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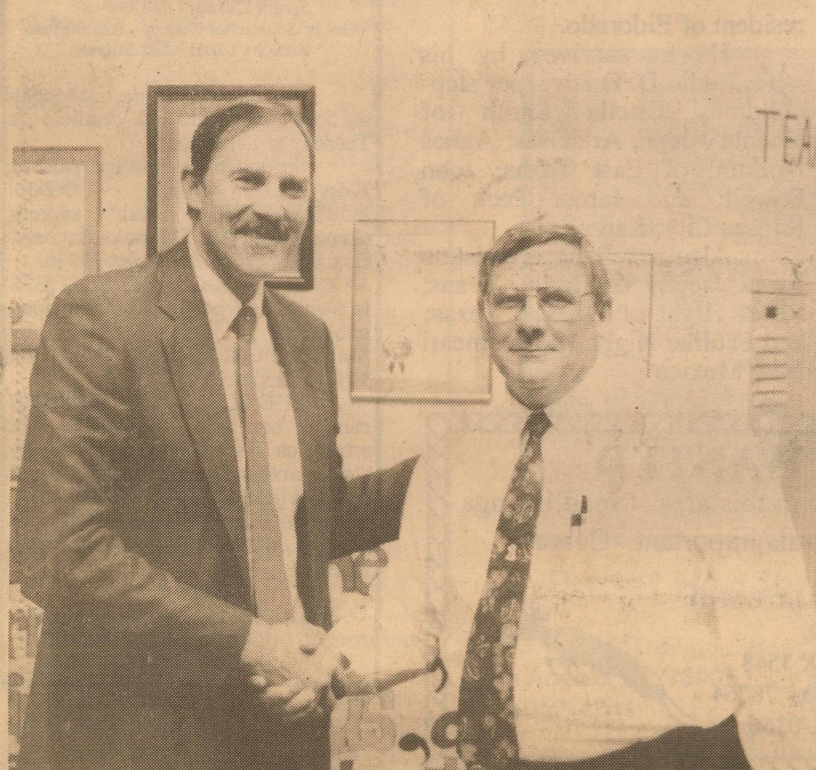

## Texas Commissioner Of Education Visits Eldorado Middle School

Texas' Commissioner of Education, Dr. Lionel "Skip" Meno made a special trip to the Concho Valley on Thursday, September 23, 1993 to visit Eldorado Middle School. He arrived at the campus at approximately 8:30 a.m. for a tour of the campus. He held a press conference from 9:30-10:00 a.m., before departing for Mertzton.

The purpose of his visit was to recognize the school's accomplishments as a Partnership School Initiative (PSI) campus and to show his support for the program. Eldorado Middle School is one of 83 PSI schools in Texas and one of four in the Region XV service area. Other PSI schools for Region XV are: Holliman Elementary School in San Angelo, Irion County Elementary School in Mertzton, and East Side Elementary School in Del Rio.

When asked his response of the Eldorado Middle School tour, Dr. Meno replied, "I think you are fortunate here that you have a Middle School that was already doing a number of things. They were inhibited by the rules that were in place. What we have been able to do is remove those rules so that they can do the good things that they were thinking about doing. There were other places in the state where people were being inhibited by those rules that weren't on to some of those new ideas and new changes that needed to take place to better serve the kids. We have found that the PSI program has really helped to get them started."

"We could have very easily made PSI a success by only choosing high performance schools to be in it. That wasn't the idea. We chose some schools, like this one, which were performing very well. We chose other schools that were among the lowest performing in the

state. I don't think that anybody is surprised that a year and a half in that some of those schools are still low-performing. I think it would be naive to believe that someone is going to go in and click their fingers and a year and a half later everything is going to be fixed. What is needed, particularly in schools where there is very low performance, is generally very profound change in the school operation and what needs to be done. That takes time. We will be working a number of those campuses across the state that are PSI and we will be working with them over that 5-6 years. That was our commitment when we started and we intend to continue that commitment. I think one of the problems is that an awful number of people are looking for quick fixes. There are no quick fixes. We have gone from a system where the definition of basic literacy was at a much lower level than what's required by the real world right now. We had a situation where 60% of the work force in 1965 could find a job that was unskilled or semiskilled. By the year 2000 that will be less than 15% of the work force. So, it is a very different world that people are going into. What we have done in our state testing is set the standards at real world requirements. Those are much higher than what's ever been required for the total student population before. What I am encouraged about is having set real world standards that we are showing substantial progress towards those. We have seen that in our TAAS testing across the state. We have one of the highest exit requirements across the country. And yet we have shown over the last three years significant improvement in the percentage of kids that are meeting that standard.

I think that there is every indication to be very optimistic in the changes that are going on in our school. That is certainly reinforced by my visit here today.

When asked what he thought about schools "teaching to the TAAS," Dr. Meno responded, "All of our testing is at the end of the school year where it should be, like final examinations for the year, so you won't have that. There's no incentive now to spend your first 6 weeks focused on nothing but TAAS. The other thing that is true is that you certainly focus on the learning objectives which are in TAAS, but that is essence what the essential elements are, which is what is required to be taught anyway. The only way that you can get better TAAS results is to improve the quality of your overall program and to teach what the essential elements call for."

He was also asked if there was any kind of curve or grading system to make adjustments for minorities in generalized tests (thought to be unfair to minorities). He responded by saying, "First of all I would disagree with the unfairness. Certainly, with some of the norm reference test that have been done, which are developed on this so called national curriculum, I would be in agreement with you and we have gotten rid of those. We no longer give those in Texas. In terms of criteria reference tests, which is what TAAS is where you are measuring exactly what you want the child to learn, those are culturally neutral. If what you are

saying is it more challenging to take a child who comes to school speaking only Spanish and get them to that standard, the truth is yes. It's true not because the test is biased, it is because there is a greater challenge to get that child there. Just as if you have a child coming to school who comes from a family where no one reads, no one has graduated from high school, there is no pre-reading done. That child is more challenging to get to the standards that we have established, but that is our job in public education. That is the population that we are working with. As a community's population changes, it is their responsibility to put programs in place that will basically compensate for that disadvantage that the child has. Certainly border towns have a challenge, but what we are finding is that, for instance, the panhandle now is over 30% Hispanic, we have a town up in East Texas, Mt. Pleasant, that is running close to 50% Hispanic, many of the kids have never been in school prior to coming to Mt. Pleasant, speak no English whatsoever, so if you go into some of your inner-city communities, you will find youngsters with tremendous disadvantages. One of the challenges that Texas has a whole is that half of our kids are economically disadvantaged. That is unlike many other states. We are a test case for public education and whether public education can work in very diverse circumstances. I

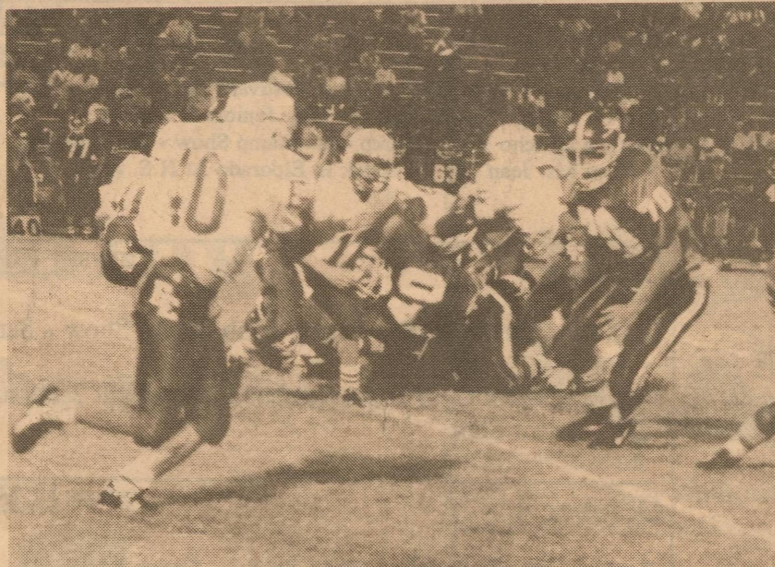
Mechanical treatment using small low-energy grubbers will also be demonstrated. Two hours of continuing education credits can

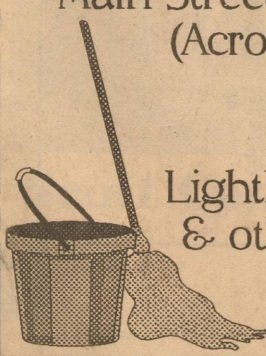

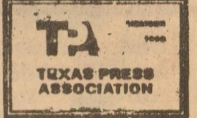
shoveling snow. I wonder, though, if avoiding those cold winters is enough compensation for living in a shoe box and having to empty the honey bucket every two hundred miles?

## ASCS Update

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy announced on September 15th that producers whose 1993 crops sustained losses in quantity and/or quality due to weather related disasters may apply for assistance through March 4, 1994.

The 1993 crop loss benefits will be paid to eligible producers no later than June 1994, he said. Payments in an amount of 100 percent of each eligible claim are authorized by emergency disaster legislation signed recently by President Clinton.

Producers eligible for benefits are those who produce commercially grown 1993 program and non-program crops.

Producers whose 1993 crops are insured by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will be eligible for payments for

losses exceeding 35 percent. Producers without such insurance will be eligible for payments for losses greater than 40 percent.

The deadline for all producers participating in the 1993 farm programs to utilize the so-called "0/92" provisions has been extended to Sept. 17. Producers may modify any previously made decision regarding use of these provisions. The deadline was extended at the request of many producers who notified the USDA that for reasons beyond their control they were prevented from meeting the earlier announced deadline.

Disaster aid applications may be made at the producers' local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service county offices.

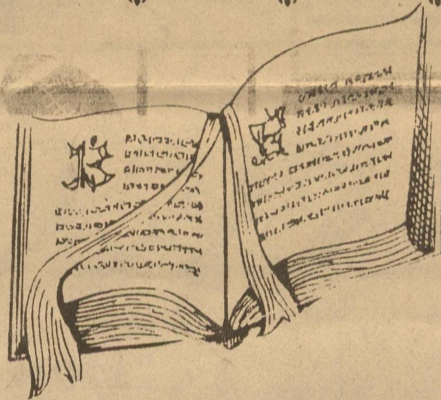

believe it can and I believe that people in Texas will respond. But, you are absolutely right that communities that have large populations of students who do not speak English coming in that that is a significant challenge. The other thing I'd say that it is a significant opportunity because those kids have already got another language other than English, which ought to be one of our objectives. I'd like to compliment this school for providing Spanish for all 8th graders. I think that is an excellent move and I think moves toward our goal of having everyone who graduates from high school being bilingual in this state. I think it is

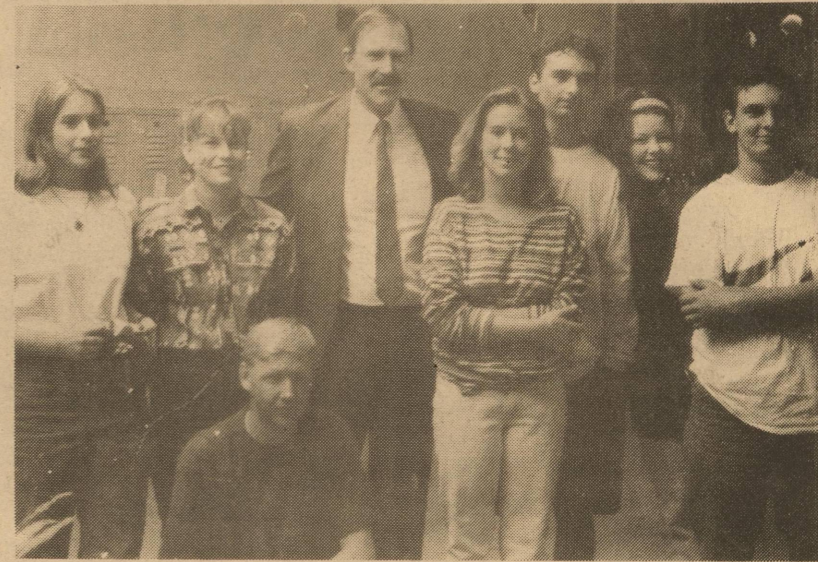
going to be very appropriate. Dr. Meno also stated that he feels it is very important for children to become bi-lingual. When asked what he thought about school athletic programs that cause travel of 200-300 miles, he replied, "I have said that I am not going to get involved in how local districts do their programming. I think there are so many varied circumstances that if I start poking my fingers in your business, that's a mistake. I will hold people accountable for the academic program. As I see it, part of my mission is to get the same level of excellence in academics as we have in athletics. If we can do it with the students in athletics, we

certainly can do it in academics. I think how local districts operate those kinds of issues need to be chewed out at the local level. What I'm interested in is the level of performance we are getting. If that is detrimental to the academic performance, then I think it is the responsibility of the community to figure out how to avoid that. For the state to get involved in trying to figure out this communities travel plans, I think would be a major mistake. I have enough problems without dealing with that.

Dr. Meno stated that he does not support mandatory consolidation of schools.

Dr. Meno stated that he does not feel that colleges are preparing teachers to meet the current expectations. "We are presently completely revamping our system of accountability for higher education, which will be very similar to the one that you are held accountable for. We are interested in working with them to

specifically define the product that they are to deliver, and develop indicators just like we have with TAAS and drop-out and so forth, in terms of their performance. They will be accredited in the future on the basis of their ability to deliver those students. We think that's the direction we need to go. We are very encouraged by the professionals in centers for professional development that have been funded by the legislature, beginning about two-and-a-half years ago. There's some very innovative practice that's coming out where the institutions of higher learning are coming out in some schools. I visited one yesterday where all of the field training of the teachers is site-based in campuses where people are actually learning how to teach in schools, which is kind of a novel idea. That's what's happening now and that's an encouraging development, but we have a long way to go.

The Good Neighbor Extension Club held its opening meeting for the 1993-94 year on Tuesday, October 21st at 12:00 noon in the home of Eleanor Powell's.

Those attending the meeting were: Nancy Lester, Marguerite Gillespy, Ola Ruth Barbee, Eleanor Powell, Carolyn Doran and Linda Daniels.

Nancy Lester presented a program on the new food labeling guides. She gave a quiz on the labeling. The quiz and answer follow:

### TRUE OR FALSE QUIZ

1. Daily Values are the new reference numbers on nutrition labels.

**True.** The % Daily Value gives a general idea of a food's nutrient contributions to a 2,000 calorie reference diet.

2. % Daily Values shows how a food fits into a 2,000 calorie reference diet.

**True.** The % Daily Value for fat on the nutrition label is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet. The % Daily Values for saturated fat, total carbohydrate, dietary fiber, and protein (if listed) are also based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet.

3. Similar products have similar serving sizes.

**True.** Similar products have similar serving sizes. This makes it easier to compare products.

4. The % Daily Value gives a general idea of a food's nutrient contribution to a 2,000 calorie reference diet.

**True.** The % Daily Value gives a general idea of a food's nutrient contributions to the total daily diet. The % Daily Value for

total fat, saturated fat, total carbohydrate, dietary fiber, and protein (if listed) is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet.

5. Calories from fat are the number of calories that are supplied by fat in a serving of food.

**True.** Calories from fat are the number of calories that are supplied by fat in a serving of food.

6. Everyone should eat the Daily Value of fat.

**False.** The Daily Value for fat (less than 65 grams) is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Your daily fat needs may be less than or more than 65 grams, depending on how many calories you eat.

7. Reading labels is a good way to see how much saturated fat

is in a serving of food.

**True.** The Daily Value for saturated fat (less than 20 grams) is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet. Your daily saturated fat intake may be less than or more than 20 grams, depending on how many calories you eat.

8. A "cholesterol free" food has less than 2 milligrams of cholesterol.

**True.** It also contains 2 grams or less saturated fat.

9. A "low sodium" food contains 70 milligrams or less of sodium.

**False.** A "low sodium" food contains 140 milligrams or less sodium.

10. The Daily Value for

carbohydrate on the nutrition label is 300 grams.

**True.** The Daily Value for carbohydrate on the label is 300 grams. This number is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet that has about 60 percent of calories from total carbohydrate. Your daily total carbohydrate needs may be less than or more than this number depending on how many calories you eat.

11. The Daily Value for fiber on the nutrition label is 10 grams.

**False.** The Daily Value for fiber on the nutrition label is 25 grams. This number is based on a 2,000 calorie reference diet that has about 11.5 grams of fiber per 1,000 calories. Your daily fiber needs may be less than or more

than this number, depending on the number of calories you eat.

12. The % Daily Value for vitamins and minerals gives a general idea of a food's vitamin and mineral contribution to the total daily diet.

**True.** The % Daily Value for vitamins and minerals gives a general idea of a food's vitamin and mineral contributions to the total daily diet.

13. The nutrition label must always list 20 vitamins and minerals.

**False.** The manufacturer is required to list two vitamins and two minerals: vitamins A and C, calcium, and iron. The manufacturer must also list vitamins or minerals if a claim is made about, or a food is fortified
