Doran Attends Lions Camp

Krista Leann Doran, 14, daughter of David and Lenette Doran, of Eldorado, recently attended the Texas Lions Camp in Kerrville, Texas. Sponsored by the East Angelo Lions club, the camper rode horses, went swimming and even camped out under the stars while enjoying fun and fellowship with other children.

Located on 500 acres of beautiful hill county, the camp serves children who are visually or hearing impaired or have physical disabilities, ages 7 through 16. A special diabetes education camp is also offered for insulin dependent diabetic children between the ages of 7 and 17. Camp programs are adapted, if necessary, so that everyone may participate. A well-trained staff supervises each camp activity at a ratio of one counselor to two campers.

The goal is to help handicapped and diabetic children become more

independent, productive adults. The programs of the Texas Lions Camp are designed to develop such qualities as improved self-image, social adjustment and self-reliance.

The Texas Lions Camp, operated by the Texas Lions League for Crippled Children, Inc., is a nonprofit organization funded by generous individuals interested in providing challenging programs for handicapped youth. Emphasis is placed on providing a summer camp for children with physical disabilities or diabetes at no cost to the family. This service is provided free of charge to eligible children.

SCS Offers Cost-Share Assistance

The Soil Conservation Service is taking applications for cost-share assistance now. If you are interested in participating in this program this coming year you need to contact the local office now to secure funds for the upcoming year.

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) is a contract between a landuser and the USDA. This program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service. It provides federal funds to help apply the needed conservation practices on farms and ranches. The term of the contract may be minimum of three years to a maximum of ten years.

You, the landuser, develop a conservation plan of operations with SCS assistance to meet your goals and objectives in keeping with the needs of the land. The plan spells out *what, how, where, when and how much* of the conservation plan is to be

completed.

You may receive up to \$35,000 in cost-share funds per contract. The contract must include all of the property owned by the ownership or operated under a single operating unit. Some practices available for cost-share are construction of terraces, diversions, crossfences, water storage facilities and livestock pipelines, mechanical and chemical control brush, prescribed burning and grass seeding.

SCS personnel will help you plan, design, layout and inspect the conservation practices in your plan. The GPCP contract is a legal binding contract between you and SCS.

Contact the local Soil Conservation Service office to learn more about the Great Plains Conservation Program. Applications for the GPCP contracts may be made at any time during the year.

Let's be honest, besides honoring our local veterans the Legion is looking for new members. One of the nice things about the American Legion is that a person need not have served overseas during wartime to qualify as a member. I for one, although having served in Vietnam, think that is a good idea. Many men during any of America's wars did not necessarily get to choose where they served. The U. S. has had global commitments since 1914

and so people who served in the military did not often get to serve where they wanted to serve. For instance I agreed with a fellow airman that he could go to Vietnam in my place and I would selflessly serve my tour in Taiwan (Nationalist China) but the Air Force did not think such a switch was a good idea. Dan Quayle had to defend Indiana from communist infiltration even though he probably had a burning desire to slog through the jungles of South East Asia.

In the Legion all honorably discharged service personnel who served during our armed conflicts are eligible to be members. yourself if you want to contribute some of your time and very little of your money to continue the tradition of veterans continuing to serve their country by serving their community.

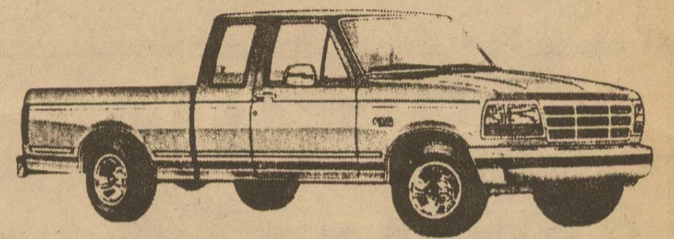

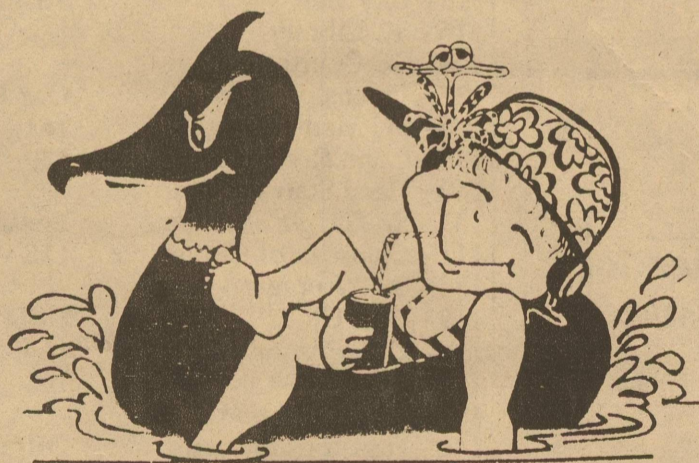

Rabies Cases High In South Texas

State health officials have repeated warnings that a rabies epidemic among dogs and coyotes in South Texas has grown worse in some counties.

The Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Veterinary Public Health, reports that rabies poses a serious threat to humans in areas where pet owners fail to have their dogs and cats vaccinated as required by law.

"In Hidalgo County, 16 rabies cases, including 12 dogs, already have been confirmed this year. That almost triples the county's total cases for all of 1992," Dr. Keith Clark, director of the bureau's Zoonosis Control Division, said.

Dr. Clark explained that canine rabies has surged - carried by coyotes and dogs - especially in Texas' southernmost counties. During 1992, TDH recorded 111 cases in a 12-county area, dramatically higher than the 67 reported for 1991. "So far this year," Dr. Clark said, "36 dogs and 29 coyotes in the region have been found rabid."

For the first time in the epidemic, cases have been reported this year north of Laredo in Webb County and in western Nueces County. Other cases this year have occurred in Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Zapata, Starr and Hidalgo counties where the current canine rabies outbreak began in 1988.

Dr. Clark said that the various strains of rabies are impossible to eradicate in the wild. For decades, skunks have been the most numerous carriers of the disease. "From 1974 until

last year, the second most common rabies carriers were bats," Dr. Clark said. "But infected coyotes outnumbered bats last year."

Including all strains, there were 471 laboratory-confirmed rabies cases in the state last year, an increase from 447 in 1991. The infected species included: 182 skunks, 70 coyotes, 69 bats, 56 dogs, 33 foxes, 16 cats, 11 cattle, 6 horses, and 28 other animals of varied species during 1992.

Dr. Clark stressed that, to lessen the rabies danger to humans, all dog and cat owners should have their animals vaccinated by 4 months of age and yearly thereafter. Veterinarians, trappers or anyone working with sick livestock or wild animals should consult a doctor about their need for rabies immunization before risking exposure.

Parents should warn their children never to pet stray, sick or wild animals. They also should avoid adopting wild animals as pets.

"We know that in some poor areas, parents feel hard-pressed to get health care for their families, no to mention their pets. But an unimmunized dog or cat, especially where rabid coyotes and wild dogs have been reported, can pose a deadly danger," he said.

Wool/Mohair Support Prices

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation today asked the public to comment on how to calculate the support price for wool on unshorn lambs and the level of support for mohair for the 1993 marketing year.

The National Wool Act of 1954, as amended, provides that the support price for pulled wool - the wool removed from the pelt of a slaughtered sheep - be set at the level relative to the support price for shorn wool that will maintain pulled wool marketing prices. This provision was implemented in the past through payments based on the weight of live, unshorn lambs.

The law also provides that the mohair price supports be set at a level to maintain about the same percentage of parity index, the 1993 shorn wool support price will be \$2.04

per pound (grease basis).

The complete proposed regulations were scheduled to be published in the July 14th Federal Register.

Public comments on the proposed regulations must be received by August 13, 1993, and should be sent to: Director, Fibers and Rice Analysis Division, USDA/ASCS, Room 3760-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C., Phone: (202) 720-6734. A preliminary regulatory impact analysis on the options is also available from that office.

Public comments will be available for inspection in Room 3756-S during normal business hours.

Walling Deployed To Somalia

Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Randale L. Walling, a 1978 graduate of Eldorado High School of Eldorado, Texas, is currently deployed and has completed the first half of a six-month Persian Gulf and Indian Ocean deployment with Marine Expeditionary Unit Service Support Group 24, 2nd Force Service Support Group, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, N.C. embarked aboard ships assigned to the USS Wasp Amphibious Ready Group.

Walling is participating in Operation Restore Hope, a peace-keeping operation off the coast of Somalia. Elements of the amphibious ready group provided a rapid, from the sea response force of Navy units

and Marine Corps special-operations capable assault troops, helicopters, Harrier aircraft, and other amphibious assault vehicles to the multinational peace-keeping force commander in Somalia.

The amphibious ready group spent 50 days off the coast of Somalia earlier in the deployment. The Marines and sailors are participating in exercise Eager Mace in Kuwait, which was cut short when they were ordered to backload and return to waters off Somalia. They were operating in the Persian Gulf when they were ordered back to re-deploy to the Somali coast.

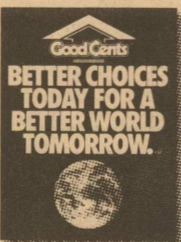

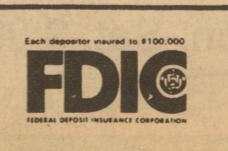
