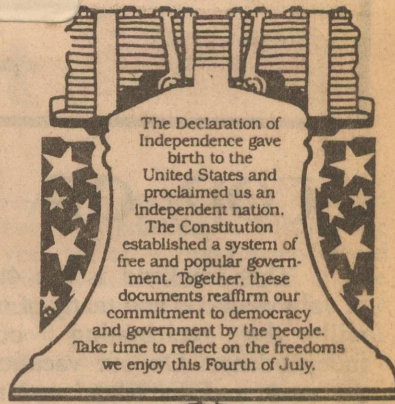

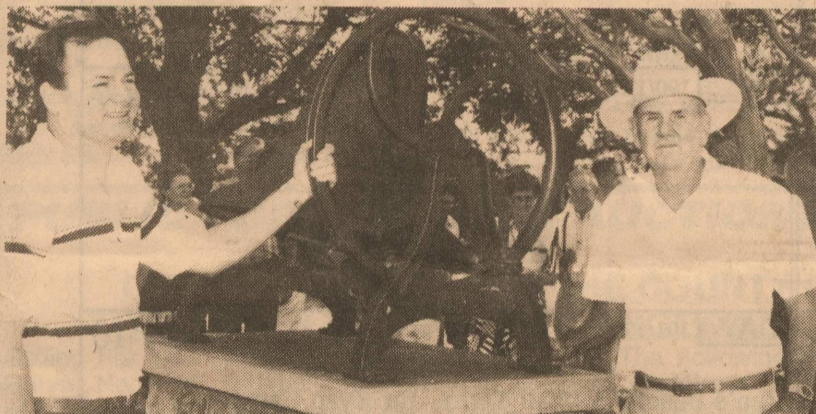
Mias Amigas Held - 50 Year & 20 Year Classes Honored

Are you one of those people who has never liked to eat lamb but, is always looking for great entertainment? Then you are the perfect choice to come attend the First Annual FIESTA DE LA BORREGA in Eldorado, Thursday, July 1st, on the Courthouse Lawn at 7:00 p.m. The festival is the result of the efforts of the local Chamber of Commerce to promote local products and industries, and they have come up with an outstanding arrangement.

Those of us who have eaten Kenny Blane's cooking before are looking forward to what he promises to do with

lamb. Kenny manages the El Patio Restaurant in Angelo, and has last been seen in Eldorado when he cooked for the Junior/Senior Banquet. On the menu for the evening are lamb chops, sausage, leg of lamb, potato salad, homemade rolls, peach cobbler, cornbread, and various vegetables. Kenny also agreed to give those of us who have never been able to turn out good lamb barbecue some hints for improvement. Also provided will be recipes from the American Sheep Institute.

If that kind of a deal does not seem promising yet, what about coming to see some superb entertainment provided

by the local Co-Hearts and San Angelo Ballet Azteca Dancers? Public Forum To Be Held

On Wednesday, July 7, 1993, Richard Ladd, Health and Human Services Commissioner, will visit the Schleicher County Community Resource Center in Eldorado, Texas at 10:00 a.m.

The Community Resource Center is one of three Health and Human Services pilot locations selected to test the effectiveness of co-locating health and human services agencies in order to demonstrate that people can be better served through a comprehensive approach to service delivery and to reduce duplication of services. The vision of this pilot

site is to meet the health care and human service needs of the residents of Schleicher County through a collaborative partnership of various state, county and local agencies and organizations.

This visit will be in conjunction with a Public Forum titled Health and Human Services Post-Legislative Impact on Rural Communities scheduled from 10:30 until 12:00 noon. Among those invited to the Public Forum are area legislators, city and county officials and representatives from participating agencies.

Editor's Journal

TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

This weekend is the 4th of July weekend and many of us will be celebrating our independence. On our vacation we went to Ellis Island and to see the Statue of Liberty.

All the years I lived in New Jersey I never had been to see either one of them. Ellis Island was closed in 1954 and left to deteriorate until the Bicentennial revived interest in it. I have found out that my Mother's parents went through Ellis Island and we think my dad's father came through there. The restoration has only been done to the processing building, the one most often shown in photographs.

We discovered that only the steerage passengers, those from poor backgrounds who could not afford first or second class passage, had to go through the processing on Ellis. The more affluent passengers were processed in only a few minutes

in New York, and the poorer folks had to wait in the stuffy hold of the ship until a ferry boat took them to the island. On the island they were questioned, examined, and probed. About 20% of them were detained and of those 20% about 2% were sent back to their country of origin or died from disease. Those who had relatives who died on the island were never told where the deceased was buried. Often these were children.

Imagine what it must have been like to have made a three to six week sea voyage, leave the only country you had ever known, arrive at a port where maybe only a few people even spoke the language you knew, and lose a child to disease, never knowing where that child was buried or even if he or she was buried! It is amazing the courage and endurance of those immigrants

to brave sea voyages in unhealthy and crowded conditions, suffering personal tragedy to try and start a new life. I have four people to thank for my chance to live in probably the most free nation on earth. They probably did not even worry too much about voting or representative government or a free press. They just wanted a better life. All but one of them died before I was three years old so I don't know whether they ever got a better life. My dad's dad did not speak much English and seldom talked to anyone under thirty anyway. He died when I was thirteen. I never heard him speak about how his life was in Italy or about the boat trip. I just know he did it!

Celebrate! Unless your American Indian, your ancestors braved incredible obstacles to get here. Be free for them!

Brother Orand also served as Chaplain at the Veteran Hospital in Big Spring, Texas and as an Exchange Pastor at Viewfield Baptist Church in Dumfermline, Scotland.

Reverend Orand and his wife, Carol have two adult children, Kara Waldrop of San Angelo, Texas and Kyle Orand

of Christoval, Texas. They also have two grandchildren, Cody Waldrop and Zane Waldrop of San Angelo.

Reverend Orand will officiate his first service as Pastor of Community Baptist Church on Sunday, July 4th and everyone is invited to attend. Community Baptist Church is located at 12 East Warner Avenue in Eldorado. Sunday School classes began at 9:45 AM with the morning worship service set at 11:00 AM. Sunday evening services as well as Wednesday evening Prayer Meeting are scheduled for 7:00 PM. There will be a 4th of July picnic following the Sunday morning service and once again everyone is invited.

The short history of Community Baptist Church began during the fall and winter months of 1991 when a core group of 4 families began meeting for Bible study and prayer. In April of 1992 the group had grown and began holding Wednesday evening worship services led by Dr. Gerald Edwards. The first Sunday morning and evening services were held in May of 1992 and PaulAnn Baptist Church of San Angelo agreed to sponsor the work as a mission. On Oct. 20, 1992 Eldorado Baptist Mission constituted into a church and became Community Baptist Church with Dr. Gerald Edwards and Dr. Stanley Jordan serving as interim Pastors.

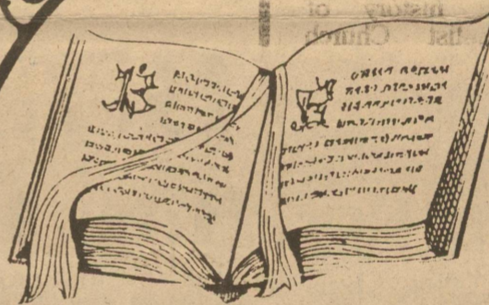

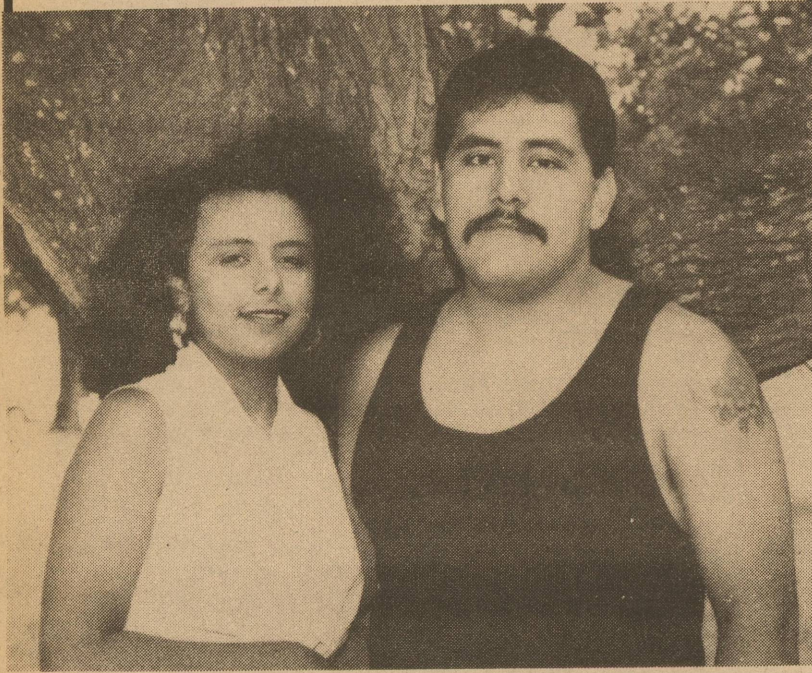

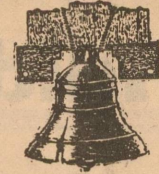
