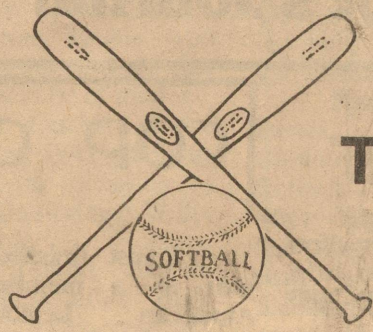

July Is Immunization Awareness Month

July has been proclaimed Immunization Awareness Month in Texas. Throughout this month, the Texas Department of Health and local health agencies will sponsor a variety of events to help educate communities about free or low-cost immunizations for children.

Dr. David R. Smith, Texas Commissioner of Health, said, "We have tried to make it impossible for any Texas parent to plead ignorance as the reason his or her child is unimmunized. But ignorance is only one of the problems. Logistics - the geographic availability of vaccinations at sensible hours for working families - are still a problem."

By age two, only 30 percent of Texas children are fully immunized, half of the national average. Vaccinations are expected to cost about \$57 million, a fraction of the expense of treating the diseases.

Governor Ann Richards in April signed into law a childhood immunization bill that requires all Texas children, except those with a religious conflict or medical contraindication, to be immunized against contagious diseases such as measles, mumps and diphtheria. Doctors and hospitals will now be required to review children's immunization records. Families will be asked to pay for the administration of the vaccine. If the family is unable to pay the administrative fee, vaccines will be administered free of charge. State law already requires children to be immunized against diseases like measles, mumps, diphtheria, whooping

cough and polio as soon as they enter school. But many children under age six have not been vaccinated.

"As a pediatrician, I have seen too much of the senseless tragedy associated with failure to vaccinate children against preventable diseases," Dr. Smith said. "It is long past time for us to have all but wiped out such devastating disease as measles, yet within the past five years, more than 4,400 Texas children under five years of age have had the disease - including 14 who died from complications of measles."

"Let's hope that the added momentum of Immunization Awareness Month will renew this state's determination to finally defeat the diseases against which we have had vaccine for decades," the commissioner said.

A Texas House and Senate Concurrent Resolution sponsored by Senator Judith Zaffirini was approved in March by the Senate. It was carried by Representative Nancy McDonald and adopted by the House in May. The resolution noted the health problems associated with low immunization rates, resolved that the Texas Department of Health would review the development and implementation of a statewide immunization registry, and declared July Immunization Month in Texas. TOP OF THE DIVIDE

I just finished my first year as a member of the American Legion, Bev McCormick Post 257. We meet every first Thursday of the month in the American Legion room of the Memorial building. Last Friday (We moved our meeting night to accommodate the lamb feast) we heard a report from one of the two young men who attended Boy's State in Austin. It is hosted by the American Legion.

The Legion annually recognizes local students who exhibit qualities of good citizenship with the American Legion citizenship award. Of course the Legion, along with other veteran organizations is always trying to protect and enhance veterans' rights both on the national and state level.

I joined the Vietnam Veterans, San Angelo chapter but I really haven't had much chance to make any of the meetings. I'm eligible for the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) but haven't been able to find out when they meet here. The local Legion post is still active and one of the their members asked if I would be interested.

One of the nice things about the Legion is that veterans who served during wars but did

not serve overseas are still eligible for membership. I am well aware that quite often someone got to serve overseas during war because of something over which that person had no control. I have an uncle who served his entire enlistment during WWII in San Antonio, Texas. Another of my uncles was in the invasion force headed for Japan when the Bomb was dropped and the Japanese surrendered. A very good friend of mine, during the Vietnam war, served in the Bavarian Alps, because that is where the army sent him.

Eldorado needs the Legion to remain a viable organization here. This town and county has a considerable number of veterans many of whom do not belong to the Legion or any other veterans group. Many of us who have served since WWII need to come forward and take up the standard by joining the Legion here.

On July 22, 1993, at 7:00 P.M. our post will be hosting a sandwich supper and ice cream social on the lawn of the courthouse for all veterans and their spouses. You are all cordially invited, whether a member or not, to join us. The District Commander, Bill Holley will give a short

presentation about what the Legion does. Also, Farley Dakan, one of two fellows from Eldorado to attend Boys State, will tell about what he experienced during his week in Austin. Please come out.

Bownds Wins Jr. World Champion Goat Roping Title

The ninth annual 1993 World Champion Goat Roping was held in Ozona at the Crockett County fairgrounds on June 25 & 26. The event was sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. There were 134 contestants.

Winner of the Open 1993 World Champion roping on Saturday night was Jesse Banner of Dryden, Tx. The Reserve Champion was Billy Teague of Rankin. Jesse had a time of 101.10 on seven head and Billy had a 101.88 on seven head with Ed Hale, Jr., Ozona; Reagan Bownds, Eldorado; and Joel Ham, Big Lake following close behind. Other contestants in the top fifteen ropers from the 60 open ropers competing were Sam Hardcastle, Crane; Coy Keith, Stephenville; Tuffy Waldrop, San Angelo; Johnny Bownds (the 1992 World's Champion), Eldorado; Cody Carruther, Sanderson; Kevin Counts, Water Valley; Dale Harrell, Sheffield; Steve Pfiel, Uvalde; Freddie Fields, Knickerbocker; and Roy J. Harris, Del Rio.

The Champion, Jesse Banner, received a new saddle, a buckle, \$1,000 cash and the Karl Kinney Kothmann Memorial trophy.

The 1993 Junior Worlds Champion Goat Roper is Reagan Bownds, 16 year old son of Johnny and Angie Bownds of Eldorado. He posted a time of 120.15 on seven head. His brother, Garrett, who was 1992 Jr. Worlds Champion, ran a close second with times of 86.19 for Garrett and 82.03 for Reagan on five goats. Only Reagan Bownds and Kipp Harrell roped their seventh goat. Kipp, 8 year old son of Dale and Marsha Harrell of Sheffield, had

a time of 299.73 on seven head, and became Reserve World Champion Jr. Goat Roper. Travis Davidson, Ozona; Clay Richardson, Ozona; Joe Ross Jameson, Colorado City; Zane Runyan, Roswell, NM; and Garrett Bownds, Eldorado, followed up, roping six of their seven goats. There were 23 contestants (16 years and under) in this event with the top fifteen going into the finals on Friday night.

A.J. Cox, a veteran roper from Barksdale, won the saddle and buckle for winning the Senior World Champion Goat Roper on Saturday night. Kenny McMullan, Iraan, also a long-time roper ran a close second. Jerry Polk, Florence; and J.B. Hutto, Campwood, gave them a race for their money. There were fifteen ropers, age fifty and over, in this event. Others in the top fifteen were Cy Banner, Dryden; Howard Davee, Sterling City; Harold Gage, Brady; Ennis Barnes, Del Rio; Noble Webb, Bronte; John Bownds, Corpus Christi; Dub Metcalf, Robert Lee; R.J. Everett, Jr., Ozona; Jerry Bratton, Voca; Bob Leverett, San Angelo; and Bill Biffle, Forestburg.

The "Novice" Roping finals were also on Friday night and the winner was Kinney Dale Harrell, Sheffield, with a time of 86.65. Zane Runyan, Roswell, NM, was second with a 93.51

and Tate McMullan, Iraan, was third with a 95.73. The top ten ropers competing in this event from the twenty nine entered in the preliminaries were Billy Braswell, Telegraph; T.J. Craddock, Rocksprings; Hayes Worthington, Ozona; Lynn Denton, Robert Lee; Zane Waldrop, San Angelo; Ruben Rodriguez, Knickerbocker; and Cecil Keith, Austin.

The Ladies Roping finals were on Friday night with Mecca McMullan, Iraan, winner of the jackpot. Cheryl Dusek of San Angelo was second, Candy Everett of Iraan, third, and Michele Driver of Midland, fourth. There were ten ladies competing in this event.

There was also the Ladies Open Goat Tying finals with Jennifer Lee of Canyon winning the event and Julie Driver of Canyon, second. Jennifer Barnes of Del Rio was third with Mecca McMullan of Iraan taking fourth.

In the Junior Goat Tying finals, Kristin Bennett of Odessa was first and Kelly Jones of Sonora was second. Margaret Jameson of Colorado City, third and Kit Smith of San Saba fourth.

On Friday night the Forty and Over finals were held with Steve Beach of Ballinger winning. Bobby Zesch of San Angelo, second, Allen Askins of Dryden, third, and Jerry Polk of

Florence was fourth. There were 27 ropers in this event.

Also the Amateur "B" Ropers had their final go-round. First place went to Vance Worthington, Ozona; second to Ray Langford, Uvalde; third to Tooter Smith, San Saba and Joe Ross Jameson, Colorado City was fourth. There were fifty goat ropers in the Amateur "B" Roping in the preliminaries with the top ten going into the finals.

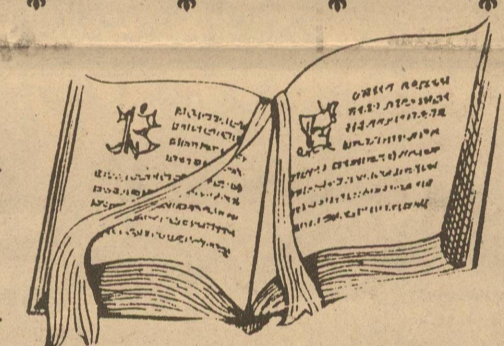

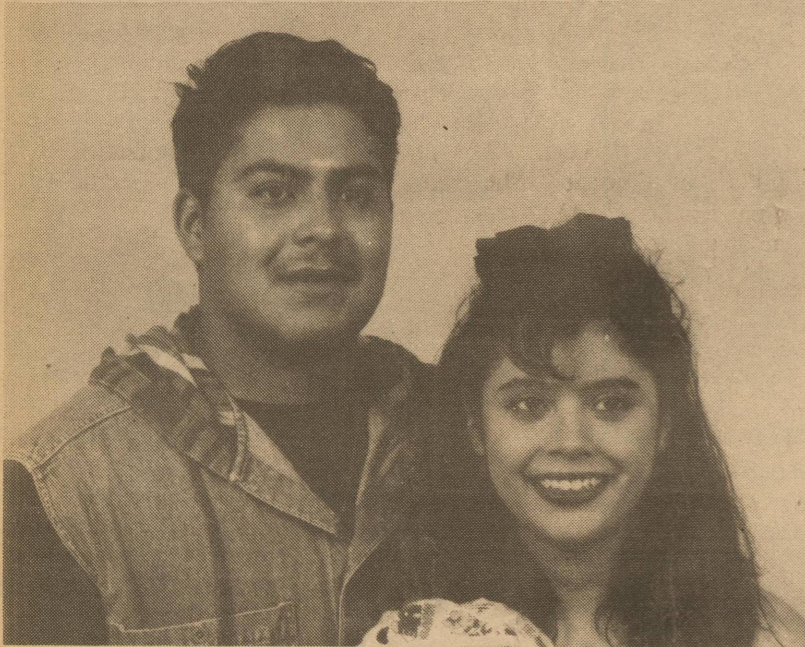

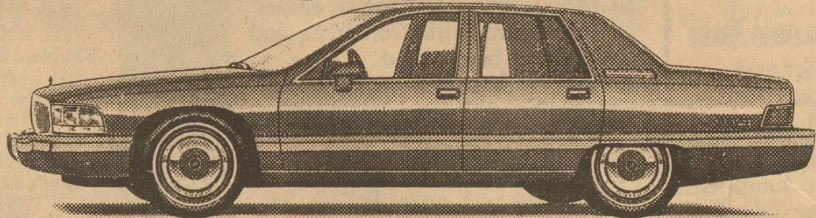
