Kindergarten Round-Up Scheduled

Tuesday, April 20, 1993 at 3:00 p.m., Kindergarten Round-up will be held in the Multi-Purpose room of the SCISD Administration building. This event will enroll children in SCISD kindergarten for the 93-94 school year. At this time, parents of prospective kindergartners will fill in enrollment forms, learn about the kindergarten curriculum, and meet the kindergarten teachers.

This event is helpful to both the parents and the school. Parents can pre-register their child for school, and learn what skills will help their child's transition into kindergarten. The school can get an idea of how many

students will be enrolled in kindergarten the following year, and get a head start on the paper work involved in registering new students.

Parents who come to Kindergarten Round-up will need to bring a certified copy (not a hospital copy) of their child's birth certificate, a copy of their child's immunization record, and their child's Social Security Card. In order to hasten the process of registration, the Kindergarten teachers ask that no children come to the round-up. If you cannot come to round-up, please pre-register your child in the Elementary office so your child will be included in the class roster when school starts.

Polling Places For May 1st Election

The May 1st election is rapidly approaching. Listed below are the polling places for the different elections that will be held.

All School Precincts, City Council, Mayor, Hospital Board, and Water Board voting will be held in the Memorial Building. Early voting will be held at City Hall.

All statewide elections, i.e. Senator, Amendments, etc. will be held according to the County Precinct you reside in. Voting for Precinct 1 will be held at the Methodist Church, voting for Precinct 2 will be held at the Memorial Building, voting for Precinct 3 will be held at

the Courthouse, and voting for Precinct 4 will be held at the SCISD Administration Building. All early voting will be held in the County Courthouse.

The school precincts are not the same as the County precincts. If you don't know your school precinct, you can call Betsy Thackerson at 853-2514 or go by the Administration Office before the election. A map will be available at the Memorial Building on the day of the election to help with you determine your precinct.

The last day for early voting is Tuesday, April 27, 1993.

Speak Out Eldorado

The South Concho River legal defense group, who opposed the Double Vision Dairy facility being located next to them, has made arrangements to refund Pete DeGroot and Jack Tuls their expenses incurred for the last year in their attempt to get permitted to construct the Dairy on the Byar's Ranch North of Eldorado.

As other towns now realize their opportunity to lure the dairy to their communities, the pie begins to get some what sweeter for the Double Vision Dairy.

Progressive economic development boards in the surrounding areas are so protective of their information that they reportedly will not give out the name, address, or phone number for Pete DeGroot.

It is reported that Ft. Stockton will be offering a large sum of money to lure the dairy to that area. Sonora, Ozona, Menard, and possibly Junction are in contact with Pete with their best deals to encourage his locating in their respective areas.

Each of these communities have become aware of the tremendous opportunities for economic development involved with securing a venture of this magnitude because of the additional business it will bring.

Bill Mobley, President of the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce, reported that in the last 5 years increases in dairies have resulted in 50 new businesses in their town. Last year they were listed as #5 in rural counties in the state of Texas with relation to jobs created and gross sales. They also, according to Mr.

Mobley, were listed in the top 100 small towns in the United States for "Quality of Life." There were only 3 other towns in Texas in the top 100 listing. (There are over 200 dairies that milk about 65,000 cows in Erath County producing \$150,000,000 in milk annually.)

The very stringent regulations of the Texas Water Commission, the Texas Air Control, the Department of Health, and now the permit process required by the Environmental Protection Agency coupled with the technology of modern dairies assure the surrounding environment will be protected.

An agriculture community such as ours is limited in the resources it has available to attract businesses to augment our local economy. If we really want to create jobs and expand our tax base we can't afford to let a bird-in-the-hand get away.

"Robin Hood Bill" Proposed

On May 1, Texas voters will decide whether to add a huge layer of new taxes on their backs. In the name of saving the public schools (the Big Lie), you're being asked to surrender your wallet: permanently. You had better show up to vote no.

You're aware of the proposed Robin Hood amendment to the Texas Constitution. Governor Richards wants to take money from "rich" school districts - yours - and give it to poorer school districts in the name of "fairness" and "educating our children." Let's get it straight: this is a call for a statewide property tax. And it's only the beginning.

New Taxes

Are Not Necessary

The judge did not mandate new taxes, only greater equality in school district spending. The Texas legislature already extracts \$7 billion a year from us for elementary and secondary education. But \$7 billion to redistribute isn't enough in the politicians' eyes. They want \$6 billion more.

This amendment would be used to set up new property taxing authorities that allow counties to grab an additional \$1 of taxes per \$100 of assessed valuation. This will be on top of the constitutionally limited local school tax authority of up to \$1.50.

This means your property taxes could go up to \$2.50 per hundred if this amendment passes, and you will never get to vote on it again. This is a potential

increase of 67%: a total of \$6 billion. This is the largest tax increase in Texas history.

Next: A State Income Tax

Local property taxes will escalate. We believe this is exactly what Governor Richards wants. She can then offer a deal to the voters: a state income tax in exchange for lower property taxes. This is the final step in the politicians' agenda. Numerous legislators speak openly about it.

A \$6 Billion Slush Fund

Today, \$7 billion a year goes from the general revenue fund into elementary and secondary education. The amendment will pull in \$6 billion more. As this money rolls into the newly created county tax districts, it will free up billions of dollars that the legislature now spends on schools.

We already know the standard scenario. Some judge will announce an "emergency" in child care or prisons or whatever. This will require new infusions of

money. The politicians in Austin will then raid the education money in the general fund.

As they say in Arkansas: "Whooo, sooiee, pig!" It's pork time!

A Loss of Local Control

Who will control the billions of dollars in these new educational districts? The amendment doesn't say. The legislature will make that decision only after the amendment is ratified. (The light dawns!)

On May 2, the legislature legally could create a whole new state-appointed bureaucracy to administer these funds locally. This would be taxation without representation. It's time to vote no.

Insights by Dr. Lee Brewer

Well, I finally have it all figured out. I am worthless. If people really knew me they wouldn't like me. I have never done anything worthwhile in life. This has been a bad day, but it should be no surprise since every day for the rest of my life will be bad. I will get

fired this week, never find another job and wind up a bum on a street corner. Life stinks and I am the odor.

America has a terrible problem with depression. Some studies suggest that at any given time 40 million people are depressed. When we are depressed we usually

think along the patterns of the statements given above. Our thought patterns are focused on the negative and disastrous. The more we think the more hopeless we become. The more we become hopeless the more we think about all the reasons we are justified in being so. More and more therapists are moving toward the conclusion that negative,

unrealistic thinking is not just the symptom of depression but also the cause.

One of the most popular and effective forms of mental health therapy today is known as cognitive therapy. Cognitive therapy holds that depression in most cases comes about as a direct result of the way we think. Our thoughts color our lives. *Continued on Page 3*

Bill Wade, 70, died Thursday, April 8, 1993, at his residence after a long, brave battle with cancer.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the First United Methodist Church in Sonora with the Rev. Clay Hall officiating. Burial followed in the Sonora Cemetery, directed by Kerbow Funeral Home in Sonora.

Bill was born July 24, 1922, to Ovid and Myrtle (Bray) Wade in Schleicher County, Eldorado, Texas. He married Fannie Sellman on Sept. 18, 1946, in Kerrville, Texas.

Bill was a prominent Sutton County rancher. He loved his ranch and always tried to take care of the soil. In 1967, he received the Certificate of Merit from the Edwards Plateau Soil and Water Conservation District. This certificate was presented to him for Outstanding Accomplishments in Soil Conservation on his ranch.

He always took great pride in his work - everyday a different job to do on the ranch. He was well-known for his black Angus cows. Each year at selling time, he always took his calves to the Special Stocker Calf Sales at the Producers Auction Co. in San Angelo. He always

received lots of blue ribbons.

Mr. Wade also served as a Sutton County commissioner from 1975 until the time of his death. He served a number of years on the Lillian M Hudspeth Hospital Board and also helped run the Hospital Ranch.

During World War II, he served in the U.S. Marine Corps. He was a member of the Third Tank Battalion, Third Marine Division. He participated in the invasion of Bouganville, Guam, and Iwo Jima.

He was preceded in death by his infant son, Joseph Michael Wade; his parents; his brother, Jack Wade; and his sister, Patsy Wade McDonald.

He is survived by his wife, Fannie of the home; one

daughter, Vera Joy and her husband Preston Joy, of Roosevelt; two sons, John Wade and his wife, Sarah Wade, of Sonora, and Pat Wade of San Antonio, and Lori Wade of Eldorado; six grandchildren, Cash and Chane Joy of Roosevelt, Johnna Wade of Sonora, and Joseph, Jacki, and Lisa Wade of Eldorado.

Bill is also survived by two sisters, Vera Wade Jessup and Neva Wade Boyer of Eldorado; two brothers, Ovid "Bud" Wade Jr. of Eldorado and Charley Wade and his wife, Trixie of San Angelo; one brother-in-law, Glenn McDonald of Eldorado; one sister-in-law, Geneva Wade of Eldorado who made his last days easier by being his nurse; two

nephews, Jack R. Wade of Austin and Wes Wade of San Angelo; and a number of cousins and many, many friends.

He is also survived by a special Marine buddy, A.C. Burns and his wife, Hilda, of Louisiana.

Pallbearers were Byrl Dillard, Ramon Gonzales, Warren Hemphill, Dr. Douglas Kappelman, Jack Kerbow, Stanley Mayfield, Bill Morris, George "Jenky" Thorp and George Wallace.

Special thanks to Rita Reeves and Mary Wiseman, both from Eldorado, of Hospice of San Angelo.

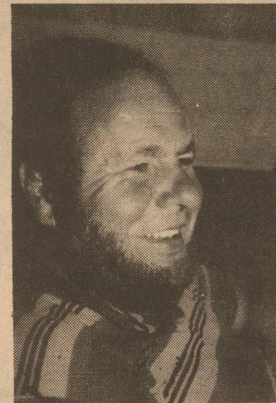

I am calling in regards to the comment in the Eldorado Spotlight questioning Barbara's innocence.

I have known Barbara for years and I can tell you that she is just as innocent as the pure driven snow of West Texas.

I have not printed or called in any letters or made a statement to this or any other publication until now: The main reason for the delay was to allow the judicial system to end its process and render its decision concerning the indictments against my son, as well as wait and watch how our basketball coach and Athletic Council handled or dealt with the suspended and at mid-term, reinstated players.

I have a much clearer view of how these situations are now. And to say the least, I, for one, am not pleased with methods used to punish, or teach our children, the lessons certain people feel the need to teach them.

When I first made the decision to live in Eldorado, one of the main reasons was to allow my two sons the chance to receive a higher quality, lasting education in a community where academics were a priority. Equally important were the values, ethics and morals which they wouldn't receive in an urban environment.

During the October 17th, meeting of the School Board of Trustees there was a discussion concerning complaints about two Varsity and two Junior Varsity athletes, after an article was printed in the Standard Times that mentioned indictments against these individuals, an

article which contained inaccurate information. These indictments pertained to alleged criminal activity during the summer months!

The board decided to have the high school administration and athletic council enforce a policy which addresses the athletes and their behavior while on the team, and to suspend them not only from athletics but all UIL activities. The policy was intended to set standards for our athletes and UIL participants and to help instill discipline as well as moral conduct. It is also a tool for the coaching staff to use when one or more of their athletes violates the policy, it dictates what action will be taken and to what degree necessary to resolve the problem.

My concern is the method used to enforce this policy and the fact that this policy is being applied selectively, and not applied to all those that violate it. It should be mentioned that the juveniles names were not mentioned in the article which is a federal law, and yet they were suspended.

I am extremely disappointed that the school board has allowed certain individuals of our community to influence their decision. The drastic measures taken have caused a dramatic impact on both the individuals involved and their families and has caused further embarrassment to the school.

I believe that the school board's decision to take such action was a mistake and has done more harm than good. There should be a positive, constructive resolution to situations such as this. After all, what is the message we want to send to our children? In my opinion, I believe the school board should be able to make decisions that affect the students and their behavior while enrolled in school - during the calendar school year and not during

the summer months.

In my opinion, I feel that this type of decision should not be based on a few "concerned" individuals' comments to board members or coaches, based on misprinted news articles. I think that the school board went beyond their jurisdiction, by forcing the Athletic Council to enforce this "policy", concerning these four individuals, and choosing not to treat other students, in the same manner, who have also violated this policy, (some of these violations have occurred after school started, this year). In deciding to punish these individuals, when their trial date had not even been set, gives me the impression that the school board believes it has the ability to override the State and Federal judicial system. Where, in their bylaws, is the assertion that allows this type of action?

They acted as Prosecuting Attorney, Judge, and Jury and in essence, found them guilty without Due Process (which is a Constitutional right). The board, as well as the public, should be made to realize how unjust this hasty decision was.

We, as taxpayers need to let the school board know how we feel about this and several other issues, and ask them these questions:

1. Why are there athletes and other individuals still participating in UIL activities who have violated this policy, which has been in effect since 1987, to include, individuals who have been convicted of DWIs (a felony), and several students who have had MIPs, and other violations of this policy, this year, to continue to participate in any of our UIL activities and not be suspended from UIL activities for the twelve month period stated in the policy?

2. Why is this policy, which has been in effect

since 1987, being enforced now, in such a vigorous manner, on simple indictments, and not enforced on convicted alcohol related activities?

3. Do we want to stand behind our students and teach them lessons to carry with them for the rest of their lives? Or, do we want to show them that one mistake ruins their chances to better themselves and learn from their mistakes?

A person should be held accountable for their actions, should learn from their mistakes, and go on with their lives.

In my opinion, the school board should

reconsider and reevaluate the policies now in effect, and take a closer look at the "selective application" of these policies. These policies need to be revised to be more specific and applied equally to all athletes and UIL participants, regardless of their last name, race, or who their parents are.

Every student at EHS should be treated equally and with the same consideration you would expect a learning individual to receive. This is America, we have basic Constitutional rights that are granted to all individuals, including students, I feel it is our duty to show our students that we are at least diplomatic

and impartial enough to treat sensitive matters of this nature with some discretion, and allow them to try to regain the dignity and self respect they once had and to learn from their mistakes.

A year ago we had these same individuals' accomplishments and achievements mentioned in the press, both the Standard Times and the Success, at regular intervals throughout the year, to include all athletics and UIL events. Until now, not one of these four specific, suspended individuals have ever caused any embarrassment or shame to the team or group of UIL members or much less the community, or school. The facts are, some or these people were and at the present time are still leaders among their peers, who are aware and accept the fact, that everyone makes mistakes

Think about it.

and still go on with their lives. They may not have the level of respect or admiration they once enjoyed, but they are on the right path to regain as much as possible. They are in the long Process of paying for their mistakes. Hopefully all of them will learn a very valuable lesson and grow and mature into the fine upstanding citizens they have the potential to be and not let this unfortunate incident end the progress in their walk of life.

These individuals brought enough embarrassment and shame to themselves and their families before school started. They were beginning to try to get this behind them when school started. Not one of them or their families expected the school or school board to be involved in any form or fashion. The Coaching Staff and Administration were aware of what had happened, this summer, all four of the individuals were allowed to participate in football with no mention of suspension or disciplinary action being discussed with the students or their parents, until the 17th of October, and was being dealt with in a positive, fair method because the alleged activities occurred during the summer vacation, or at least that was my impression.

I feel that these individuals' desire to participate in sports and UIL

activities displayed their intent to face their peers and the public and try to regain some self-respect, despite the mistakes they made; to show themselves and their peers that they were not going to let one mistake be the end of their efforts; to make something or themselves. A person should not be judged by the mistakes made, but by what that person does afterwards. We have all made mistakes, some more than others, but most of us learn and go on with our lives. Let's not let these individuals down by showing them a negative method of behavior by our actions or lack of actions. Let's try to be constructive and help them to learn that we are behind them, that they can overcome this and that our school and its administration are not as insensitive as they have seemed.

On February 3, this year a pre-trial hearing was held which, in essence, dealt with the issues that caused this unfortunate series of events to occur. At that time both of the high school students were made aware of the District Attorney's decision to not prosecute with a trial by jury (more tax dollars) under certain strict conditions, which was both fair and just to not only the students but the individuals who were involved as plaintiffs. There will be no

conviction or record on either of these two which could follow them the rest of their lives. The D.A.'s office conditions were very specific and were based on written law, followed to the letter, and perhaps a little more severe than I felt it should have been (monetarily only). Compared to the school board's irreparable actions, the lesson received will at least teach them something positive. It is very possible that each of the students will become people to be proud of and learn to not be as quick to judge their children or someone else and the mistakes that will be made by them or their parents.

And last but not least, I feel the school board owes not only these specific individuals involved as well as the remaining students and their parents an apology and an explanation for why they felt it necessary to deal with this issue in the fashion they did. Not that it will replace the lost time or that it will bring back the enjoyable memories lost for two students' senior year, but if nothing else, acknowledge the mistake made and make every effort possible to not allow it to happen to any other student and their families again. ***About the coaching staff: I feel that the coaching should be left up to the coaches and not the parents of the players, and if

the coaches are going to allow the parents to have that much influence on who is going to play or not play, then they need to reevaluate the specific coach involved. It should be emphasized who has the ability to play based on their past performance and not on who their parents are.***

These opinions are mine and mine alone. This letter was not printed to offend anyone or to attack any specific person or persons. The purpose of this statement is to make the public aware of some of the occurrences, and how they came to be, and possibly prevent this from happening to someone else's child and family, and only that. I am definitely not proud of the mistakes my son made, but I am proud of his achievements and still to be his Dad.

To The Citizens of Schleicher County:

On Saturday, May 1st, Schleicher County residents will go to the polls to select School, Water District, City and Hospital Board members. These elections will be held in the Memorial Building.

In addition to these elections, voting will be held in the County Precincts for the U.S. Senate race, and three (3) proposed constitutional amendments.

These proposed constitutional amendments will have a tremendous impact on the future financing of Texas Public Schools.

The following is a reprint of the March 11, 1993 San Angelo Standard Times article addressing the proposed amendments:

1. "The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the Legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county educational districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

A "Yes" vote according to legislative materials means you support legalizing the state's shift of tax base from property-wealthy school districts to help equalize school district funding; support limiting the amount the state can redistribute to 2.75 percent of the total state and local revenue in the state system; and support a County Education District (CED tax rate cap at \$1 per \$100 worth of valuation.)

A "No" vote indicates opposition to the above changes.

2. The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.

A "Yes" vote according

to legislative information sheets means you support prohibiting the state from requiring school districts to comply with state mandates to spend funds unless the state fully funds those activities.

However, the state would be able to get around funding certain state educational mandates if the mandates is imposed in connection with the Constitution or federal law or is enacted by a two-thirds majority of both houses of the Legislature.

This change would apply only to state and education mandates imposed after December 31.

A "No" vote means you do not want to change the way the state passes on

funding costs to local districts.

3. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive repayments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities and repealing the authorization for 750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the "Permanent School Fund."

A "Yes" vote according to the legislative information means the Legislature would be able to issue 750 million

in state bonds to make loans to or purchase current bonds of school districts for instructional facilities.

A "No" vote indicates opposition to allowing the state to help local districts construct, acquire or improve educational facilities in this way.

So as you go to the polls, carefully study the positioning and issues and remember to vote in both locations.

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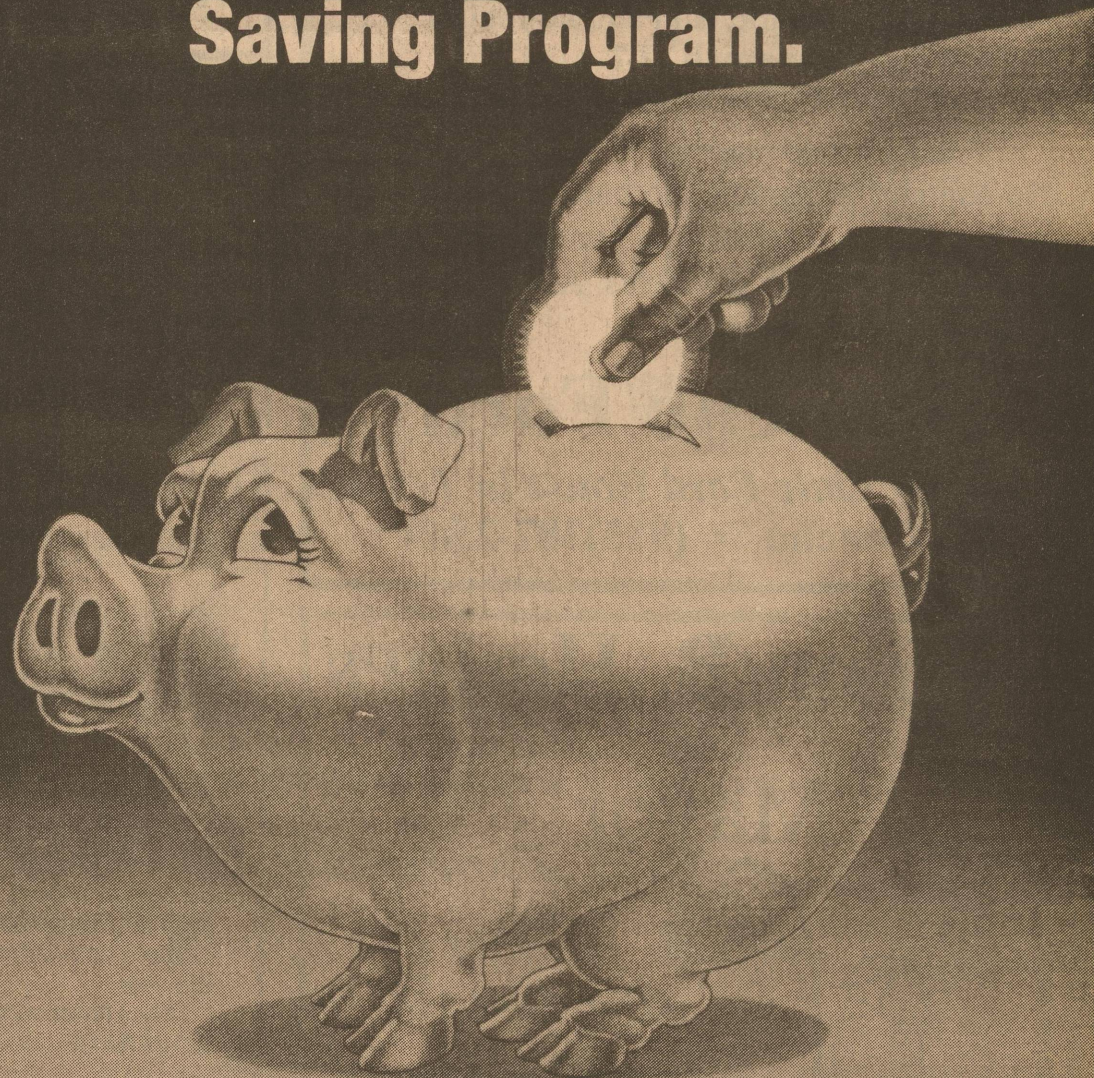
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1st Grade Learns About Recycling
