It is a challenge to every spark of decency in Bandera county. People of this whole country are paying tribute to violators of the liquor laws by maintaining silence instead of denouncing without fear every offender. The time will come when the right-thinking body of American people will rise in force and banish at one fell swoop every vestige of liquor corruption. It will clean house and put law and order in the saddle. Until that time every citizen should endeavor to protect his family and home against the menace of the underworld by standing solidly back of the law, for after all the law and its enforcement is our only recourse.—Harper Herald.

FORESIGHT

Man never arrives to his full stature until he awakens to full consciousness in all departments of his being. 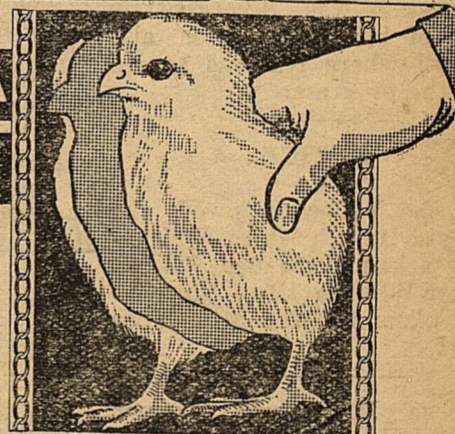
ARSON WORSE THAN MURDER

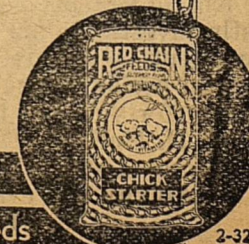

LOANING \$225,000
DAILEY TO FARMERS

"By the end of this week, the Regional Seed Loan Office in Dallas of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation will be grinding out a quarter of a million dollars in checks daily for Texas farmers," declared Owen W. Sherrill, Regional Manager, in a statewide broadcast over WFAA. "Our organization is working night and day. Every worker is doing his utmost to get the millions of dollars available for Texas, New Mexico and Arizona farmers in their hands as soon as possible."

"Getting these funds into circulation in business channels is helping restore confidence and stimulating general business in counties making full use of this loan service of the government." Farmers in Smith, Cherokee and adjacent counties in East Texas are borrowing to replant their tomato crops, which were lost in the recent freeze. If it were not for these funds farmers would not be able to replant this season.

Applications for loans from wheat growers in the Panhandle are being received in the Dallas office in large quantities, as well as from the Rio Grande Valley. In irrigated districts of the State, a special allowance of \$3.00 per acre is being granted for irrigation purposes.

Community committees are being organized in many counties to work with county committees so that farmers in outlying districts may be better accommodated.

PECAN DIVISION EXPERTS
TO BUD TREES AT MASON

AUSTIN, Texas, March, 31.—That native stock pecan trees can be budded with improved varieties to produce high quality nuts will be profen by the Department of Agriculture in the State's own backyard.

In co-operation with Mrs. Ross S. Sterling, wife of the Governor, and Mrs. Adrian Pool, wife of Board of Control Member Pool, who are ardent advocates of bettering the quality of nuts produced by native pecan trees, pecan experts of the Department have topworked and late this summer will bud two large pecan trees on the grounds of the Governor's Mansion here.

J. H. Burkett, chief of the pecan division and creator of the variety that bears his name, and J. T. Kelly, also of the Pecan Division, supervised the top working of the trees recently in preparation for the budding.

The larger of the two trees will be budded with the famous Burkett variety, while the second will be budded with either the Texas Prolific or Western Schley variety.

In the past the larger tree has produced about 75 pounds of nuts each season, the nuts being so small that about 200 were required to make a pound. Budded with the Burkett variety it is expected to produce at least 150 or 175 pounds of large nuts that will weigh out around 40 a pound in two seasons.

The House Wednesday inserted the following items in the revenue bill:

Reduced surtax exemptions from \$10,000 to \$6,000, to yield \$7,000,000.

Reduced corporation exemptions from \$2,000 to \$1,000, to yield \$6,000,000.

Assessed a 15 per cent tax on affiliated and consolidated returns \$18,000,000.

Mechanical refrigerators, 5 per cent, \$4,500,000.

Re-establishing the 1921 beverage taxes, \$11,000,000.

Safety deposit boxes, 10 per cent of rent, \$1,000,000.

Repealing the net losses deduction, \$20,000,000.

Levy on telephone, telegraph, radio and cable messages, \$33,000,000.

Increasing first class postage from 2 to 3 cents, \$135,000,000.

Admissions tax on tickets over 45 cents, \$40,000,000.

Stamp tax on stock issues, \$13,000,000.

Increasing from 13 to 13 1/2 per cent tax on corporations fil-

ing separate return, \$5,000,000.
