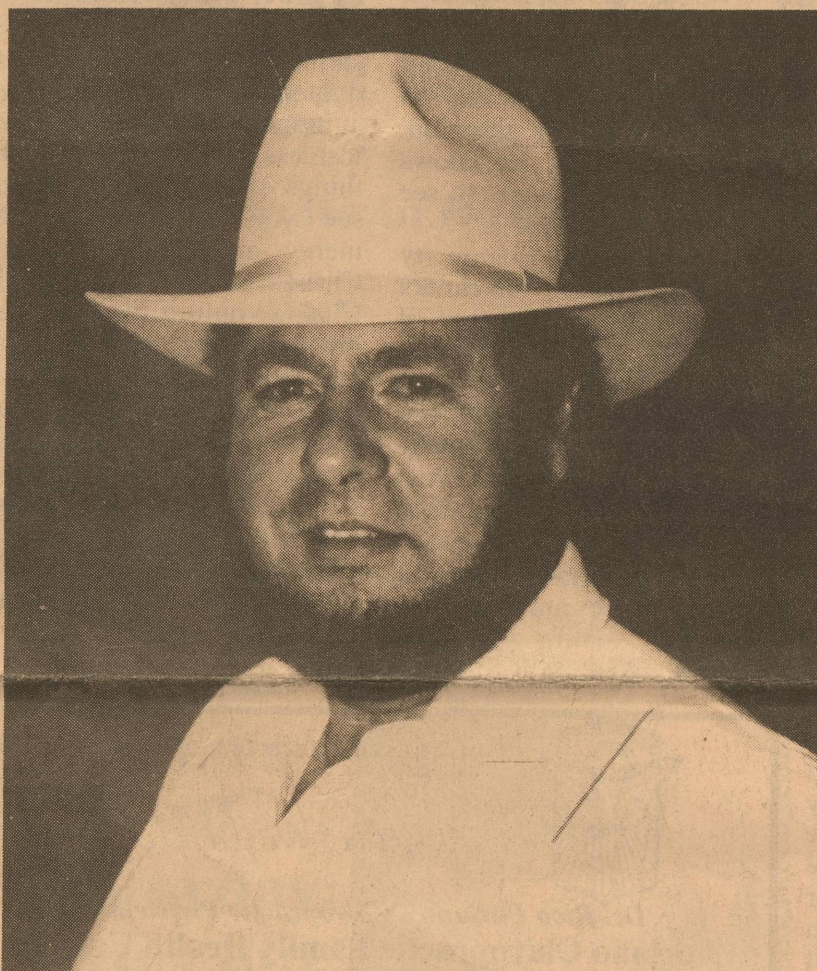

If you receive Social Security, Food Stamps, AFDC, or any other

government assistance you will need to bring proof of such assistance. If you are 60 or older we need proof of income.

In order to get your commodities on May 12, you will need to come to the Community Resource Center on May 10 from 9:30 a.m. until noon to update your application. This new information has been required by the State. I apologize for any inconvenience this may cause.

Commodities will be distributed on Wednesday, May 12, at 1:00 p.m. at the Memorial Building.

Fire Destroys Home 1 Person Injured

Shortly before 8:00 a.m. on Monday, May 3rd the Schleicher County Sheriff's Office received a phone call of a house fire at 202 East Hill Street.

Stated Sheriff Richard Harris, "When I arrived at the scene there was quite a bit of smoke. I kicked down the door and got one person out, Steve Fletcher, who is in his early 30's."

Fletcher, who is employed by Milton Fitts Construction, was transported to Schleicher County Medical Center Hospital where he was prepared for transportation to

Brook Army Burn Center in San Antonio. He was transported by helicopter to the burn center at approximately 11:30 a.m.

"The fire began with an explosion, but the cause is still under investigation," concluded Sheriff Harris.

"He has third degree burns on his arms, chest and back," stated Sharon Fitts.

"Right now he is holding his own - his body has not come out of shock to begin healing yet. His kidney's have started working and he is improving, but he is still in critical condition."

EMS Associate Membership Drive

The Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service (E.M.S.) will be kicking off their Associate Membership Drive today. Schleicher County residents will receive letters and brochures containing information about becoming Associate Members of the E.M.S.

Founded in 1974, the E.M.S. was simply a Red Cross First Aid Station, but by 1983 the service had advanced to State-Certification Status and continues in that capacity today. The Ambulance Service is manned by volunteers who have completed state-mandated courses and certification requirements. These volunteers, consisting of Emergency Medical Technicians and Emergency Care Attendants, receive no pay for their services.

With the changing technology in the health field, the E.M.S. holds training sessions each month, and upgrades its equipment as often as possible so that it may serve the county the best way possible.

Due to the soaring costs of maintaining quality service, the E.M.S. is asking the people of this county for monetary support.

Money donated to the E.M.S. will be used to cover the expenses which include continuing educational opportunities, obtaining equipment to meet the advances in technology, and meeting monthly operating expenses.

Private citizens and businesses alike are encouraged to become a part of this worthwhile organization.

Editor's Journal

TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

This Sunday is Mother's Day. Since I feel I have "The Mother of All Mothers," I figured one more story about Angie Giovannitti would fit the bill for this week.

I really think my Mom ought to be one of those Reader's Digest most unforgettable characters but none of her children are willing to stick their neck out that far. Remember, this paper is seventeen hundred miles from my mother and I can tell her pretty much whatever I want to about what I write in my article. You won't be able to find out her address either. I have sworn all of my family here to secrecy.

You know, if my Mom had been a young person in the "Sixties" she might very well have been a "Hippie." Never a slave to fashion, she was more interested in clothes for utilitarian purposes than for looks. Oh, she had a few nice Sunday dresses but as soon as slacks became acceptable for

women in church my Mom was in them lickety-split.

Around the house she had long been wearing Dad's old work pants, especially in the summer when she would cut them off for shorts to work in the garden. She also wore his cotton work shirts, cutting off the sleeves for summer. Those worn work clothes she claimed were very comfortable since the nap had been washed away and the cotton twill was cool and soft against her. Actually she was even a little more Bohemian than what I am willing to write down, but that is what makes her unique.

Although she would wear broad brimmed straw in the hot sun, her favorite hat was a welder's cap that she got her brother-in-law, Louie, to get for her. (Those of you who know what a welder's cap is know that except for welder's it is not a cap that is of much use to anyone. The brim is very small and so is the cap for that matter, being almost a beanie rather than a

cap. Welder's, I think, use them so that the strap that holds on their welding mask won't dig into the back of their heads.) Anyway, she liked the one she saw my Uncle Louie wearing and said she would like to have one. My uncle knows my mother well enough that he got her one of her own. She wore that cap nearly everywhere except weddings and funerals.

Everyone in my hometown recognized Angie, welding cap propped on her head, as a sort of "Yarmulke" of her own fashion religion, wearing cutoff men's work pants, a sleeveless worn work shirt, and riding on the last remaining girls Schwinn bike. My mom, in all of her proletarian glory dressed accordingly, rode that bike into the folklore of Paulsboro until finally age and a weakening heart took her off the bike. The cap she still has. I wonder now, if her real idea was to get her hands on that welding machine; but that is another story.

Insights by Dr. Lee Brewer

William James, the 19th century psychologist, called for a new understanding of our need to make choices in life. Each one of us must choose in life, for even to not choose is a choice. The way in which we make choices will determine the tenor of our lives. James said that people tend to fall into two categories based upon their choices: prudent or brave.

The prudent person takes a cautious approach to life. They wish to protect themselves and their lives. They understand risks and avoid them. This leads them to a life of general safety, but also general smallness of being.

On the other hand, the brave person (or "saint" as James puts it) is one who is willing to take up the

challenges of life, to take a risk for ideals and purposes which have meaning. Now understand, James is not calling for one to try sky diving, or mountain climbing, or some high risk endeavor of thrill seeking. What he is suggesting is that to find the most in life we must be willing to take a risk on behalf of things which have meaning and consequences. What we choose, and what we do, makes a difference in lives and in history and we must rise to the challenge.

The prudent person sees a need, analyzes the consequences to himself and avoids trouble. Nothing changes for the better, but they are safe. The saint, on the other hand, sees a need and takes the risk to meet that need. The saint not only makes things better for others

by doing so, but also sets an example of what bravery can do.

We need people who will show us the way to lead lives of courage and conviction. We need people who will take the first step when others are afraid. We need examples of those who will make a difference while the rest hide in fear. True life is not lived on the sidelines, but in the struggle.

We need people who have the bravery to stand up and say "this is not right and I will not do it." We need people with the courage to risk being different and leading the way even when others do not immediately follow. We all have to choose how we will live our lives. Will our lives make a difference?

Speak Out Eldorado

A Licensed Group Day Care Home is considered a small business and there are many state requirements that must be met:

1. As a director of a Licensed Group Day Care Home, we are required to participate yearly in at least 20 hours of child care training.

2. Our homes must have an annual fire inspection with a written report by the local Fire Marshal.

3. The gas pipes must be tested annually for leaks.

4. There must be an annual sanitation inspection with a written report by a sanitation official.

5. We must be certified in CPR and first aid annually.

We receive a minimum of two unannounced visits from the State Licensing Representative each year. At the end of each visit another Day Care Compliance Record is filled out and placed in the facilities file with the state. We also receive at least four unannounced visits from the USDA Nutrition Program to check compliances with their

rules. We are required to serve breakfast, lunch, morning and afternoon snacks, and supper if the children are at our homes during the evening. These meals and snacks are based on the four food groups and in amounts sufficient to meet the nutritional needs of each child. We do not serve junk food or foods high in sugar and salt content.

A minimum of 65% of our income is spent on food, paper goods, cleaning supplies, utilities, repair, maintenance, crafts, games, toys, activities, gifts, rewards, licensing fees, CPR and first aid certification and 20 hours of child care development education. Then 30% to 35% of the profit is paid to "Uncle Sam". For example: 6 children at \$50 per week is \$1,200.00 income per month, less 65% of expenses incurred (-\$780.00) is a net income of \$420.00. Taking \$126.00 for FICA income tax out of the net income leaves a monthly income of \$294.00.

Being self employed, we must pay our own medical insurance. We have

no paid vacations, no paid sick leave, and no retirement. We make \$290.00 a month to pay our medical bills, insurance, car payments and expenses, and personal items (i.e. clothes, medications, etc.). We were making \$.80 per hour eight years ago and today we are making \$1.00 per hour.

The Texas Licensed Child Care Association has informed us that the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services (PRS) is currently considering revisions in the minimum standards for child care facilities. Lower staff to child ratios, lower square footage, additional staff in vehicles transporting school age children, and lower field trip ratios will definitely raise the cost of child care to the parent or entity paying the bill. The increase in cost will range from 20% to 50% depending upon individual facility circumstances. Considering the pending cuts in the funding programs and the economic condition of the state as a whole, such excessive increases in the

cost of child care is unacceptable.

We encourage you to make a concentrated effort to respond to these changes. As caregivers, we feel that the community needs to be informed of the cost impact that the proposed revisions to the minimum standards will have on caregivers and parents alike. We have copies from the state regarding these changes and if anyone wishes to respond with their comments, please contact Vera Bradshaw or Donna Newton.

We, as caregivers, would like to thank all of our parents for sharing their children and for the kindness, support and love they give to us.

PLEASE DON'T LET YOUR DOG RUN LOOSE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS AT ANY TIME...

There has already been a verified rabies case within Schleicher County, and a man is having to take rabies shots after being bitten by a rabid fox!

The City Ordinance prohibits allowing your dog to run loose - even if it does have a City Tag! Now that the weather is nice and folks are out walking, riding bicycles, and enjoying the nice weather, the number of loose dogs has risen also. The

possibilities of animal attacks has increased tremendously. There were a number of rabies cases within the City Limits last year, and we have logged several animal attacks! Once a child or adult is bitten, it is too late ... just don't let them loose in the first place. Repair your fence and gates or keep the animal on a leash or tied.

Even a good fence and gate are not enough for a "dangerous" dog. Don't let it be too late for you - as a pet owner, you are liable for your dog's actions!

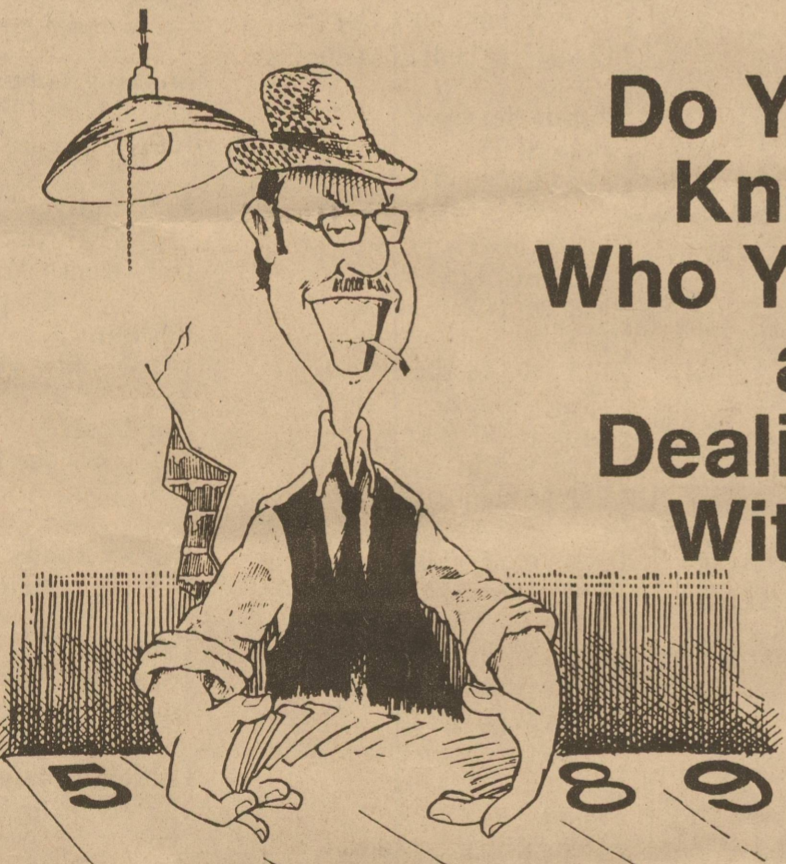

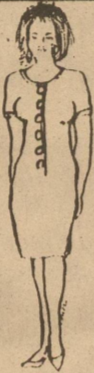

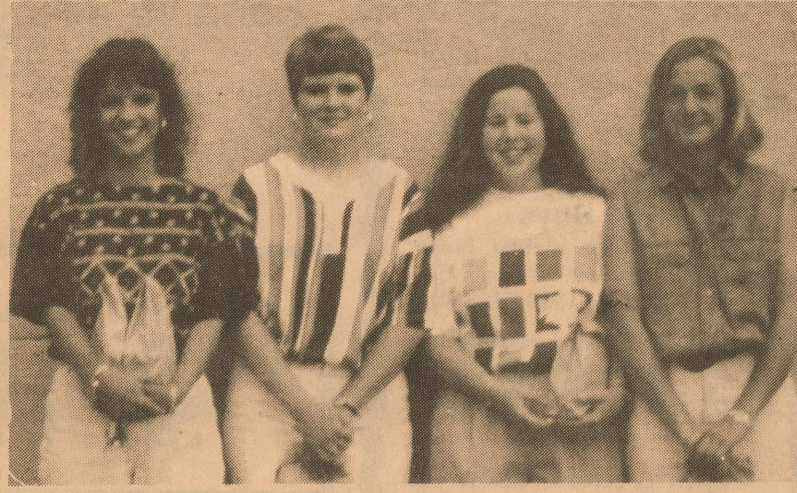

Caty will continue a long standing tradition at Eldorado High School. We have had at least one representative at the state tournament since 1987. This could be the year to win the state championship.

Caty's first match will be at 11:00 a.m. on Friday at the University of Texas intramural courts.

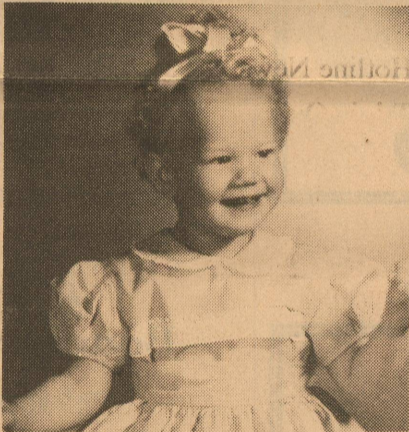

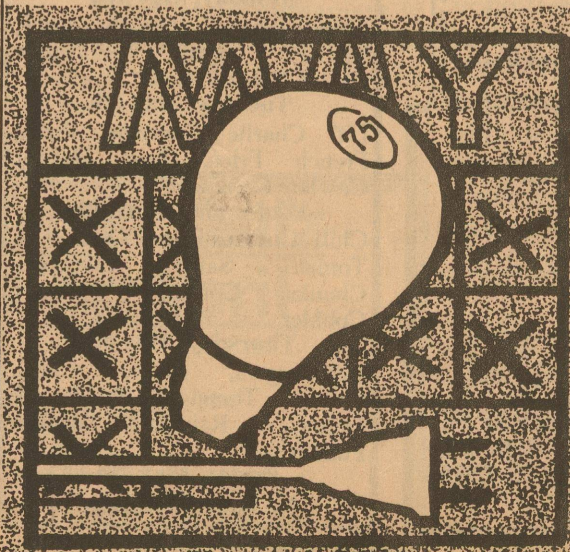

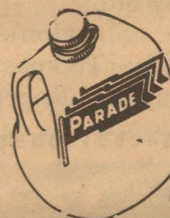
