Community Resource Center Grand Opening

The County of Schleicher requests the honor of your presence at the Grand Opening of the community Resource Center on Tuesday, October 27, 1992. The ceremony will originate at the Schleicher County Memorial Building, Courthouse Square, Eldorado, Texas, two until five in the afternoon.

Guest speaker will be Bryan Sperry, Deputy Commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission. Mr. Sperry joined the Commission August 1, 1992, after serving for two years as the Executive Director of the Center for Rural Health Initiatives, the state office responsible for planning, advocating and coordinating efforts to preserve, stabilize and enhance health care in rural Texas.

He was the Administrative Assistant for Health and Human Services for Lieutenant Governor William P. Hobby from 1987 until June of 1990 and helped develop the Anti-Crime Plan of 1989; AIDS, maternal and child health, and rural health legislation; and efforts to maximize federal funding for Texas.

Mr. Sperry was Executive Director for the Texas task Force on Indigent Health Care from 1983 to 1985 and developed new state programs and initiatives on financing indigent health care, access to primary care and health data. He has been an administrator of health and human service programs at the Texas Department of Human Services and a research associate of the

American Public Welfare Association.

He graduated from Trinity College, Hartford, Connecticut, and received his masters degree from The University of Texas at Austin in Community and Regional Planning. He received a Pew Fellowship on Health Policy and studied at the School of Public Health at the University of Michigan.

What is the Community Resource Center?

The Community Resource Center is dedicated to making access to health and human services to residents of Schleicher County much easier. This pilot project is one of three in the State of Texas chosen by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission to demonstrate that people can be better served through a "one-stop shopping" method to reach needed services from a variety of agencies.

How does the Community Resource Center Provide Services?

Service begins when you either make a telephone call or simply walk into the Community Resource Center. A caseworker can help you decide what services are necessary to meet your needs. The caseworker will then let you know the information you will need to provide and, if necessary, an appointment with the appropriate in-house service provider can be scheduled for you. For most of the services offered at the Center, a complete eligibility determination can be made at the time of your first visit.

You provide basic information one time, that information can then be used to complete an application which is used to determine eligibility for services provided through the Center. This method of intake allows you to visit the Center only once to determine the most appropriate services to help you, rather than making many trips to many different places.

What does the Community Resource Center Provide?

The Center provides information and Referral concerning services available locally, in the State of Texas, and nationally. Information and Referral is designed to let you know more about services which might help you. Services available may be arranged locally, through state funded programs, or through programs directed by federal law.

The Center also provides actual services in-house to residents of Schleicher County.

What services are available directly from the Community Resource Center?

The Schleicher County I.S.D. is interested in offering classes in Adult Education and English as A Second Language. To be eligible to offer the classes, there must be a need within the community and a minimum of 12 students must sign up to participate. The classes are

The Community Resource Center provides information, and, in most cases, intake and eligibility determination for the following programs: Medical Indigent Care; Food Stamps/AFDC/Medicaid; Services for Senior Citizens; Services for persons with disabilities; WIC; Immunizations; Texas Department of Health/Case Management; Job Training Partnership Act Programs; Substance Abuse Assistance; Family Shelter; Family Planning; Primary Health Care; Mental health community services; Social security; Commodity Foods/HUD applications; employment.

Who can receive services from the Community Resource Center?

Residents of Schleicher County are eligible to receive full services through the Center without regard to race, creed, color, national origin, ancestry, marital status, sex, or physical or mental handicap.

Residents of surrounding counties are welcome to call for Information and Referral.

Schleicher County Library Accredited Member Of Texas Library System

The Schleicher County Public Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System for fiscal year 1993, according to William D. Gooch, Director and Librarian of the Texas State Library.

"We are pleased to award a certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services", said Gooch. "It is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

The Schleicher County Public Library is a renewal member of the Big Country Library System. The SCPL had to meet strict criteria, according to Jeri Whitten, such as hours of access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Public libraries must apply and

qualify for system membership annually. Schleicher County Public Library has been a member of Big Country Library System for six years.

Being a system member enables us to receive 30 large print books a month to keep for one year; provides us with a computer and printer; a slide projector; 16 mm Projector; a rotating books on cassette service and Inter Library Loan which means we may have any book a patron might want in a matter of days. This service has been real beneficial for our school children doing research for school reports. Through System Membership we are given \$1108.00 for collection development. (to be spent on reference, non-fiction, childrens books) This figure is based on local support from County funds, donations, & memorials.

Authorized by the Library Systems Act of 1969, the Texas State Library was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts.

Comprised of ten regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of both their own resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made

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Fire Commission On Fire Protection Celebrating Anniversary

The Texas Commission on Fire Protection is observing the anniversary of its first full year of serving the Texas fire service and the public. Established by SB383 in the 72nd Legislature, Regular Session in October 1991, the commission was officially organized in October 1991.

Special events to celebrate the occasion will include a display of fire-fighting equipment, and a luncheon for legislators, commissioners, and advisory board members, Commission Chairman Andrew F. Mehl said that the events will take place at the agency's Austin headquarters during the quarterly meeting of the commission on October 14-16.

The agency consolidated the major state entities that focus on the fire service in Texas, State Fire Marshal Ernest A. Emerson said, "This agency gives us the opportunity to provide for the people in Texas an organized attack on the Texas fire problem. It is possible to accomplish much more when

we are all moving in the same direction and have the same goals."

The agency's mission is "to serve as a statewide leader in ensuring that the lives and property of the public and of the fire service are adequately protected from fires and related hazards," in its first year of operation, the Texas Commission on Fire Protection has made extensive progress toward accomplishing in mission.

Executive Director Michael E. Hines, said that the agency is on target with its state mandates. "We were given significant mandates at the very beginning of our operations. We are to perform fire insurance key rate inspections of all Texas cities every six years. This schedule has been set, and the inspections are underway," he said. We also are to conduct biennial inspections of fire departments in the state. Additional inspectors have been hired and those inspections are on schedule."

Hines listed many more accomplishments made in this first year of operation:

- * adding two regional offices, Tyler and Conroe, for a total of seven regional offices;

- * establishing an arson laboratory;

- * adding a full-time grant researcher to the staff to assist fire department seeking funding;

- * increasing fire department participation in the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System; and

- * developing a voluntary certification program for volunteer fire fighters.

Hines said that the future of the commission on Fire Protection included an even more active commitment to the Texas fire service and the public. "In the next year, we hope to develop and implement regional training programs for 16 fire fighter training centers," he said. "We are also planning to organize an arson task force, to open two more regional offices in West Texas, and to assist in the development of a state fire code."

This has been an active year," Hines continued, "We are encouraged by the support we have received from the fire service, the public, and the governing authorities both state and local. This agency will continue to concentrate on those things that will keep our fire fighters safe and reduce the number of fires and related injuries, deaths, and property loss in Texas."

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

With cotton harvest soon to begin in the Cooperative's service area, the probability of contacting overhead lines with harvest equipment poses a serious threat to farm equipment operators.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to the danger and take precautions to avoid contact with power lines.

Take time to survey the situation in each field. Don't park trailers near overhead lines. This increases the possibility of contact when the basket is raised to dump.

Those who use module builders should remember that the extended packer arm can easily contact overhead lines also.

Should you encounter a line that is low, don't risk trying to squeeze under it. Call the Cooperative and we will take the necessary action to be sure the line is at a safe height.

Remember: "Look up and live" and play it safe when working around power lines.

This week at Schleicher County Medical Center there were two winners at Black-Out Bingo. The winners were Hettie Bryan and Pat Ridgeway.

In 1988 Congress passed the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments (CLIA) which set standards to improve the quality of clinical laboratory testing in all laboratories in the nation that

conduct testing on human specimens for health assessment or for the diagnosis, prevention, or treatment of disease.

Effective September 1, 1992 the rules affect all hospital and independent laboratories, as well as physicians' office laboratories nationwide. CLIA rules set quality standards such as personnel requirements, proficiency testing,

enforcement procedures and laboratory fees.

Prior to the enactment of CLIA, Clinical laboratories were regulated at the federal level only if they were involved in interstate commerce or if they accepted Medicare reimbursement for their services. With the passage of CLIA, all clinical laboratories are subject to the law regardless of their location, size or type. The new regulations reflect this broad statutory coverage, and base their degree of applicability on the complexity of the tests performed by the lab.

The CLIA rules require laboratories to obtain a certificate according to the test complexity. Tests are classified as waived, moderate complexity, and high complexity. They must also affirm that they will follow good laboratory practice.

The factors for determining the complexity is the degree of knowledge, training and experience needed to perform a test. Also, the complexity of materials and reagent preparation used, and the operational steps involved, the characteristics for the testing device used, troubleshooting and maintenance, the degree of interpretation and judgment require in the testing process.

County Agents Report

Mankin Questions Commissioners' Salaries

Today, Randy Mankin, candidate for Commissioner of Schleicher County, Precinct 1 announced that when he is elected he will move to have commissioners salaries reduced by a minimum of 50%. Mankin has served as a member of the City Council and is on the Board of Directors of the Schleicher County Appraisal District. He is an officer in the Eldorado Lion's club and he is on the board of the Eldorado Crimestoppers Association.

Currently, the commissioners have two scheduled meetings a month and occasional called meetings.

Halloween Safety

Parents need to be certain their children follow a few, simple safety tips this Halloween to so that the festive occasion turns out to be a happy and healthy event.

"Supervised parties at home or school are the safest way for children to enjoy Halloween," said Charles L. Branton, head of the Product Safety Program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH).

He warned that if small children go trick-or-treating, they should be accompanied by an adult. The adult should carry a flashlight to show the way and to make the children more visible to motorists.

Branton offered these additional safety tips:

* For clear vision, use make-up, instead of masks.

* When buying a costume, look for the label stating it is fire-resistant. Costumes should be brightly colored, and dark colored ones should have fluorescent or reflective tape on them.

* Teach children not to eat any treats before bringing them home for examination by an adult. Remember, many hospitals offer free X-raying of treats.

* Keep children out of the street and never let them run between parked cars.

* Parents should control the amount of treats children eat to avoid stomach aches and indigestion.

Branton said that children should stop only at homes with outside lighting and not enter the home of anyone they do not know.

He has some safety tips for homeowners, as well. "Homeowners welcoming trick-or-treaters should turn on their porch lights, restrain their dogs and clear the lawn of objects that a trick-or-treater might trip over," he said.

In addition, jack-o-lanterns and other candle-lighted devices should be kept away from doorsteps and walkways to prevent igniting a costume.

TxDOT Offers Teenage Driving Safety

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is working with an insurance company to fight the No. 1 cause of death among teenagers: traffic accidents.

TxDOT traffic-safety experts are distributing an educational kit developed by Liberty Mutual Insurance Group for teens, parents and teachers.

"Avoiding Collisions: How to Survive the Teen-Age Driving Years" promotes a non-threatening atmosphere for teens to talk about their driving habits openly with adults. The kit, which includes a videotape, was developed in cooperation with Students Against Drunk Driving (SADD) and the National Safety Council.

Last year in Texas, accidents killed 362 teens between the ages of 15 and 19.

"The program challenges teens to re-evaluate their driving habits by examining four subjects key to their survival: speeding, night driving, using safety belts and drinking and driving," said John Connors,

executive vice president of Liberty Mutual. "We want teens to realize that a license to drive is a privilege that carries responsibility."

Arnold Oliver, TxDOT executive director, said, "Too many of our young people are killed needlessly, with so much of life ahead of them. But we are encouraged that programs such as this one can make a difference."

Project Graduation, another program administered by the department, has helped reduce traffic deaths among graduating seniors by 10 percent. The program helps schools pay for alcohol-free proms and graduation parties.

TxDOT safety specialists are using the educational kit to make presentations in schools and will lend it free on request. To borrow the kit, call your local TxDOT district office or a Liberty Mutual sales office. Teachers may call Modern, a distribution company, at 800/243-6877.
