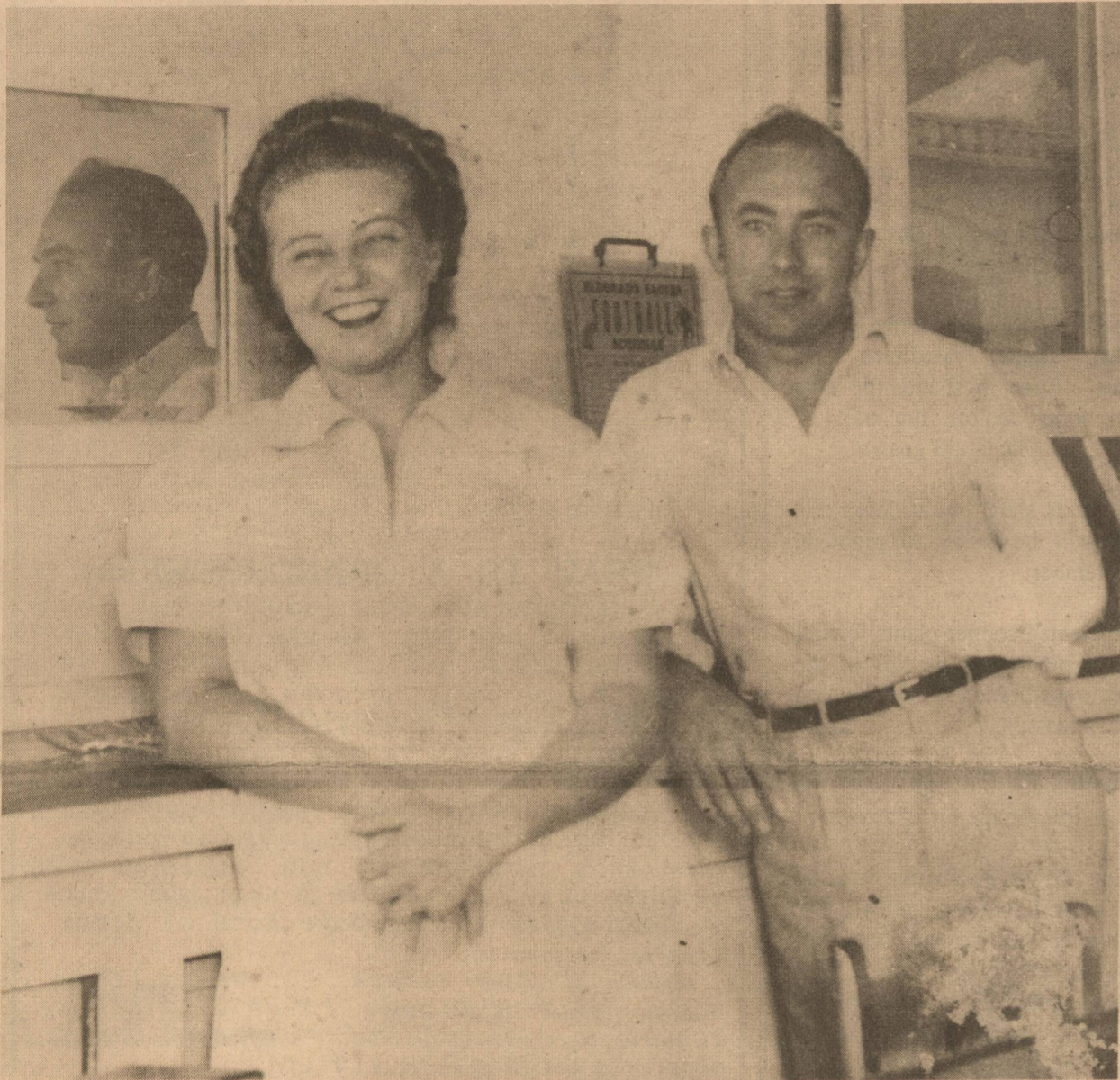

Love, Yates Honored For Schleicher County Days

The Schleicher County Historical Society elects two local citizens to represent their pioneer family every year. These residents and their families will be honored at Schleicher County Days, August 7th and 8th. The representatives elected this year were Elnore Andrews Love and Dozier T "Duge" Yates. The following are their family stories.

Elnore Andrews Love

Working as a photographer from her studio in London, Texas, Bessie Annie Melvinie "Bess" McDonald traveled to the homes of her customers to take family portraits. When she went to the Andrews home to take the family photos she did not realize their son would be her future husband. Bess McDonald and Roy Andrews were married on June 21, 1912. They rode away on horse back for their honeymoon trip.

On June 24, 1914, a beautiful little girl named Elnore was born to this union. The family also moved to Schleicher County that year. They moved to a farm at Kaffir Community where a

lot of Bess's relatives, the McDonalds, lived. In 1915 another beautiful daughter named Loleet "Happy" blessed the Andrews family.

Elnore started school at the Kaffir on room rural school. The family moved to Eldorado when she was in the 4th grade. Elnore enjoyed her years in Eldorado schools and participated in many activities. She was pep squad yell leader for E.H.S. She graduated in 1933.

When the Andrews moved to Eldorado, they built a grocery and meat market on the corner of Main and Mills Streets.

In 1933, on Elnore's birthday, her parents store and living quarters burned to the ground. The fire that started in the Shoemakers Feed and Fuel Store consumed six buildings before it was put out. This was a very difficult time for the Andrews family as they had no insurance and lost everything. The family worked very hard and was able to rebuild in 1935. Elnore opened a cafe in the new building in 1935 and operated it until 1941. Duge Yates worked for her for many years.

The Andrews family loved parties and visitors. In the early days on the Kaffir Farm, a constant visitor was Gus Love, a cowboy that worked on the Sol Mayer Ranch. Gus was a lot older than Elnore, but after Elnore was grown and operating her cafe, she and Gus began to date. The two fell in love and were married on April 19, 1941.

Two children were born to the Love's. Linda Bess was born on January 26, 1947 and Roy Lynn was born on February 24, 1948.

Gus and Elnore bought "Love's Flower Shop" after their marriage and Elnore still runs the business today. The Love's have been avid civic leaders in our community over the years, and have contributed much to Schleicher County.

Roy Andrews died on October 26, 1971. He served as Constable of Schleicher County from 1963 until his death.

Bess Andrews died on September 9, 1984, at a young age of 92. She will always be remembered for her kindness, wit and love for music. Her last few years in the nursing home she continued to play

the piano for the other residents.

Gus Love died on January 16, 1967. He always said he didn't have any musical talent like the rest of the family, but he could tell good jokes! Roy, Bess, and Gus are all buried in the Eldorado Cemetery.

Dozier T. "Duge" Yates

John Wilson Yates, born in Bell County Texas on March 8, 1879, married Sophronie Elizabeth O'dell in Belton, Texas on October 28, 1900. The young couple moved to Schleicher County before 1915 to do farm and ranch work on the H. Leslie Jones Ranch near Ft. McKavett. Born to this union were eight children: Melvin (Burleson), Lorene (Scott), Wurdell, Duge, J.W., Earl, Vivian (Love) and Harold.

The first school Duge attended was at Ft. McKavett. He later went to Schleicher County Rural Schools at Rudd, Tisdale and Cliff. He transferred to Eldorado his freshman year, but did not get to graduate because he had to quit school and help his family. His mother was not well after the birth of her son Harold, and Duge helped with house-hold chores and farm work.

Duge worked for Elnore Andrews, a life-long friend, after she opened her cafe in the Andrews Building in 1935. He worked for until he was drafted for the Selective Service in World War II. He was Schleicher County's first man to leave for war, and was sent off with a grand parade hero of the day!

Duge's sister, Lorene Scott, owned and operated a beauty shop in Eldorado for many years. His brother, Earl, has also been a life-time resident of Schleicher County.

For many years Duge was in the dry cleaning business, owning Yates Cleaners.

Duge loves gardening and is a great sports enthusiast. He has supported and encouraged three generations of Eldorado school students in all sports and band.

Sophonie Yates died in 1943 while Duge was in the service, he could not come home for her funeral.

John Wilson Yates died in February of 1946. They are buried in Eldorado Cemetery.

Lester Presented Award

Nancy Lester, Schleicher County Extension Agent, Home Economics, was presented the Excellence in Community Development Award by the Texas Association of Extension Home Economists during their annual meeting August 5-7 at the Lubbock Plaza, Lubbock, Texas.

The program emphasized beautifying Schleicher County to improve community and economic development through a community-wide recycling effort. Lester accepted the award for having provided leadership and training for the State's most outstanding

community development project. This project was cited for having outstanding cooperation between county government, city government, clubs, organizations, schools, and churches. A wide variety of recycling projects were used for the involvement of volunteers in developing a sense of community spirit.

"Congratulations Nancy Lester and Schleicher County on a job well done," commented Dr. Jennie Kitching, Assistant Director-Home Economics, Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "This was definitely a 'Spirit' of the community involvement."

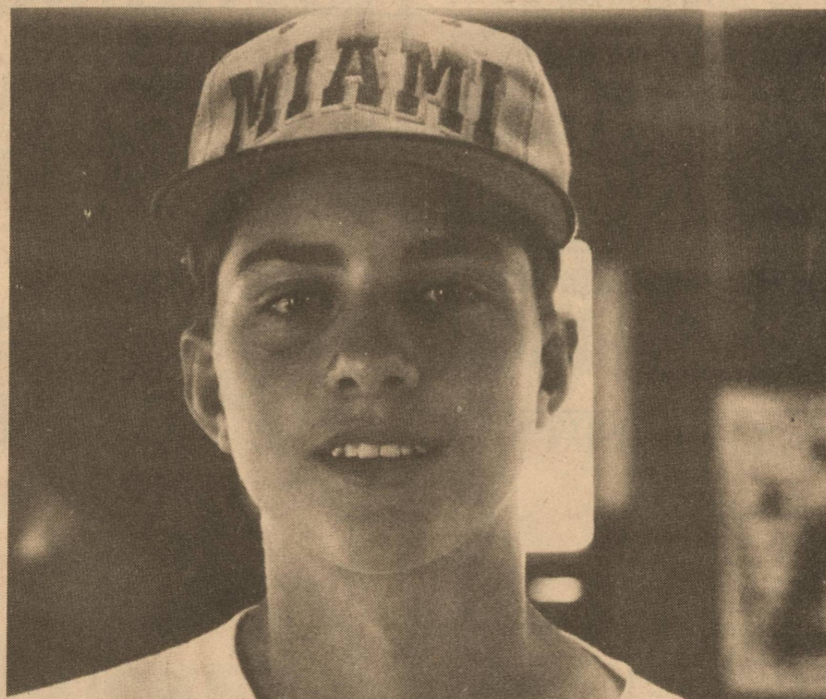

County Agents Report

GARDEN CHECK LIST FOR JULY

Landscape Horticulturist

✓ Water lawns and gardens when needed, giving a thorough soaking rather than frequent light sprinklings.

✓ Check plants for mulch. Replace or add when needed.

✓ Keep close check on recently planted plants. Inadequate root system and drought can be damaging. Early heavy rains have caused root damage and loss. This can result in stress and death in just a few days. Plants injured by last winter's cold should not be allowed to suffer drought stress.

✓ Sow seeds of the following annuals for later summer and fall flowering:

- Marigold
- Zinnia
- Periwinkle
- Petunia
- Cosmos
- Portulaca
- Ageratum

Transplants available from your nursery or garden center will usually provide faster color.

✓ Check junipers and marigolds for red spider mites. The brown, discolored foliage may be due to mite damage. Hold a sheet of white paper below a branch and tap the branch sharply. If the dirt specks start to move, you can be almost certain you have spider mites. Spray them with insecticidal soaps or chemicals labeled for control.

✓ To keep plants in hanging containers looking attractive, soak the baskets in a tub of water every few days in addition to the regular daily watering. This is also a good time to fertilize baskets. Never apply fertilizer to dry plants.

✓ Divide spring and early summer perennials -- including daffodils, daylilies, iris, etc., and replant the best clumps. Discard the diseased or damaged material and share any surplus with friends.

✓ Don't forget to water large leafed plants like hydrangea, coleus, caladiums and chrysanthemums. Even in shade, the hot, dry wind can soon deplete the soil of moisture where these plants are grown.

✓ Bluebonnet seeds should be ordered this month so you will be ready to plant in August and September.

✓ If you have planted copper plants for fall color, be sure to pinch out the tips of the branches to encourage branching and develop bushy, compact plants.

✓ Gladiolus corms can be dug, cured and stored as soon as the foliage turns brown.

✓ Many spring flowering shrubs will be forming flower buds in late July and August. Drought conditions can reduce both the quantity and quality of spring flowers. This is true of azaleas, camellias, peaches, pears, forsythia and other similar plants. Don't allow them to suffer drought stress.

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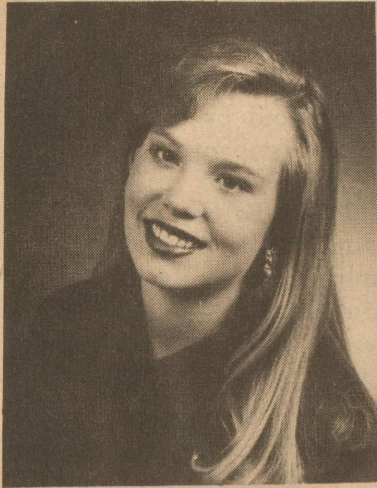

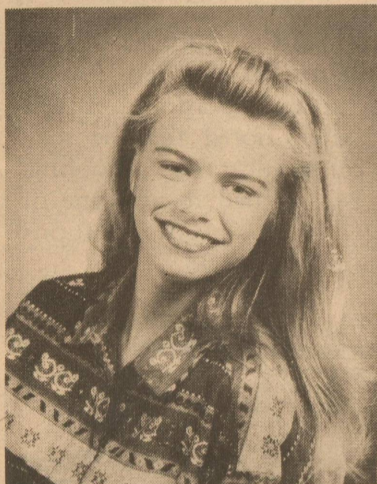

Health News

If you are traveling by plane or car, extended periods of sitting in one position may cause fatigue and painful stiffness in different parts of your body. Usually stiffness and discomfort can be minimized by moving around. When you are driving on a trip you should stop, walk around, and stretch your arms.

If you are in an airplane or in other areas where you cannot move around, there are some stretches you can do for the different parts of your body.

1. Neck - roll your head slowly from front to back and side to side, three times followed by a deep breath.

2. Lower Back - staying seated, lean over as far as you can, for 5-7 seconds, repeat this until your back is loose. You can also pull your knees to your chest for 5-7 seconds,

do it about 5 times.

3. Shoulders - place your elbows firmly on the arm rests and press your shoulders down for about a minute then relax, repeat this a couple of times.

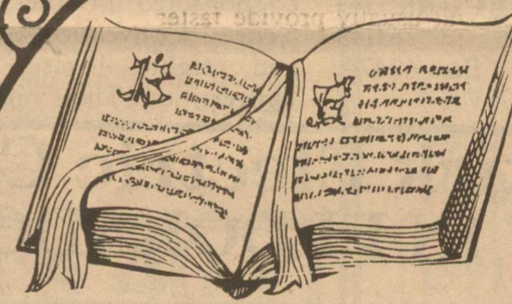
4. Legs - extend your legs as far forward as possible and stretch.

If you sit or travel for long periods of time, maybe some of these stretches will keep you loose and out of pain.

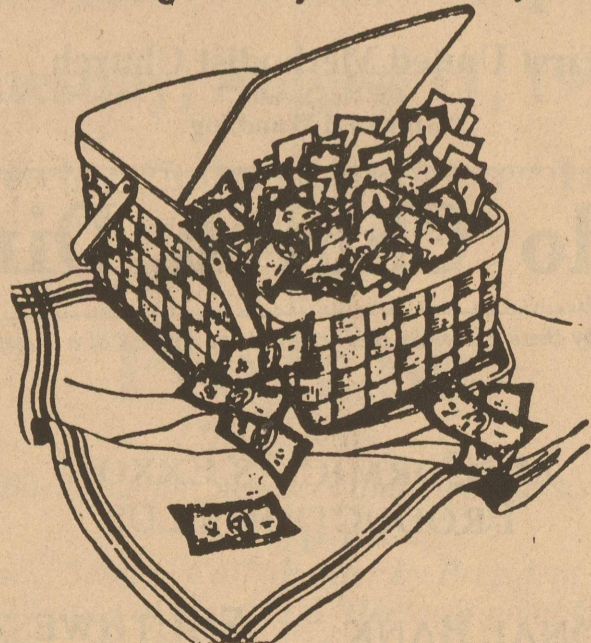

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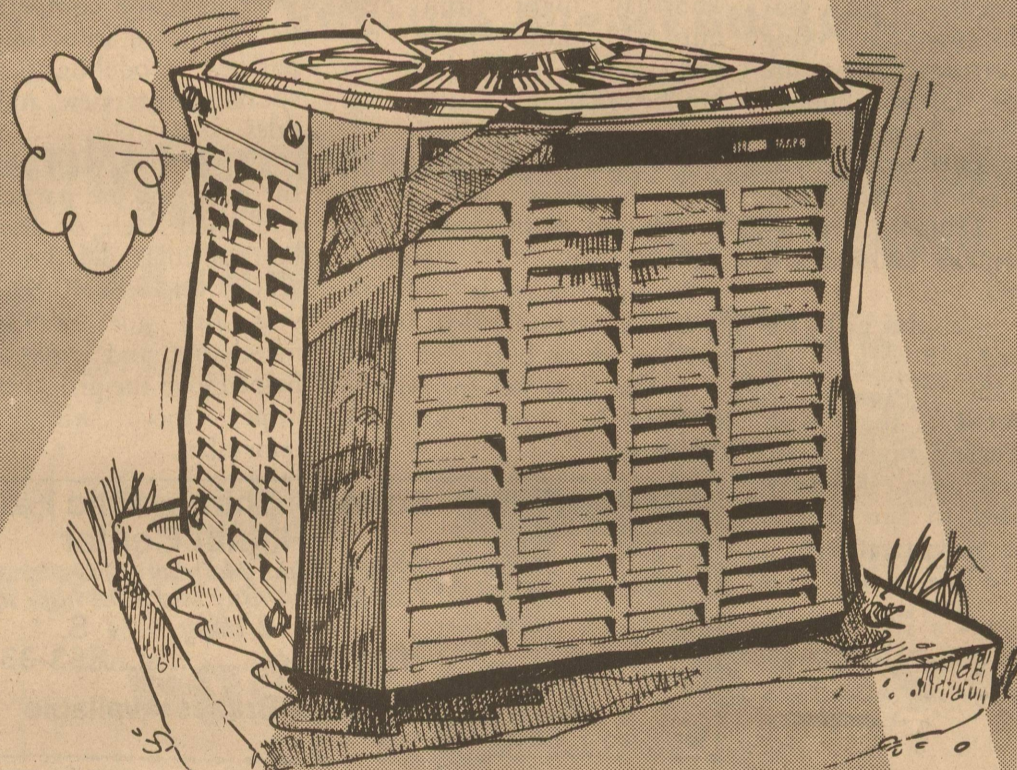

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The Importance Of Immunizations

Although most people think about immunizations before going back to school, they are a year-round health concern. Immunizations play an important part in preventive health because a number of infectious diseases are almost completely preventable through routine immunizations. The incidence of measles, one such preventable disease, increased twelve-fold in Texas from 1988 to 1991. In fact, as late as 1990, Texas was home to about 18 percent of the nation's measles cases. To help prevent this and other diseases, Texas Medical Association urges you to make sure you and your children have current immunizations.

Routine childhood immunizations protect against eight diseases: measles, mumps and rubella (usually

given as one vaccine called MMR), diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (also combined and called DTP), poliomyelitis, and Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib). The following is an immunization schedule recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics and Immunization Practices Advisory Committee to the Centers for Disease Control:

* DTP—a series of five shots, at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, between 15 and 18 months, and a booster shot between ages 4 and 6.

* Polio—a series of four oral doses at 2 months, 4 months, 15 to 18 months, and 4 to 6 years.

* MMR—two shots, one at 15 months and a booster at 11 to 12 years old.

* Haemophilus influenzae type B—two different vaccines available, both given

at 2 months, 4 months, and 12 to 15 months; one also requires a dose at 6 months.

* Tetanus-diphtheria—between ages 14 and 16 years.

A new recommendation was issued by the CDC in November 1991 about Hepatitis B. Although it is an adult disease, Hepatitis B has not been controlled by adult immunizations. To help eliminate Hepatitis B, the CDC now recommends immunizing for the disease at birth, at 1 to 2 months, and at 6 to 18 months.

Although some risks are associated with immunizations, they are outweighed by the benefits of disease prevention. If you are concerned about vaccine risks, speak with your physician.

Infants and school-age children aren't the only ones who need to be immunized, however. Adults also need immunizations. Most adults have not been immunized in accordance with existing guidelines, including receiving booster shots. Infection rates in seven diseases—influenza, pneumococcal pneumonia, rubella, measles, tetanus and diphtheria—can be significantly reduced by targeting adult populations for vaccination. You should receive a tetanus booster every 10 years. Adult immunization schedules for

other diseases vary widely and depend on such factors as age, past immunization history, and physical condition.

At its annual meeting held recently in San Antonio, Texas Medical Association's House of Delegates approved a recommendation asking the American Medical Association to seek legislation in Congress to designate immunizations a matter of universal entitlement. The recent increase in outbreaks of infectious diseases, combined with renewed emphasis on preventive health, makes immunizations more important than ever. Check with your physician about immunizations you and your family need.

National School Lunch Program

The Schleicher County I.S.D. school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for K-4 for \$1.10; 5-8 for \$1.20; and 9-12 for \$1.30; and breakfast for 50¢. Adult teachers may buy lunch for \$1.75 and guests may buy lunch for \$3.45. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the income chart below, your

children can get free meals or reduced price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40¢ for lunch and 25¢ for breakfast.

To get free or reduced price meals for your children, you must complete an application and return it to the school. We cannot approve an application that is not complete.

How To Apply

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the child you are applying for, the

application must have the child's name, a food stamp or AFDC case number for that child, and the signature of an adult household member.

If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature.

If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for the child you are applying for, then the application must have the child's name, the names all household members, the amount of

income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send paper showing that your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Scott Barton, Superintendent, P.O. Box W, Eldorado, Tx. 76936. Phone number - (915) 853-2514.

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at not additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

You will be notified when your application is approved or denied. because you get food stamps or AFDC, you must tell the school when you are not getting AFDC or food stamps for them. You may then fill

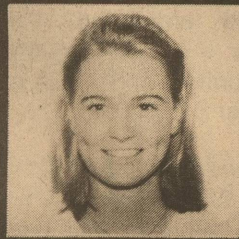

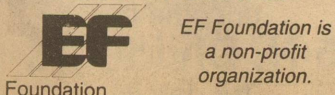

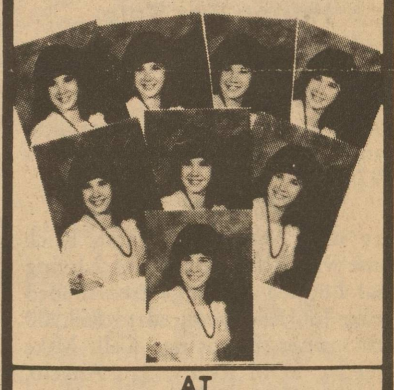
