## Mexico Missionary To Speak At Assembly Of God Church

Reverend Mike Powell, newly approved Assemblies of God missionary to Mexico, will be speaking at Agape Assembly of God, 502 Warner in Eldorado, on Saturday, February 27th at 7:00 p.m. and on Sunday, February 28th at 11:00 a.m., according to Reverend Terry Allen, pastor.

Mike has already had several opportunities to gain missions experience in Mexico. One avenue has been through participation in Ambassadors in Mission (AIM). AIM is an Assemblies of God sponsored program that places volunteers on short-term ministry trips with missionaries around the world. "I've ministered in AIM trips, food distributions, crusades, and construction teams in San Louis Potosi, Guadalajara, and Nuevo Laredo, Mexico," Mike explains.

After working in his father's construction business for nearly 20 years, Mike entered the full-time ministry. He held youth pastorates in Lavon and Rockwall, Texas before accepting a pastorate in Royse City. He has also held sectional and district youth positions while pastoring. During these years

of ministry in Texas and his trips to Mexico, Mike began to sense God's call to full-time missions. "My heart was touched each time I went to Mexico," he shares, "but it was the death of missionary Mark Buntain in Calcutta, India, that God used to solidify that call."

Mike and his wife, Renay, will be moving to Mexico with their three children. They will be living in San Louis Potosi, an industrial city in central Mexico with a rapidly growing population. "The people of Mexico are religious," Mike observes, "yet many of them are entrapped in empty tradition and mysticism. We plan to work in Bible school instruction and pastoral training as well as evangelism and church planting."

The public is invited to attend the Powell's missions presentation on February 27th and 28th. "I want to share my love for the people of Mexico," Mike emphasizes, "as well as the importance of missionary commitment on the part of all Christians everywhere."

A reception will be held for Mike on Sunday afternoon at the church.

## TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

There are some things that just cannot be explained. Every so often an entertainer comes along, usually a singer, and they have a hit that takes over the national consciousness and pretty soon the whole country is humming the song or singing along as they hear it on the radio.

It pains me to think that one young man with probably not too much experience with the real challenges of relationship dysfunction has made himself wealthy with a fairly silly song.

"Acky Breaky Heart," for some reason, has won the

hearts, both broken and unbroken, of most everyone. It is not really a very deep song like maybe "Wind Beneath My Wings" and not completely silly such as one of Ray Stevens' old hits but it is "Catchy."

"Catchy" is what gets us, I think. Those successful jingles are the ones we never forget; that become part of the idiom of this land. "You care enough to send the very best" or you "Reach out and Touch someone". Acky Breaky is one of those catchy songs.

Even if you can't remember the verses, many

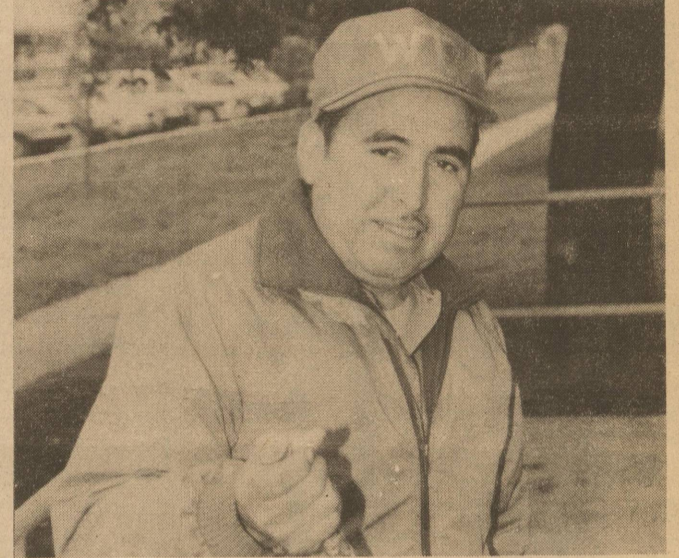

After teaching at colleges for eight years, one of the things I miss most is the discussions I had with students concerning new ideas and viewpoints on various topics. I hope to use this column to bring out some thoughts for dialogue over the breakfast table, the eighty-four table, or in classes. The topic of the week may be ethics, social issues, philosophy or religion. Whatever the subject, I hope it will provide mental and conversational stimulation to your life.

Walter Lippman stated: "There is no doubt that in one form or another, Socrates and Buddha, Jesus and St. Paul, Plotinus and Spinoza, taught that . . . without renunciation of many of the ordinary appetites, no man can really live well." Our society, on the other hand, is appetite oriented. Our value and success is evaluated on the basis of how many of our appetites we can satiate when the desire arises. This is the

epitome of the "good life:" immediate gratification without effort.

What our society has deemed the dream existence, however, is inn reality the definition of immaturity. Maturity is measured in great part by one's ability, based upon personal decision, to postpone pleasure to gain some greater end. It is the child who cannot muster the needed foresight and fortitude to, recognize a higher plane of existence.

Until our society recognizes its pleasure fixation and embraces the need for long-term, spiritual values, it has no right to complain about the decline of morals. Indeed, or children are simply adopting the morals we demonstrate to be important, rather than the one's to which we only pay lip service.

I believe that the future of our nation will be decided by our maturity level. If pleasure in the moment is our guiding ideal, I am not very optimistic about the future.

Being young is exciting. But the excitement can become a barrier to closeness wit God if it makes young people focus on passing pleasures instead of eternal values. Make your strength available to God when it is still yours, during your youthful years. Don't waste it on evil or meaningless activities that become bad habits and make you callous. Seek God now.

One final note: A man came rushing up to a ferry, breathless after

running at a terrific pace, but he got there just as the gateman shut the door in his face.

A bystander remarked, "You didn't run fast enough." The disappointed man

answered, "I ran fast enough, but I didn't start on time."

To accomplish the most for God in a lifetime, you must start in early - "in the days of your youth" (Eccles. 12:1).

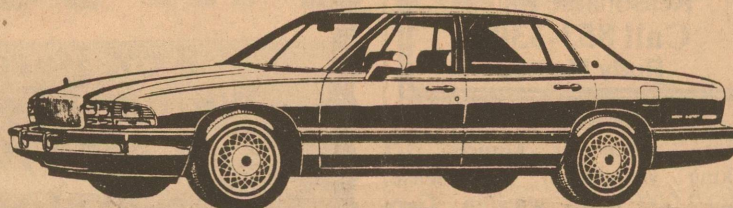

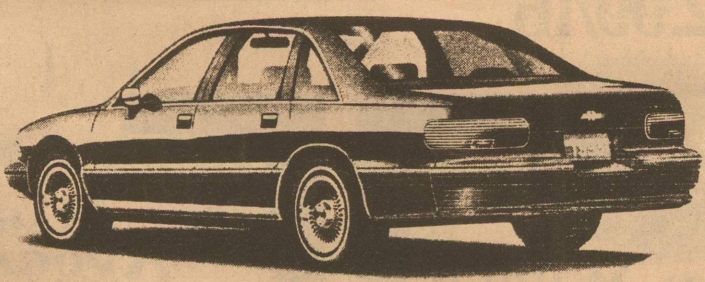

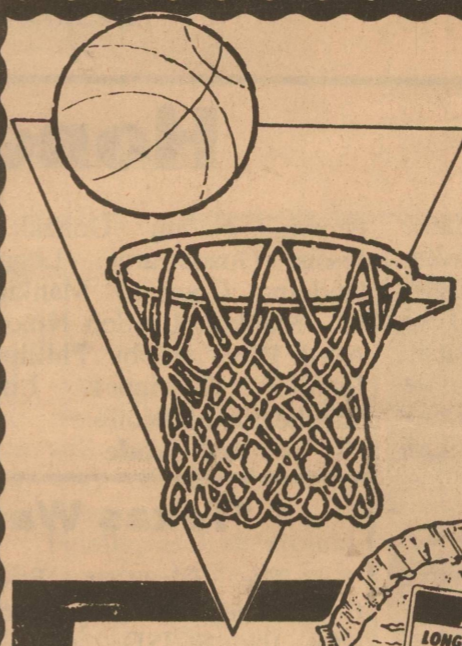
