City council agrees to property swap

Rennond and Cathy Kuykendall met with the Eldorado City Council Monday evening, December 6, 2004, and offered to exchange a 50 ft. by 60 ft. parcel of land for a similar sized piece of property owned by the city that adjoins their property on the south end of Colpitts Street in the Orient Heights neighborhood.

It was noted that the city's lot was given to them by the Jim Hardy family so that a water well could some day be drilled in that area. When the Kuykendalls asked the Schleicher County Commissioners Court to consider closing the southernmost portion of Colpitts to traffic, it was the city's need for access to its property that prevented the measure from passing.

So, the Kuykendalls offered a compromise, trading the small parcel of land for another piece nearby. The council agreed with the idea and voted to approve the trade, provided there were no restrictions placed on the property by the Hardy family that might prevent the exchange.

The meeting was the council's regularly monthly session and was called to order by Mayor John Nikalouk with council members Bill McCutcheon, Toni Sudduth, Dora Bosmans, Richard Mendez and Juaqin Rojas in attendance. Council member Tommy Minor joined the meeting a few minutes after it began. Fire Chief Jerry Jones was also on hand for the meeting.

With Utility Superintendent Floyd Fay absent due to the death of his mother, City Secretary Carolyn Mayo updated the council on work in the various department that Fay oversees. It was noted that engineer Steve Dennis and contractor Mike Verfurth met earlier in the day with city employees for a pre-construction conference to discuss the upcoming installation of a dissolved air flotation unit (DAF) at the city's wastewater treatment plant. The work is slated to begin soon and should be complete by Spring of 2005.

One concern discussed by the council involves the use of sewer clean out taps to drain flooded yards. It was noted that, with the onset of recent heavy rains, Floyd Fay had found some citizens removing the caps from their sewer clean-out taps in order to drain their flooded yards into the sewer system. This resulted in a large jump in the volume of water being handled by the wastewater plant, and interferes with the efficient operation of the facility. The council briefly discussed the need for an amendment to the city's utility ordinance in order to deal with the problem, but they chose to await Fay's return and seek his input on the matter.

Also, it was noted that Linda White, an inspector with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has scheduled an inspection of the city's water system. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 8**

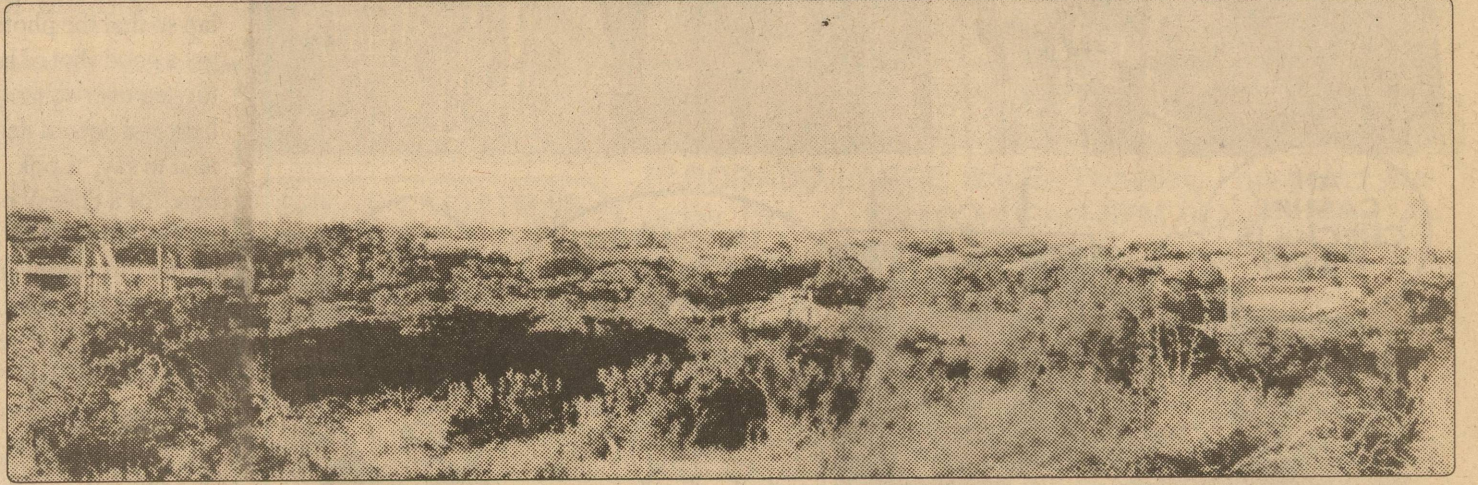

Massive hoist going up at YFZ rock cutting area

Construction continued this week at the YFZ Ranch with the erection of a large hoist, believed to be standing over the rock cutting area near where many believe the Fundamentalist Church of Latter Day Saint plans to build its first-ever temple. The hoist, clearly visible from County Road 300, consists of four large I-beam trusses, connected down the sides by more large beams that carry the hoist. While the massive structure is built in such a way as to make it easy to enclose with metal or other siding, it is unclear if the workers at the ranch plan to do so.

A new gate has also been erected at the entrance to the property, several feet down a fenced lane from where the original gate stood near the roadway. The first gate was damaged, reportedly by a truck delivering construction material to the ranch.

In keeping with their policy of excluding outsiders from the property, YFZ officials have brought in their own propane truck from Utah. It is used to meet a local delivery truck at the county road where propane is transferred to the YFZ truck for transport into the ranch.

Back on the legal front

Utah authorities are still eager to hear from FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs. A second round of legal notices have been published in newspapers three states and one Canadian province, including here in The Eldorado Success (see notice on Page 6) in hopes of compelling Jeffs to respond to a civil lawsuit brought against him by his nephew Brent Jeffs.

Rungini's "Believe It Or Don't Museum" opens Dec. 17

The third link in the Schleichersonian Museum System will open its doors on December 17, adding variety to the two existing museums in Eldorado, which are the Schleicher County Museum and the Old Eldorado Woolen Mill. This particular museum is not only a collection of memorabilia gathered on a "giant road trip through life on roads less traveled," but the unusual layout and construction of the facility is part of the attraction.

Visitors wind their way through a series of twists and turns with displays on every wall and shelf, not to mention hanging from the ceiling (displays, not visitors.) It is also a study in compactness as the structure is very small for a museum, but every inch is utilized in a very efficient manner.

The first feature to grab the eyes of tourists is the one hundred costumes hanging from every available clothes bar, which virtually surround you. Then there are the dozens of hats and equal number of masks displayed on high rise shelves around the room. Head forms also hold numerous wigs of varying shape and color. Drawer after drawer

Thus far, efforts by Utah private investigator Sam Brower to serve Jeffs with notice of the lawsuit have failed leading Utah District Judge Stephen L. Henroid to determine that Jeffs is attempting to avoid service.

School problems

Meanwhile, things in Colorado City, AZ, the FLDS stronghold located on the Utah/Arizona border, are quickly heating up. Paychecks issued by the Colorado City Unified School District began bouncing in October. Since that time more than sixty of the district's employees have gone without pay, according to numerous published reports. That condition was alleviated somewhat this week when the district began honoring its paychecks after receiving \$750,000 in grant funds from the government.

A notice, published on the school's website (www.ccusd.net) indicates that a public hearing has been called for Monday, December 13, 2004, at the school district office where the board of trustees will consider a revised budget.

The school's recent financial problems, coupled with years of allegations about gross mismanagement of the school district prompted Arizona Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Horne on Monday of this week to ask the Arizona legislature for the authority to appoint a trustee or receiver over the dysfunctional district.

In 2001, Prophet Warren Jeffs ordered the FLDS to remove their children from the C-City school system and place them in one of several private schools located in the town. Since that time, the district's students have consisted primarily of children from Centennial Park, a neighboring community, whose residents broke away from the FLDS many years ago.

Interestingly, C-City USD Superintendent Alvin Barlow, is listed the agent for a Utah corporation named Hildale Educational Institute, that operates a

private school in Hildale, UT. Other directors of the corporation are listed as Kevin J. Barlow and Fred Jessop, the 94-year-old patriarch of the FLDS who many church insiders say should have become the group's prophet when Warren Jeffs' father, Rulon Jeffs, passed away.

C-City and Hildale are actually a single town, formerly known as Short Creek, that straddles the Arizona/Utah border north of the Grand Canyon.

Chatwin update

Ross Chatwin, the C-City man who stood up to Prophet Warren Jeffs after being excommunicated from the FLDS church last year, has suffered a setback in his legal battle to keep his home. Mohave County Arizona Superior Court Judge James Chavez ruled last Friday that before Chatwin can evict his brother Stephen from the upper floor of his 2-story home, he must pay his brother some \$23,000 for improvements made to the home. The ruling mirrors and earlier one the judge made when he said the FLDS church, or more accurately the United Effort Plan Trust, a trust fund controlled by the church, had to pay Ross Chatwin for improvements he made before it could evict him from his home which was built on UEP-owned land.

It is unknown if Chatwin will pay to have his brother move out. Stephen Chatwin reportedly took up residence the home at the direction of Warren Jeffs, after Ross Chatwin was excommunicated and after he refused to vacate the home.

Ross Chatwin, his wife Lori, and their daughter Kimberlina visited Eldorado in August of this year.

FLDS holiday schedule

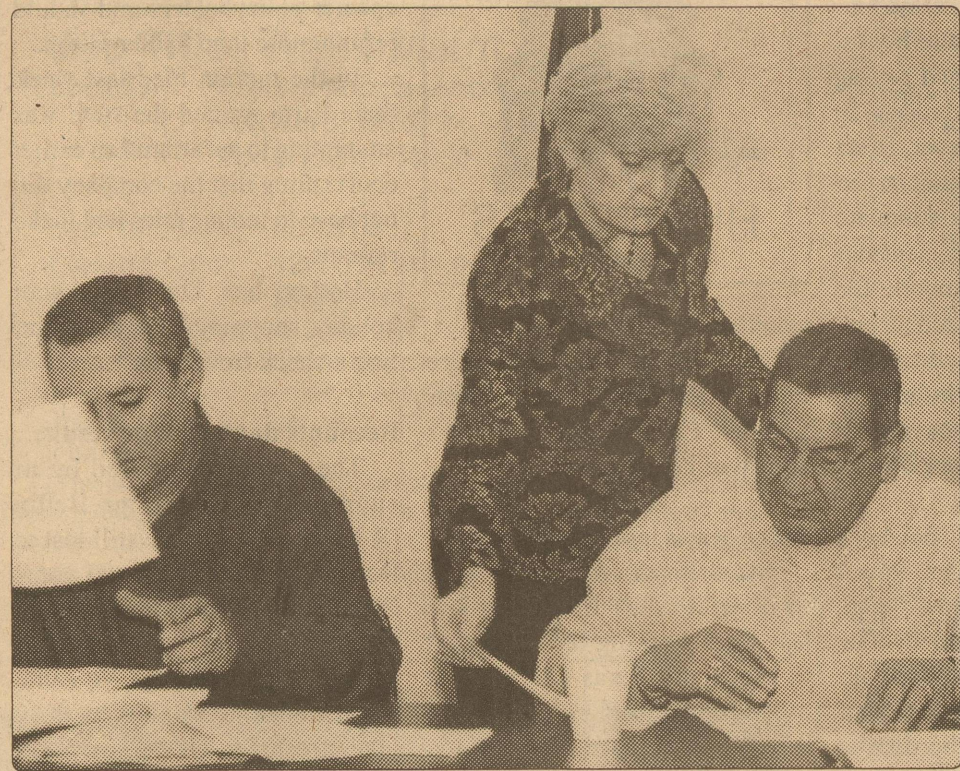

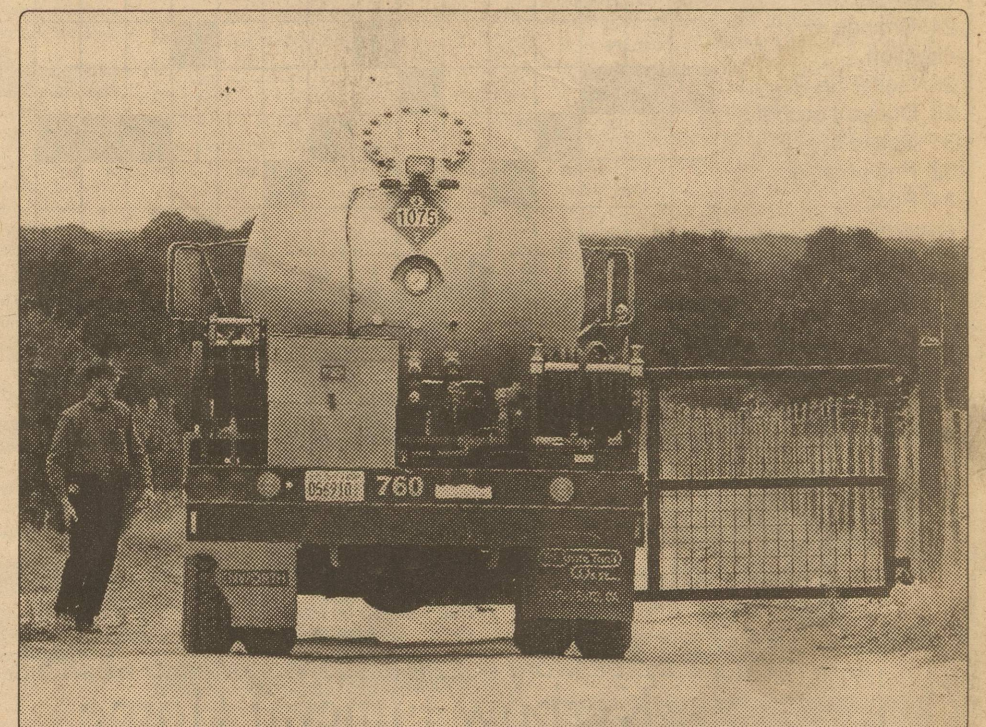

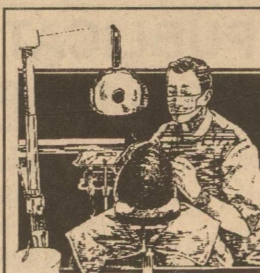
Seaman Recruit Koda A. Lozano

hold labeled costume parts, haunted house props, make-up appliances, magic supplies, etc. Mixed in with these items are unique props and accessories collected over the years and used in conjunction with these costumes, etc.

Many of the displays are items that have been donated to the Amazing Rungini over the years and are so labeled. Most of these donations are reminiscent of some of the characters he impersonates. Then there are the numerous verification notices around the room, in the form of newspaper and magazine articles, which chronicle the over fifty published news stories or pictures which depict various activities around the state over the past fifty years. A lot of these postings exhibit the use of some of these costumes over a span of twenty years of performances across Texas.

Also on the walls are Texas History tidbits and maps, used in presentations to historical groups. Lots of items might be observed that are used in the production of Count Dracula's Quality Pre-Owned Casket Company and guests may continue their journey through the building to

observe it's complete layout.

Mixed in with these items are various wooden signs utilized in the production of different acts and festivals produced by the Amazing Rungini. The museum is open by appointment only and there is a story behind every exhibit. Amazingly, the Amazing Rungini will be available to answer any questions visitors might have about each display.

For those who wish to delve deeper into the mystery of the Amazing Rungini, notebook after notebook of pictures are available for perusal after or during the tour. The museum is unconventional at best and is ever changing. Displays are rotated on an as needed basis and no two visits will ever be the same.

In addition to the costuming displays, other displays involve such diverse topics as Alamo Day, Barn to Yarn, Batmobile, Circus Fair, Col. Black, Chili Craft Fest, Dickens of a Christmas, Downtown McKinney Association, Eldorado Elgoatarod, Elvis, EOBOC, Galveston Storm of 1900, Historical tours, Hysterical District, Illusions of Grandeur, Jaycees, Abe Lincoln, Lions Club, Man of Many Faces, Modern Pentathlon, Mormon invasion, RRR,

Running of the BULL, Schleicher jackrabbit call, Schleicher trophies, Scouting, Tagoo Bird, Texas history and Uncle Sam.

Other displays focus on basketball, canoeing, drama, hitch-hiking, orienteering, party planning, spoofs, track & field, vampire detectors, warehouse yarns, wooden travel maps, or other odds and ends. Two of the most interesting items on display are probably the walking canes depicting some of the above topics.

Comments have ranged all the way from "I can't believe there is so much in that little building," to "I spent two hours in there and still didn't see everything," to "I can't believe this isn't against the law," to "I can't believe I paid to get in!"

Admission is \$2 per person and is open for group tours by calling 325-853-2434 or e-mailing rungini@hotmail.com. Allow a minimum of one hour if you wish to view every exhibit thoroughly. Younger visitors will probably be most interested in the mazes and/or the numerous displays of costumes and props, while adults might enjoy reading the diversified newspaper articles in more detail.

At any rate, this museum is a

"one of a kind" attraction that is not to be duplicated anywhere on the face of the earth. It differs from a conventional museum in that it houses the memorabilia of one man and his ancestors and descendants. It's title, "Rungini's Believe It Or Don't Museum," while a spoof of Riley's Believe It Or Not Museum, should not lead visitors to think it resembles the famous chain of museums in any way. It is just a method of explaining that this museum is a little out of the ordinary and one can't imagine it's contents without actually touring the facility for themselves.

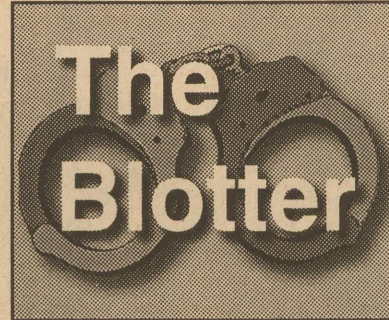

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. The City of Eldorado, P.O. Box 713, Eldorado, Texas 76936-0713, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TECQ) for a renewal of TPDES Permit No. 10165-001, which authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 385,000 gallons per day. This application was submitted to the TECQ on June 28, 2004.

The facility is located approximately 5000 feet northeast of the intersection of U.S. Highway 277 and U.S. Highway 915 in Schleicher County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to an unnamed tributary of the South Concho River; thence to South Concho River; thence to Middle Concho/South Concho River in Segment No. 1424 of the Colorado River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life use for the unnamed tributary of South Concho River and no significant aquatic life use for South Concho River. The designated uses for Segment No. 1424 are high aquatic life use, public water supply, and contact recreation.

The TECQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The executive director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The permit application, statement of basis/technical summary and executive director's preliminary decision, and draft permit are available for viewing and copying at the City of Eldorado, City Hall, 6 South Cottonwood, Eldorado, Texas.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the application. Generally, the TECQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments and requests for a public meeting should be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TECQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087 within 30 days of the date of newspaper publication of the notice.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for public comments, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. **The response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who requested to be on a mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the executive director's decision.** A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn. Issues that are not raised in public comments may not be considered during a hearing. **The TECQ may act on this application to renew a permit without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.**

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The executive director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or a timely request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the executive director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TECQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

City Council's monthly meeting held Monday, Dec. 6

 on December 15, 2004.

While reviewing the city's financial reports, Ms. Mayo noted that financial assurance fund the city sets aside to provide for the closure of its landfill has been

transferred to First National Bank and is accruing 2.25 percent interest, a higher rate than was being paid by Texas Bank when the money was being kept in a trust account in San Angelo. It was also noted that a disputed bill for services presented by Dick Baggett, a human resource consultant who offered the city advice on the recent overtime ruling and how it applies to the Utility Superintendent and City Secretary, was ordered

paid after it was noted that Mr. Baggett had agreed to reduce the bill by half.

The council also reviewed the recent expenditures made by the Fire Department. Of concern to Ms. Mayo was the fact that the city had budgeted \$1,000 for fire truck repairs and had already spent \$481 of that amount. At that, Fire Chief Jerry Jones and Ms. Mayo reviewed some recent invoices with Jones stating that some of the

expenditures were for equipment, not for repairs. Mayor Nikolauk thought the problem was minor and assured Jones that money could be transferred from equipment to repairs if it was needed.

While meeting with Jones the council also learned that the fire whistle, located on the city's main water tower, needs repair. Chief Jones explained that the fire department's pager system has also been broken, making it even more important that the fire whistle work properly. He said that he had been in contact with the county and that it had agreed to pay for the pager and fire whistle repairs.

The council then learned that the city had received a \$3,455.00 refund from the Texas Municipal League liability insurance fund. It was noted, however, that an audit report for workers compensation report revealed the city owned TML \$1,070.

Ms. Mayo then updated the council on her efforts to come up with job descriptions for her position and said she had been in contact with the City of Big Lake to see how the breakdown their job titles and job descriptions.

Mayo then explained that she had just returned from election school and updated the group on several new regulations, including one that calls for city to have a voting machine available in upcoming elections. She said that the rules allow the city to rent the equipment from the county and encouraged the council to consider it since it would help the county afford to buy the equipment.

Among other business, the council approved the minutes from the last meeting and okayed the payment of the city's current bills. They also reviewed several conflicting pieces of information regarding the disannexation request submitted by Alma Corbell. While they took no action on the matter, the consensus of the council seemed to be that the issue needed more study.

The council also asked Ms. Mayo to contact Cebridge Connections, the city's cable TV provider and ask them to have a representative attend the next meeting.

Next, the council took up the issue of Christmas bonuses for city employees. Since it is unlawful for the city to pay Christmas bonuses, the council did what it has done for the last several years, authorized the payment of "longevity pay." Each city employee will receive \$50 for each year of service, up to ten years, with a \$500 maximum.

Before adjourning, the council approved sick time and vacation time benefits for part-time employees, based on the number of hours they work. They also approved the holiday schedule for 2005 with ten and one-half days being authorized as paid holidays for city employees in the upcoming year.

The council is scheduled to meet next on January 3, 2005 at 6:00 p.m. in City Hall.
