S. A. Telephone Company to Install Cables.

The San Angelo Telephone Co. has begun work on the installation of cables within the city limits of Eldorado. This will make the lines heavier and destroy the roaring and buzzing noises that have been so troublesome lately. Gas and Oil Show at 4110 Feet.

On reaching the depth of 4110 feet in the Whitten No. 1 oil well about four miles northwest of Eldorado a showing of gas and oil was struck last Thursday afternoon. The drilling was stopped and casing and reserve tanks were ordered. The test of the quantity of the oil has not been made. The gas has almost stopped. The casing and tanks have arrived this week and a test will soon be made as to the amount of oil that is in the well. There were about four or five hundred feet of open hole when the drillers hit the oil. The only work that has been done since is the reaming out of the hole making it an eight inch where it was only six at the time of the showing.

The quantity of the oil is not known and no estimate has been made by the officials of the company, but the test of quality has already been made which showed a test of quality has already been made which showed a test of 41, almost perfect.

This well was started about two years ago by Jones Bros. Co. and only a few feet drilled. Later a contract was made with the Interstate Oil Company to complete the hole to a depth of 3500 feet. This was completed and no showing was found. The contract was then taken over by the Phillips Oil people which called for a hole 8,000 feet.

There is no active work going on at the well at present and no report has been received at the present writing as to the amount that the well will produce.

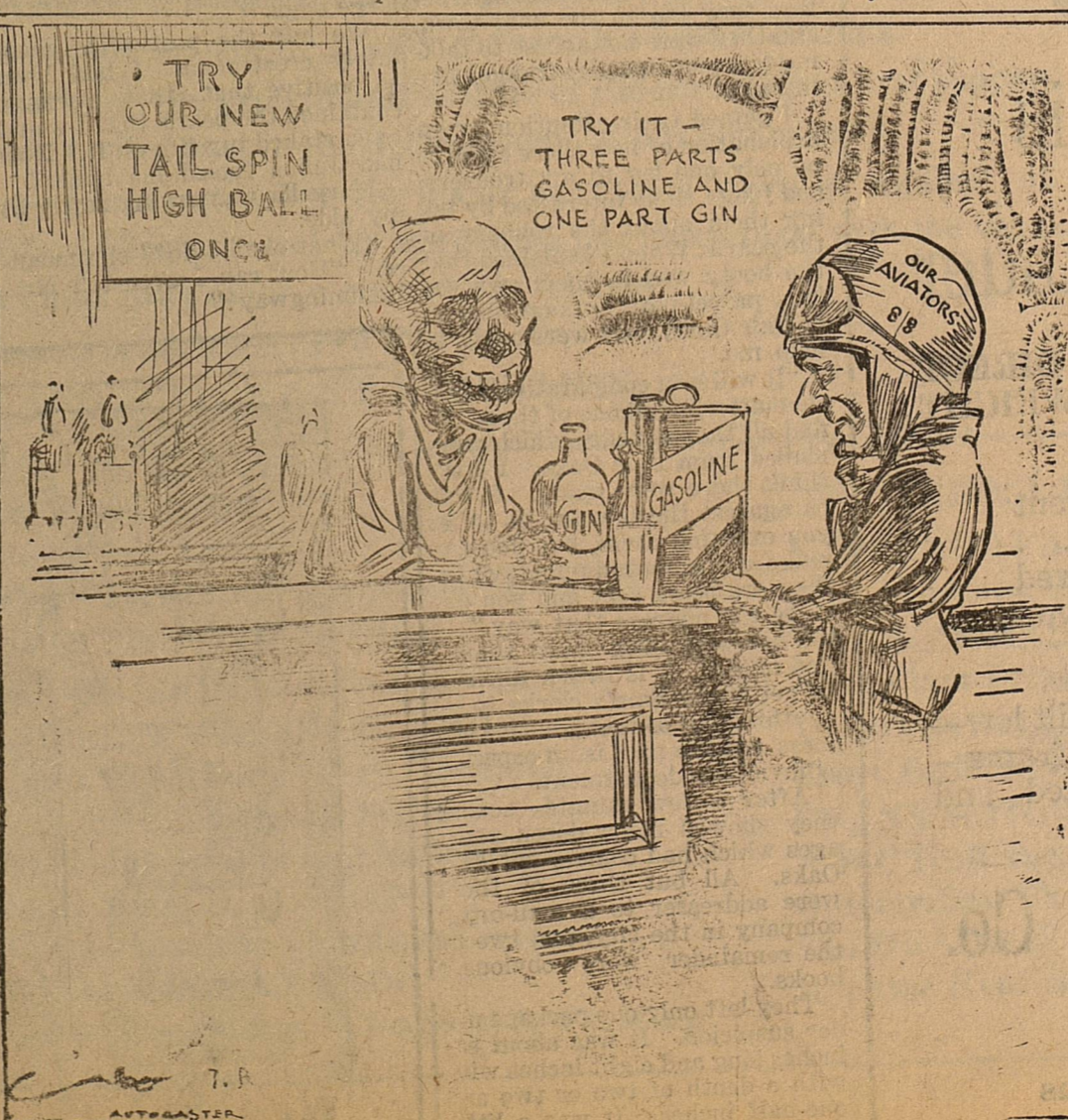

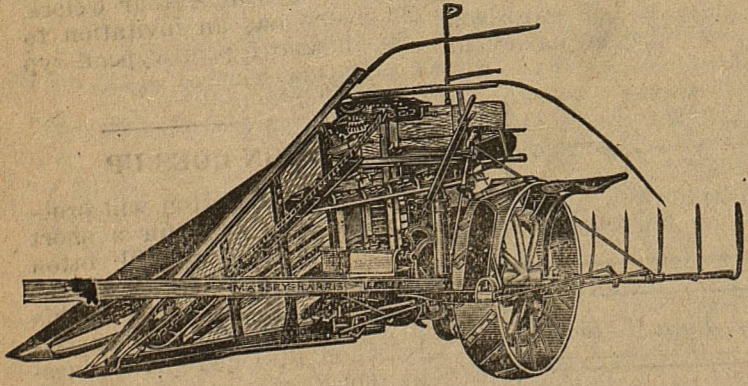


Some of the people seem to

we were readily admitted.

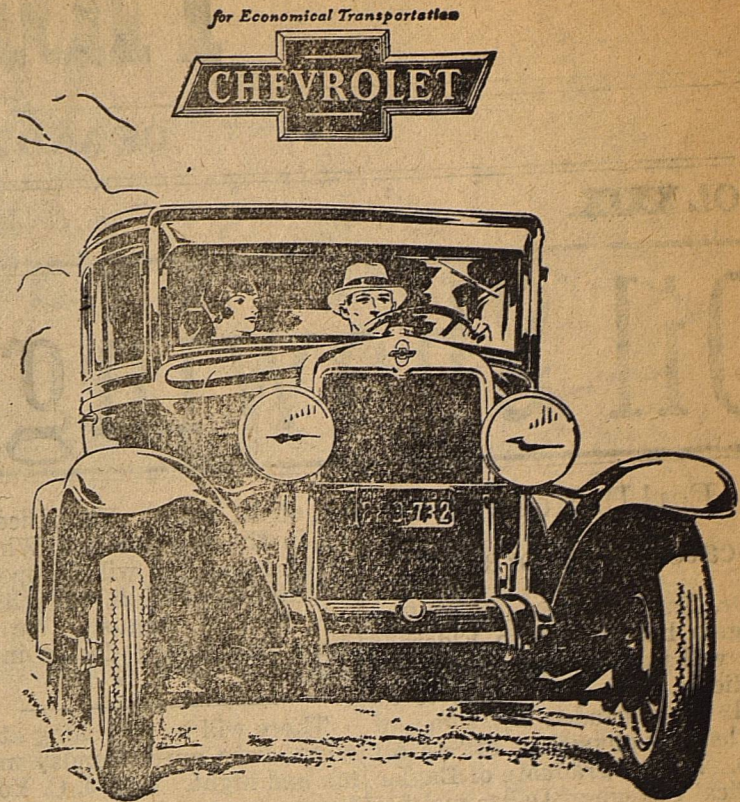
The box lay on his desk and

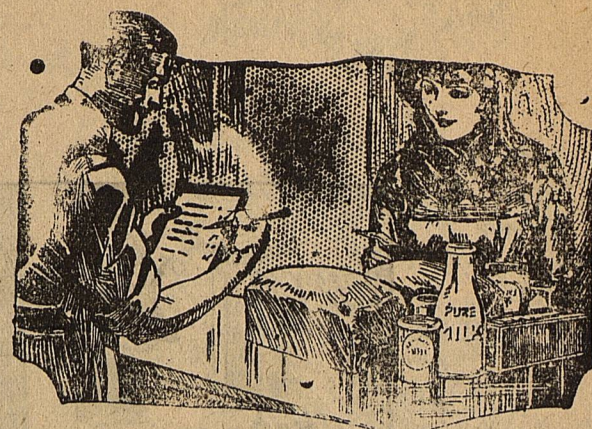
SILENT ELOQUENCE

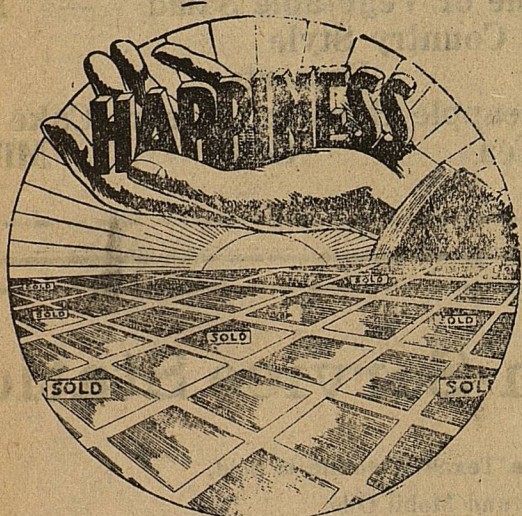

WANTED: A BRAVE MAN

If one touches a toad, one will get warts. So persons have believed for a very long time. Why?

The scientific books on disease of the skin recognize the fact that the cause of warts is unknown. The wart, it is known, represents a thickening of certain layers of the skin with projection upward. This process is initiated by an irritation which may be due to poison, to bacteria, to mechanical action or possibly to nerve disturbances.

Says Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association: "There is one excellent way, however, of proving promptly that touching a toad will not produce warts—that is to get a toad and touch it. It is a safe bet that the warts will not appear in the vast majority of cases when this experiment is tried."

It is a great and noble tradition that helps every one of us every day.

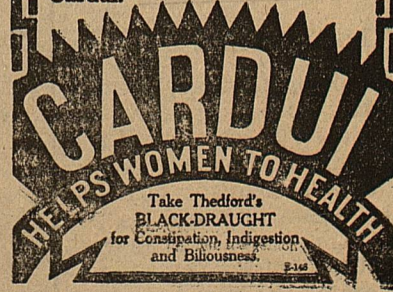
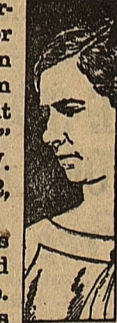
