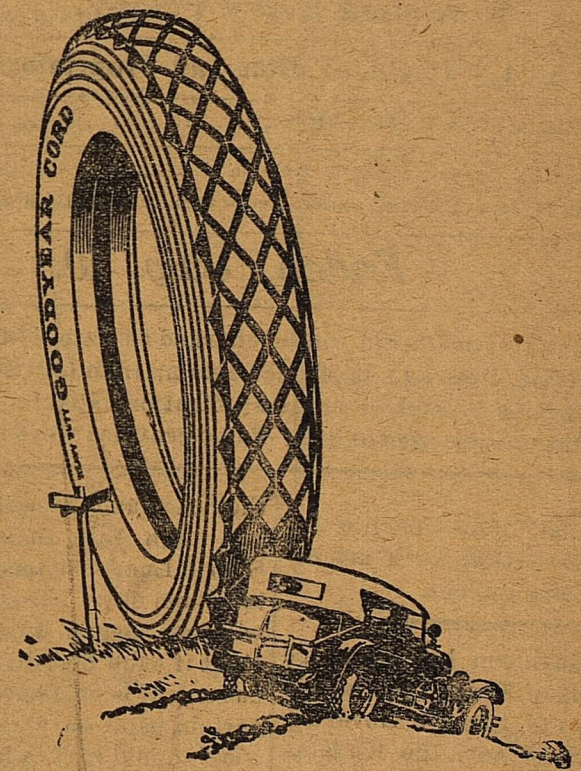

WHY MEN GO FREE.

William Darlin Shepherd went free. It is not surprising. We were not at the trial, nor did we follow the press reports futher than human nature and a battling morbidity enticed. We know little of the details of the case, and accept the verdict of acquittal because the jury has spoken and because of the cardinal principal of innocence until proven guilty.

It may be interesting, however, to speculate upon the reason for the jury's verdict of acquittal in the face of the fact that a state's witness, "Dr." Charles Faiman, testified that he supplied the defendant with typhoid germs with which to inoculate Billy McClintock, the millionaire wark of Shepherd. The jury didn't believe Faiman's story. They either decided that he told an untruth on the stand, or their confidence in his testimony was shaken to the extent that a reasonable doubt arose in their minds, which is sufficient for an acquittal in a criminal case.

We hear a lot from super-sentimental people about circumstantial evidence, but it is sometimes stronger and more convincing than direct or personal "eye-witness" testimony. The reason is because circumstances never lie, while men do. Conclusions drawn from circumstances may be erroneous, but not the circumstances by their very nature. This is why actual confessions of alleged murderers must be backed up by actual proof of the corpus delicti—body of the crime—by other evidence. A confession from a defendant is sometimes unreliable, and it is wholesome provision of our law and discretion of courts that confessions are not taken arbitrarily and alone upon which to pass sentence and base punishment.

Jurors know the proneness to error, the frailties of human speech and thought; the flights of imagination. They sit, they hear, they form doubts, and they acquit. It's the right system or the best system humans know; but it is both a protection to the innocent and a shield to the guilty.

EL DORADO TAKES SERIES FROM DEL RIO.

Games Attract Large Crowds At Sonora Celebration.

The El Dorado Eagles, baseball champions of this part of the world, triumphed over the Del Rio Cowboys by winning two games out of three during the celebration recently held at Sonora. The games attracted probably the largest crowds that ever attended baseball games in Sonora.

King pitched El Dorado to a 4-2 victory in the first game. He allowed eight hits but kept them well scattered, and was never in danger of being scored upon except in one inning when a single, tripled and steal of home netted Del Rio two runs. Up to this time El Dorado had been leading by virtue of White's home run which came in the 4th inning with no one on base. The locals won the game in the 7th after two men went out. Williams doubled to right and Barber followed with a homerun to left. Moore was hit by a pitched ball and scored on Bailey's double to right. Curry and Bailey divided the hitting honors for the winners while Dobbins led in this respect for Del Rio.

The second game proved a disappointment for the home fans when the locals kicked the ball game away. Each side garnered eight hits but the Cowboys made their hits when hits meant runs. Galloway pitched a strong game for Del Rio, having fourteen strikeouts to his credit. Howard, with two hits out of four bats, led the hitting for Del Rio, while Bailey, with three hits out of as many times up, had a perfect day to lead the Eagle hitters.

The last game proved a burlesque, but was highly entertaining to El Doradoans. The locals hit hard and timely and won in a walk at the expense of five Del Rio pitchers. Although Bailey, El Dorado hurler, was in poor shape to pitch he managed to hold Del Rio scoreless until the 3th inning, when the Cowboys put over two runs. In the meantime El Dorado had been making runs with monotonous regularity. The turning point in the game came in the 3rd inning: Williams singled to left. Barber sacrificed and both runners were safe when the pitcher overbrew first. Haney walked, filling the bases. Bailey singled sharply to right scoring Williams, but Barber was held a 3rd. Higgins took one strike and then drove the next pitcher over the left field fence for a homerun, scoring the three runners ahead of himself. This put the finishing touches on Del Rio and had a like effect on Sonora. The game was featured by the perfect hitting of Higgins, Barber and Bailey for El Dorado. He later duplicating his feat of the day before. Williams played a fine defensive ball for the winners, handling seven chances without an error. Dobbins, with two out of three tries, again led the hitting for Del Rio.

CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS

S. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, is in Indianapolis, Ind., attending the annual meeting of the National Teachers' Association.

Deputy supervisors of the oil and gas division of the Railroad Commission met in conference with the chief supervisor and the members of the commission here and remained for two or three days.

With 127 opinions handed down in less than ten months, Section A of the Commission of Appeals, of the State Supreme Court, two of whose members have retired from the State Judiciary, set a new record for the assisting division.

The Texas State Florists' Association, no capital stock, with headquarters at Greenville, has been chartered. Purposes of the organization include the development of improved methods of culture of flowers and ornamental plants and to promote civic improvements.

Permit to do business in Texas has been granted to the Gulf State Steel Company, Birmingham, Ala. capital stock \$15,500,000; Texas headquarters at Dallas. Charles E. Pad dock, State agent. The company will buy and sell nails and wire and products of wire and steel.

Some of the many State convicts who are being pardoned by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson may be given aid by the American Prison Relief Society, headquarters at Houston which has been granted a charter by the Secretary of State for the purpose of "assisting prisoners, and particularly obtaining employment for discharged prisoners."

Failure of the bill by Senator John Davis of Dallas, amending the divorce statutes to become a law, did not result through negligence on House employees, Carl L. Phinney, chief clerk of the House, asserted and he declared that "the reason for the failure of the bill to be enrolled will have to be explained by the secretary of the Senate."

Supreme Court Chief Justice C. M. Cureton, accompanied by Mrs. Cureton, left for Los Angeles, Cal., to spend the summer vacation. Associate Justice T. B. Greenwood and Mrs. Greenwood are now en route to San Diego, Cal., to remain until September. Associate Justice William Pierson remains at Austin and expects to spend the summer in Texas.

The Railroad Commission recently heard arguments on the application of the city of Sherman for a rehearing and change of judgment in the commission's recent order raising from 25c to 50c the monthly service charge for gas furnished to patrons of Sherman by the Municipal Gas Company. The company wanted it raised to \$1 per month.

Howard Mumford Jones, associate professor of comparative literature in the University of Texas, has resigned in order to accept a position on the faculty of the University of Wisconsin. During the last year, he has been on leave of absence from the University of Texas, teaching and studying in the University of Chicago.

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson has been invited to become a member of the Council of Governors, which will serve in a supervisory capacity to the international exposition to be held in Philadelphia, Pa., June 1 to Dec. 1, 1926. The invitation was extended by W. Freeland Kendrick, Mayor of Philadelphia, in an unusually cordial note addressed to Mrs. Ferguson. The Mayor advised that Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania will act as chairman of the council.

Extension of financial and other types of aid to students of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas was listed as the primary purpose of the Association of Former Students of the College incorporated here recently. Aid will be worked out by promoting social, literary and scientific pursuits, it was shown. Members of the Board of Directors come from all parts of the State.

Controversy between the State Highway Department and the State Board of Control was smoothed over upon the arrival in Austin of Frank Lanham of Dallas, chairman of the Highway Commission. According to Mr. Lanham the misunderstanding grew to proportions not justified by the facts. As a result of the amicable adjustment the \$125,000 of automobile number plates purchased by the Board of Control will be delivered as per contract.

The Supreme Court made final its former decision upholding the validity of the textbook contracts of last December by overruling motions for rehearing in all eight cases and immediately mandate had been served on L. W. Rogers, First Assistant and Acting State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in the absence of State Superintendent Marrs, commanding the latter to do all things necessary to carry out the order of the State Board of Education of Jan. 12 to put the contracts into effect.

TEXAS ITEMS

The hayning season has opened up at Alvin and several cars are being shipped daily.

The proposition to issue bonds to install a sewerage system for Alto was defeated in an election held last week.

Affiliation in eight and a half units has been granted the Canton high school by the state department of education.

Tax records show that the total rendition value of property in Van Zandt County for 1925 is \$250,000 less than that in 1924.

On July 1 the Llano postoffice again was advanced to second class. Two years ago, after the failure of two banks at Llano, business declined and the postoffice lost its second-class rating.

Port collections for the Galveston customs district passed the \$10,000,000 mark for the fiscal year ending June 30, for the first time in the history of the district.

An issue of \$100,000 Mineral Wells Independent School District bonds, bearing 5 per cent and maturing serially, has been approved by the attorney general's department.

Work has been started on the Culberson highway from Glimmer to the Harrison County line. Construction of the Jefferson and Texas Central road through Upshur County will soon be completed.

A marker for the site of old Fort Elliot, near Mobeetie, used by the United States army as headquarters during the Indian troubles following 1874, is planned by the Panhandle Plains Historical society. The fort was abandoned by the army in 1894.

Estate of the late Mrs. F. A. Lutzer of Orange, will pay to the state approximately \$175,000 in inheritance taxes, according to Comptroller Terrell. A final report of the executor, H. J. Lutzer Stark, has been filed in the tax division. The net estate for distribution is \$3,578,744.

The \$40,000 necessary for the location survey of the intracoastal canal will be ready to turn over to the government within the next week or so and actual work on the survey is expected to get under way within the next sixty days, according to Roy Miller, active vice president of the Intra-coastal Canal Association.

Advisory regulations in regard to selection of school sites by school boards were made this week by Dr. H. O. Sappington, state health officer. They urged well drained grounds and adequate sewerage, ample playgrounds, away from dangerous places, such as highways and railroad tracks; good environment, safe water and sidewalks.

James Stephen Hogg and John H. Reagan, in heroic bronze statues, will take their place beside Davis, Albert Sidney Johnston, Robert E. Lee and Woodrow Wilson in Austin within the next month, when the nine-foot bronze figures are received for the George W. Littlefield memorial to the Southern Confederacy, which when completed will be the largest group of statuary on any American college campus.

Five Texas towns get lower fire insurance rates and seven will pay higher rates as a result of revisions just made by the insurance commission based on new schedules. The reductions were given Cold Springs, Dayton, Lueders, Shepherd and Perrin, each from 99 to 98 cents. Increases were applied on Glidden, Lincoln, Nada, from 97 to 98 cents; Roby, 95 to 96 cents; Brookshire, 96 to 98 cents, and Lazare and Leesville, 99 cents to \$1.00.

Jefferson County, Texas, shows a marked increase in the number of farms revealed by the agricultural census taken as of January 1, 1925, when the number was 650, compared with 419 five years ago. The land and building values, however, dropped from \$5,505,960 to \$4,662,670 during the period. Land values as of last January aggregated \$3,734,320, or about \$300,000 less compared with 1920, while building values of \$928,350 were \$30,000 greater than the former year.

Game conservationists of Texas have scored a victory in the passage of a revised game law in Texas, effective next season. Those who have labored long and diligently to afford the dove more adequate protection are rejoicing in the fact that the open season on this bird has been reduced to two months, November and December, in the Southern zone, September and October in the Northern half of the state. There was a time when the open season on dove opened in August and continued until mid-winter. Such a season brought about the slaughter of many birds that had not attained even a half growth.

Officials of Federal Land Banks and Farm Loan Association secretaries of the state will meet in annual convention at Austin August 14, instead of the second week of July, it was announced this week.

Increased fees of county tax assessors based on assessments, will not take effect until 1926, Attorney General Dan Moody ruled in a recent opinion to Comptroller S. H. Torrell. The assessments for 1925 were made under the old law and at the old rate of fees, it was held.

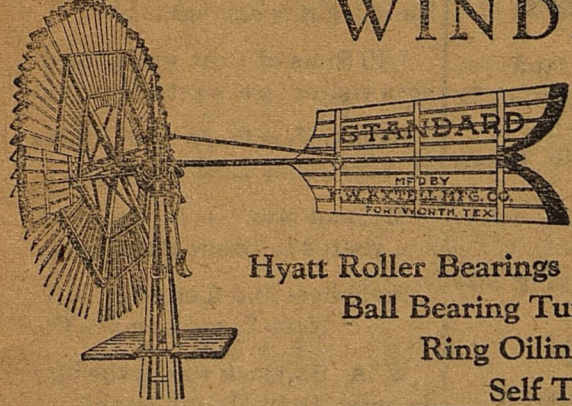

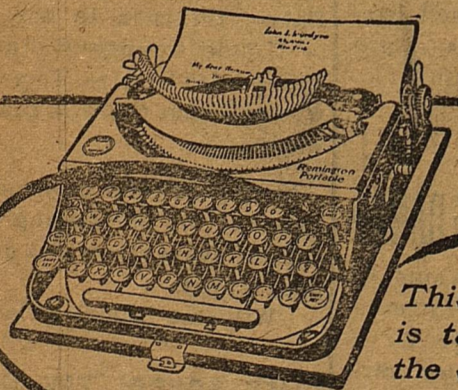

FEEDING BABY DURING SUMMER

Milk is recognized as the ideal food for young children. It should be carefully guarded during the warm summer months, to insure its freedom from germs & bacteria that might cause harm to the child. From Sixth Week to Third Month.
Milk, evaporated 6 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 26 ounces
Seven feedings in twenty-four hours
4 to 5 ounces at three-hour intervals
during the day and four-hour intervals
at night.

From Third Month to Fifth Month.
Milk, evaporated 7 1/2 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 29 1/2 ounces
Six feedings in twenty-four hours:
5 to 6 ounces at three-hour intervals
during the day and a feeding at 10
p. m.

From Fifth to Seventh Month.
Milk, evaporated 10 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 23 ounces
Five feedings in twenty-four hours:
6 to 7 ounces at four-hour intervals
the last feeding to be given at 10 p. m.

From Seventh to Ninth Month.
Milk, evaporated 11 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Billed water 35 ounces
7 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals
during the day. Last feeding at ten
at night.

From Ninth to Twelfth Month.
Milk, evaporated 12 ounces
Lime water 3 ounces
Milk sugar 2 ounces
Barley water 34 ounces
8 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals
during day. Last feeding at ten a
night.

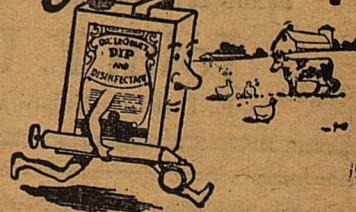
