Recycle Eldorado Workshop Held

A Recycle Eldorado training workshop was led by Dr. Susan Quiring, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Waste Management specialist, on Tuesday, March 23rd at the Extension Office with eleven people attending. Nancy Lester, Chairman of Recycle Eldorado and County Extension Agent, sponsored the workshop.

Dr. Quiring stressed the three steps to waste management are: **REDUCE**, **RE-USE** and **RECYCLE**. If we don't first reduce the amount of our waste, we aren't solving the problem. Secondly, re-use what we have or what someone else has - i.e. shop resale clothes shops, use a blackboard at home for notes, carry your own grocery sacks to the store, share magazines and newspapers with friends, call or write to cancel junk mail (853-2132 for 800 numbers), make gifts or greeting cards from old ones, buy glass

instead of plastic catsup bottles and other items (Eldorado has no outlet for plastics), educate the public about environmental shopping, use both sides of writing paper, buy recycled products, practice the "Don't Bag It" program - do not bag grass clippings and leaves. Horticulturists recommend leaving grass clippings on the lawn, and using leaves as mulch, or start a home compost bin. For more information, call the Extension Office at 853-2132.

Mayor John Nikolauk stressed the importance of reducing the waste in our sanitary landfill. "Basically we're talking about your pocketbook - the less we put into the landfill, the longer it will last. New government regulations regarding use of landfills will result in drastically increased costs to operate," stated Mayor Nikolauk. "We all need to help!"

"E-Day" Approaching

Saturday, April 3rd is "The Great Texas Trash-Off" statewide clean-up. Also, on this date Eldorado will again be participating with our own City-Wide Clean-up, better known as "E-Day."

All Adopt-A-Highway Groups across Texas are to clean their highway on this date. As a reminder, all local Adopt-A-Highway groups need to call Carolyn Scroggins at the Sonora T-DOT Office, 387-2848, to have bags and vests delivered for your group. Then after cleaning you need to call her again to receive your credit for cleaning.

On April 3rd, everyone in the community wishing to help with the City-Wide Clean-up must register at 9:00 a.m. on the north side of the Courthouse. Upon registering you will receive a badge for a free lunch to be held at the Memorial Building at noon. Then the clean-up will again continue after lunch. If you are interested in helping with food or serving lunch, please call Nancy Lester at 853-2132.

Bags for the City-Wide Clean-up are being donated by Coca-Cola. Volunteers are asked to bring mowers, gas weed-eaters, rakes, brooms, etc. After filling the bags, please put the bags along the curbs or next to dumpsters in alleys. Please **DO NOT** put bags in the streets or blocking

the alleys. The City trucks will be picking up that day and the Landfill will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Volunteers are also asked to bring trucks or flatbed trailers for the larger items.

If you are interested in being a neighborhood captain, please contact Cynthia Sauer at 853-3618. Neighborhood captains will be contacting their neighbors before the clean-up.

The "Great Texas Trash-Off" is held every April to spruce up our highways in time for the spring wildflower season, which brings thousands of visitors to view the bluebonnets.

In 1992, more than 29,000 trash-conscious Texans picked up 2.3 million gallons of garbage on this one day alone. Also, Trash-Off participants have cleaned a total of 16,500 miles of highway since the first annual pick-up. That is the equivalent of scouring the roads from Los Angeles to New York City 6 times.

The "Great Texas Trash-Off" is considered the largest one-day clean-up in the nation. With Keep Texas Beautiful affiliates participating in full force this year, we are expecting to blow the lid off our own record. Won't you join in helping break this record by coming out on Saturday, April 3rd to help **KEEP ELDORADO BEAUTIFUL?!**

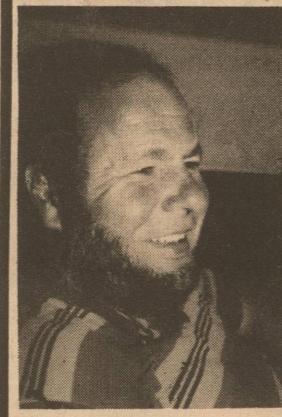
All of this would be of little note except that life has a way of coming back around. One local sage (who will remain nameless) puts it

Health News

Without a good night of sleep we do not function well. The average adult needs six to eight hours of sleep a night. Usually if you sleep deep you do not need to as long as if you sleep restlessly.

If you have trouble sleeping at night you can try to: 1) go to sleep and get up at the same time everyday even on weekends; 2) avoid stimulants in the evening such as coffee, cokes, chocolate and tobacco

products; 3) avoid alcoholic beverages in the evening; 4) do light exercises about a half hour before going to sleep; 5) avoid taking sleeping pills on a regular basis, it can make the problem worse; 6) only use your bed for sleeping not for watching TV, studying or business; 7) if you do not fall asleep in 15-30 minutes after going to bed, get up and do something relaxing and do not go back to bed until you are sleepy; 8) eat a light bread or fruit snack about a hour before going to bed,

avoid sugary snacks; 9) learn to relax before you go to bed and don't worry about the days problems, sometimes relaxation tapes might help you do this; 10) take a warm bath before you go to bed; 11) drink non-alcoholic beer before going to bed; 12) set the temperature to a comfortable level; 13) wear loose fitting clothing to bed; 14) make sure your bed and

pillow are comfortable; 15) do not take naps in the afternoon; 16) have your back checked to make sure it is in proper alignment.

If these suggestions do not help you sleep better you should see your doctor because not sleeping at night can be a symptom of a bigger problem such as pain, disease, depression or health problems.

Insights by Dr. Lee Brewer

Do you ever watch Jeopardy? It asks for all kinds of trivia concerning history, people and events. It is very impressive when someone gets numerous answers (or questions) right. But I always wonder if they really know what they are talking about, or if they have merely memorized a lot of trivia. There is a difference between knowing information and understanding what it means.

Reneé Descartes reminds us that understanding is personal and subjective. For us to truly understand something we must grasp it clearly and distinctly. Valuable knowledge is that which we comprehend for ourselves. How does this effect our lives? Let me explain.

The consequences of personal understanding in education are manifold. If education is merely rote learning we may very well have a great number of useless facts. I may be able to list every state capital, name every president in order, and even repeat the periodic table without hesitation. Unless, however, I can apply this information in some useful way it is meaningless. Why should I know the state capitals? (I would truly like to have an answer to this one.) Is there some importance in knowing the names of presidents? What can knowledge of the periodic table do to enhance my life and understanding of existence? If a student cannot answer these questions is what they are doing truly education? There must be some personal tie-in on the students part, some personal grasp of meaning and importance. If we dispense facts without providing a reason for those facts have we accomplished anything but memorization? Certainly rote learning can be a tool which opens the door to later understanding, (and this should be explained), but too often it does not go

beyond being a graded mantra. Knowledge must become their knowledge if it is to make a difference in their lives.

This idea of personal understanding is important as well in teaching our own children. Children do need rules and restrictions and they need to be given the reasons for those rules. It is not enough to simply reply "because I said so!" Give them a reasonable basis for why they should do certain things and they are much more likely to accept your guidance and maintain it as a part of their lives. If you can't give a reason, then maybe you need to rethink what you tell them.

The need for personal understanding is also crucial in religious matters. If I can quote the entire Bible from beginning to end, but it has no personal impact, has it any value? If I attend every church service and revival that I can and yet never see any reason for it beyond ritual, is there any substance? There is value in faith when it is the expression of my faith and communication with God. It is folly when it is just following the lead of others without knowing why.

Knowledge has value when it becomes a viable part of us. This takes more work, but the effort has meaningful consequences. Do you understand what I'm saying?

The application process used for selection of the mentor schools was a rigorous one. First, the school districts were required to submit an eight page application that outlined the mission of the high school, described the organizational structure of the school, and explained in detail the curriculum, instruction, and assessment implemented by

the high school. The applications were then read by three different committees appointed by the Texas Education Agency and each school was rated on their submitted application.

State Health Officials Warn Of Rabies Epidemic

State health officials have warned that an epidemic of rabies among dogs and coyotes in South Texas may be growing worse in some counties.

According to the Texas Department of Health's (TDH) Bureau of Veterinary Public Health, the danger of rabies to humans is high in areas where pet owners fail to have their dogs and cats vaccinated as required by law.

"In Hidalgo County, six rabies cases already have been confirmed this year. That ties the county's total cases in all of 1992," Dr. Keith Clark, director of the bureau's Zoonosis Control Division, said.

He explained that canine rabies, found in coyotes and dogs, has urged in the past two years, especially in 12 South Texas counties. During 1992, TDH recorded 111 cases in the 12-

county area, dramatically higher than the 67 reported for 1991. So far this year, 16 dogs and seven coyotes in the region have been found rabid.

For the first time, cases have been reported north of Laredo in Webb County and in western Nueces County. Other cases this year have occurred in Brooks, Duval, Jim Wells, Zapata, Starr and Hidalgo counties where the current canine rabies outbreak began in 1991.

Dr. Clark said that rabies, in its various strains, is impossible to eradicate in the wild. Skunks have been the most numerous carriers of the disease for several decades. "From 1974 until last year, second place among the most frequent rabies

carriers was held by bats," Dr. Clark said. "But last year, infected coyotes outnumbered bats."

Including all strains, there were 471 laboratory-confirmed cases of rabies in Texas during 1992, an increase from 447 the previous year. In order of most numerous, the species found infected included: 182 skunks, 70 coyotes, 69 bats, 56 dogs, 33 foxes, 16 cats, 11 cattle, 6 horses and 28 other animals of varied species.

To lessen the rabies danger to humans, TDH urges that all dog and cat owners should have their animals vaccinated by 4 months of age and yearly thereafter.

Also, veterinarians, trappers or anyone working with sick livestock which might have

been exposed to wild animals should consult a doctor about their need for rabies immunization before risking exposure.

Parents should warn their children never to pet stray, sick or wild animals. They also should avoid adopting wild animals as pets.

"We know that in some poor areas, parents may feel hard-pressed to get health care for their children, not to mention their pets. But an unimmunized dog or cat, especially in a rural area where rabid coyotes and wild dogs may already be present, can pose a deadly danger," he said.
