## KTB Award Winners

The highest statewide environmental awards were announced today in Austin, the 1992-93 Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc. (KTB) Governor's Community Achievement Awards. The nine winning cities are San Antonio, Waco, Denton, Lufkin, Pampa, Dickinson, Diboll, Eldorado, and Seven Points. Supported by the Governor of Texas since 1968, and co-sponsored by the Texas Department of Transportation since 1985, this awards program has recognized communities in nine population categories for their grassroots efforts in local environmental improvement through litter prevention, waste reduction and recycling, beautification, public education, and litter law enforcement.

The first place cities were among a field of 74 entrants from across the state. These winning cities WILL share a total of \$700,000 in landscaping projects from the Texas Department of Transportation.

"These nine Texas communities have done an outstanding job working to keep our state clean," Laura Lantrip, KTB Awards Chairwoman from Mesquite, said. "Environmental quality is a key ingredient to future economic development, and these cities should be proud of the example they have set by building a public-private partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful."

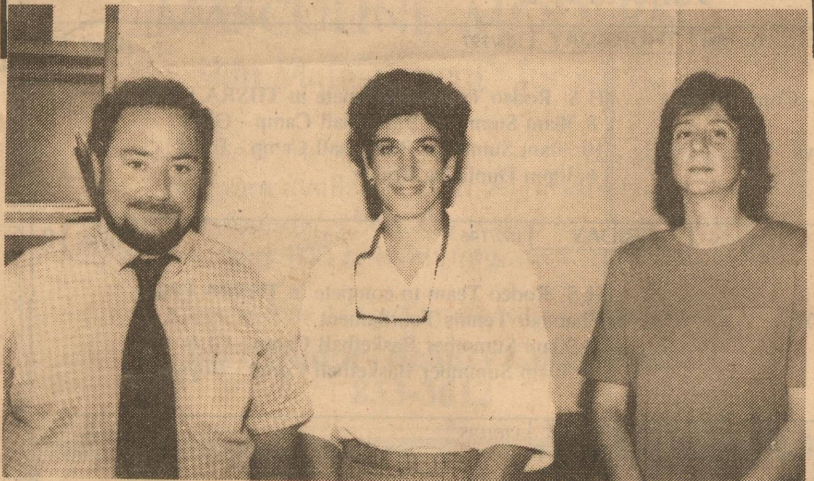
Community achievements are judged in six areas --public

awareness, educational programs in the schools, solid waste management and recycling programs, citizen cleanup efforts, law enforcement, and beautification. Of the 74 cities entering the awards competition, 47 scored more than 90 out of a possible 100 points-pointing to the quality of these volunteer program at the grassroots level.

"Literally thousands of civic and business leaders, community volunteers, school and government officials have worked cooperatively at the local level to change attitudes and habits towards the environment which has resulted in visibly cleaner cities and a cleaner Texas, for the long term," said Bill Vincent, Chairman of the KTB Board from Richland Hills. "These grassroots programs have helped make Texas the number one leader in the nation in solving litter prevention and solid waste challenges."

Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., the non-profit state affiliate of Keep America Beautiful, Inc., provides grassroots solutions to Texas' solid waste and litter issues. The nine winning cities will be honored by state officials and KTB officials on July 2, 1993 in Austin during KTB's 26th Annual Convention. ## SCMC Applies For Grant

SCMC applied for a grant through the Center for Rural Health Initiative to establish a rural health physician network so that rural physicians in West Texas can go for further medical training, and also to provide relief services to those rural communities.

"This is cost prohibitive for many communities and for the physicians as well, stated Jim Blum, SCMC Hospital Administrator. "Physicians may have to close their practice in order to receive further medical training or are not able to leave

at all and are therefore not current on certain medical curriculum."

SCMC, with this grant, would provide rural relief physician services so physicians would be able to go for more medical training and in turn, be able to serve their community better.

The Center for Rural Health Initiative is a state agency designed to help rural communities help themselves. Different health care projects are available to help secure services for their population.

## IRS Help For Taxpayers

According to Gary O. Booth, IRS District Director for Dallas District, "If you haven't filed past years' tax returns, the best gift you can give yourself is an appointment at the San Angelo office this Thursday June 10, 1993. The San Angelo IRS office (33 E. Twohig, Room 101) will be staffed between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. to help taxpayers get right with their government."

This is an ongoing effort sponsored by the IRS to help taxpayers who have failed to file past years' returns. Booth commented, "What struck me about those who have come in for help is the sense of tremendous relief they expressed.

"One young couple hadn't filed for three years and that fact alone had been a source of considerable anxiety in their marriage. When they saw that they owed taxes for 1988, they weren't very convinced that they were doing what was best for them. Yet, as their assistor worked through tax years 1989, 1990, and 1991, refunds wiped out that first year's liability, and they even wound up with a small refund.

"A trucker stopped filing in 1989, the year his wife had to

have emergency surgery. Filing his tax return was not his first priority. While his wife recovered and he got his affairs in better order, he was afraid to file subsequent tax returns because he thought for sure he'd be going to jail. We helped him, too. He worked out an installment plan to pay off what he owes, and he's still trucking."

Booth says that taxpayers who owe IRS returns owe it to themselves to get back into the system. "For many, it is fear that creates a barrier. We see our job as making it as easy as possible for taxpayers to comply. Many may have paid in withholding or estimated tax payment which are held in credit to their accounts. And if they owe us, we can work out payment arrangements to bring them square with us."

"I want to assure taxpayers that we sincerely want to help. Our experience has shown that most people want to file overdue returns and settle their affairs with the government," Booth continued, "and from our own vantage point, if we can help people back into the system on their own, we will not have to focus on more costly enforcement efforts later."

# Editor's Journal

## TOP OF THE DIVIDE

Today is our twenty-sixth wedding anniversary. I know that this is not necessarily an overwhelming number of years, but it's not a bad start for a marriage. Of course, in my line of work I see many marriages end and sometimes when I read the statistics I begin to think that there aren't very many permanent marriages around.

That is not true. There are plenty of good solid marriages, and hopefully more of them in the future. Those statistics that say that one out of every two marriages ends in divorce must mean that a few folks are getting married and divorced over and over again. Maybe the

statistics people aren't getting their figures right, but I alone know of at least ten out of twelve marriages that have not ended in divorce.

I can't say that Maxine and I have any special market on the does and don'ts of marriage. There are plenty of books out there supposedly with all the answers to a happy marriage and Reader's Digest must average an article a month on the secrets of marital bliss (maybe part of the problem is that there is no one set of secrets, but that each couple has to find the rules that are helpful to them).

## Department Of Agriculture Names New Chairman Of Texas State Committee Of ASCS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced the appointment of Ray Joe Riley of Hart as Chairman of the Texas State Committee of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Joining Riley on the Texas State ASC Committee are Raul Tijerina, Jr., of Brownsville, Edward L. Lehman, Jr., of Vernon, Vera H. Harrington of Sulphur Springs, and Gerald M. Clark of Edna.

These leaders bring a wealth of farming and ranching experience to ASCS. They have established an impressive record, combining years of experience as agriculture and community leaders.

Ray Joe Riley is a member of the Board of Directors of the Texas Corn Growers Association and serves on the Executive Committee of Plains Irrigation Gas Users Associations. He served as a Director of the Texas Certified Seed Producers Association, on the Cotton board of the United States, on the National Cotton Council, and as President and Director of the Texas lamb feeders Association. He is an active producer of corn, cotton, wheat, grain sorghum, sugar beets, sheep, lambs, wool, hybrid forage sorghum seed, cotton seed, and cattle in Castor, Deaf Smith, Fannin and Lamb counties. Riley serves as President and Chairman of Riley Yieldmaster Seed Corporation and President of Estacado Industries, Inc.

Raul Tijerina, Jr., operates the Tijerina Ranch in Hidalgo County and oversees farming interests in Cameron County. He has served on various area and community boards. He is past Chairman of the Public Utilities Board of Brownsville, and past Chairman of the Board of Regents of Pan American University (now the University of Texas-Edinburg).

Edward L. Lehman, Jr., is co-owner of Lehman Farms, 3,500 acre irrigated and dryland farming and cattle operation. He is retired owner of a John Deere Agriculture Equipment dealership and the owner of Lehman Flying Service. Mr. Lehman previously served on the Texas ASC State Committee, as the Chairman of the Greenbelt Cotton Improvement Association, Director of the Red River Valley Association, and board member of the Red River Authority of Texas. He has served on various local and area boards and received numerous agriculture and civic awards.

Vera H. Harrington owns and operates a progressive dairy operation in Hopkins County, milking 450 head and producing hay on a 1,000 acre operation. She is active in Women Involved in Farm Economics,

and serves on the Board of Directors, Southwest Dairy Center and Museum. Mrs. Harrington serves on numerous local and area civic organizations and has been recognized as a business and agriculture leader in northeast Texas.

Gerald M. Clark is a rice, feed grain and cattle producer in Jackson County. He has served as a Director of the Texas Rice Producers, Texas Farm Bureau, and is active in environmental concerns.

The State ACS Committee oversees farm program activities of the ASCS throughout Texas. ASCS employs a staff of 1,400 in Texas and supervises the distribution of more than \$1.5 billion in federal farm program benefits to the farmers and ranchers of Texas.

## Loans Available From SBA

Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Crockett, Irion, Reagan, Schleicher and Tom Green Counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Drought which occurred June 1 through October 31, 1992 caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these

producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing applications is December 15, 1993.

Due to the drought, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to

purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance. The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program. The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4 %) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

## CIDC Aid Available

Do you know a child who needs physician care, medications, surgery, medical supplies or equipment?

The Chronically Ill and Disabled Children's Services (CIDC) with the Texas Department of Health may be able to help that child receive the service he or she needs and deserves.

"The program was legislated several years ago to address the medical needs of Texas children who were chronically ill or disabled," comments Oscar Latham, CIDC Social Worker in San Angelo. "The program assists the child's family by arranging, and paying for the medical care."

A child is eligible for CIDC services if he or she is a resident of Texas, has a medical condition that the program covers, is under age 21, and the family meets the program income and asset limits. However, families that have incomes over the limits may still be able to qualify for CIDC services.

Some of the medical conditions covered by the CIDC program include: HIV and AIDS; bone, muscle and joint problems; severe burns, cancer, heart problems; Cerebral Palsy and other neurological disorders; cleft lip and palate; craniofacial anomalies;

Studies at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston indicate there are significant differences between the sleep patterns of breast-fed and formula-fed infants.

Dr. Nancy Butte, an associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine, found that four-month old, breast-fed infants spent more sleep time in a "quiet" cycle called NREM (nonrapid eye movement) than formula-fed infants. The NREM stage appears to require complex feedback from the brain that maintains blood pressure, regulates breathing and heart rate, and inhibits physical

activity.

In contrast, formula-fed infants spent more time in the REM (rapid eye movement) cycle. During REM, also known as the dream cycle, the body experiences an increase in breathing and heart rate, blood pressure and physical activity.

"The duration of 'active' sleep and 'quiet' sleep shifts as the infant grows and begins to undergo longer periods of unbroken sleep," Butte said. "These changes in sleep behavior reflect changes in brain function."

According to Butte, differences in sleep patterns may be due to differences in the composition of human milk and formula or developmental differences between the breast-fed and formula-fed infant.

"This is another piece of the puzzle that appears to support and development," she said.

Results from this study follow previous CNRC findings that indicate breast-fed infants burn fewer calories when they sleep and have lower heart rates than formula-fed infants.

Despite early differences in sleep patterns between breastfed and formula-fed infants, Butte emphasizes that scientists do not know the cause or the long-term implications.

The study is part of the Center's ongoing research aimed at defining the energy requirements and nutrient needs of infants.

The findings were published in a recent edition of Pediatric Research.

## Heat Exhaustion Precautions

"Goose pimples" may be associated with winter weather, but they can be an early indicator of heat illness among summer athletes.

"They are one of the early signs of severe heat exhaustion a dangerous problem during the hot months when athletes may not take necessary precautions," warns Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, head of adolescent and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Other signals to be aware of while exercising during the coming summer months are headaches, unsteadiness or dizziness, nausea, muscle spasms, cramps or fatigue, and excessive sweating.

"If athletes experience any of these, they should stop, rest and drink water. If in competition, a trainer or physician should be notified," said Hergenroeder.

Taking such actions are crucial since the effects of competing in hot weather are cumulative, says Hergenroeder. Athletes are more likely to develop heat illness on the second or third day of competition or practice, if precautions are not taken.

If left unchecked, heat illness can lead to dry skin, rising body temperature, physical exhaustion, and unconsciousness.

"These are the late signs and at this stage, the athlete is in

extreme danger," said Hergenroeder. "A doctor should be consulted immediately and emergency measures begun since heat illness can be fatal if not treated."

Hergenroeder advises preventive measures for people who pursue outdoor physical activity of any kind during hot and/or humid weather:

- \* Stay in the shade as much as possible. If jogging, choose tree-covered trails or streets.
- \* Drink a minimum of one and a half cups of fluids every half hour, even if not thirsty. Water is recommended. Avoid diuretics and caffeine drinks like sodas and coffee.
- \* Drink a minimum of one and half cups of water about 20 to 30 minutes before physical activity.
- \* Cold water is best since it is absorbed faster.
- \* Do not take salt tablets. They are unnecessary and may be dangerous.
- \* Sports drinks may be nearly 5% glucose, which can reduce their effectiveness in replacing lost fluids. Dilute such drinks to one part per two parts water.
- \* Do not exercise or compete in hot weather if you are sick, running a temperature, or feeling overly tired.
- \* If possible, exercise in the mornings or evenings, when it is cooler.

"Above all, exercise should not be about torture," said Hergenroeder. "It's okay to occasionally forego exercise if the weather is particularly brutal."

## New WTU Bill

To provide extra convenience and more account information to the people it serves, West Texas Utilities Company has improved the monthly bill it mails to customers.

Beginning May 14th the postcard-style bill customers have been receiving was changed to a full-page, more detailed bill that will be mailed in an envelope. A return envelope will be enclosed for convenience when paying by mail.

The most obvious change in the bill will be its appearance. The letter-sized format will be noticeably larger, with a detachable bill portion at the top and a detailed statement below. The top portion of the bill will be identified by WTU's logo and light blue color.

While the new bill is more attractive, its real purpose is to serve WTU customers more efficiently. The biggest change most customers will notice is how much more information the new bill provides about their accounts. "The new format has more space, so we can include additional information regarding each customer account," said Leroy Reeves. "You'll see exactly how your bill is calculated with meter reading usage, fuel and other factors."

Now customers will see a detailed breakdown of their energy usage and rates, as well as how much they owe. The bill will also show more detailed information on other matters such as merchandise accounts.

WTU also is taking this opportunity to provide extra

convenience to customers. In the past, customers have expressed a strong wish for a return envelope to be provided with their bills. Now that bills will be mailed in envelopes, WTU will be able to provide this requested service.

The return envelope will have a window. The top portion of the bill you return to WTU, when placed correctly in the envelope, will position the address of your local WTU office in the window.

The full-page format fared well in selected customer testing early this year. WTU randomly chose 100 accounts company-wide to receive the new bill. Afterwards, each of the 100 customers was called personally and asked for reaction. Some of the features customers especially liked included: the new bill is easier to read; having the return envelope provided for them; the privacy of their account information going through the mail in a sealed envelope; and having more detailed information about their accounts.

The only change customers should notice is more information and added convenience. There won't be an increase in customers' bills to pay for the new features.

Although the return envelope is provided for customer convenience, those who prefer to pay their bill in person at their WTU local office may continue to do so. Your favorite WTU office personnel can still take your payment in person.

Mason and Austin.

Huie received her bachelor of arts degree cum laude in 1969 from the University of Texas, Austin. She earned a master of theology degree in 1973 from Southern Methodist University, Dallas, and a doctor of ministry degree in 1989 from Emory University, Atlanta.

Huie and her husband have two sons, Matthew, 15, and David, 13.

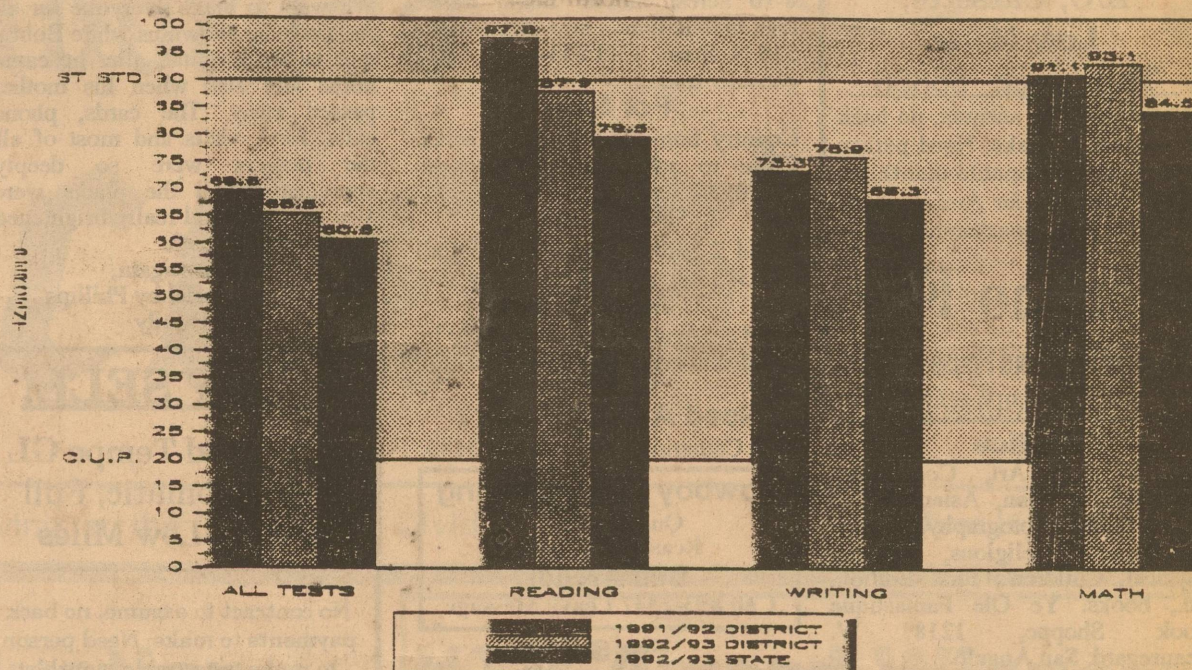


# Texas Education Agency District Graphics For the AEIS Schleicher ISD

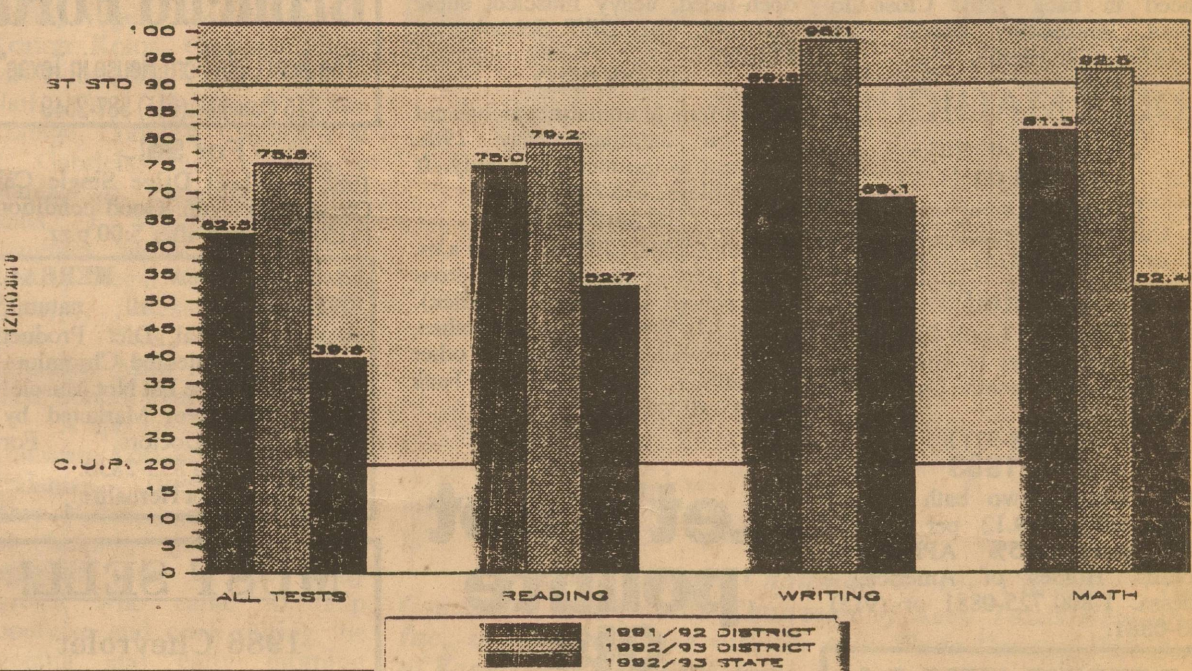
TAAS - Exit Level

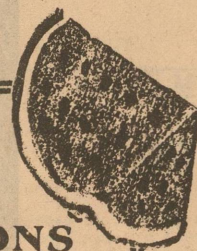
