## Town Meeting Set

The City of Eldorado will conduct a town meeting on May 18, 1993, at 7:00 PM at the Schleicher County Memorial Building to discuss current and future landfill operation problems and possible alternative solutions.

The State of Texas and the EPA have instituted extremely stringent restrictions on all municipal solid waste landfill operations. New limitations equate to one bottom line - more cost, hence higher trash collection fees.

For a number of months the City Council has studied various options which would satisfy the new regulations. The options range from continuing our current operation and spending

significant money to meet the new standards to closing our landfill and contracting with a commercial operator to haul our trash to another landfill. Whichever option is chosen, the trash rates will go up - significantly.

Since the decision has such community-wide impact, the City Council feels an obligation to present the alternatives in a Town Meeting format. We feel by providing all the available information to the public and receiving their input, a more knowledgeable decision can be made. You can be assured that your comments, concerns, and suggestions will be fully considered before the final decision is made.

## Chrisman Wins 1st At State UIL Meet

Five years of determination and hard work paid off Saturday May 8 when Senior Shannon Chrisman won a first place medal in spelling at the State UIL Meet in Austin. Earlier, she had placed first in district and first in regional.

"When I finished the test, I felt I had done pretty well, but I was scared because I thought it was too

easy," Chrisman said.

Participants in the Spelling/Vocabulary contest study a list of 1600 words. They must also learn 270 definitions. The test consists of ten sets of five words; one word in each set is misspelled. The contestant must find the misspelled word and correct it. The second part of the test has 20 vocabulary words with multiple choice definitions. The last part of the test is the writing of 70 words and a 20 word tie breaker. These 90 words are called out by a pronouncer.

"I felt elated when I knew the results. She has put so many hours into studying for this contest and she deserved to win," said Coach Linda Thomas.

Mrs. Thomas said that Shannon tied for third last year. The only other state winner she has coached was Henry Robles, class of '87.

Shelly Chrisman and Justina Saunders accompanied the state speller to Austin to lend support and help celebrate the victory.

## TOP OF THE DIVIDE by Thomas Giovannitti

Well, I have done one more thing to make Eldorado a little more attractive, I got rid of my old lawn tractor. Now it can rust on my brother-in-law's place near Waco. He lives in the country, so a tractor with weeds growing up around it won't look out of place.

I gave up putting in a garden since the weeds won last year. Oh, I got some fruit but the weeds took over about July fourth and never looked back. My sister took pictures while she was here to celebrate my 25th Anniversary. I believe she is going to try and blackmail me with the pictures by threatening to show them to my mother, the greenest thumb in New Jersey. If my sister tries this she will lose because she will have forgotten the most important

rule of motherhood. Sons don't do anything wrong, only daughters do.

Those of you who are daughters with brothers can confirm this. Mothers just cannot see that what has befallen their son is his fault. Our society is fixated on acceptance by the crowd. We cringe at the thought of being different or standing out in some way. Those who would dare to be great, however, are willing to be different. Those who make a

lasting difference are those who are willing to listen to the truth even when it hurts and make changes in their lives and actions.

Our modern situation has great need of those who will lead out by making a personal decision to learn, grow and be people of morals and values. The future becomes different and better every time one of us changes who we are for the better. Will we let the truth change us, or will we continue to avoid it?

## Living Water by Rev. Terry Allen

Today I would like to share with you a picture of God's grace. Put simply, grace can be defined as unmerited favor. Of all the men of Israel that saw God deliver them out of Egypt, only two were able to have a part of entering and possessing the promised land. One man was Joshua and the other was Caleb.

Let us picture in our minds the long wanderings of the children of Israel in the wilderness for forty years, and see what could have been theirs in a matter of days if they by faith had followed the hand of God. It is no wonder that the spiritual thought for the book of Numbers is, "getting somewhere by the grace of God". They could have gotten somewhere by the grace of God in a very short time. The place of God's choice for them after the Red sea was the promise land via Kadesh-barnea. Instead of getting somewhere by the grace of God, they went nowhere by their own

choosing. Let us look however, and notice the devotion of a man named Caleb who did get somewhere by the grace of God.

"He (Caleb) hath followed me fully". (Numbers 14:24) This was God's testimony of the consistency of Caleb. May we obtain an equally good report. To follow the Lord fully is to follow him with all our heart, to follow him through all hazards, and to follow him all our days. Except our hearts are engaged in obeying God's will, and participating in Christ's example; except we are willing to risk everything in God's service, and for Christ's honor; except we

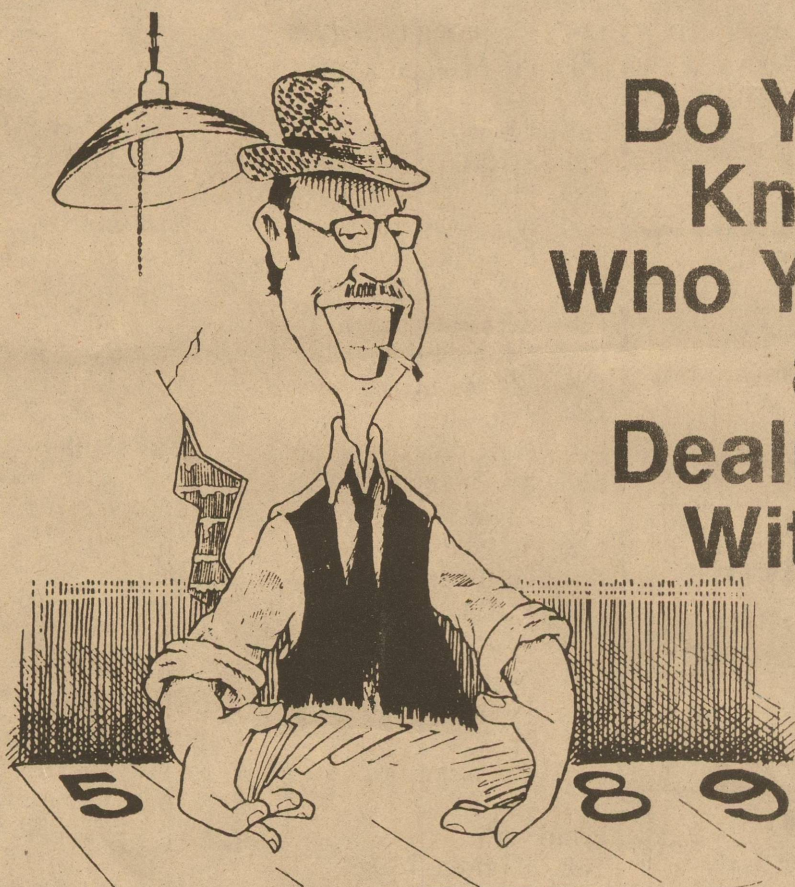

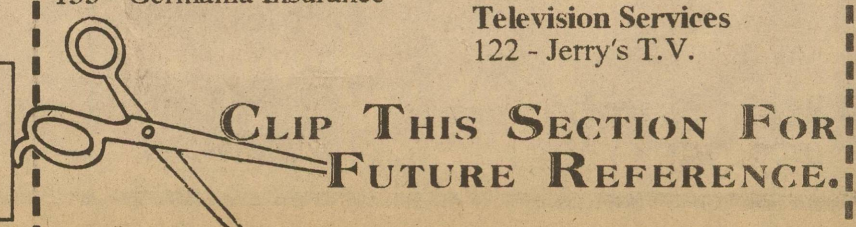

### Nolen Receives Scholarship



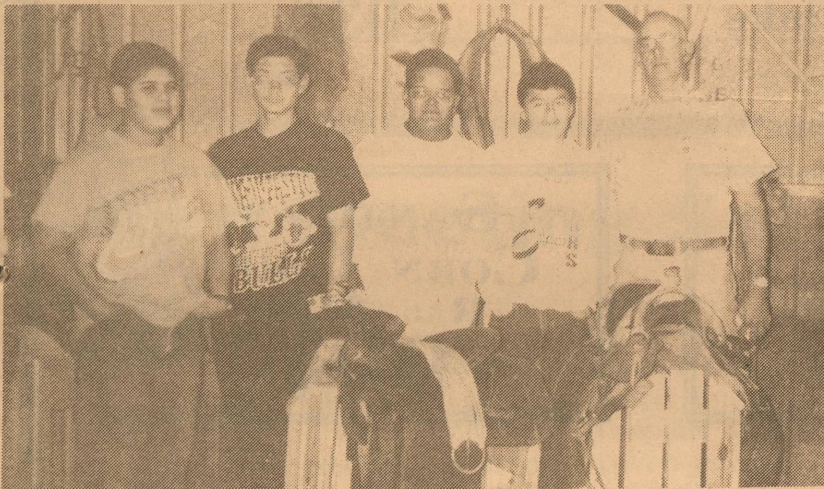

Barbara Jackson reported on the last RC&D meeting. She reported the RC&D is investigating the possibility of turning the Woolen Mill into a tourist attraction.

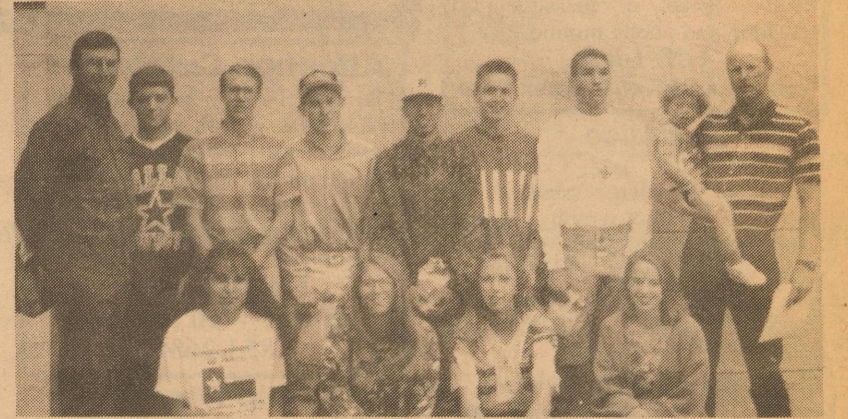

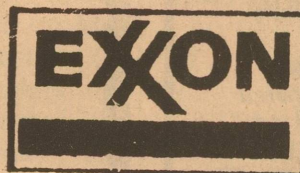

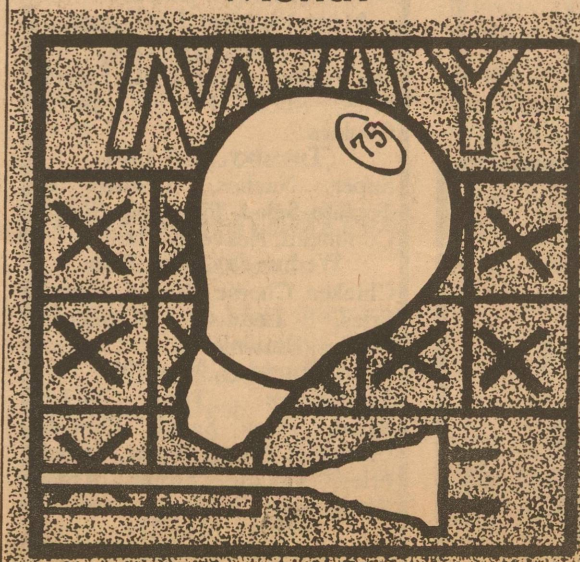
