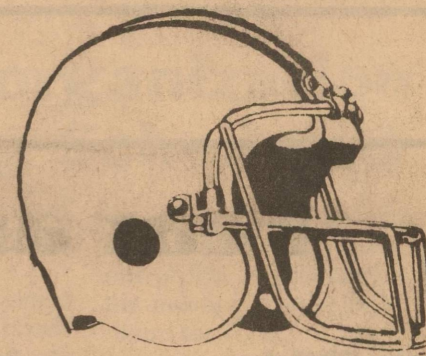

SCMC Lowers Tax Rate

In 1989, Schleicher County residents were informed that its Medical Center was in serious financial trouble. A significant tax increase was needed to keep the hospital open.

On January 20, 1990, Schleicher County residents went to the polls in a rollback election to determine if Schleicher County would have a hospital. At that time it was estimated 8 years would be required to get on solid financial footing. Further, the Board, Management and Staff made a promise to lower taxes once it was accomplished.

On August 23, 1993, the Schleicher County Hospital District Board of Directors

voted to decrease its tax rate by 13.3%. This was accomplished by a great deal of cost cutting and sacrifice. It was also accomplished through the public's support and use.

At the Medical Center, we will continue to strive for high quality health services to all people. The next time you see a person who is associated with the Medical Center, you may want to say, "Thanks, for a job well done."

New Uniforms For Brownie Girl Scouts

No longer just the signature brown, this year's Brownie Girl Scouts (ages 6 to 8) will be sporting blue chambray-look shirts, floral-topped jumpers, and short, gathered skirts. They may also choose a western-style belt and fun T-shirts to complement the new colorful components.

Traditionalists can find comfort that some elements remain. Girls may still choose to wear the familiar Brownie Girl Scout beanie and will wear a sash or vest to display the official recognitions they've earned.

The change in the uniform is based on two years of research involving interviews, surveys, and focus groups across the country. Responses from girls who previewed the new uniform components were very positive: "It's really pretty." "Very comfortable." "I'd buy it for a million dollars!"

The new uniform design is part of a complete program update for younger girls and is

the result of the Girl Scout organization's commitment to remain contemporary. Other changes include additions to the Daisy Girl Scout (ages 5 to 6) uniform, and revisions in the Daisy and Brownie Girl Scout handbooks.

"Girl Scouting is as relevant today as it was 80 years ago," said Mary Rose Main, national executive director for Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. (GSUSA). "But girls of each generation face different challenges, so we continually review and update our resources to meet contemporary needs."

The new uniforms are available for purchase at the council-operated shop in San Angelo. Purchase of a uniform is not required to join Girl Scouting.

With over 3.5 million members, GSUSA is the largest voluntary organization for girls in the world. Its sole focus is to meet the special needs of girls from diverse racial, ethnic, socioeconomic, and religious backgrounds.

Establish Homework Guidelines Early

For young children, settling in to a good homework routine is the best lesson they can learn.

"Homework begins as early as kindergarten and first grade," said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "These early years are the time for parents to lay the foundation for good study habits."

Eddins believes children's experiences in learning basic skills taught in the early grades will set the tone for how they perceive the rest of school.

To begin a homework routine, she recommends that parents teach by example.

"When it is time to do homework, sit nearby with some work of your own," Eddins said. "This way you give your child an idea of how to do homework."

Flexibility is the next key in creating the right homework environment. Eddins cautions parents to remember that what works for them may not be right for their child.

"A child's attention span is much shorter," she said. "You may need uninterrupted quiet to get work done, but your child

may need short breaks."

Eddins warns parents not to let struggles arise over these differences.

"Some children may like music or television in the background or may need a play period before settling down to work," Eddins said. "The important thing is to experiment and learn what works best for your child."

As homework guidelines are established, Eddins encourages parents to let the child play a key role in the decision-making process.

For example, if a parent feels that listening to music is becoming detrimental, Eddins suggests talking it over with the child and trying homework without music for a week to see how it goes.

"If your child has trouble establishing a good routine, help them set time limits for completion," Eddins said. "Gradually you and your child will find what works best."

Homework success also depends on good communication between the parents and teacher. Parents should learn what the school expects of the child and of the parents.

Teachers can establish a system for sending home written notices of homework assignments if a child is having difficulty remembering to do homework or failing to tell the parents about homework.

As grades begin to come in, Eddins urges parents to acknowledge both the successes and the failures.

"The best reward is that parents take notice and admire their child's efforts in school," Eddins said.

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Eating For Good Health

Your mother was right when she said, "You are what you eat."

Experts at the DeBakey Heart Center of Baylor College of Medicine and The Methodist Hospital in Houston agree what we eat plays an important role in reducing heart disease risk, controlling high blood pressure and diabetes, and preventing and treating obesity.

Eating for good health does not require large doses of vitamins and minerals or purchasing special foods, according to Lynn Scott, R.D., director of Baylor's Diet Modification Clinic and co-author of "The Living Heart

Diet" and "The Living Heart Brand Name Shopper's Guide."

The key to healthy eating, Scott said, is eating a well-balanced diet that included a variety of foods.

For healthy eating, Scott recommends following the basic, daily guidelines of the American Heart Association and the National Cholesterol Education Program:

- * Less than 30 percent of calories from fat (to determine grams of fat for the whole day, multiply your daily calories by 0.30 and divide by 9).
- * Less than 10 percent of

calories from saturated fat such as meat fat, poultry skin, butter, fat in dairy products, tropical oils, cocoa butter and coconut (to determine grams of saturated fat for the whole day, divide total daily grams of fat by 3).

- * Less than 300 milligrams of cholesterol.
- * 50 to 55 percent of calories from carbohydrates such as bread, cereal, pasta and starchy vegetables.
- * 15 to 20 percent of calories from protein.
- * Five servings of fruits and vegetables, preferably fresh or frozen.
- * Consume total calories to reach and maintain desirable body weight.

In addition, Scott recommends that daily servings of meat, poultry and fish total no more than 6 ounces, cooked, and that dairy products be low-fat or fat-free. People who need to lower cholesterol should also limit egg yolks to three a week.

Recent research indicates antioxidants (vitamins A, C and E and beta carotene) may help reduce risk for cancer, immune diseases, cataracts, aging and heart disease. Scott recommends selecting foods that are concentrated sources of these substances when choosing vegetables and fruits. Carrots, broccoli, spinach, yams, oranges, bananas and pumpkin are good choices.

"It is much better to get the vitamins and minerals we know are beneficial from food rather than from supplements,"

Scott said. "Supplements can cause side effects and consuming too much of some vitamins and minerals can be toxic."

Adhering to a healthy eating lifestyle requires more awareness than effort, Scott said. "Be aware of the fat content of food and choose those that are lower in fat. For example, select meats that are roasted, grilled or baked instead of fried."

"Choose a wide variety of lean meat, low-fat or non-fat dairy products, fruits, vegetables, bread, cereal, pasta, starch foods and limited amounts of oil and margarine -- just as your mother told you."

Kerrville State Hospital Announces New Clinical Director

The Superintendent of the Kerrville State Hospital, Dr. Gloria P. Olsen, announced that Dr. William Schultheis has been selected as the new Clinical Director for the Kerrville State Hospital, as of July 1, 1993.

Prior to his appointment Dr. Schultheis served as the Staff Psychiatrist for the Kerrville State Hospital Acute Admissions Unit from 1989 until 1991. For the past two years he functioned as a psychiatrist with the KSH Community Service Division providing outpatient psychiatric services to the mental health beneficiary population of six counties.

Prior to his employment with the KSH Dr. Schultheis served for two years at the San Antonio State Hospital as the Director of Extended Care following retirement from the United States Army Medical Corps in 1987.

Dr. Schultheis' articulated goals as the Clinical Director include the provision of quality medical and psychiatric services to the mental health care beneficiary population served by Kerrville State Hospital; and

secondly to provide the clinical resources and quality administrative support to get the job done.

Dr. Schultheis expressed that his new position offers two major immediate challenges. One is the transition of inpatient care to the new hospital building currently under construction. The second is participation in the implementation of a seamless model of psychiatric care which integrates community mental health services with the provision of inpatient mental health care.

Dr. Schultheis is the 1993-1994 President Elect of the Texas Mental Health Mental Retardation Medical Staff Organization. He and his wife Sue reside in Kerrville. They have two married daughters, one grandchild, and attend the First Presbyterian Church in Kerrville.

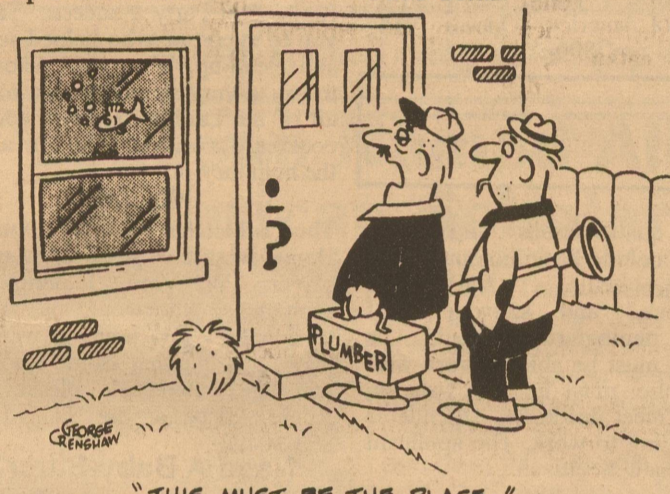
Whether you are a novice,
