This event is being sponsored by the OLG Parish Council.

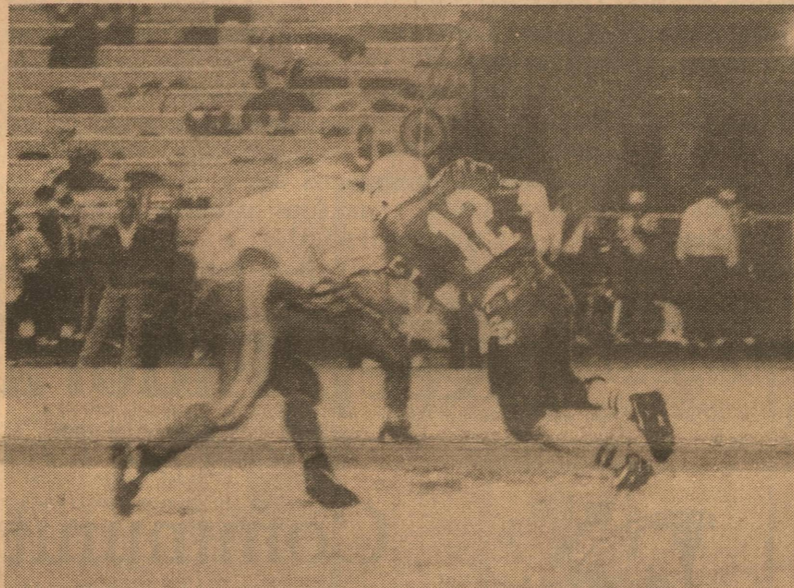

Eagles Baffle Buffaloes

The Eagles were impressive Friday night in their win over the Stanton Buffaloes. Eldorado received the opening kickoff and returned it to their own thirty yard-line. From there they marched seventy yards in just eight plays for a touchdown scored by Reagan Bownds.

The Eagle defense was equally impressive against Stanton's opening offensive series as they forced the Buffaloes to punt after gaining twenty-five yards in six plays.

On their next offensive series the Eagles punted from the Stanton forty-two. McGinnes' punt was killed on the Stanton six and seven plays later the Eagle defense forced and recovered a Buffalo fumble - setting up another Eagle score as Pepper Nix caught a tipped pass in the corner of the end zone. The half ended with the Eagles on top, 14-0.

The second half began

with Nix recovering a pooched Eagles kick on Stanton's 30 which led to another Eagle touchdown.

With the score being 21-0, Stanton scored their first touchdown of the game as they moved the ball sixty-four yards. Later, toward the beginning of the fourth quarter, the Buffaloes mounted another good drive and were threatening to score when Hunter Preston came up with a big, momentum shifting interception near the goal-line and returned it to the Eagle 25.

The final score was 21-7, Eagles.

Eldorado's record now stands at 4-4 overall and 2-2 in the district.

Clarification On City Utility Bill Enclosures

The City Hall has stated that there has been much confusion about the confidentiality enclosures recently mailed out with the October 15 City Utility bills. In response to the many inquiries, the City Hall offers this explanation:

Effective September 1, 1993, H.B. 859 required that all government operated utilities which provide water, garbage, gas, or electricity, may not disclose personal information in a customer's account record of the customer requests in writing that the utility keep the information confidential. Therefore, the City of Eldorado has been required to include the prescribed notice of this Act in a sealed envelope when mailing out the 10/15/93 bill to each of its customers. The notice provided written request form for obtaining the confidentiality service and prescribes the applicable fee for the

confidential service. Personal information affected includes the individual's address, telephone number, or social security number.

The City of Eldorado Utility Department does not routinely maintain Social Security Numbers nor telephone numbers on their records. Customer listings are rarely distributed except to the "911" personnel, which is one of the exceptions in the law.

If a customer does desire the service, the form must be completed and \$5.00 attached and returned to the City Hall so that customer's card can be flagged to insure confidentiality. The intent of the law, according to the Texas Rural water Association, was to hamper "stalking" of customers whose addresses may be obtained from government operated utilities.

If customers have further questions, they may call Kim-et or Carolyn at the City Hall.

I would like to take issue with U.S. Representative Charles Tenholm on The North American Free Trade Agreement that he thinks is so wonderful of NAFTA on the Standard Times editorial October 21, 1993.

I completely agree that Wayne Hill's letter to the editor in the September 30, 1993 Standard Times is closer to giving National Sovereignty to

Canada, Mexico and the United States. Also Richard Kneupper, President of the Communication Workers of America Local 6171 said, in the Standard-Times October 24, 1993, that he fears the dropping of trade barriers will give domestic companies south of the border and those that don't will use the agreement as leverage to force a reduction of U.S. wages and benefits.

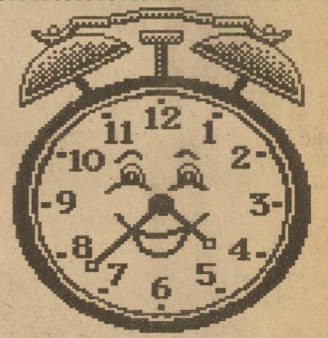
retired from as County Executive Director.

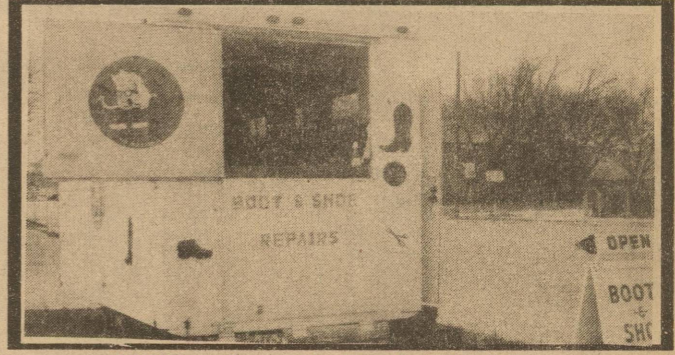

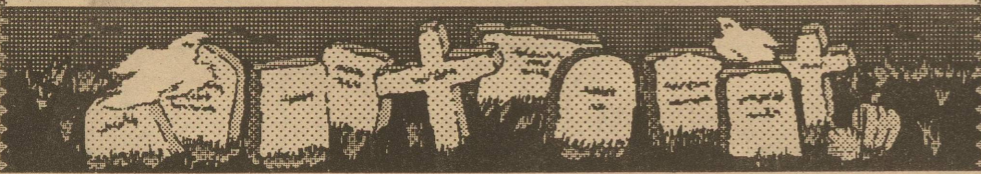

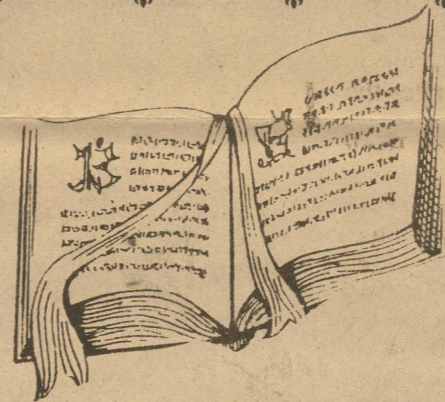

Hausenfluck Elected President Of Conservation Districts

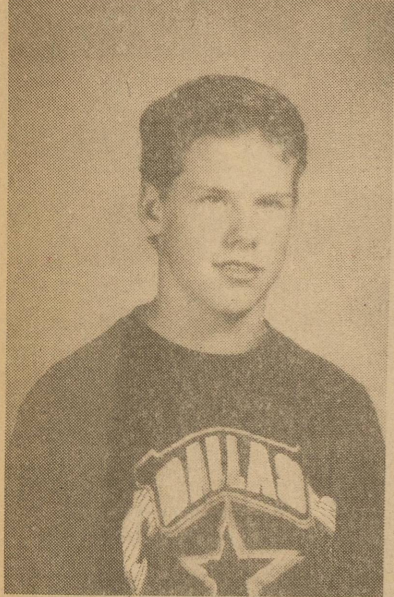

On October 3, 1993, Chauncey Donaldson was awarded the title of 1993 World Jr. Frisbee Champion in Buena Park, California.

The tournament, sponsored by Wham-O, and cosponsored by Knotts Berry Farm, took place over a three-day, intense competition that included distance, disk golf, MTA, accuracy, free style, and new this year a diskathon.

This year, Chauncey took 1st Place in disk golf with a four-under par, 1st Place in distance with a throw of 414 feet, 11 inches and overall champion beating out last year's Ian Liddell of Virginia.

Over 200,000 kids under the age of fifteen tried out for the semi-finals. Only eight boys and eight girls were selected to compete in the finals throughout the United States. Each finalist received a \$100 savings bond for qualifying. First place included trophies, \$1,000 savings bond, and numerous Frisbees and golf discs.

Arvada, Colorado, where Chauncey now resides, currently has two Frisbee champions, Chauncey, and Johnny Roberts, Grand Master Frisbee Champion, close friend and mentor of Chauncey.

Chauncey is the grandson of Clara Mae Donaldson of Eldorado, and the son of the late Bill Donaldson and Kathy Donaldson of Arvada, Colorado. He has a younger sister, Sabrina.

SCISD Board Met

The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Board of Trustees of Schleicher County ISD was held on October 11, 1993 at 6:30 p.m. in the Administration Building.

David Hill informed the Board about a questionnaire that will be sent out to all residents of Schleicher County. Mr. Hill asked the board for their support in this effort by encouraging all school employees to fill out and return the questionnaire. In action items, board members approved a motion to upgrade the administrative network computer system. The board also nominated the following individuals to fill the positions on the Schleicher County Appraisal District board of directors: Raymond Mittel, Randy Mankin, Ross Whitten, Phil McCormick, and Jo Ward. A waiver requested to move the TAAS test to May 9, 1994 was approved. The board voted to accept Mr. Barton's recommendations and to approve the local policy worksheet concerning the Family and Medical Leave Act. The board voted to join the TASB Legal Assistance Fund and to adopt Option, 1, which relates to a Limited Open Forum. Approval was given to move the early voting election from City Hall to the school administration building because of limited space and higher voter turnout. The 1993 tax roll was also approved by the board.

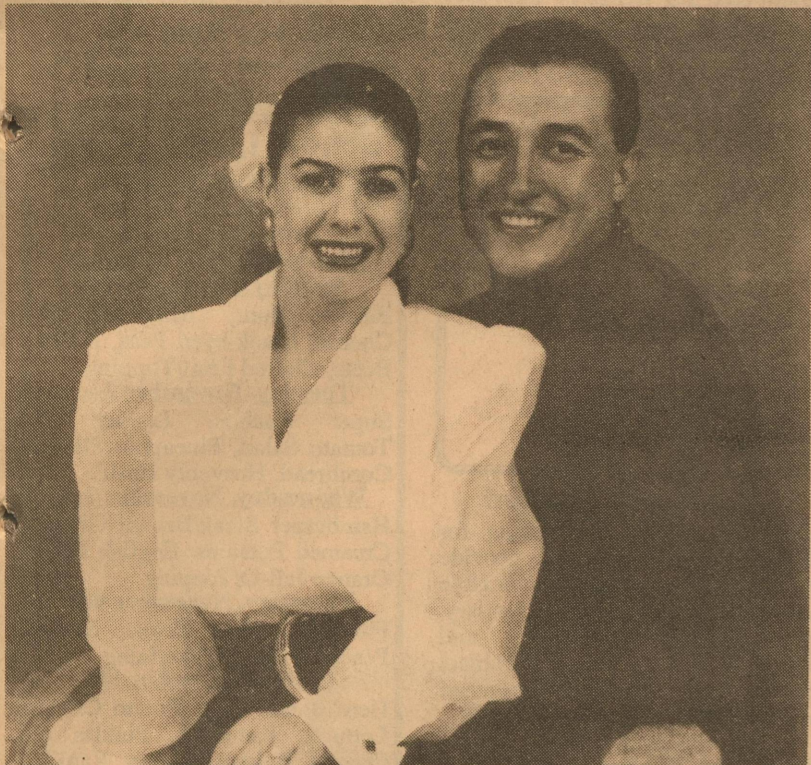

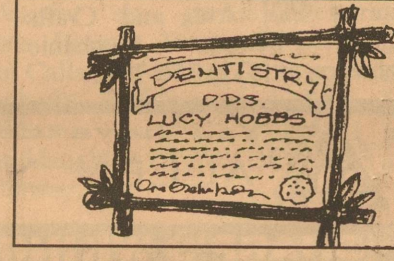
