## Jail Break

At 8:20 a.m., Wednesday morning, November 18 a prisoner escaped from the Schleicher County Jail. Frank Guevara, who was being held for the Tom Green County Sheriff's Department, injured Jailer Ricky Griffin with a sharp instrument and escaped into Eldorado. Although Griffin was stabbed in the hand, he was not seriously injured.

Law enforcement officers from the surrounding areas came together in Eldorado to assist in Guevara's capture.

A man hunt was carried out from 8:20 until 12:50, when the prisoner was apprehended. He was captured less than a mile away from the jail, on Callandar Street.

Guevara had been sentenced to 50 years in prison on a aggravated robbery charges. He was in the Schleicher County Jail on appeal. He has been jailed in Schleicher County since November 2nd.

Guevara, a native of San Angelo, filed suit against Tom Green County, alleging

mistreatment during his incarceration there. Guevara was heard screaming obscenities and threatening to sue Schleicher County after his capture. Wednesday morning, Guevara also attempted an escape while in Tom Green County.

The following organizations and people assisted in the capture: Tom Green County Sheriff's Department, Irion County Sheriff's Department, Crockett County Sheriff's Department, Sutton County Sheriff's Department, Menard County Sheriff's Department, Customs, Border Patrol, DPS - Patrol and Intelligence, FBI, San Angelo Park Police, San Angelo Police Department, Game Warden Mike Porter, Schleicher County Constable - George Arispe, Texas Rangers, Eddie Howard Search & Rescue Dog and the Citizens of Eldorado.

Said Sheriff Ronnie Norris, "He got away, and we got him back. If it had not been for the assistance of so many people, we would not have been successful in capturing Guevara."

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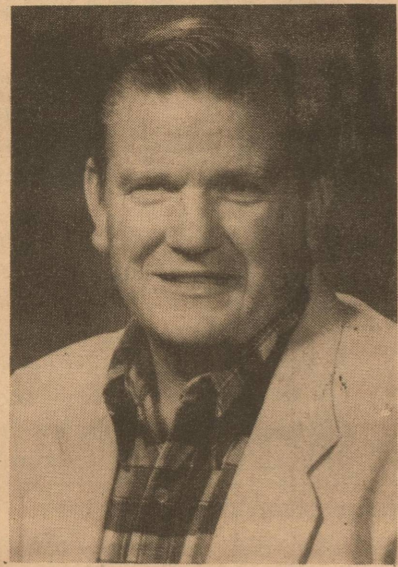
### Community Baptist Revival

"It is our desire to help as many of the children who need care as we can," Ruppeck said. Each year, as many as 200 applications are turned down for admission to the homes simply because there is not enough room available.

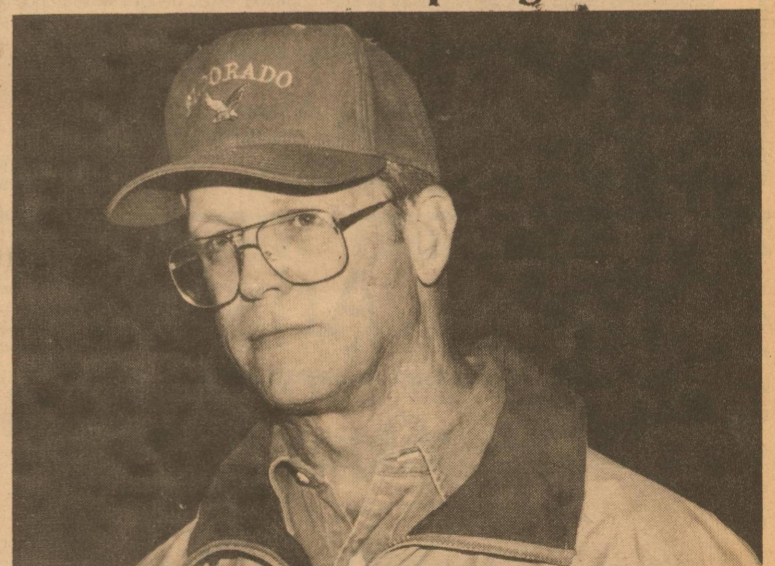

# Kimble County Wild Game Dinner

The Eighth Annual Wild Game Dinner will be held in Junction, Texas, on Saturday, November 28, 1992. The event which provides food for approximately 1,500 visitors from Texas and surrounding areas, features a combination of native and exotic game donated by area landowners and hunters.

The day begins early for the many volunteers who separate and cut the various meats into roasts and ribs for barbecuing, and into small slices for deep frying. On a long, narrow ground pit, the barbecuers begin their slow smoking process at mid-morning. Over 100 pounds of mixed venison goes into the two huge cast iron washpots mounted above their own gas burners in which the chili simmers all afternoon. One hundred pounds of pinto beans simmer on back burners. About 3:30 P.M. the dozen fry cooks begin their salting, peppering, flouring and frying.

Game donations for the dinner come from hunters who do not want all of their meat and from land owners who want to keep their deer herds properly balanced.

The last ten years have seen a tremendous increase in the numbers of imported, exotic game stocked on Hill Country ranches and available for hunting. The Kimble County Wild Game Dinner draws on the large number of these animals. In addition to native white tail, the venison on the menu comes from a variety of exotic deer including: Axis, a very large red deer with white spots, originally from India; Sika, a chocolate brown deer native to Japan;

and Fallow, a reddish-brown, white, or spotted deer native to Germany.

Other exotic animals on the menu include Russian Boar; Barbados, Mouflon and Corsican rams and Catalina goats from the Mediterranean islands; Aoudad from Northern Africa; Eland from the African Plains; and Black Buck antelope from India.

Game birds, including dove and wild turkey, are also served. Mountain oysters and alligator are the only animals on the menu which are not usually found live in Kimble County.

Potato salad, beans, Texas venison chili, tea and coffee round out the menu.

The Saturday following Thanksgiving was chosen as the annual date for the Dinner because this is the weekend that a great many hunters bring their families with them and that many Kimble county folks come back home. Unlike some game dinners, the Kimble County event is designed for family fun and no alcoholic beverages are served. The basic idea remains to draw people into Junction, introducing them not only to the delicious taste and nutritional value of the animals found here, but also to the scenic beauty of the county.

The \$6.00 donation provides the ticket-holder with both entry into the event and a plate of delicious food. It also makes its holder eligible for the thousands of dollars in guns, camping gear and other door prizes which are given away throughout the evening. The 1992 door prizes will consist of at least 20 guns; custom knives, scopes, binoculars, Coleman stoves and lanterns, sleeping

bags, rods, reels, tackle, and many other items too numerous to mention--more than 50 drawings in all.

The 1991 crowd was approximately 80% out-of-county residents and included persons from both Taiwan and mainland China. Door-prize winners from out of county have come from all over Texas and parts of Louisiana and Arizona as well.

The Wild Game Dinner is held at the Coke R. Stevenson Memorial Center on U.S. Highway 83-377, just north of Interstate 10 at Junction, Texas. The serving

begins at 6:30 P.M. and the lines, although appearing long, move rapidly, with serving generally completed within 90 minutes.

Although advance tickets are not necessary, they may be ordered from the Kimble County Wild Game Dinner Association at P.O. Box 25, Junction, Texas 76849. For more information, write the Association at that address or call Donnie Coleman at (915) 446-3737, Roy Cooper at (915) 446-3361 or the Kimble County Chamber of Commerce at (915) 446-3190.

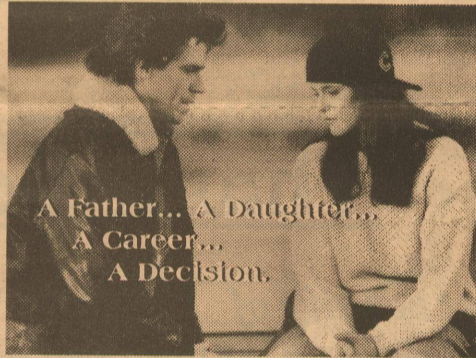

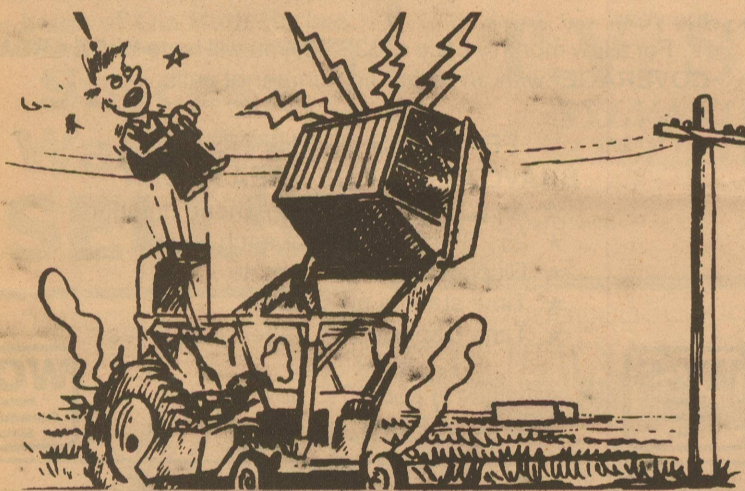

GTE Southwest Incorporated (GTE-SW) and Contel of Texas Inc. (Contel) have filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to seek approval to provide two new private line services and to change rates for existing services. GTE's intraexchange DS1 Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through concurrence with GTE's interLATA access tariff rates which are lower. Contel's intraexchange DS1/DDS Service will be offered pursuant to the rates proposed with this filing and will no longer be available through Contel's current private line tariff rates. Existing customers with DS1/DDS Services will not be affected by these rate changes. DS1 1.544 Megabits per second (Mbps) Service and Digital Data Service (DDS) will normally be used for the transmission of data communications or large volumes of voice communications between two locations. These services are optional and will not affect the existing rates of customers who do not order these services. The estimated annual effect on GTE-SW's revenues in the first year is \$1,080,567. The estimated annual effect on Contel's revenues in the first year are \$42,383.

### DS1 Service

DS1 Service is an intraLATA Private Line Service which provides a dedicated, high capacity channel which may be used for simultaneous two-way transmission of voice data or other digitally encoded customer information signals. DS1 Service provides a transmission speed of 1.544 Mbps and is designed to provide an average performance of at least 95 percent error-free seconds of transmission over a continuous 24-hour period.

DS1 Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DS1 Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two Customer Designated Locations (CDL), between a Serving Wire Center (SWC) and a CDL, between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider or between two SWCs.

IntraLATA DS1 Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DS1 Local Loop, DS1 Transport and DS1 Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DS1 Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer has two payment options for the purchase of DS1 Local Loops. There is a month-to-month plan or term contract Optional Payment Plan (OPP).

The month-to-month payment basis allows the customer to establish and disconnect DS1 Services, without penalty, other than to meet the minimum service interval of one month's service, as needed. Under the month-to-month service, the additional DS1 Local Loop rate applies only when the additional DS1 Local Loop (s) is (are) ordered at the same time and between the same two CDLs as the first DS1 Local Loop.

The OPP plan allows the customer to select a term of service (1 YR, 3 YR and 5 YR) with lower monthly rates associated with longer term contracts. If the customer selects an OPP, additional DS1 Local Loops may be ordered and installed at the Additional DS1 Local Loop rate between any SWC and CDL covered by the OPP, at any time during the term of that OPP.

### DS1 Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DS1 signal between Serving Wire Centers. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DS1 Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DS1 Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DS1 Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the DS1 Transport.

### Digital Data Service

Digital Data Service (DDS) is an intraLATA Private Line service which supports synchronous, full-duplex transmission between the CDL and the SWC or the point of connection with another telephone company at transmission speeds of 2.4, 4.8, 9.6, 19.2 and 56 kilobits per second (Kbps). DDS provides a transmission path for digital data signals within the same LATA.

DDS Service is available in and between all exchanges of GTE-SW and Contel where digital facilities exist. DDS Service is available on a point-to-point intraLATA basis between two CDLs or between a CDL and a point of connection with another service provider.

IntraLATA DDS Private Line Service is comprised of three rate elements: DDS Local Loop, DDS Transport and DDS Transport Termination. Each element is described below.

### DDS Local Loop

This rate element is for the cable facilities from the CDL to the SWC. The customer may establish and disconnect DDS Local Loops without penalty other than the minimum service interval of one month's service, as his/her needs demand.

### DDS Transport

This rate element is for the mileage sensitive charges for transporting a DDS signal between SWCs. Transport occurs only when the two CDLs being connected are served by two different SWCs.

### DDS Transport Termination

This rate element is for the equipment to terminate DDS Transport at the SWCs. This charge applies only when DDS Transport is required for the service configuration of the customer. One transport termination charge applies at each end of the service.
