Junior Market Auction Guaranteed Premium At Houston Livestock Show

Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo officials announced junior market auction guaranteed premium program that will enhance the auctions for both the exhibitors and the auction buyers.

Junior market livestock exhibitors at the 1994 Houston Livestock Show will know in advance the minimum amount of money they will receive for animals sold at auction through the guaranteed premium program.

All lambs, barrows and poultry, along with steers whose exhibitors elect to sell in the auction, that win ribbons while competing in their individual classes will become the property of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in return for a guaranteed premium paid to the animal's exhibitor.

These animals will then be sold by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo in their respective junior market auction sales.

In accordance with recent tax legislation, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (a nonprofit charitable organization) will provide each

auction buyer with a record of the animal they purchased from the Show. This documentation also will inform buyers of the fair market value of the goods and services provided by the Show. This disclosure shall allow buyers to determine what amount of the excess payment above fair market value is a charitable contribution.

As in the past, all junior market auction sales proceeds will be paid to the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. All guaranteed premiums will be distributed after the livestock show is completed.

Total money committed by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo for this new guaranteed premium program exceeds \$3.21 million, an increase of more than \$340,000 above the 1993 auction awards of \$2.87 million.

The 1994 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo begins with horse Show competition Wednesday, February 16th with all other livestock Show competition and rodeo performances beginning Saturday, February 19th. All events conclude March 6th.

Use Care In Handling Holiday Meats

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has warned that holiday meats — especially turkeys, hams and roasts —

require strict cooking, handling and storage rules to prevent illnesses from food-borne bacteria.

According to Barbara

Keir, director of the TDH Public Health Nutrition Program, several food poisoning outbreaks occur every year in Texas during the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons. "The usual culprit is Salmonella, the most common bacteria in raw, under-cooked or spoiled poultry," she said.

However, she added that recent reports of bacterial infections, including two deaths, from beef contaminated with *Escherichia coli* (E. coli 0157:H7) have heightened concern that people may not be as cautious as they should be when cooking meats.

"People should be aware that any meat poses a food poisoning risk from organisms which survive insufficient cooking or unsanitary food preparation," she said. "Cooks can prevent most food poisoning risks by strictly obeying a few simple rules, the first of which is always cleanliness."

Among these rules are:

* Anyone handling foods should thoroughly wash hands, utensils, cutting boards and other surfaces at

each step during food preparation. Serving platters and other tableware also should be clean.

* Frozen meats, particularly turkeys, ground beef and hams, should be thawed in the refrigerator, or under running water no warmer than 70 degrees. Microwave thawing is safe only if the food will be immediately cooked. After thawing, meats should be rinsed with cold water and dried, including the cavity of a turkey.

* Turkey stuffing should be prepared immediately before cooking. Dry ingredients may be mixed in advance, but eggs, oysters, butter or other moist ingredients should not be added until cooking time. Cook stuffing separately, or stuff the turkey right before cooking — not the night before.

* When fully cooked, dense portions of a turkey should have reached at least 180 degrees Fahrenheit, measured by a thermometer. Stuffing should have reached at least 165 degrees.

* Ground beef, such as hamburgers and meatloaf, should be cooked until the inside is gray or brown and nays juices run clear. Whole cuts of beef, such as steaks and roasts, may remain pink inside, if their outsides are uniformly browned and their internal temperatures have reached at least 135 degrees.

* Hams and other pork always should be cooked until well-

done (at least 165 degrees internally) to prevent illness both from bacteria and from parasites.

* Never leave turkey or other meats, stuffing or gravy unrefrigerated for more than two hours. Turkey should be cut off the bone for refrigeration. Leftovers may be kept unfrozen in a cold refrigerator for no more than three days, and if reheated should reach at least 165 degrees.

Texas Commission For The Blind

The Texas Commission for the Blind offers a variety of services for children who are blind or visually impaired through the Blind and Visually Impaired Children's Program.

Early detection of potentially disabling eye conditions makes it possible to treat many of these children. In some cases, full sight can be restored; in others, blindness can be avoided and existing sight can be conserved and enhanced through visual aids.

Young children whose vision cannot be restored or corrected will need intensive specialized developmental stimulation, and their parents will need an equally strong support system during the early learning years. Service geared toward physical, mental, social and emotional development are critical.

Provocational guidance, counseling and advocacy all apply important roles. Dependent upon the degree of visual loss, various types of low vision aids and technological equipment are needed to enhance learning, traveling and communicating skills.

Through a caseworker in its San Angelo office, the Commission offers service to blind children and their parents living in this area. If you or someone you know has a child who is blind or visually impaired, contact the Commission's San Angelo office at (915) 949-4601 or call toll free 1-800-252-5204 to find out more about agency services. 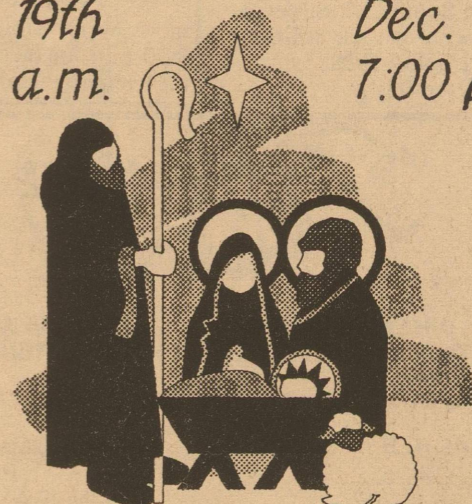

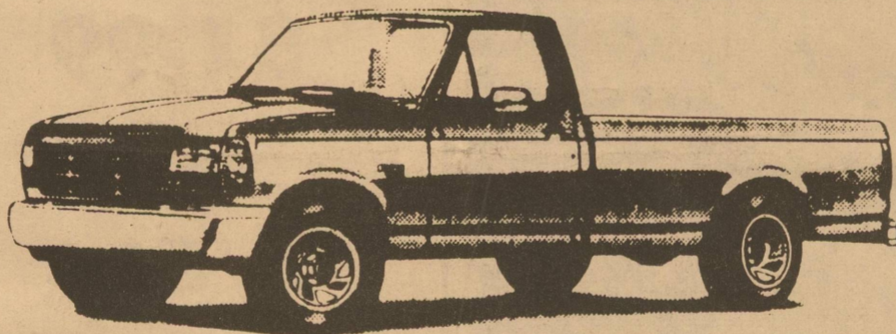
