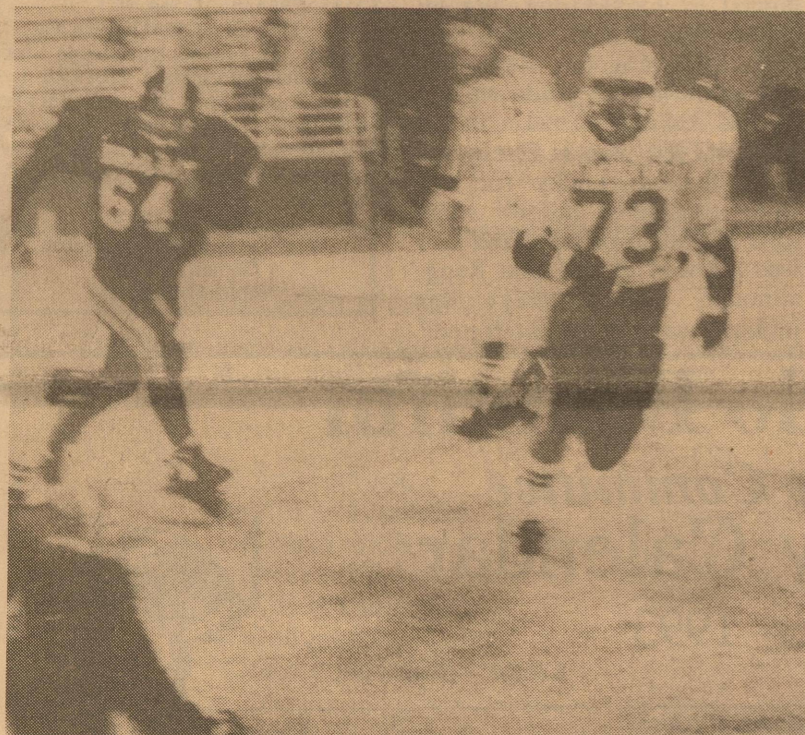

Cold! That may be the first word that comes to mind when thinking of last Friday's varsity football game against Iraan. "Awesome" would be another. The Eagles simply over-powered and out-played the Iraan Braves in every aspect of the game to the tune of a 33-0 shutout.

The Eagle's first score of the game came with only 27 seconds left in the first quarter of play on a ninety yard run by Casey Triplett. Robert Sanchez added the point after to make the score 7-0.

Later in the third quarter, Iraan had the ball on their own 33 when McCravey forced a quarterback fumble and Corey Edmiston recovered it. The Eagles recovered and on the very next play and scored on a pass to Reagan Bownds. Once again, Sanchez hit the extra point to make the score 14-0 at the end of the half.

In the opening drive of the second half the Eagles moved the ball from their own 38 to score 15 plays later. The scoring play was a two-yard quick pitch to Bownds. The PAT failed, leaving the score

20-0.

The defense then held Iraan to only four plays as they were forced to punt. The Eagles then mounted another scoring drive that went 67 yards in nine plays, making the score 26-0 with 6 seconds left in the third quarter. The Eagle defense shined again as the Braves were held to only 17 yards before they were forced to punt. On the Eagles next offensive series they turned the ball over on their own 40, giving the Braves their best starting possession of the night.

As the Braves attempted to spoil the shutout, the defense came up with a big play. The Braves attempted a pass that was intercepted on the Eagle 9 by Randy Adame. Partial credit for the interception has to go to Sanchez for his pursuit and big hit on the Braves Quarterback. Later in the fourth the Eagles took possession of the ball again on the Iraan 43 as McGinnis recovered a fumble. Five plays later, Wayne Jenkins took it into the end-zone on a four-yard run for Eldorado's final TD. Sanchez added the PAT for a final score of 33-0.

TOP OF THE DIVIDE

Next week my Brother Joe, the oldest of my siblings will be making his first visit to Texas. Joe recently retired. He had been a butcher for over 40 years and at one time owned his own shop, The Royal Meat Market, located in our home town. My brother was call "Joe Joe" as he was growing up. Many of his contemporaries of non-Italian descent thought the first part of our last name, Giovannitti, was his middle name, "Joe". That is why, I guess, they called him "Joe Joe". This helped him because he escaped having a real nickname. It is a dangerous thing for an Italian-American to have a nickname.

For example, when we were visiting New Jersey this summer the Philadelphia paper carried a series of articles about the gangland shootings of alleged members of organized crime in that city, and many of the deceased were guys with nicknames and last names ending in a vowel. It appears that the FBI had linked the murders of Antonio "Tony Bananas" Caponigro, John "Johnnie Keys" Simone, and Frank "Chickie" Narducci, to New York Genovese family head, Vincent "The Chin" Gigante, an underworld character noted for his novel attempts to avoid prosecution by claiming (at least his attorneys claimed) he was crazy, thus incompetent to stand trial. All of these murders, and few more, were all perpetrated to help Nicodemo "Little Nick" Scarfo take over the rackets in Philadelphia. There were a few other people murdered who did not have nicknames, but they may have only been bystanders.

Of course, guys with nicknames also moved up the chain of command in these nefarious organizations, but more died than lived. On the other hand, maybe nicknames are not the cause of their deaths since I remember most of us having nicknames when we were growing up.

Nicknames do not seem to be in as much favor as they were up through the fifties, so maybe the influence of television did nicknames in as a form of identity. Once we could buy jeans with someone's name on the rear pocket, or sneakers with the signature of some basketball star, we no longer needed nicknames. Who can say what has brought on the demise of nicknames? Once the adults organized our summer sports and we no longer were in charge of our own recreation there was no room for the improvisation that creates things like appropriate monikers for each participant. You never here a little league coach call his players by any other name than their given name. When I was growing up the only adult who could give a kid a nickname was his father or maybe a beat cop.

The nicknames I remember usually came from something significant, either a persons features or some event that altered his life, thus calling for a new name. My brother Carlo was briefly called "Fang" when a false rumor was spread that he often bit his opponents when he was wrestling.

My favorite was the one tagged to Joe Morina. We all called him "Rang" which was short for Orangutan. Rang was still in the eighth grade when I arrived. He had started with my brother Fred who is five years older than I. Lucky for me, Rang considered himself some kind of cousin of mine and so I was allowed to call him Rang, although considerably his junior. I was also his interpreter.

Rang was one of those guys who spoke English as a second language, but did not have a first language. Anyway, he got his nickname because, compared to the rest of his physique, his arms were considerably longer than necessary. (The calluses on his knuckles did not detract from the comparison either.)

Texas Commission For The Blind

The Texas Commission for the Blind offers a variety of services for children who are blind or visually impaired through the Blind and Visually Impaired Children's Program.

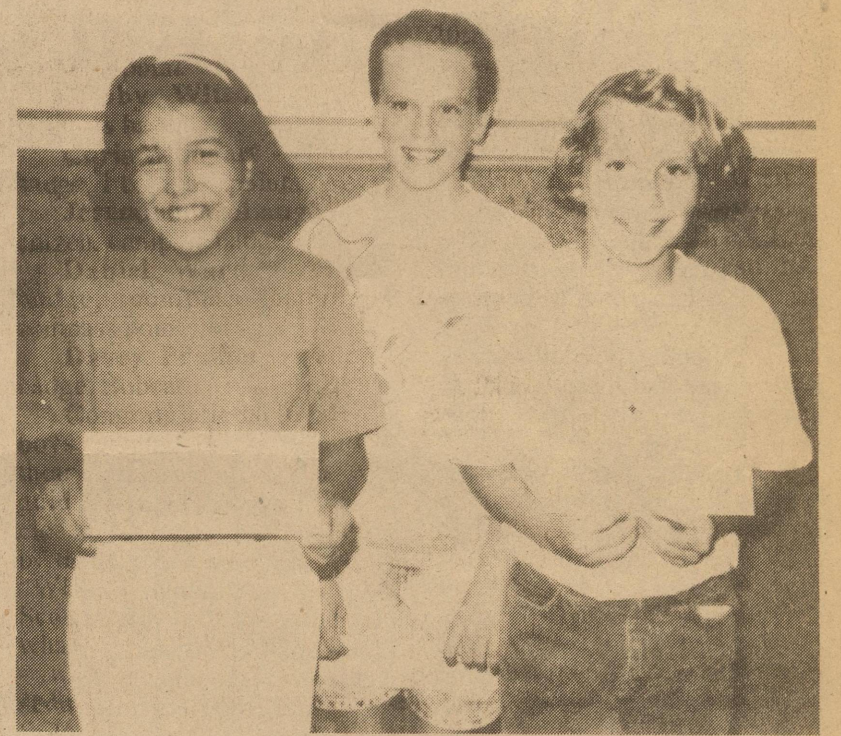
Early detection of potentially disabling eye conditions makes it possible to treat many of these children. In some cases, full sight can be restored; in others, blindness can be avoided and existing sight can be conserved and enhanced through visual aids.

Young children whose vision cannot be restored or corrected will need intensive specialized developmental

stimulation, and their parents will need an equally strong support system during the early learning years. Service geared toward physical, mental, social and emotional development are critical.

Prevocational guidance, counseling and advocacy all apply important roles. Dependent upon the degree of visual loss, various types of low vision aids and technological equipment are needed to enhance learning, traveling and communicating skills.

Through a caseworker in its San Angelo office, the Commission offers service to blind children and their parents living in this area. If you or someone you know has a child who is blind or visually impaired, contact the Commission's San Angelo office at (915) 949-4601 or call toll free 1-800-252-5204 to find out more about agency services. To find out when we will be in Eldorado, call the Community Resource Center at 853-2574.

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Information On Job Corps

For anyone with no marketable skills, life can be a day-after-day, hand-to-mouth existence that seems to have no end.

Without an education or some vocational training, people looking for meaningful jobs often run into stone walls.

The Job Corps could be the answer, and information on the program can be obtained from the San Angelo office of the Texas Employment Commission at 122 S. Oakes Street in San Angelo, or from the Community Resource Center at 105 W. Callender in Eldorado.

The Job Corps provides incentives for more than 68,000 students a year, and anyone who qualifies can obtain a tuition-free education and vocational training, and have a good chance at employment after completion of training.

Requirements for Job Corps applicants must:

- * Be either a high school graduate or a dropout;
- * Be 16 through 24 years old;
- * Be from a home considered to be low income;
- * Be from an area where conditions keep a person from getting an education or job;
- * Be able to complete the training and benefit from it.

Both men and women can study automotive trades, carpentry, bricklaying, plumbing, electrical trades, welding, nursing, clerical, secretarial, food services, word processing, electronics assembler, retail sales, appliance repair, heavy duty equipment operator, construction trades and others.

The Job Corps has centers all across the country, including San Marcos and McKinney.

"We also have access to

four centers in Oklahoma, three in Arkansas, and two each in New Mexico and Louisiana," said Melvin Cribb, special programs coordinator for the San Angelo office of the Texas Employment Commission. "For those who qualify, everything is free and the agency will try and place them in a job once training is completed."

Cribb's duties include recruiting and screening Job Corps applicants.

While at the Job Corps center, students can also earn their high school equivalency diploma (GED). The center also provides an English as a Second Language (ESL) course, he said.

Transportation to and from the center is provided by the Job Corps. In addition, once a year after six months attendance, a free round trip home is provided.

Anyone interested in joining the Job Corps or obtaining information, can call Cribb at (915) 653-2321, or call the Community Resource Center at 853-2574.

Cribb said he covers a 13-county area in the Concho Valley, including Tom Green, Coke, Sterling, Irion, Reagan, Schleicher, McCulloch, Mason, Kimble, Sutton, Crockett, Concho and Menard.

"I go out to the schools, probation offices, community service agencies, welfare offices or any location that has access to people who may be able to qualify for the Job Corps," he said. "This program is not just for troublesome youths, but anyone who needs that extra push and extra training and can't afford college."

Cribb said graduates of the Job Corps training have employment opportunities in a number of areas including clerical, welding, food service, apartment maintenance, entry level electrician and plumber, business and administrative support, nurses aide, and others.

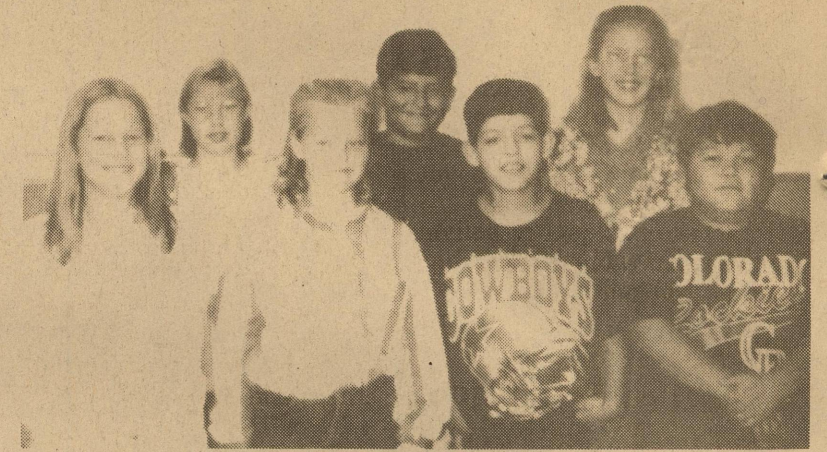
"They have the basic knowledge in many areas and can go to work for employers rather quickly," he said.

The centers have classrooms, dormitories, cafeterias, recreational facilities and offices. While at the center, participants are provided with free medical and dental care from doctors, dentists and nurses assigned to each center.

Training lasts between six months to a year.

In addition to the free vocational training, the Job Corps program offers free room and board and a clothing allowance.

County Agent's Report

submitted by Jerry Swift, County Extension Agent

Some critters just seem to like cold weather. Cattle lice and winter ticks are certainly among this group.

Lice begin to reproduce rapidly at the onset of cool weather and by late spring they average costing Texas Cattle producers about \$100 million

and skin exudes. Sucking lice are usually more damaging. A study conducted by Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist at Amarillo, showed that treated stocker calves had average daily gains of up to 21% more than heavily infested untreated calves.

Many producers do not recognize lice problems until

per year. They tend to infest whole herds because cattle bunch up more in the cold weather and this gives the pests the chance to move from one animal to another.

Lice come in two types - bloodsucking and biting. Sucking lice pierce the skin and feed on blood, whereas biting lice feed on hairs, skin scales

late spring when the cattle have much of the haircoat rubbed off trying to relieve the itching and irritation caused by lice. These cattle probably had high lice population since December or January and to make control pay dividends a December or January treatment is normally much better than a February or March treatment.

Pour-on or spot-on lice treatments are effective and reduce the problem of cold stress associated with sprays or dips.

Winter ticks also like cold weather and increase to peak population by December or January. The engorged tick is a large gray colored tick often seen around the tail, head or between the back legs of cattle this time of year. In a study conducted by Texas A&M entomologists, Dr. Tom Fuchs and Dr. Pete Teel, at the Hill Ranch near Sonora, the population of winter ticks reached the highest level the last week of December. In a similar study conducted by the same entomologists at the Winters Ranch near Brady, the population peaked on December 20. At both locations a single spray applied in early December provided season-long control.

Producers should check their cattle for both of these pests during December or January. Early treatment is the key to cost-effective control.

ASCS Update

submitted by the Schleicher County ASCS Office

A Farm Service Agency (FSA) will be established through the collection of ASCS, FCIC, and programs administered by FmHA except for the rural development program. The FSA will carry out programs relating to:

- * Price and income support and other related programs
 - * Supervision of the Federal crop Insurance Corporation
 - * Agricultural credit programs, formerly assigned to FmHA, and other lending programs for persons engaged in the production of agriculture.
- Not included in the function of the Farm Service Agency are Conservation

Programs (ACP, CRP, ECP, etc.) which are to be assigned to the Natural Resources Conservation Service.

* ACP approval authority will be taken away from a producer elected county committee.

In each county or area the Secretary may establish a county or area committee in which activities of the Farm Service Agency are carried out. The committee will consist of five members who are fairly representative of the farmers in the county or area. Three of the members shall be elected by the farmers in the county or area under such procedures as the Secretary may prescribe. Two members shall be appointed by the Secretary. The members shall serve for terms not to exceed three years.

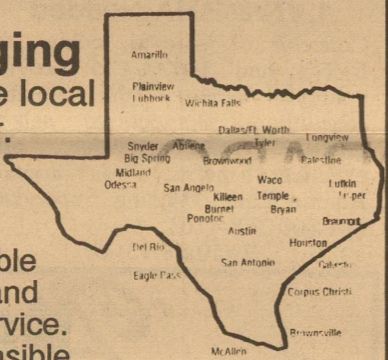
