There was a time when slavery was widespread, and slaves almost helpless. Now the Emancipation Proclamation is world wide in scope. There are no longer slaves except those of bad habits. The creditable and powerful people known as the Jews were once slaves of the Babylonians, but were able to overcome their masters: not by revolution but by industry, efficiency, reliability, saving. Such information as their masters had the Jews acquired and improved. And it was the patient workers who survived; the rowdy Babylonians disappeared from the face of the earth, and the Jews are today a notable people.

Politics in the finest piece of sentiment in human affairs, and the worst reguery. Every politician is too great a friend of humanity when a candidate, and too great an enemy when elected in attempts to carry out promises he knew in the first place were ridiculous. This is in the very nature of things, and I know of no remedy, except endeavor to improve the intelligence of voters. Such young men cause dissensions hurtful to the business, and I observe that frequently in the best establishments the sons of owners are compelled to take pot luck with the others; to put on overalls, and fight grease with those in the lower ranks, while the best offices are occupied by workers who have honestly earned the distinction.

This should be the rule every where and in every thing; I do not know how it is to be brought about, but it is best that every one be compelled to earn his way up, or stay down.

I am convinced it would be better in human society if this rule could be adopted:

No work, no dinner. Everyone is better off for earning his own way; it makes him fairer, broader, easier to get along with.

In one small town thirty-three rich widows, not one of whom has ever legitimately earned a penny were counted. In some ways it is right; in more ways it is wrong. Let the people vote on it.

## Schleicher Railroad Committee Has Almost Completed Work

For the second time in the history of Schleicher County a railroad committee has almost completed its work and is waiting for the railroad to come to Eldorado. The first committee has waited for twenty years in vain but the present committee has every reason to believe that their work will be fruitful. The only member of the old committee who is also a member of the present railroad committee is Joab Campbell, who is now chairman of the right-of-way committee, a sub-committee of the general railroad organization of Schleicher County. Mr J. B. Christian is chairman of the general committee and Judge J. A. Whitten is secretary.

According to Mr Campbell, the right of way committee has secured title for the railway thru Schleicher County and has also arranged for land for stockpens in Eldorado. Deeds have been secured for all the lands along the right of way and all agreements have been reached in regard to damages except in two cases and these are not expected to delay the work on the road in any way.

The stockpens are to be located near the north east corner of the town section of Eldorado. This will be one-half mile from the court house, approximately. The plans call for some of the best shipping pens in this part of the state and consist of sheep and cattle pens, cutting chutes, holding pens provided with water, and scales upon which to weigh the stock before shipping.

The county is to furnish the land and the railroad company is to build the pens. Five acres of land have already been purchased by the right of way committee from the Townsite Company, at \$100 per acre. The stockpens are modeled after the shipping pens at Barnhart with some few changes.

The right of way committee of Schleicher consists of Mr Joab Campbell, (chairman) Mr Luke Thomson, Albert Bailey, Dick Lawhorne, Lee Williams, and W H Parker. They have accomplished much in the securing right of way and in settling claim for damages along the road.

The general railroad committee of the county, working thru its various sub-committees, has raised a bonus of more than \$20,000, which is not to be paid to the railroad company until the road reaches Sonora. The bonus is to be collected, however, when the road reaches Eldorado. Mr Jess Koy is chairman of the committee in charge of the apportioning of the bonus among the land owners of the county.

The depot at Eldorado is to be located southeast of the court house and some two hundred yards south of the present Fort McKavett road. This will be some three fourths of a mile from the business part of Eldorado. There is no street leading to the proposed depot site, according to Mr J B Christian, who is chairman of the general railroad committee. The land separating the town section and the depot site is privately owned but it is expected that a street will be opened up without any difficulty.

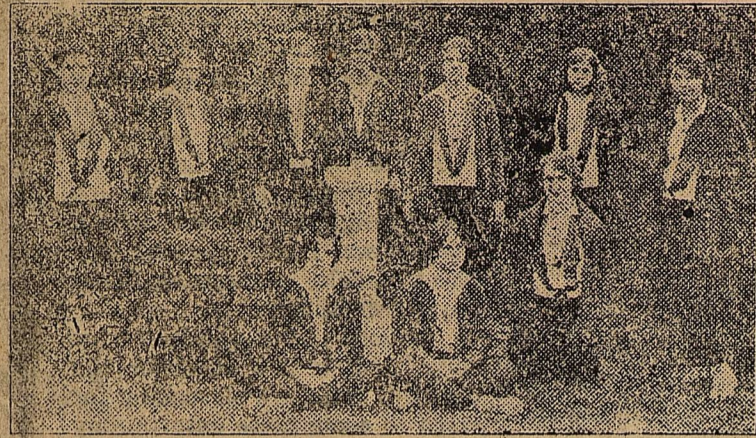

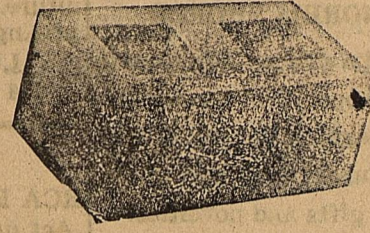
"Stand anywhere else, young feller," he chuckled, "but give me the pole. This anklet fits a certain girl, and I'm the bad boy who's going to put it on her!"

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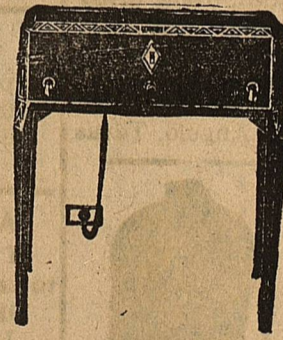
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
