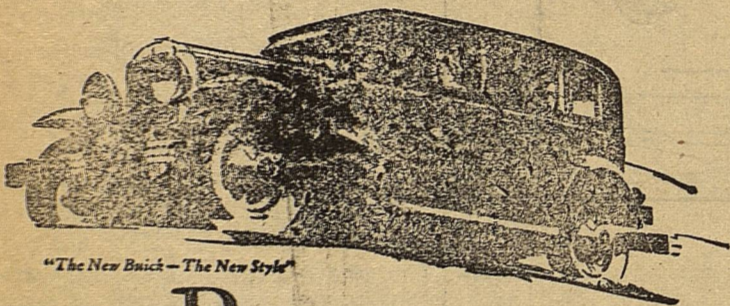

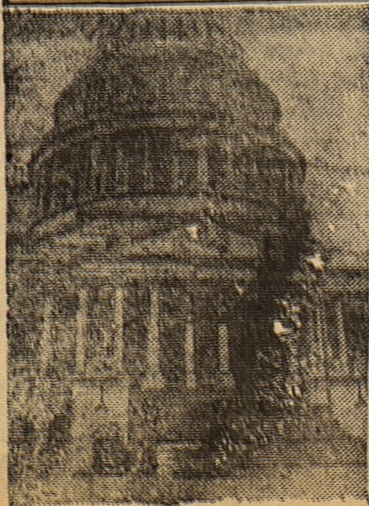

THE TOWN DOCTOR SAYS

Is there anyone who thinks that it isn't a good idea to make the town in which he lives just a little more attractive, a little more interesting, a little bit larger and a little bit better?

But, if a man came into your town a stranger and said to any twenty people on the street, or in the stores, "This looks like a pretty good town here," what percentage of the replies do you suppose would be for the town.

If he were to put the question to YOU, what would YOU say?

If you were working in a store and a customer said, "This looks like a pretty good store," and you answered, "Oh, yes, it's all right if you like it," or "Well, it used to be all right," the boss would doubt fire you; if he didn't he should!

If you answered a customer's inquiry of, "What kind of a store is this," with, "slow," "dead," "terrible" or any of those unprintable descriptions that you and I and everyone have heard people say about their town, you would be classed as a blithering idiot, mutton-head numbskull, and a loony nincompoop—and who wants to be that?

Maybe you have never thought of it that way. Well, one can't think of everything, but here is something every resident of every city must think about sooner or later, and for your own personal betterment it had better be sooner.

Start thinking about your community as a business—look at it as a business of which YOU are a part. Put out of your head the old-fashioned idea of your town being something that just happened—something that you

can't get hold of—an intangible thing so big that whatever you do as an individual won't make any difference one way or the other.

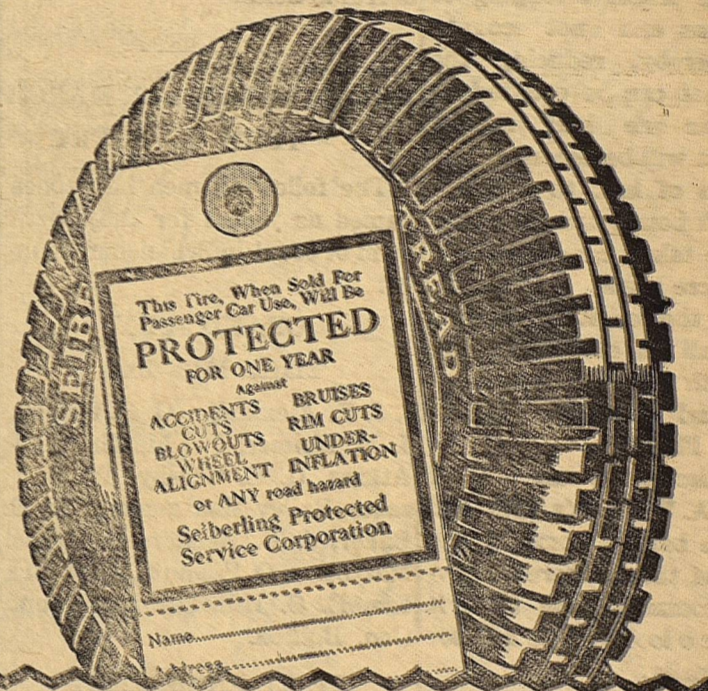
You don't have to be mayor, president of a civic club, head of a bank or a store to be important your vote counts just as much as that of any banker, doctor, lawyer, merchant, or any city official, and it's the attitude YOU take toward your community—the things YOU do for or against it—that makes it alive or dead, good or bad, forging ahead or standing still.

When industry considers your town, it is the people they want to know about, not just the few shining lights—the big boys alone—and have their men study. It's you they feel out, often without your knowing it, and on your attitude, how you look at, act toward and talk about your community, depends on whether their report is favorable for a new factory, distributing point, headquarters for representatives or for whatever they are considering your town.

As a citizen you are a salesperson for your community the same as a clerk is a salesperson of a store; the merchants, bankers and professional people are the same as department heads of a store, and the officials of your community are the floor-walkers.

It's always up to the sales force of any business. Your town is a business—your business—and just the same it's up to you.

NEW TENNIS COURT

A new tennis court has been made on the boys basket ball court. Net wire back stops have been erected, the ground packed and all is ready for practice. Several boys have hopes of winning a trip to Austin through the skillful use of their rackets. The most likely contenders for the honor to represent Eldorado High School are Glenn Ratliff, Edward Ratliff, Hayne Graves, Roscoe Parker, Cicero Owift, Morris and Jack Whitten.

TRACK PROSPECTS

With the new 400 yard track on the west side of the campus in good condition, prospects for Eldorado High School's first track team are looking better. Both the junior and senior boys are working out daily. The boys are taking much interest and will soon be ready to show their "stuff." A new discus and shot are giving the stout boys some puzzling afternoons. Eldorado with 20 good men for a track team should give a good account of itself this year at the District Meet.

TRACK MEET AT SONORA

The first goal for the Eldorado track team is to win the invitation track meet at Sonora March 16. Both senior and junior boys are going to this meet and are expecting to return with the loving cups. This meet will give the Eldorado boys a chance to gain some experience before the district meet at San Angelo, April 12 and 13.

THE MANAGEMENT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY

The library of the Eldorado High School, with its 1,100 volumes, is for the use of the students of the school, as well as for the public in general. Under the present plan of management the library is under the direct charge of one of the high school teacher who in turn appoints students to assist in the work. The library is kept open two periods during the day from 8:30 to 9:00 and from 3:20 to 4:00 o'clock. Two students are in the library each period when the library is open and at all other periods the library is locked.

The girls who work in the library are Una Ford, Isabella Isaacs, Oma Ford, Linna Parker, Margaret Tisdale, Lelia Parker, Viola May, Hazel Bruton and Grace Ratliff. Each of these girls devotes two periods each week in the library and without compensation of any kind. These students are to be commended

for the spirit in which they perform their duties and for the interest which they take in maintaining the library in an efficient manner. Only the better students are chosen for library work and instead of hampering them in their regular school work the library training and dealing with other students helps them in many ways.

During the last two years few books have been lost from the library. A careful check of the library and of the books charged out enables the librarians to charge a small fine for all books overdue. A considerable sum is collected each year for fines and this is placed in the general library fund.

LEARNING TO DO BY DOING

In this day of keen competition in business, scarcity of employment and struggle to meet the bills at the end of the month, the spotlight of public opinion is being turned upon our educational system. Are the public schools training the future citizens to meet the demands of the time? Is the work of the public school a practical benefit? The experience of mankind has shown that schools are necessary for the best training of the youth so that he may better be able to take his place in the world.

The answers to the above questions are to be found in the study of the present educational tendencies of the public school system of Texas. The course of study and methods of instruction have undergone great changes in the last decade. The educational facilities of the state have developed rapidly but not as rapidly perhaps as the development of the economical resources of the state. In our rapid industrial development there is need that we put into practice some form of education that will train the hands and the eyes and not merely train the mind or store up a collection of dry facts which might take the place of something more useful. As a writer in Hollands Magazine recently stated it, "the time is here when the young man in overalls with grease on his hands and mawbe his face, is in greater demand at a higher wage than the white collar worker, important as he may be."

A strong demand for a practical education has brought a strong demand for vocational subjects in the Texas high schools. Shop work, home economics, agriculture, cooking and sewing have taken the place of Latin and Greek.

This particular section of Texas has not been backward in its revision of the course of study or the schools. Commercial work, Home Economics, Vocational Agriculture and other practical subjects have been added to the course of study in most of the high schools.

The directory of the accredited high schools of 1928 shows that the schools in this section of the state have the following

vocational work:
 Mertzon—2 credits in Home Economics; 1 in Home Nursing; 1½ in Vocational Agriculture.
 Menard—1 credit in Agriculture.
 Sterling City—2 credits in Home Economics; 3 in Agriculture.
 Eden—3 credits in Vocational Agriculture.
 Brady—3 credits in Home Economics; 1 in Home Nursing.
 Ozona—2 credits in Home Economics; 1½ in Agriculture.
 Sonora—1 credit Home Economics.
 Big Lake—1½ credits in Home Economics.
 Rock Springs—2 credits in Home Economics.
 San Angelo—2 credits in Shop Work; 2 in Mechanical Drawing; 2½ in Home Economics.

The members of the Eldorado High School track team and other field events are invited to attend the second annual Track and Field Meet held at Sonora on March 9, 1929. This meet is sponsored by the Lions Club and the Commercial Club of Sonora. There will be two divisions; senior boys and junior boys. We shall use the same system of awards as we used last year, says the coach of the Sonora school. Any boy under 14 years of age on September 1, 1928, shall be regarded as a junior in accordance with the rules of the Inter-scholastic League, except that no distinction will be made between those in the grades and those in the high school.

Junior boy's events will begin at 10 a. m. Senior boys events will begin at 1 p. m. Any necessary senior boys preliminaries will begin at 10 a. m.

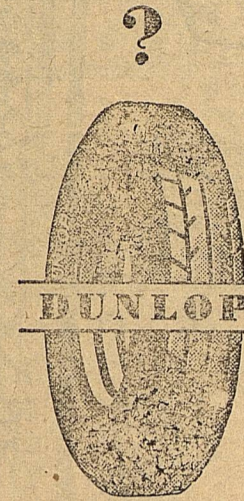
