## Schleicher County RC&D Council Update

The Schleicher County Resource Conservation and Development Council met on Monday, October 4th at 5:00 p.m. in the Eagle Dairy Mart.

The Council is working with Elton Shamblen, a student in Advanced Marketing Management at Angelo State University, to unfold economic opportunities for Eldorado and Schleicher County. A questionnaire is being developed for Schleicher County residents to get their opinions on economic opportunities. The questionnaire will be mailed out at the end of October. The RC&D Council is asking that all residents return the questionnaire within two weeks.

Some of the ideas being discussed are: the Eldorado Woolen Mill, Game Harvest Festival, Eldorado Working Ranch, etc.

The Schleicher County

RC&D Council is an important step towards growth in Schleicher County. The council includes city and county officials, members of civic organizations, church leaders and private business owners.

Some of the issues this board is trying to overcome are a declining tax base, business mortality, an aging population and general economic decline. The issues are a symptom of the general population decline in rural areas and the gravitation of their population to metropolitan centers.

"One of the current major issues we are facing is the effect of the Wool Act," commented David Hill. "This has put into perspective just how vulnerable our economy."

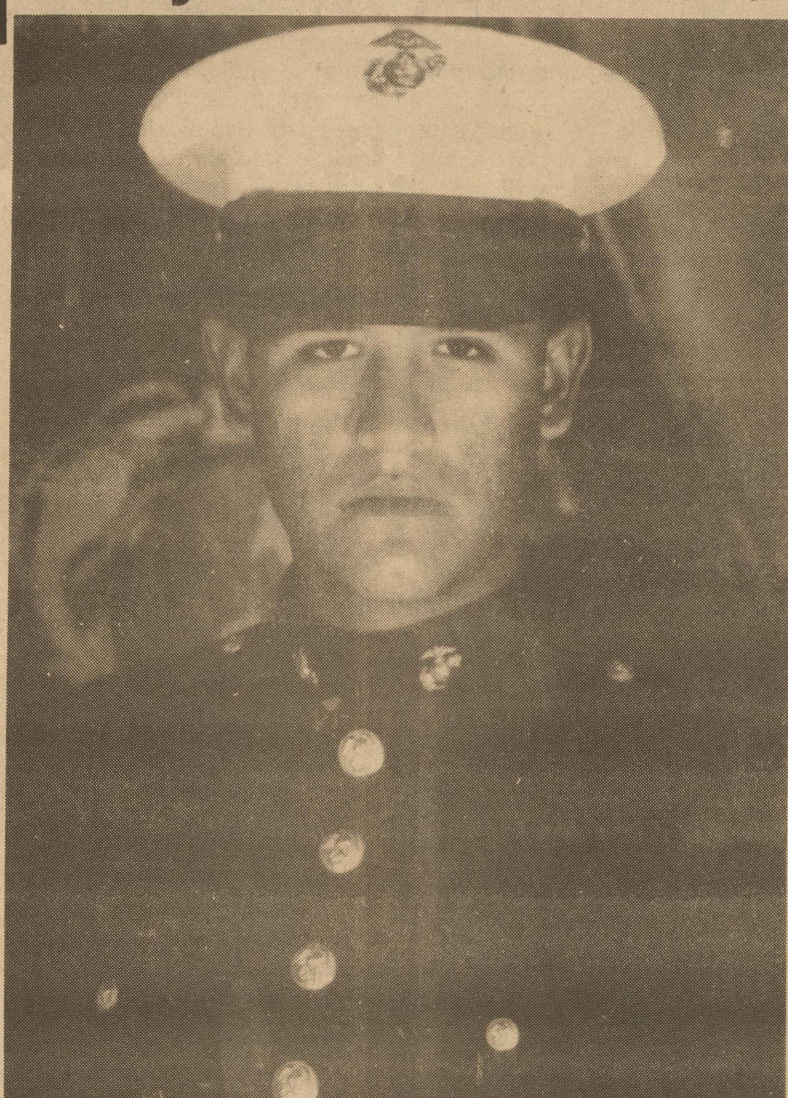

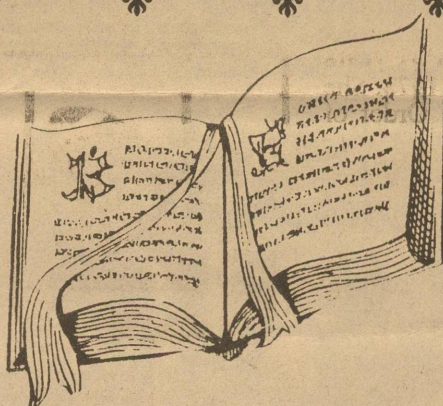

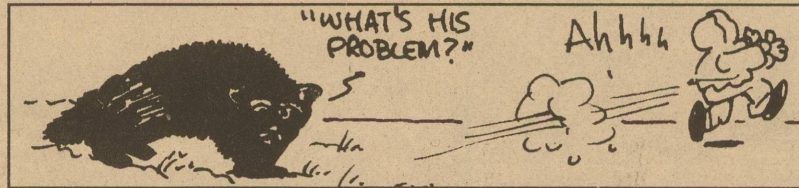
## Historical Society Met

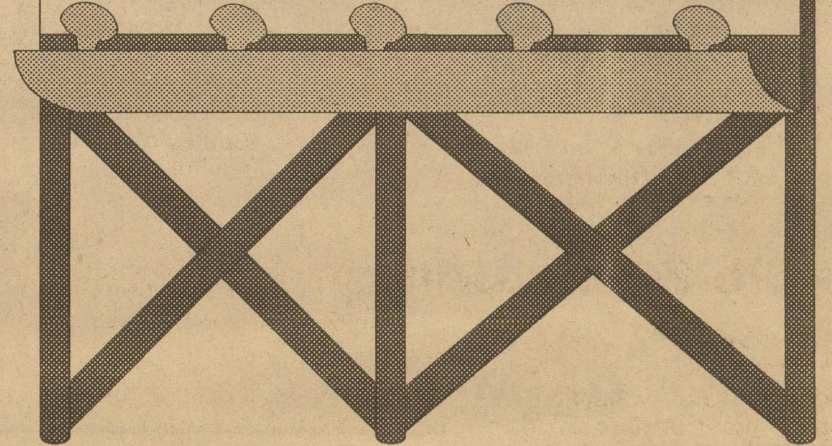

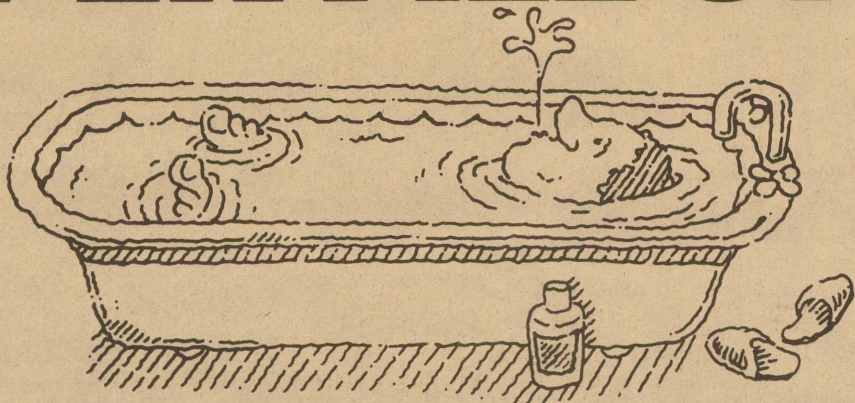

## Sales Tax Rebates For September

State Comptroller John Sharp today sent a total of \$117.4 million in September sales tax rebates to 937 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 4.7 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

Another \$162 million in rebates went to mass transit authorities in the state's six largest cities and to two city transit departments.

Texas cities received \$105.7 million for their monthly sales tax payments, up 4.7 percent from the \$100.9 million they received last September. Counties received \$11.7 million in September rebates, a 4.8 percent increase over the September 1992 rebates of \$11.1 million.

"Total employment in Texas has increased by 1.7 percent over the past year. The service sector continues to lead all other industries, by adding over 49,000 jobs since last year," Sharp said.

The City Sales and Use Taxes for Eldorado for

September 1993 are as follows: Current Rate-1.000%; Net Payment This Period-\$5,233.42; Comparable Payment Prior Year-\$4,551.35; % Change-14.98%; 1993 Payments To Date-\$54,547.47; 1992 Payments To Date-\$51,805.60; % Change-5.29%.

The County Sales and Use Taxes for Schleicher County for September 1993 are as follows: Current Rate-0.500%; Net Payment This Period-\$5,009.87; Comparable Payment Prior Year-\$2,999.53; % Change-67.02%; 1993 Payments To Date-\$37,584.06; % Change-53.95%.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected on July sales and reported to the Comptroller in August by businesses filing monthly tax returns. The transit payments includes taxes collected between April and July and reported to the Comptroller in June, July, and August.
