Building Bridges is now accepting applications for persons wanting to participate in our volunteer training program to be offered in the fall. Hospice of San Angelo sponsors this unique program that began two years ago.

Building Bridges was designed specifically to address the needs of children in grief. It offers understanding and support for any child in the community grades K-12 who has lost a significant loved one to death. The children come for six consecutive weeks on Monday nights beginning October 11 and are facilitated in small groups by trained volunteers. This is not therapy, but rather a time of skilled and directed listening to children.

The 20th Annual Sheep and Goat Field Day has been set for Thursday, September 2 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in San Angelo. The Center is north of San Angelo on U.S. Highway 87.

Sponsors of the field day are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX) and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES).

The morning program opens with registration and commercial exhibit visitation from 9:00-9:45 a.m. The remainder of the morning is devoted to a walking tour under the direction of Dr. Tom Fuchs, San Angelo-based Extension

Entomologist.

Tour stops and those manning them include: "Boer Goats," Dr. Frank Craddock, TAEX Sheep and Goat Specialist, San Angelo and Norman Kohls, Glasscock County Extension Agent; "Pasture to Packer Program," Dr. Rick Machen, TAEX Livestock Specialist, Uvalde; "Automatic Image Analysis Progress/polypropylene Contamination of Wool," Dr. Chris Lupton, Professor, San Angelo Wool and Mohair Lab leader and associates; and "Disease Losses in Sheep and Goats," Dr. Andres de la Concha, TAES Assistant Professor of Veterinary Pathobiology, San Angelo.

The tours will conclude with an optional stop on

computer applications for agriculture presented by Stan Beyers, Extension Economist-Management, Vernon.

A lamb lunch prepared by District 7 Extension Director Ken Cook and associates will be served on the grounds at 11:45 a.m.

The afternoon program starts at 1:00 p.m. under the direction of Dr. Brian May, San Angelo-based Executive Director of the Mohair Council of America.

The afternoon speakers and their topics include: "Special Updates on Critical Topics - Wool and Mohair Incentive Program," Pierce Miller, San Angelo, Vice President of American Sheep Industry Association (Englewood, Colorado) and "Predator Check-off Program," Perry Bushong, Mountain Home, President of Texas Sheep and Goat Commodity Board.

Also, "What Ranchers

Should Know About Rabies," Dr. Keith Clark, Director, Zoonosis Control, Texas Department of Health, Austin; "Sheep and Goat Breeding Research Plans," Dr. Dan Waldron, Assistant TAES Professor, Animal Science, San Angelo; and "Supplemental Feeding for the Upcoming Fall and Winter," Dr. Ed Huston, TAES Professor, Animal Science/Rangeland Ecology and Management, San Angelo.

ASCS Update

Eligible pecan growers, grower-shellers and importers can vote October 4th through October 6th on whether to continue the Pecan Promotion and Research Plan.

L.P. Massaro, acting administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service, said that to be eligible to vote, growers, grower-shellers and importers must have produced or imported pecans sometime from September 1, 1991 through August 31, 1993. For the plan to continue, it must be approved by a majority of those voting in the referendum.

Eligible growers, grower-shellers and importers must register September 27th through October 1st. Ballots will be distributed at the time of registration.

Growers and grower-shellers must register in person at local offices of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Importers may either register in person at the local ASCS offices or by writing to the Research and Promotion Branch, Fruit and

Vegetable Division, AMS, USDA, Rm 2535-S, P.O. Box 96456, Washington, D.C. 10090-6456. Mail registration must be received by AMS on or before October 1st.

Voting must be by mail and ballots must be postmarked during the October 4th-6th voting period. Ballots postmarked before October 4th or after October 6th will not be counted.

The pecan plan has been in effect since May 1, 1992, and operates under the Pecan Promotion and Research Act of 1990.

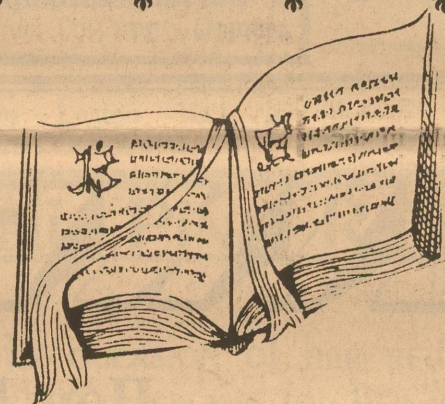

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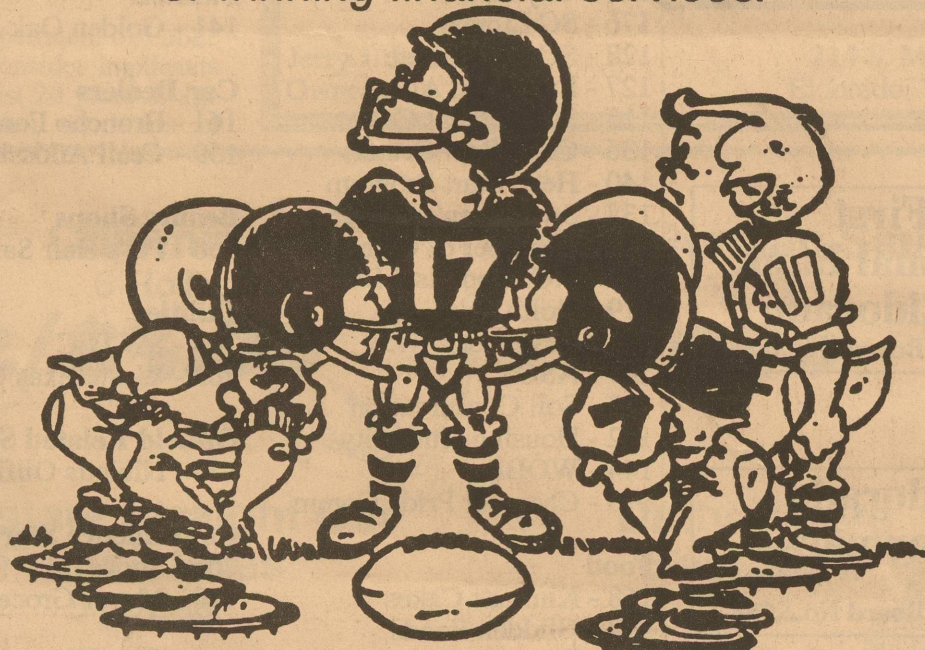

Westside Church Of Christ To Sponsor Speaker On Christianity In Russia

As everybody knows, since the fall of communism in Russia, the doors have been open to all religion. Did you ever wonder what it would be like there now?

In 1917 in Petrograd the Bolsheviks carried out a bloody revolution. Under the leadership of Lenin and Trotsky began its reign of all Russia and Siberia. In a historical sense, communism refers to all doctrines that have proposed a social order in which private property is abolished and all forms of property are held in common.

The only religion was the Russian Orthodox Church, and it was under such harsh restrictions the majority of the churches closed. Atheism has been the strict order of the government. With conditions like this for seventy-five years, what do you suppose it would be like living there? Do you

suppose there have been any great changes? What is it like living in Russia now??

For the past year we of the Westside Church of Christ have been assisting the Westangelo Church of Christ in San Angelo in supporting missionary work in the Ukraine. Brother Tim Johnson and family have been living and working there for the past year. Recently Brother Van Pendergrass, a minister of the Westangelo Church of Christ has returned from a months visit and work in Sumi, a city of Ukraine. He will be with us at the Westside Church of Christ on Sunday, August 29th. Integrated Pest Management USDA Requests Comments On

The Texas Department of Agriculture has entered into an agreement with Texas Pest Management Association (TPMA) to administer the biologically-intensive integrated pest management (IPM) grant program, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said today.

"Integrated pest management has been used for years by farmers," Perry said. "But we still need more farmers to make it more intensive and consider all practical and available control techniques. Production costs are such that farmers will be the first to use less pesticides if they can still produce a profitable crop."

IPM is a crop production system, in which a combination of pest control techniques are used. Farmers do not apply pesticides on a fixed-scheduled basis. Instead, they use control techniques such as pest resistant varieties, crop rotation and natural enemies. Farmers also change planting time to escape pest damage and destroy pest breeding grounds. When these methods fail to control the pests, farmers use pesticides as a last resort, and only when pest numbers reach levels that will cause significant crop damage. By using IPM, farmers can reduce their pesticide use by 50 percent on average.

However, IPM is very labor intensive because monitoring of pest populations is a cornerstone of IPM. Information must be processed on a continuous basis and decisions made on which type of IPM tactic to use.

This year, \$280,000 is available for projects that use and expand the use of IPM and for IMP research, a \$150,000 increase over last year's funding. The increase resulted from Senate Bill 1089 which appropriated funds from the Family Farm Security Fund to other agricultural grant programs.

TPMA requests proposals for 1994 fiscal year projects that implement and carry out biologically-intensive integrated pest management programs for farmer/rancher groups, on-farm/ranch demonstration trials and education programs developed from state of the art IPM systems. Proposals must come from producer, education or research organizations involved in integrated pest management programs.

"Farmers are environmentally friendly, and they want to reduce pesticide use," Perry said. "This program will provide answers that will help them do that and help expand the use of IPM in Texas."

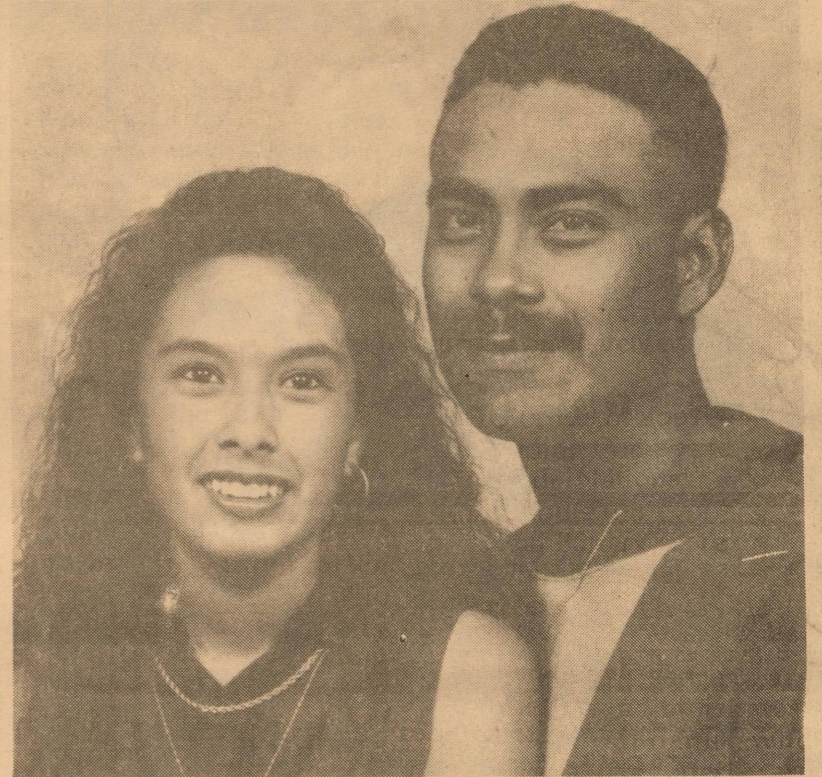

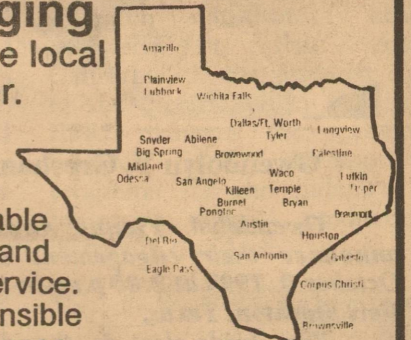

Upland Cotton User Marketing Certificate Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation is requesting public comment on how the "Step-2" user certificate program for upland cotton might be restructured and how the administration of the program might be changed.

The cotton user marketing certificate program is intended to assure the competitiveness of U.S. - grown upland cotton in domestic and foreign markets. The program provides for payments to U.S. textile mills and to exporters of raw U.S. cotton to ensure their competitive position relative to foreign mills and exporters.

The program, as currently structured and administered, encourages extraordinarily large export sales at the beginning of the program year. This may prevent the certificate payments throughout the remainder of the year from more closely reflecting actual market conditions and may reduce the program's effectiveness.

CCC is seeking comments concerning changes in the operation of the program to ensure that it interferes as little as possible with cotton

marketing practices, does not overly influence decision-making in the cotton market, does not unnecessarily commit federal funds and does not unduly burden program participants with paperwork.

This notice was published in the Federal Register on August 20th and comments must be received no later than September 20th. USDA will carefully consider all comments and determine whether program changes are warranted. If proposed changes are developed, USDA will issue a proposed rule and again seek public comment before publishing new program rules in final form.

TDPS Accepting Applications For Recruit School

The Texas Department of Public Safety is accepting applications through September 30, 1993 for its January 1994 recruit school - the first opportunity in three years for men and women who want a law enforcement career to join the agency.

Following 22 weeks of intensive training, successful applicants will be commissioned as state troopers for the Texas Department of Public Safety, charged with enforcing traffic laws on rural Texas highways. Troopers investigate accidents, recover stolen vehicles and other property, seize illegal drugs, apprehend wanted persons and perform a variety of other law enforcement duties.

After four years with the Department of Public Safety, troopers will be able to compete for promotions within the Traffic Law Enforcement Division, which includes services such as Highway Patrol, Drivers License, Safety Education, License and Weight and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Promotional opportunities eventually will be available in other DPS areas, such as Criminal Law Enforcement - Narcotics, Criminal Intelligence, Motor Vehicle Theft, Polygraph and the Texas Rangers.

The Department of Public Safety will consider applicants who are at least 20 years of age and have either 60 hours of

college credits or prior military or law enforcement experience. U.S. Citizenship, a Texas Driver's license and a willingness to accept assignment anywhere in the state are also required. An applicant must successfully complete a written examination, a physical exam, an agility test, oral interviews and a thorough background investigation before being accepted.

The DPS offers state benefits, and a starting salary for trooper-cadets (while in training) of \$1,720.78 per month. Following graduation, troopers will be paid \$1,982.82 per month, with a raise every six months for the first year. Commissioned officers also receive hazardous duty pay and monthly allowances for meals, uniform cleaning and footwear. Uniforms and equipment are finished by the Department.

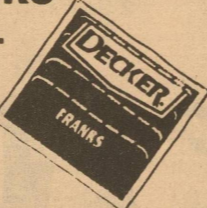

WTU, Parent Corporation Selected For Major Wind-Power Research Program

West Texas Utilities Company has announced that the Renewable Energy project it is hosting will also participate in a nationwide program. The local utility's parent, Central and South West Corporation, is one of three electric utilities selected by the U.S. Department of Energy and the Electric Power Research Institute to participate in a nationwide wind-power testing program.

During the next five years, the \$40 million program will evaluate advanced wind-turbine technology that is expected to make wind power competitive with electricity generated from fossil fuels.

Central and South West will receive a \$2 million grant toward construction of a wind farm near Fort Davis, Texas in the WTU service area. EPRI will provide an additional \$3 million of funding through a dollar-for-dollar cost-sharing program. The grant will allow expansion of the project to 6 megawatts from an originally planned 2-megawatt facility costing \$3 million. Six megawatts of electricity can serve approximately 2,000 homes.

Central and South West began its Fort Davis project in 1992 to investigate the viability of wind power and other renewable energy resources throughout its 152,000-square mile service territory.

E.R. Brooks, chairman,

president and chief executive officer of Central and South West, said the CSW system expects to invest \$10 million by 1997 to study how renewable energy technologies could benefit the customers of its four electric utility companies.

"Research and technological advances could help make wind and solar power affordable alternatives for our customers early in the 21st century," Brooks said. "We're committed to being good stewards of our environment, and we're proud that EPRI and the DOE endorse our efforts."

Brooks pointed out that research studies indicate wind power in Texas alone could supply approximately 10 percent of the electrical needs of the United States. He said the CSW project will help determine how much of this resource can be practically used as well as the environmental effect of renewable technologies.

A primary goal of both DOE and EPRI is wind-power research to lower the cost of wind power from the current 7 to cents a kilowatt-hour to 4 cents a kilowatt-hour by the end of the decade.

The new wind turbines to be tested in the DOW/EPRI program incorporate many improvements, including more efficient blades, lighter materials, streamlined designs

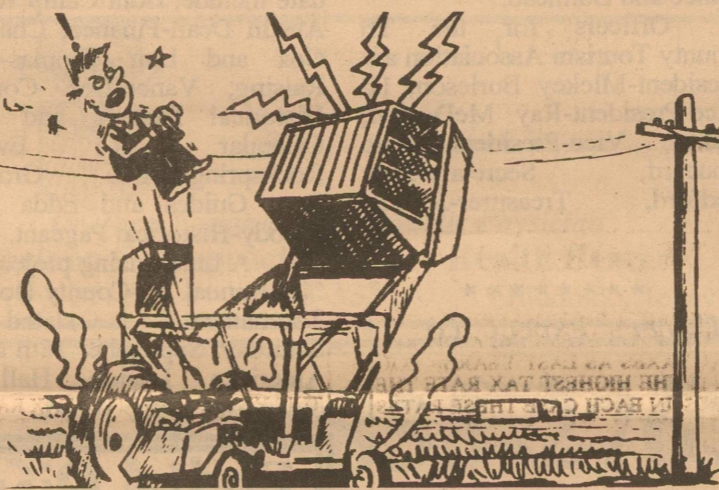
and fewer parts for reduced weight and cost.

The other two utilities selected for the program are Green Mountain Power Corporation in Vermont and Central Maine Power Company. The selections were based on the companies' progress in wind power development. Other factors included geographic diversity and weather conditions. EPRI and DOE plan to select two or more projects for funding in the second phase of the program, beginning in 1994. Twenty-one utilities have expressed interest in the second phase.

Central and South West Corporation, a Dallas-based public utility holding company, owns West Texas Utilities Company and three other electric utilities. These subsidiaries provide electric service to 1.4 million customers in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas. Central and South West also owns Transok, Inc., an Oklahoma intrastate natural gas pipeline subsidiary, and four other subsidiaries.

The Electric Power Research Institute, headquartered in Palo Alto, California, is the research arm of the electric utility industry. EPRI manages the technical research and development programs for the industry to improve power production, distribution and use.

Notice of Application for Waste Discharge Permit Renewal and Request for Temporary Water Quality Variance

CITY OF ELDORADO, P.O. Box 713, Eldorado, Texas 76936 applied to the Texas Water Commission (TWC) for renewal of Permit No. 10165-001 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 385,000 gallons per day. The City of Eldorado wastewater treatment facilities are approximately 5000 feet northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highway 277 and U.S. Highway 915 in Schleicher County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into an unnamed tributary of the South Concho River; thence to the South Concho River in Segment No. 1424 of the Colorado River Basin. The City of Eldorado has also requested a temporary variance to existing water quality standards of the South Concho River in Segment No. 1424 of the Colorado River Basin. The variance would authorize a three year period in which to conduct a water quality study of South Concho River in Segment No. 1424 of the Colorado River Basin to show whether a site specific amendment to water quality standards is justified. Prior to the expiration of the three year variance period, the TWC will consider the site-specific standards and determine whether to adopt the standards or require the existing water quality standards to remain in effect.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards the TWC staff has determined that the existing instream uses for the unclassified receiving waters of the unnamed tributary of South Concho River have no significant aquatic life uses. The designated uses for Segment No. 1424 are contact recreation, high quality aquatic habitat and public water supply. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the commission, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations and requirements in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit be specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval. The Executive Director has also prepared an order which, if approved would authorize a variance to existing water quality standards. The proposed order would expire three years after the date of Commission approval.

Legal Authority: Section 26.028 of the Texas Water Code and 31 TAC Chapter 305 of the Rules of the Texas Water Commission.
No public hearing will be held on

this application unless an affected person who has received notice of the application specifically requests a public hearing. Any such request for a public hearing shall be in writing and contain (1) the name, mailing address and daytime phone number of the person making the request; (2) the statement "... request a public hearing"; and (3) a brief description of how the requester, or persons represented by the requester, would be adversely affected by the granting of the application. If the Commission determines that the request sets out an issue which is relevant to the application, or that a public hearing, would serve the public interest, the Commission shall conduct a public hearing, after the issuance of proper and timely notice of the hearing. If no sufficient request for hearing is received within 30 days of the date of publication of the notice concerning the application, the permit will be submitted to the Commission for final decision on the application.
