

I hope you are filling out the questionnaire that just came in the mail -- the one about future economic projects for our community. We all know that the Wool Act is being phased out and that oil and gas revenues are tapering off. What are we going to do? The questionnaire is meant to help us all to begin to figure out an answer to that question. The boxes are waiting for your

You'll notice that 4 of the options relate to what goes under the banner of "rural tourism," an important fastgrowing industry nationwide. You might say to yourself, "Rural tourism in Eldorado? Who would want to come here?" But of course many already do come. Hunters come. People come from out of town to rodeos, Mias Amigas, Schleicher County Days, Old Main street Days, Community Theatre productions. Many more would like to come. I sat down in the Cow Town Cafe the other day talking to Mary Chipley of Austin, who comes out with other state workers to oversee our Resource Center

"Eldorado is a great town: I like it here. But you don't hear much about it in Austin. I've drawn a line on a map, a radius of fourhours drive out of Austin. That's where my family goes on getaway weekend trips, to see something different and get out of the crowds. You're within my radius. But what is there to do here? Do you have any camping? Horseback rides? What?"

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

The Schleicher County Emergency Medical Service met Monday evening, November 1st, at the Fire Hall for its regular monthly business meeting. The main item on the agenda was the election of officers for the coming year. After discussing several items of business the election of officers took place.

Those members elected to take on the responsibilities of the various offices in the organization are as follows: David Doran, president; Pam Daniels, vice president; Debbie Griffin, secretary; Ken Thomas, treasurer; Susie Richters and Kim Thackerson will share duties as communications and training officers; Lynette Doran will do billing for the service; and David Templeton will be reporter and chaplain.

The Emergency Medical Service exists to provide the volunteers who are not paid for the time spent training and carrying out this responsibility. The responsibility. president has the responsibility of making sure the service s run according to state standards and also conducts all the meetings. The vice president assists the president and also is responsible for making sure the vehicles pass state inspections as emergency ambulances. The supply officer must make sure each vehicle carries the needed supplies and orders them as needed. The maintenance officer is responsible for the upkeep of the vehicles so that they stay in constant service. The communications and training officers keep all members of the service

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work of the service, schedule training sessions (every member is required to have continuing training hours to stay certified by the state) and keep records of the number of hours each member has for continuing education. The treasurer keeps financial records and pays all of the bills, the billing officer collects fees from the patients who were served, the reporter is responsible for keeping the community informed about the work of the E.M.S., and the Chaplain serves the spiritual needs of the members and patients when this is requested. This short description is given to show that these volunteers put in many hours of service to the community and the county.

Schleicher County E.M.S. is in need of more personnel. If you have ever been interested in doing emergency medical service work we are interested county with quality ambulance in talking to you. Our service. All of the members are membership includes people trained at two levels. Emergency Care attendants are those who have taken the State of Texas entry level course for working on an ambulance service. This course includes about ninety hours of classroom and skills training, and the

written test. Every person who does E.M.S. work in Texas must be at least an E.C.A. The second level is called Emergency Medical Technician. This course involves about one hundred fifty hours of training. including classroom time, skills practise, observing in a hospital emergency room or operating room, and making five emergency ambulance runs as an observer.

If enough interest is

shown the E.M.S. will have an E.C.A. course in the near future. Keep watching the paper for information about that course. Any member will be glad to talk to you about emergency medical service volunteer work in our community.



Pursuant to Title 49, United States Code, Section 1616 of the Federal Transit Act, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) issues this notice for solicitation of proposals and/or applications from private and public nonprofit organizations serving elderly and/or disabled persons to utilize funds available under the Section 16 grant program, administered by TxDOT.

Notice of Invitation: The Department Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing this request for applications for the Section 16 grant program. The Section 16 grant program provides capital assistance to nonprofit provide organizations which transportation services to elderly and/or disabled persons in Texas.

Funding for the Section 16 grant program is appropriated by the Federal government under the Federal Transit Act as described in FTA Circular 9070.1C, December 23, 1992. Fiscal Year 1994 appropriations for Section 16 grant program are expected to be announced in October.

Eligible capital expenses under the Section 16 grant program include: (1) the replacement of vehicles such as buses, vans, trolleys, etc., currently used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles of this type; (2) the purchase of vehicles for services expansions and new services to elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles of this type; and (3) the purchase of radio equipment only, i.e. equipment that is not part of a vehicle allowed categories 1 and 2 of this paragraph. Section 16 funds must be used for transportation projects serving elderly and/or disabled persons.

Each project will be evaluated in the appropriate category in accordance with the stated selection criteria. However, TxDOT reserves the right to establish minimum required scores.

Projects must meet Federal funding criteria included in Circular 9070.1C and must also comply with property management

standards set out in Title 43, Chapter 31.57 of the Texas Administrative Code, relative to the replacement of vehicles. To be eligible for consideration, each 16 proposal must include the documents following information:

(1) Successful completion of the pre-application interview and on-site visit with the District transportation coordinator.

(2) A complete Section 16 grant application, copies of which are available at TxDOT District offices. Applicants requesting funds for multiple projects should group them within the application by funding category (replacement vehicles, expansion vehicles, new starts, and radios). The narrative should demonstrate the need for the equipment, the capability to maintain and operate the equipment, and the involvement of the applicant and the community in requesting funding for the equipment.

(3) A budget for each category of equipment which shows the unit cost of each item and total equipment costs. The federal dollars and local match dollars provided by the applicant should be noted.

type (bus, van, etc.) * license or serial number

* size (length) * passenger capacity special equipment on board (radio, lift, ramps, etc.)

model year * odometer reading, date of odometer reading, and whether vehicle is a spare or is used regularly to provide service.

Response date: Written proposals must be received by the Public Transportation Coordinator, Mr. Tommy Robinson, Texas Department of Transportation, at 4502 Knickerbocker Road in San Angelo, on or before January 18,

Selection criteria: TxDOT will select projects for Section 16 funding on quantitative measures such as demonstrated coordination efforts, ability to operate present equipment on an annual basis where applicable, local match ability, ability to meet service needs of elderly and/or disabled persons based on passenger trips per vehicle per month in urban or rural areas, hours for service, ability to maintain equipment, average fleet mileage where applicable, and average fleet age where applicable. Only those measures appropriate to a specific funding category will be used in evaluating projects within that category.
