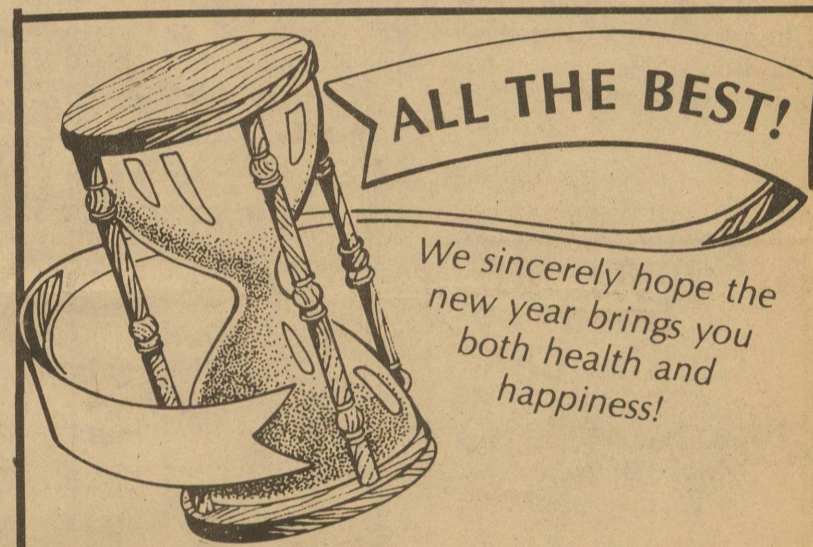
**Eldorado Band Students

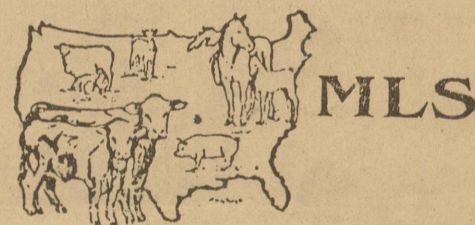

The following is a summary of the proposed Rules of the Plateau Underground Water Conservation and Supply District, Eldorado, Texas, as proposed by the Board of Directors. A complete text of the Rules may be obtained by sending a written request or calling:

A Public Hearing will be conducted for the discussion of these proposed Rules and their adoption by the Board of Directors.

RULE 1 - DEFINITIONS
Definitions of various words as used in the Rules.

RULE 2 - WASTE
No person shall produce or use underground water in a wasteful manner.

RULE 3 - WELL REGISTRATION
Registration of all existing and future wells in the District shall be filed with the District.

RULE 4 - PERMIT REQUIRED
Permits will be required for all wells capable of producing more than 25,000 gallons of water per day.

RULE 5 - DEPOSITS
Each application for a permit shall be accompanied by a \$50.00 deposit to be returned upon receipt of the drilling log.

RULE 6 - ISSUANCE OF PERMIT
The Board shall issue a drilling permit for a properly spaced well proper application filed with the owner.

RULE 7 - REQUIREMENT OF DRIVER'S LOG, CASING AND PUMP DATA
Complete records shall be kept and reports made to the District of the Driver's Log, casing and pump data.

RULE 8 - MINIMUM SPACING OF WELLS
No well shall be located nearer than 50' from the nearest property line and 330' from existing wells and no more than 16 wells shall be permitted per section.

RULE 9 - EXCEPTION TO SPACING WELL
The Board may grant exception to the above spacing regulations.

RULE 10 - PLACE OF DRILLING A WELL
A well must be drilled within ten feet of the location specified in the permit.

RULE 11 - REWORKING OR REPLACING OF WELL
No person shall rework or replace a well without obtaining a permit from the Board.

RULE 12 - TIME DURING WHICH A PERMIT SHALL REMAIN VALID
Any permit shall be valid for 2 months from the filing date of the application.

RULE 13 - CHANGED CONDITIONS
The decision of the Board on any matter contained in the Rules may be reconsidered by the Board.

RULE 14 - RIGHT TO INSPECT AND TEST WELLS
Any authorized person of the District shall have the right at all reasonable times to enter on the lands on which a well or wells may be located to inspect and test such wells.

RULE 15 - OPEN WELLS TO BE CAPPED
Each land owner in the District shall close or permanently cap any open or uncovered well.

RULE 16 - FINAL ORDERS OF THE BOARD
The orders of the Board in any non-contested application or proceeding shall be final on the day it is entered by the Board.

RULE 17 - REHEARING
Any person whose application is denied or whose contest is overruled may file with the Board a motion for rehearing.

RULE 18 - RULES GOVERNING PROTESTS
The event anyone should desire to protest

or oppose any pending matter before the Board, a written notice of protest shall be filed with the Board.

RULE 19 - GENERAL RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR HEARING

Hearings will be conducted in such a manner as the Board deems most suitable to the particular case, and technical rules of legal and court procedure need not be applied.

RULE 20 - GENERAL RULES
Computing, Time, Time Limit, and Show Cause Orders and Complaints are covered by this Rule.

RULE 21 - WELL VALIDATION
All wells in the District shall be validated upon location and determination of the wellhead equipment by District personnel.

RULE 22 - TRANSPORTATION OF WATER FROM THE DISTRICT
A permit is required for the transportation of water from the District.

RULE 23 - WELL DRILLING, COMPLETION, CAPPING AND PLUGGING

All well drillers and persons having a well drilled, deepened, or otherwise altered shall adhere to the provisions of this Rule prescribing the location of wells and proper drilling, completion, capping, and plugging.

RULE 24 - REPORTING UNDESIRABLE WATER

Each licensed well driller shall immediately inform the landowner or person having a well drilled or altered when undesirable water has been encountered and must inform the District within 10 days of such encounter.
