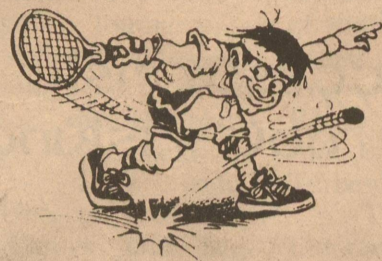

## District Tennis Held 3 Qualify For Regional

District tennis was held here in Eldorado on April 3rd and 5th. Three will be advancing to the Regional tournament in Abilene on April 29th and 30th.

Caty McGregor placed in the Varsity girl's singles division routing Wall's Stacy Haechton 6-1, 6-1. Caty will be making her 3rd consecutive trip to the Regional tournament. Coach Staci Helmers commented, "Caty and I both feel that the Regional title is well within her grasp. She has placed 3rd during the summer and fall she has taken her game up another level."

The doubles team of Lee Ann Lamb and Shanna Edmiston will also be advancing to Regional this year. This is their first year to advance to Regional as well as their first year to play together. These girls finished second at District after losing 6-3, 6-3 in the finals to Ozona's Childress and McKinney. In the semi-final round of the tournament, Lamb and Edmiston upset the #1 seed, also of Ozona, 6-4, 3-6, 7-6. The team was down 0-3 at one point in the 3rd set before rallying back to tie at 3 all. They got down again 3-5 in the same set and things were not looking good for the Eagle team. The girls fought their way back to tie the

match at 5 all. We later tied at 6 all and were forced to play a tie breaker. The tie breaker itself was an emotional one with the lead changing hands several times. The Eagles clinched the win when Edmiston put away a volley to win the tie breaker at 7-5. "These girls have worked hard all year and have shown great improvement from week to week. If they can play with as much intensity and concentration at Regional as they did at District they will certainly be able to compete."

In the same division, the team of Kim Williams and Adrienne Pina were narrowly edged out for 23rd place by Ozona 4-6, 6-3, 6-3. This was a disappointing loss for the duo because a win would have given them a chance to play their teammates for regional berth.

Tara Holley was beaten by Haechton of Wall in the quarterfinal round of the tournament 6-3, 6-3. Holley had advanced to the quarters after beating Stanton's Moore 6-4, 6-3.

The girls received co-champ honors in the Varsity division.

The only boy to place in the Varsity boys division was Freshman Bryan Gray. Gray lost 7-5, 7-6 in the 3rd place match to Michael Paul

Martinez of Stanton. "Bryan has consistently played well throughout the year, but he couldn't seem to get this game on track at District." The Eagle's other entry in boys singles was Shy Lowe Middleton. Shy Lowe was beaten by Urias from McCamey in the opening round of the tournament.

The Varsity Boys Doubles was definitely the strongest division in the tournament. Both Eldorado entries were beaten in the quarterfinals by the eventual 1st and 2nd place finishers. The Sophomore team of Leon Fuentes and Cody McCravey were beaten by the 4th seed and Juniors Farley Dakan and

Jeff Prendergast were beaten by the #2 seed. Coach Helmers stated, "Though we didn't finish as well in District as we would have hoped, we are a young team and I look for great things out of these guys in the future." The Varsity boys team consisted of two Juniors, three Sophomores and one Freshman.

The Regional tournament will be held at the Abilene Christian University Tennis Center on Thursday and Friday April 29th and 30th. McGregor's first match will be Thursday morning at 10:30. Lamb and Edmiston will take the court at 1:30 Thursday afternoon.

Dear Editor,

Recently the City of San Angelo agreed to pay \$12,500.00, along with \$17,500.00 from other Fat Cats along the South Concho River watershed for the builders of the Double Vision Dairy to abandon their plans in northern Schleicher County. The proposed plans for the dairy have met all the requirements of the Texas State Water Commission and would provide no water pollution to any underground water. In addition, the builders agreed to put 4 test wells around the dairy and check on a scheduled basis to insure that underground water was not being contaminated.

About 90 percent of the residents of Schleicher County are for the dairy, since it would decrease the 9 percent employment rate, provide additional tax revenue for the declining tax base in the County, and farmers in Schleicher and Tom Green Counties would have an additional market for their grain and silage.

I live adjacent to the proposed dairy site and believe the dairy would be very beneficial to the local area.

May I suggest that the City of San Angelo take the \$12,500.00 set aside for the dairy settlement and use it to improve their own sewer treatment system. I am sure the City of Paint Rock would

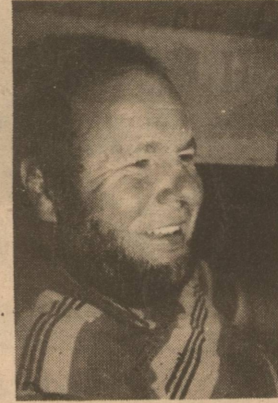
It is funny the things you remember and the things you don't. I remember only one of the presents, Benny

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## Beta Sigma Phi Update

On April 26, 1993 in Eldorado, Xi Xi Chi and Kappa Delta of Beta Sigma Phi, in concert with 12,500 chapters of 250,000 members throughout the world, will celebrate their Founder's Day. Founder's Day honors Walter W. Ross, a man who, during the Depression, saw a need among the young women he met in his work as a traveling encyclopedia salesman. He believed they needed more in their lives than work, responsibility and hardship, and decided to devote his life to providing them with a social and cultural outlet.

His efforts brought seven young women in Abilene, Kansas together in 1931 to form that sort of organization. Beta Sigma Phi met their needs, and continues to meet the needs of hundreds of thousands of women today. This April 30th, Walter Ross will be remembered by this, the largest Greek letter sorority in the world.

Throughout the 62 years of its history, the members of Beta Sigma Phi have enjoyed programs for cultural studies and numerous social events. They devote much of their time and effort

to service, and this past year raised over \$150,000 in just two months for sorority sisters who suffered losses due to Hurricanes Andrew and Iniki.

A typical year finds the chapters donating over \$3 million directly to local charities, reflecting over 200,000 work hours. The chapters have created their own international funds, which donate millions to health research groups, hunger projects, and other worthwhile causes. Through Beta Sigma Phi's International loan and scholarship funds, members and their families receive assistance.

Basic to Beta Sigma Phi, however, are the socials for its members. One of the most important is Founder's Day. The local chapters will meet on Monday, April 26th, at Casa Arispe Restaurant, to observe Founder's Day. The chairman of the celebration is Flora Hubble. The mistress of ceremonies for the evening will be Dorothy Dacy. Barbara Jackson has been selected for the honor of presenting the special message from the International Executive Council of Beta Sigma Phi. Other members taking part in the program are Glenda Harris, Linda Lindsey and Jana Key.

Awards will be presented during the evening to outstanding chapter members, recognizing them for their sorority and community work. Some local Beta Sigma Phi projects include Trash pickup on Mertzon Highway, T.V. Raffle and Benefit for the Danny Worley Family, Halloween Carnival, Turkey Raffle, Bake Sales, Valentine's Dance for Middle School, and donations to various local community organizations.

## Litter In Eldorado

### WHAT IS LITTER?

Litter is any decayable waste from a public or private source, including animal and vegetable matter. Also, any non-decayable solid waste including combustibles, glass, metal, discarded materials and worn-out machinery are considered litter.

**WHY DO PEOPLE LITTER?** Keep Texas Beautiful has determined three attitudes that predominate peoples thinking about handling waste:

- They feel no sense of ownership for the property,
- Someone else will clean up after them;
- Litter has already accumulated, what harm will a little more do?

**WHAT IS AN OFFENSE OR VIOLATION?** Under the Texas Litter Abatement Act disposal of litter except in a legal landfill is illegal.

**WHAT IS TRACEABLE EVIDENCE?** Any piece of material such as an envelope, circular or magazine found with a name on it is allowable evidence according to the Health & Safety Code.

**WHAT ARE THE PENALTIES?** You may be fined from \$50 to \$1000 plus court costs.

**WHAT DOES LITTERING COST ME?** In Texas \$20 million is spent annually to remove litter from roadsides - money and

time that could be used for more needed services. Clean communities have a better chance of attracting new businesses than those where litter is common.

### WHAT CAN I DO?

- Set an example by not littering and teach your children the proper way to dispose of trash.

- Make sure trash cans have lids closed and don't set out open containers or boxes filled with trash.

- Carry a litter bag in your car.

- Ask your neighbors to join you in cleaning up one public area.

- Plant shrubs and flowers because people litter less where areas have been beautified.

- Cover truck beds when transporting material to and from the landfill or job sites.

- Pick up one piece of litter a day and challenge your friends and family to do so, too.

- Adopt a spot and maintain it on a regular basis.

- Report illegal dumping to your local enforcement authorities.

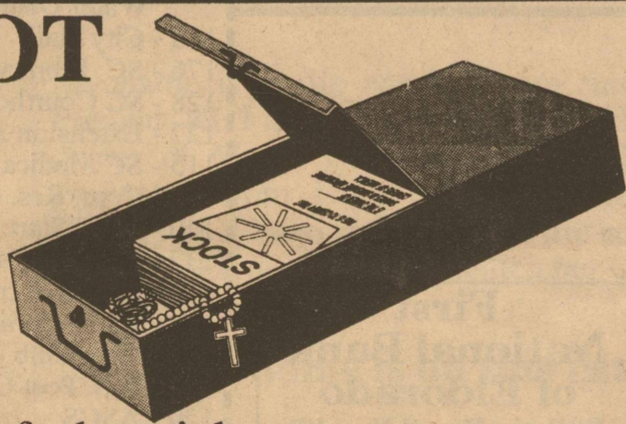

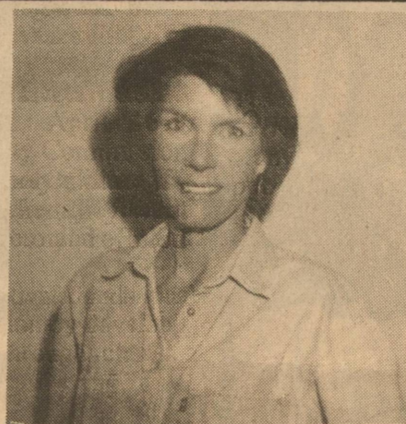

## RC&D Board Met

The RC&D Board met Monday, April 5, 1993 at the Eagle Dairy Mart. Chairman George Gower called the meeting to order at 6:15 p.m. Rev. Hawley Wolfe gave the invocation, then gave a brief talk about the Woolen Mill and its possibilities as a tourist attraction.

Carrol Green then showed a film on loan from a Houston television station which was made for the program "Eyes of Texas." The film was about a mill.

Mayor John Nikolauk introduced Professor Harlan Bruha and his assistant Jim Moore of the Small Business Development Center at ASU. They talked to us about small city economic development. This department at ASU offers one on one counseling free of charge to people with business ideas in a ten county region which includes Schleicher County. Sonora has used their ideas and is doing well. John Childress of the FNB of Sonora asked for help and is doing a number of loans through SBA. Our bank could do the same.

Professor Bruha told us that Holley House had used the ASU team and they are presently doing a survey for Tom Green County that a professional team had bid \$90,000 to do.

Economic development suggestions for Schleicher County include:

1. Get Bankers involved.
2. Think of Holley House as an asset and encourage other small businesses like them.
3. Woolen Mill developed as a tourist attraction.
4. Build on these small cottage type businesses instead of going for Big Business.

Ronnie Mittel questioned Professor Bruha about whether the free trade agreement would be beneficial to our community since we are near the border. Professor Bruha stated that he felt it would. Mittel also questioned if a small business loan might be available to buy out and develop the woolen mill. Professor Bruha felt it would be if we had a potential buyer apply for a

loan through a banker.

Gower asked that Eldorado be put on the agenda for an economic study by the ASU team in September. They will also schedule a workshop this summer. Cost will be approximately \$10 a person. It will be an all day workshop with lunch catered. All interested persons are asked to attend with special emphasis on attendance by community leaders such as city council and county commissioners.

Ronnie Sauer was present to give us some information on the possible relocation of a dairy in Schleicher County. There are seven locations available, but there must be proper drainage. Adequate water is also a requirement since it requires about 75 gallons per cow per day. He said that West Texas Utilities was interested in helping financially to bring a dairy to our area since the dairy would be a heavy electric power user.

Sauer stated he had toured Erath county where there are 200 dairies. There is no underground water pollution in the county and he noticed no foul odor when he was there. He stated that cow manure had no more pollutants than decaying leaves that go into streams. He feels that a series of articles to educate the public are needed and possible will be published in the future. He did say that when the lagoon on a dairy gets full the water is used to irrigate farm or ranch land and that this will have a foul odor.

In closing he states we have everything a dairy needs in Schleicher County: adequate water-utilities and a main highway.

After a discussion on the dairy, the guest present from the city council, county, and chamber of commerce were excused and the board went into regular meeting.

It was voted to send

Hawley Wolfe to grant writing school in June at a cost of \$710. Schleicher County, the City of Eldorado and Chamber of Commerce are to be asked to cover the cost of the school.

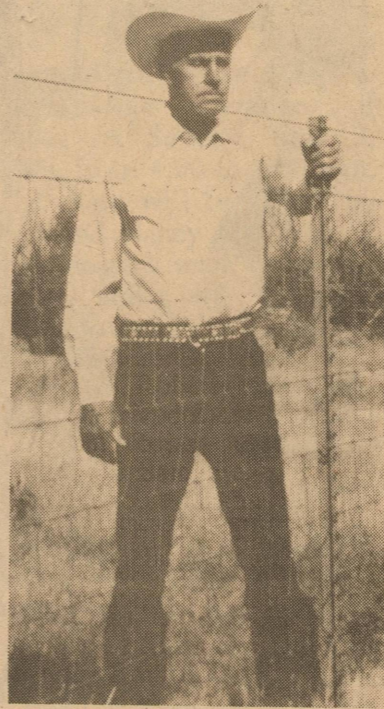
Resource development project proposals by Mayor Nikolauk will help buy equipment for the landfill and an oiler to repair streets. He states that the present landfill will be inadequate after October due to new regulations by EPA. The city will either have to hire a commercial hauler to take the trash to Big Spring or spend \$230,000 to operate the current landfill. Estimated cost of the street oiler was \$70,000.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, May 4th.

## GPCP Conservation Cost-Share Program

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) is a conservation cost-share program that involves a long term contract between a landuser and the USDA. This program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service. It provides federal funds to help apply the needed conservation practices on farms and ranches. The term of the contract may be a minimum of three years to a maximum of ten years.

You, the landuser, develop a conservation plan of operations with SCS assistance to meet your goals and objectives in keeping with the needs of the land. The plan spells out WHAT, HOW, WHERE, WHEN and HOW MUCH of the conservation program.

You may receive up to \$35,000 in cost-share funds

per contract. The contract must include all of the property owned by the ownership or operated under a single operating unit. Some practices available for cost-share are construction of terrace, waterways, diversions, crossfences, water storage facilities and livestock pipelines, mechanical and chemical control brush, prescribed burning and grass seeding. SCS personnel will help you plan, design, layout and inspect the conservation practices in your plan for cost-share payment. The GPCP contract is a legal binding contract between you and SCS.

Contact the local Soil Conservation Service office to learn more about the Great Plains Conservation Program. Application for the GPCP contracts may be made at any time during the year.

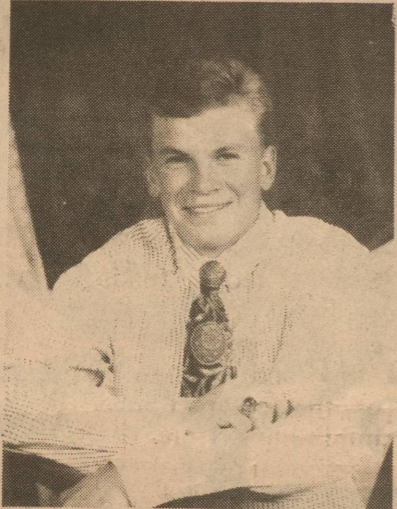

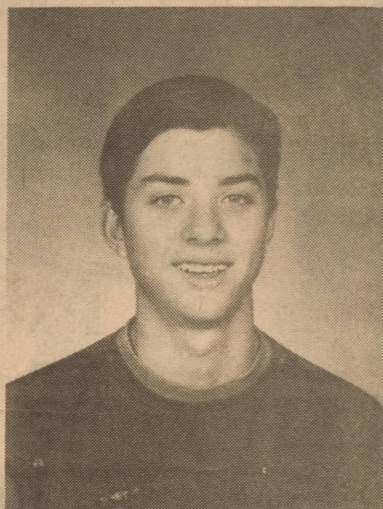

entails. In this case (since I am still new in this business) I thought it might not be a bad idea to provide an overall idea of the role of a board member. (Maybe I should have put a "should" in every sentence?)

I understand that as long as you are still incensed about the matter it will be hard to see any other point of view, but I would like to clarify a few points regarding the case itself. The four boys were suspended from extra-curricular activities -- activities that are not a student's basic, constitutional right but an addition to the regular school day. The State requires that students are suspended for six weeks from these activities as soon as they do not pass one of their classes, a clear indication that these activities are meant to be a privilege.

The Board has also revised the policy in question to make it more specific, so that future problems of a similar kind might be avoided.

I am sure that your information of the case is quite different from mine. I could only base my decision on the information I had, and I can assure you and everyone else involved that I agreed to a temporary suspension from extra-curricular activities in spite of who these boys were, not

because of who they were. It is my desire as well that the policies are applied to all students equally, regardless of who they are.
