Rehab '94 - Get Ready

Rehab '94, West Texas Rehabilitation Center's fundraising television special, will air on January 8, 1994, bringing together for one day friends and neighbors in our community and around the state to support the treatment facilities that help an average of 650 children and adults each day of the year.

This 24th annual telethon, to be aired from 7 p.m. to midnight on a dozen stations including KLST-TV in San Angelo and KRBC in Abilene, will feature entertainers lending their talents, volunteers manning phone banks to accept pledges and, most important, the viewers whose gifts keep the Rehab Center running year after year.

In Eldorado, the phone bank will be at Southwest Texas Electric Co-op under the guidance of Mabel Freitag.

The phone bank telephone number will be 853-2544, and Eldorado residents are urged to call, or come by with their gifts between 7 p.m. and midnight.

People are welcome to make their donations in advance of the show by calling Mrs. Freitag. Names of advance donors will be televised during the early hours of the telethon.

Featuring the theme, "Love is the Reason," Rehab '94 will originate live from the Abilene Civic Center. Local interview and phone-bank segments will be televised from WTRC's San Angelo campus,

with television personality and WTRC board vice-chairman Pat Attebery as host.

Hosting the January 8th show are Rex Allen, Rex Allen Jr. and Anita Bryant, joined by entertainers Lee Roy Parnell, Anacani, Arthur Duncan, Susan Hayes, Hilton Talbert, Brad Maule, Pedro Gonzales-Gonzales, the Maines Brothers and the Rehab '94 Orchestra and Chorus.

Special segments will showcase treatment services to underscore the Center's commitment of service to disabled men, women and children.

The Rock-A-Thon, conducted from the Abilene Civic Center, will feature youngsters from church and youth groups in rocking chairs, raising funds for Rehab while competing for prizes.

Returning again this year will be the auction, with merchandise and hand-crafted items donated by businesses and individuals. Phone numbers for bidding will be announced in advance, and auction updates will be presented periodically during the show.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center treats all patients without charge except for specialized equipment such as braces and hearing aids. The majority of funds to maintain the Center's operation comes from voluntary donations, with the balance from insurance, other third-party payments and contracts.

On November 15, 1993, Otis Deal of Eldorado was inducted into the Angus Heritage Foundation. The Angus Heritage Foundation was begun to honor men and women who have worked to make Angus and the American Angus Association leaders in the beef cattle world.

Otis is the first Texan to be honored with the award. Otis and his wife, Ora, were honored at the American Angus Association annual meeting, which was held in conjunction with the International Livestock Show. His name will be engraved on the prestigious list which hangs in the American Angus Association museum in St. Joseph, Missouri.

Otis, an Eldorado native, bought his first registered Angus in 1954. For 18 years he served on the board of directors of the Texas Angus Association, and in 1978, he received the

first and only Honorary Life Membership for Meritorious Service to the Texas Angus Association. He worked with the feeder calf sales in San Angelo for 17 years, so much in fact that on May 12, 1987, the San Angelo mayor proclaimed the day as "Otis Deal Day - Feeder Calf Sales Award." Otis also served as superintendent of the Junior Angus Show in San Angelo.

Otis and Ora's daughter and son-in-law, Lou Ann and Jack Turner were in Louisville for the celebration.

The Angus Heritage Foundation was established by the Board of Directors of the American Angus Association in 1983 to recognize the many men and women who, for more than a century, have worked tirelessly and selflessly to make Angus cattle and the American Angus Association the leaders in the beef cattle world.

Plans Underway For TxDOT Landscaping Project

On December 1st, Texas Department of Transportation representatives Laurie Williams, landscape architect from Odessa, and Ken Harrison from Sonora, met with the Chamber Pride Committee Board and Judge Johnny Griffin to review and approve plans for Eldorado's new landscape project. The \$30,000.00 Landscape Grant from TxDOT was earned when our town won the Keep Texas Beautiful Governor's Community Achievement Award.

The park will be located at the intersection of Highways

277 and 190 on the corner of the Courthouse parking lot. It must be on a highway right-of-way, so it will be L-shaped and will occupy an area within the present curb to a width not exceeding 15 feet. The landscaping will consist mainly of trees and shrubs. Construction will not begin before the fall of 1994.

This is an exciting event and will contribute significantly to the beauty of our city. Eldorado is the first community in the TxDOT District 7 to win this award. Congratulations, Eldorado!!!

The Eldorado Woman's Club Annual Christmas Parade of Homes will be held this Sunday afternoon, December 12, 1993 from 2:00-5:00 p.m.

The homes on the tour will be:

Jeff & Mary Leggett Home
The Rafter 4B Ranch was named after Jeff and Mary Leggett's boys, and is fondly called the House of 4 boys - Brandon, Blake, Bryce, and Briley. It is located 3 miles North of Eldorado on Highway 277. Turn West at the rock entrance and travel 1/2 mile up the caliche road.

The house was built by Howard and Charlie Looka of San Angelo and features a 2-story ranch style home with a porch surrounding the house. The rock for the home and fireplace was obtained in Kerrville and is topped by galvanized tin roof. It features three gables upstairs and a sunburst window in the gameroom.

The beveled glass door and Mexican Saltillo tile welcome visitors at the entry and kitchen area. The home features an open floor plan for the entry, kitchen and den. Using hunter green as her basic color in the downstairs area, Mary has introduced peach, navy, khaki, and burgundy in her decorating, having made all the drapes for the home herself. The kitchen cabinets showcase custom painted ceramic by Debbie Hartman of Wall on the back splash and buffet. Also downstairs is the master bedroom and bath, utility room, and office-sewing room, with antiques and modern conveniences serving side by side.

An open stairway leads upstairs to the boys' quarters. At the top of the landing the boys share a common gameroom decorated with a Western flair. The large sunburst window allows them to enjoy the horizon and keep an eye on the open pasture and a rock tank which serves as a swimming pool in warm weather. Using an antique dresser and peddlers bench from Scotland, Mary and Jeff have turned this area into a haven to be enjoyed by Leggett boys and their lucky friends. The boys selected their colors for their rooms - Brandon and Blake proudly display a 6' Texas Tech emblem and colors of red, black and white while Bryce and Briley chose Santa Fe wallpaper in navy, teal and maroon with grass rope border. Their saddles and ropes are right at home with their pine furniture. No space is wasted throughout the home, but the upstairs area especially utilizes space, including the clothes drop to the utility room below.

From the beginning, the whole family and several friends helped transform this

house into a home. The Leggett boys helped push and clear brush and pick up lots of rocks! Several people, including Glyn Hutto, L.D. Leggett, and Mike Lux built the pipe fence around the house as well as cattle guards and pens. Mary enlisted the help of Peggy Williams for the hanging of wallpaper while Jack Williams and Delwin Greer helped Jeff with the electrical work. They wish to thank everyone involved as they enjoy their first Christmas at the Rafter 4B Ranch.

Doug & Jo Ward Home

Drive out the Big Lake Highway about a mile and a half, and you will notice on the right a blond brick house with a brick and iron fence. This is the Ward home.

Doug and Jo Ward designed and built their home in 1985. Doug Ward and Roger Phillips, from Menard, constructed this home, except for the brick work. The past two summers have been dedicated to constructing the fence which will be finished just as soon as warmer weather arrives, along with lights for columns at the end of the drive and on the front gate. Landscaping will be completed next Spring.

The living area is approximately 2400 square feet with 3 bedrooms and 2 1/2 baths. Entry through the front door brings you into an area tiled with imported Italian tile. The living room features a cathedral ceiling and a large fireplace area with an insert (a gift from Ed and Martha Lee Meador) which completely warms the home. On each side of the fireplace are bookcases. One side displays a Norman Rockwell plate collection started in the early 70's. One wall is "upholstered."

A skylight in the kitchen area gives extra lighting to the cooking area. It is told that Jo is a fantastic cook, although she and Doug maintain their trim figures.

In their son Brant's room (Yes, he's still at home some of the time!) are displayed boards and shelves made by his dad for ribbons, trophies and belt buckles won while in school participating in horse shows, livestock events, and rodeos.

The master bedroom is decorated in gray and mauve. The upholstered walls were done by Doug and Jo. All drapes and window coverings were made by Jo. Editor's Journal

Our Sympathy

W.B. "Bill" Roberts

W.B. "Bill" Roberts Sr., 92, died at his San Angelo, Texas, residence on Tuesday, November 23, 1993.

A memorial service was held at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, November 27, 1993, in the Robert Massie Riverside Chapel, San Angelo, Texas, with burial in Belvedere Memorial Park Cemetery, San Angelo. The Rev. Glenn Roenfeldt officiated.

Roberts was a farmer, rancher, investor and developer in West Texas for 65 years.

Born December 13, 1900, in Guadalupe County, Texas, he was the third of six children born to James Meek and Emma Roberts on the family farm beside the San Marcos River. Roberts attended schools in Kingsbury (Guadalupe County) and Prairie Lee (Caldwell County, Texas, before enlisting in the U.S. Navy during World War I. He served aboard the Battleship New York.

Returning to Texas in

1923, he worked as a tool dresser for Carl Cromwell at Texon Oil and Land Company, Texon, Texas. In 1925, he married Viola Johnson of Bastrop County, Texas, and lived and worked in oil fields in Best, McCamey and Wink, Texas. They moved to Littlefield, Texas, on the plains in 1929, and farmed land that Roberts' father had acquired from the Mashed O and the XIT ranches.

Relocating in the San Angelo area in 1934, Roberts engaged in farming, ranching, land acquisitions and various investments which he pursued the rest of his life. When the areas "boomed," he acquired and developed land -- building shopping centers and homes -- in Albuquerque, N.M., Tucson, Ariz., Amarillo, Texas and Larado, Texas. He also had banking interests, investing in several Texas banks.

Mr. Roberts owned and operated a ranch approx. 13 miles S.W. of Eldorado in Schleicher County during the 40's and 50's.

Roberts was actively engaged in business activities pat his 91st birthday when he was struck by a car while walking across a San Angelo street in January 1992. He never fully recovered from that accident.

He is survived by two sons, W.V. "Red" Roberts of Midland, Texas, and W.B. "Jim" Roberts Jr of San Antonio, Texas; one daughter, Helen Crews of Brownwood, Texas; four grandsons, Rod and Rick Roberts of Midland, and Trey and Brett Roberts of San Antonio; one granddaughter, Cami Crews of Lubbock, Texas; two great-grandchildren, Ryan and Robyn Roberts of Midland; and a brother, Vernon W. Roberts of Denver City, Texas.

He was preceded in death by a son, Reeves Leslie; a grandson, Kyle Crews; and four sisters.

Pallbearers were Harold Gibbs, Bob Nichols, Dan Thompson, Spencer Kissell and Bill McManus, all of San Angelo, Texas.

Freelance Philosophy

As my family and I were preparing for Christmas, it occurred to me that this would be the first Christmas after the death of my father. For every Christmas of my life, Dad was there. The thought of Christmas without him brought tears of sadness and loneliness to my eyes. Then, for some reason, I thought of Wellington's defeat of Napoleon...

The fog lifted! It was June 18, 1815, the Battle of Waterloo. The French, under the command of Napoleon, were fighting the Allies (British, Dutch, and Germans) under the command of Wellington. The people of England were depending on a system of signals to find out how the battle was going. One of the stations for these signals was on the tower of Winchester Cathedral. Late in the afternoon the signal came: "W-E-L-L-I-N-G-T-O-N- - - D-E-F-E-A-T-E-D- - -". Just as the words were being sent a heavy fog cloud made it impossible to read the message. The news of defeat spread quickly throughout London. People throughout the countryside were sad and gloomy when they heard the news that they had lost the war. Suddenly the fog lifted, and the remainder of the message could be received. The message did not have two words but four. The complete message was: "W-E-L-L-I-N-G-T-O-N- - -D-E-F-E-A-T-E-D- - -T-H-E- - -E-N-E-M-Y!" It took only a few minutes for the good news to spread. Sorrow was turned into joy, defeat was turned into victory!

Although it is sometimes hard to remember, I, and others who believe like I do, know that death is not the end, only a new beginning.

Texas Commission For The Blind

The Texas Commission for the Blind offers a variety of services for children who are blind or visually impaired through the Blind and Visually Impaired Children's Program.

Early detection of potentially disabling eye conditions makes it possible to treat many of these children. In some cases, full sight can be restored; in others, blindness can be avoided and existing sight can be conserved and enhanced through visual aids.

Young children whose vision cannot be restored or

corrected will need intensive specialized developmental stimulation, and their parents will need an equally strong support system during the early learning years. Service geared toward physical, mental, social and emotional development are critical.

Prevocational guidance, counseling and advocacy all apply important roles. Dependent upon the degree of visual loss, various types of low vision aids and technological equipment are needed to enhance learning, traveling and communicating skills.

Through a caseworker in its San Angelo office, the Commission offers service to blind children and their parents living in this area. If you or someone you know has a child who is blind or visually impaired, contact the Commission's San Angelo office at (915) 949-4601 or call toll free 1-800-252-5204 to find out more about agency services.

The home of David and Carrie Hill is located at 208 East Live Oak in the Sunset Acres Addition of Eldorado. The Hill family believes in the saying "Christmas is for kids," and with that in mind, Carrie chose to decorate the home for Christmas through the eyes of a child.

The tree displays candy, garlands, giant suckers, and ornaments saved over the years, some of which their two young sons have made. Also a huge, lighted candy garland is strung in the dining room which focuses on a hand carved antique buffet made in 1850 and an antique Queen Anne dining room table and chairs given to them by Carrie's parents.

The home itself has vaulted ceilings, Saltillo tile floors, a rock fireplace, a wet bar, large skylights, many windows, and as Carrie simply states, "a lot of light."

The Hills take pride in their many antiques throughout the home. The kitchen and breakfast room centers around a solid oak breakfast table and an English Pitch pine server made in 1870 which was a wedding gift from David's parents. The server displays a Christmas snow village.

In the den a hand carved sideboard with a marble top from the 1800's serves the family. David displays his grandfather's first set of golf clubs mounted on a wall tapestry. Also featured is a piano and grandmother clock from the early 1900's which belonged to Carrie's grandparents.

The master bedroom is enhanced by an antique dressing table, pine armoire, and a four poster bed. A large bathtub with steps awaits under a large skylight in the masterbath.

Joyce has graciously agreed to be Hostess to the Woman's Club who will serve refreshments in her dining room where she has displayed a Lenox Christmas plate collection from 1976-1983 utilizing an old trunk that belonged to Joyce's mother, Ona Burk.

A hand-painted Nativity scene is displayed on the antique buffet in the kitchen area. The buffet once belonged to Sam and Martha Jones, early Schleicher County residents. Don't miss the display of cups, saucers and salad plates in the top open cabinets.

These were made in occupied Japan during the war. Wallpaper on the ceiling highlights this room.

The quilt on the bed was made by Joyce's grandmother, Nettie Wheeler, from sample swatches given to Mrs. Wheeler by a shirt salesman who came by the family farm to sell Joyce's grandfather custom-made shirts.

Recently Joyce added the master bedroom, dressing area, closet, bath, and utility room to the home using Milton Fitts as her contractor. Decorating During The Holidays With Safety

The year's largest and most festive holiday season is upon us. In addition to the celebrations and family gatherings, safety should be a priority when decorating the house or planning the perfect party. Electrical safety is especially important during the Christmas season due to the many decorative lights draped through trees and around homes. West Texas Utilities Company encourages everyone to observe the following precautions for holiday decorating.

"Use only Christmas lights which are safety-certified by a recognized testing agency such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL). Check your tree lights and outdoor lights for damage each year before you use them. Look for frayed wires, loose connections and broken or cracked sockets. Throw away any set that is damaged," said Paul Valdez, Safety Coordinator at WTU.

Follow the manufacturer's instructions for using tree lights. All lights should be fastened securely with string, ribbon or rubber bands, but never with conductive wire. Bulbs should not come into direct contact with needles or branches on natural trees. Though bulbs do not emit much heat, it could eventually be enough to dry out the tree limbs.

Select lights appropriately and never use indoor lights outside, because they are not designed to be waterproof and could short circuit. Outdoor lights are usually hotter than

indoor lights and could pose a hazard if placed on an indoor tree.

Although Christmas lights do not consume a great deal of power, it is important not to overload wall outlets or extension cords. Never run electrical cords under carpets or rugs where daily walking and wear could cause fraying and overheating. Unplug all unnecessary electrical equipment before restoring

power if fuses blow or circuits trip in the home.

When you leave the house or go to bed, be sure all lights are turned off. Disconnect lights by pulling the plug, not by yanking on the cord.

A few moments exercising caution with electrical equipment can help you avoid accidents which would dampen the cheer of the holiday season.



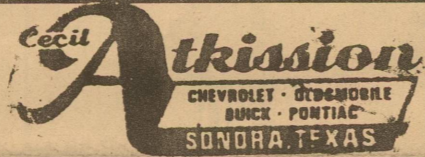

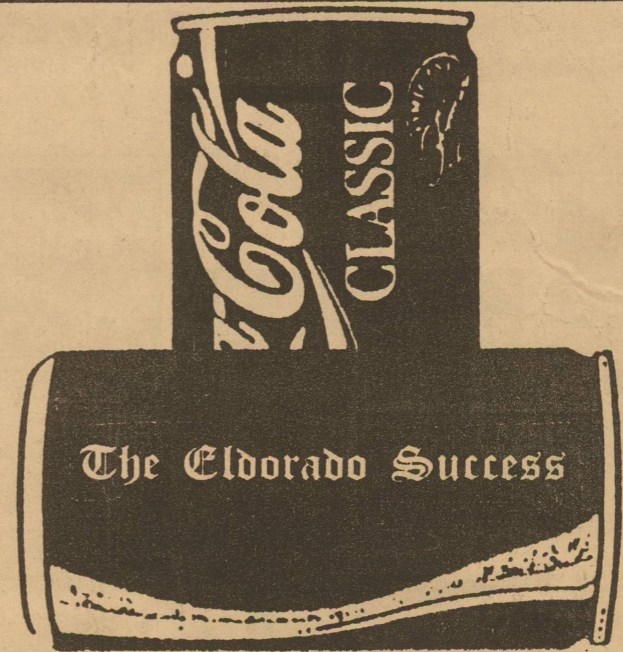
