

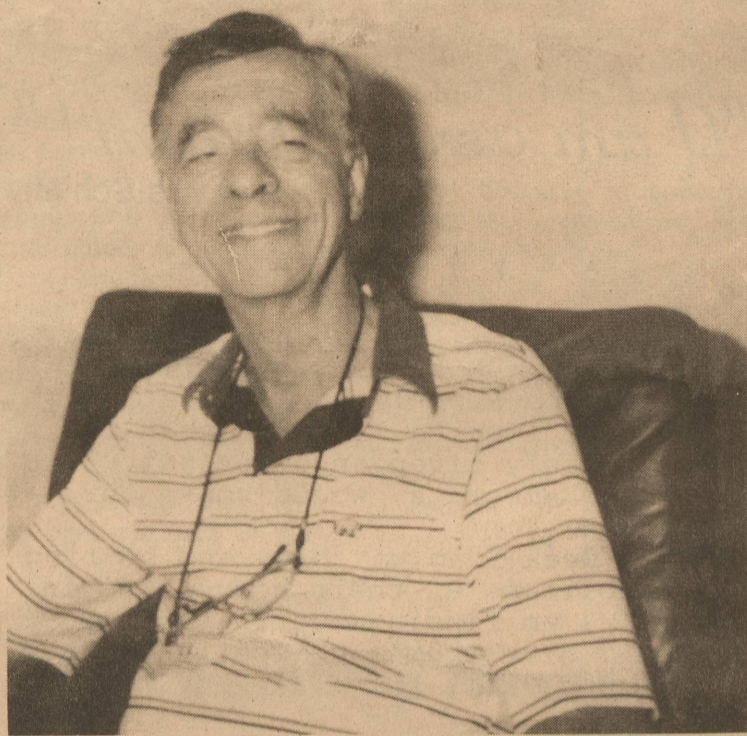

## Baptist Congregation To Get Historical Marker



Original First Baptist Church Building

The Schleicher County Historical Society is proud to announce the approval of an Official Texas Historical Marker for the congregation of the First Baptist Church of Eldorado.

A grand dedication ceremony and celebration is planned by the First Baptist Church, after erection of the Marker at the Church site. This should be in a few months.

Following is the story of the First Baptist Church.

On September 1, 1901 fifteen men and women joined together to establish the Eldorado Missionary Baptist Church. The Reverends Ben Wilson and A.T. Talbert served as moderator and clerk. On that day, seven people were baptized into the fellowship of the church thus bringing the total membership to twenty-two members. Within a month the church had affiliated with the Concho Valley Baptist Association. The Reverend Y.F. Barnett served as the church's first pastor. In 1925 the name was changed to first Baptist Church.

A frame church building capable of seating 250 was built in 1905. A second story was added in 1915. In 1928 this structure was torn down and replaced with the present brick

structure. The Reverend J.L. Ratliff served as pastor and chief carpenter during this time of construction. In 1951 a two-story educational annex was constructed. In 1954 a brick parsonage was built across the street from the church facility. The associate minister's house was purchased from Shell Pipeline and moved next door to the parsonage in 1960. During the years of 1962-64 the front of the church was remodeled and the preschool annex was constructed. In 1986 new doors for the fellowship and ministry were opened with the completion of a 6,000 square foot fellowship hall.

The years since the beginning have been years of growth. The 1902 associational report listed the pastor's salary as \$122.85; associational, state and home missions, \$15.00; orphan's home, \$3.00; and foreign missions, \$1.00. The 1990 association report lists church property valued at \$700,000.00; 389 resident members; average Sunday School attendance, 170; and total receipts of \$140,335.00. In 1990 the church gave \$23,981.00 to mission causes. As it looks to the future First Baptist continues to be a church with a vision to share the love of Christ with its community and with its world.

## 1992 Cattlemen's Round-Up For Crippled Children

Mike Moore is among 250 area ranchers and community leaders who are joining hands to help West Texas Rehabilitation Center by participating in the 1992 Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

This Schleicher County supporter, who will serve as Eldorado area chairman, will be asking neighbors to join him in donating livestock to be sold at special auctions during September and October.

Sale proceeds are converted into "treatment dollars" which help provide out-patient services for handicapped children and adults at WTRC facilities in Abilene and San Angelo.

Special Sale, Brownwood Auction.

"If ranchers sell stock at other times of the year, we're hopeful they will make a commitment now and then later ask their local auctions to send the Center a check when the stock does sell," said James (Jim) Alexander, CRCC general chairman. "Every day WTRC treats people who are our friends and neighbors. Donating one or more animals is a good way for us to help Rehab help others."

Since 1953, West Texas Rehabilitation Center has provided out-patient treatment services to individuals without regard for age, race, origin or financial

circumstances. More than 175 trained professionals deliver quality care in physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech pathology, audiology, orthotics, work evaluation/work hardening and support services to more than 13,500 patients annually.

If you bring cattle to Producers prior to September 24th, Mid-West Feed Yards will be glad to receive and hold them for the Rehab sale. Or, we'll be glad to pick up donated animals - just call Rehab at 949-9535.

## Curtis - Featured Artist For Sutton County Days

Mary L. Curtis will be the featured artist in Sonora August 21 and 22 during the Sutton County Days Celebration. Beginning at 10 a.m. each day, the show will feature many of her pen/watercolors from her Sesquicentennial Collection and paintings inspired by her work at the National Wildflower Research Center on the LBJ Ranch.

Mary is returning to Sonora after 50 years. She left after her first year in high school, but has always felt that Sonora was home. Her work will be on exhibition at the newly restored Santa Fe Depot, along with other local artists.

Sponsored by the Sutton County Historical Society, the art show will be a benefit for the Miers Home Museum Fund. The museum will receive \$50 of the money made in sales.

Mary Curtis was a secretary in Austin for the State Board of Insurance. She returned to college to work toward a business degree. Her degree plan allowed room for electives, and she took a course in drawing. That elective changed her life. She realized a long hidden talent for art and majored in interior design. Graduating Magna Cum Laude from St. Edward's University, Mary began a new career as an artist.

On exhibit will be a number of paintings from her Sesquicentennial Collection. She was one of the few private artists sanctioned by the 1986 Texas Sesquicentennial Commission. Many of her paintings originated in

antique post cards, photographs, and sketches from the early days of Texas cities. The works are vivid, accurate depictions of our early days. Many paintings from this collection are owned by corporations and private collectors throughout the U.S. and Europe.

Mary was chosen to paint the wildflowers at the national Wildflower Research Center on the LBJ Ranch. Her vivid and bold colors

combine with botanical accuracy to create exciting paintings of the wildflowers of Texas.

Her paintings are of a quality seldom seen in small town exhibits. She became aware of the possibility of art as a career when a professor bought a painting. In the 12 short years as an artist, she has given workshops, taught seminars, illustrated for magazines, and is now seeing her designs on T-shirts.

## Host Families Needed

Exchange students Lars and Riana are from opposite ends of the world, yet they share the same goal: the desire to become their country's "young ambassador" to the United States. Each student hopes to live with an American family while attending a local high school during the 1992-93 school year. The two students were selected for an academic year abroad by EF Educational Foundation for Foreign Study, a non-profit student exchange organization based in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

In addition to his desire to represent Sweden, Lars is eager to learn about American customs and improve his English during his exchange

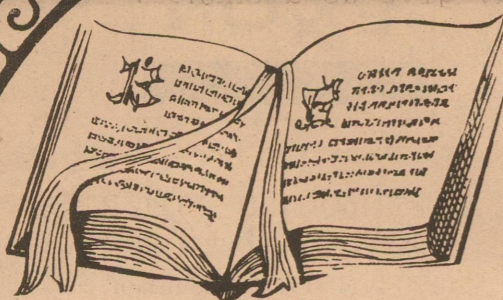

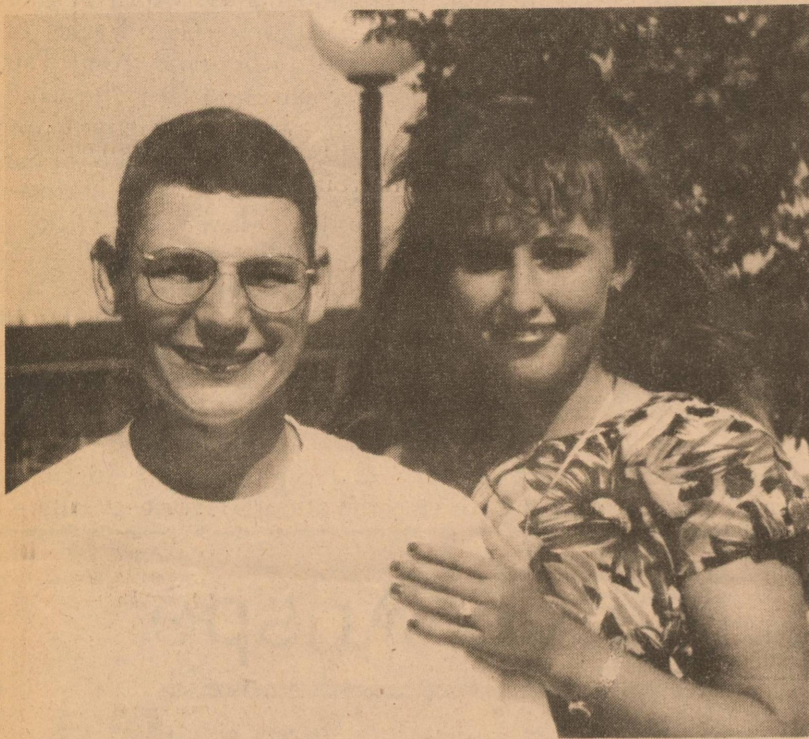

HEB Grocers (180 stores in Texas) recycles plastic grocery bags returned by customers. The bags are sent to Temple to be remanufactured into trash can garbage bags. The program, though less than two years

old, results in the recycling of 125 tons of HEB plastic grocery bags a year. HEB also recycles cardboard boxes by the tens of thousands of tons a year. Most other grocery chains in Texas have similar recycling programs.

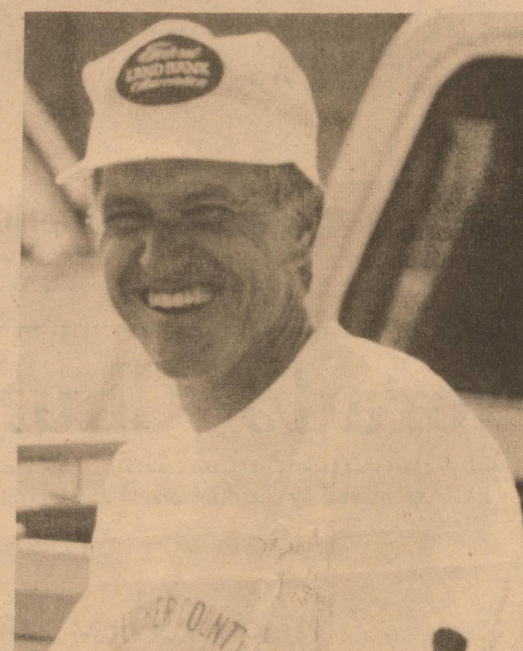

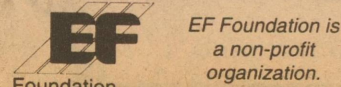

### Social Security Forms Not Destroyed

The Social Security Administration reports that some genealogical researchers are worried about the destruction of the original government forms that people completed to request Social Security numbers.

"We can understand the concern about the loss of information of possible historical value when the 'Application for a Social Security Number Card' is destroyed," said a Social Security headquarters official. "However, we can assure everyone that precautions have been taken to make certain that no critical information is lost."

The Social Security Administration, which is required by law to keep records confidential, can release copies of Social Security card applications for deceased individuals because the dead are deemed to not have privacy rights. Therefore, if a person has applied for a Social Security card, SSA can generally provide a copy of the application that shows the person's name, date and place of birth, and parents' names that were given when he or she applied for the Social Security number. Genealogists often find this a valuable starting point in their research.

It is noted that while federal agencies such as SSA

may select records for destruction, the records may not be destroyed unless the agencies have received written approval from the Archivist of the United States. This approval is granted only after the records have been appraised, and it has been determined that their historical value does not warrant keeping them permanently.

Since the Social Security program began in 1935, more than 355 million Social Security numbers have been issued. This is a huge volume of paper, and it is very difficult to maintain all of the original paper documents.

In 1977, SSA obtained approval from the U.S. Archivist to destroy original Social Security card application forms. But, the information from all of the original application forms was entered into a computer data base, and the 'face' of the form was filmed. The reverse side of the document is not filmed because it contains only the instructions for completing the form.

Anyone interested in conducting genealogical research through SSA records should write the Office of Public Inquiries, 6401 Security Boulevard, Baltimore, Maryland 2135. Fees are charged for researching agency records.

at a later date.

In action items, mileage reimbursement rate was set at 25¢ per mile. All student handbooks were accepted with revisions. Low bids for maintenance supplies were approved. The district will provide a high-low insurance plan offered by Gerber Life that meets the requirement mandated by House Bill 285. The financial report and budget amendments as presented for the month of July were approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 p.m.
