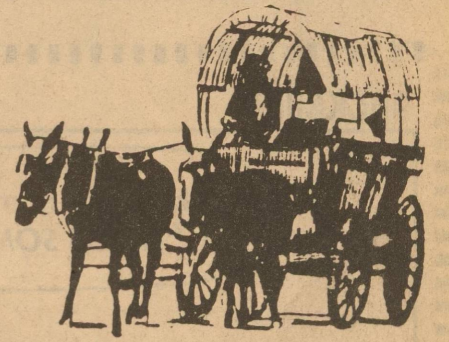

American Eagle Plane Crashes In Indiana

Roselawn, Indiana

American Eagle flight 4184 destined for Chicago's O'Hare Airport crashed near here Monday afternoon, killing all 68 aboard. The accident came as the plane was flying in a holding pattern around the Chicago airport during a violent rainstorm.

Emergency personnel and equipment attempting to reach the crash site were hampered by muddy conditions. A gravel road was hastily constructed across a boggy soy bean field to access the area.

Officials from the Air Transportation Safety Board investigating the wreck declined to speculate on the cause of the accident, but reported that no unusual radio transmissions were received by Air Traffic Controllers in Chicago before the plane disappeared from radar screens.

Gunman Opens Fire On White House

Washington, D.C.

Francisco Martin Duran of Colorado Springs, Colorado was taken into custody last Saturday by Secret Service officers after he fired several shots at the White House. No one was injured in the incident and most of the rounds ricocheted off the mansion's exterior, but one bullet did break a window and lodge in a wall in the White House Press room.

Duran, who was standing and firing at the building from the sidewalk on Pennsylvania Avenue was tackled by tourists and passersby and handed over to security agents.

Although he was in the White House at the time, President Clinton stated that he was not alarmed by the incident and resisted calls this week to close off Pennsylvania Avenue as a security precaution.

NAACP Lays Off Employees

Baltimore Maryland

The NAACP announced this week that it would be laying off most of its 100+ employees. The move was prompted by a reported \$3.5 million budget deficit which the NAACP board of directors blamed on Benjamin Chavis, the former executive director of the organization.

Chavis was fired by the group's board of directors earlier this year after he allegedly used NAACP funds to settle a sexual harassment lawsuit against him by a former assistant.

According to published reports, many of the organization's personnel intend to work without pay in order to keep the nation's oldest civil rights group from closing its doors.

Eagles Overwhelm Van Horn

"Do Or Die" Friday Night In Iraan As Eagles Vie For Play-off Spot

The Eldorado Eagles hosted new district rival Van Horn last Friday night and handed the visitors a 31-0 loss. The Van Horn Eagles made the long trek east hoping for their first district win but Eldorado Eagles had something else in mind. After stopping Van Horn's first drive, Michael O'Daniel scored for the Eagles from 19 yards out. From there on, the game was never in doubt.

Travis Whitten added a one yard TD run in the opening quarter and Landon Neal found the endzone with 7:03 remaining in the first quarter to make the score 19-0 at the half.

Pepper Nix scored on a 15 yard pass from Travis Whitten in the 3rd quarter and Whitten scored again with 10:47 left in the game to round out the scoring.

For the night, Michael O'Daniel gained 152 yards on 19 carries. Landon Neal picked up 28 yards on 9 tries while Travis Whitten ran 5 times for 26 yards. Whitten hit on 8 of 14 pass attempts for 128 yards. Clay Butler gained 23 yards on 6 carries and caught 1 pass for 4 yards. Pepper Nix hauled in 4 passes for 90 yards. Eric McGinnes caught 1 for 15

yards. Joe Rocha caught 1 for 8 yards and Cody McCravey gained 11 yards on a pass reception.

Defensively, Cody McCravey turned in 15 tackles with 5 of those being solos and 1 quarterback sack. Zane Bruce had 16 tackles and a fumble recovery. Landon Neal counted for 11 tackles, forced a fumble and sacked the quarterback. Will Edmiston contributed 2 sacks. Eric McGinnes delivered 10 tackles, 1 sack and 1 batted ball while Ty Williams notched up 9 tackles and a fumble recovery.

After the game, Head Coach Doug Kuhlmann was already looking ahead to the all important game with Iraan. "We are really pleased with the progress of our team recently. But, we must continue to improve and play well Friday against Iraan." Kuhlmann also named Pepper Nix and Cody McCravey as this weeks Offensive and Defensive Players of the Week.

The Eagles will travel to Iraan tomorrow night to take on the Iraan Braves in the final game of the regular season with the winner advancing to the Class AA playoffs.

Election Draws Near

Just when Halloween was over and we thought we were safe at last from all thing frightful, along comes the November 8th General Election and a bevy of candidates making their final pitches to the voters.

Races being decided this year range from United States Senator on the National Level, to Governor on the State Level, to County Commissioner and Justice of the Peace locally. (please see sample

Early Voting will conclude Friday, November 4th. Polling Places will open at 7:00 a.m. Tuesday, November 8th and remain open till 7:00 p.m.

Local races to be decided this year are County Judge with incumbent Johnny Griffin facing challenger John Nikolauk, County and District Clerk with Peggy Williams and Pat Ragsdale vying to replace retiring Clerk Helen

Blakeway, Justice of the Peace with Robert Parker and Jimmy Doyle running to fill that vacant office, County Commissioner Pct. 2 with incumbent Kerry Joy facing challenger Matt Brown and Write-In Candidate Hal Whitten, County Commissioner Pct. 4 with incumbent Ross Whitten challenged by C.R. Sproul. Also on the ballot locally is County Treasurer Karen Henderson who is unopposed for re-election.

Polling Place Changed

Helen Blakeway, Schleicher County Clerk announced this week that the polling place for Precinct 3 in next Tuesday's General Election will be in the Schleicher County Courthouse Annex in the Extension Agents Office at 201 S. Main, Eldorado, Texas.

The polling place was officially moved by the Schleicher County Commissioners Court a year ago but the first Notice of General Election posted by the County named the Court House as Precinct 3 polling place. Corrected notices of General Election have been posted in all 4 election precincts.

The other polling places will remain the same as they have been. Precinct 1 will vote in the First United Methodist Church Educa-

In other election news, it was discovered this week that Write-In Candidate, Hal Whitten's name was inadvertently printed on the ballots to be used in Precinct 2. The Secretary of State's Office reported to the Success that Write-In candidate's names should not appear on the ballot. County Clerk Helen Blakeway ordered that corrections be made to the ballots, however those ballots already cast in early voting will remain as they are. Paul Miles, an attorney in the Secretary of State's office said that the mix-up could result in the election for County Commissioner in Precinct 2 being contested in court and the possibility of a new election being ordered.

The Schleicher County Independent School District will hold a special election Saturday, January 21, 1994. The purpose of the election is to fill the two vacated positions created by the resignations of Tommy Martinez and Phil McCormick. As this is a very important election, the SCISD encourages your participation, if you reside in Precinct One or Precinct

Five, you should have received a letter explaining the election and outlining important dates. The filing dates are: November 7 through December 7, 1994. Anyone with questions or requiring further information is asked to contact Janet Curtis at 853-2514. The School District will issue further notices concerning early and regular election information.

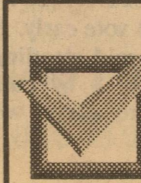

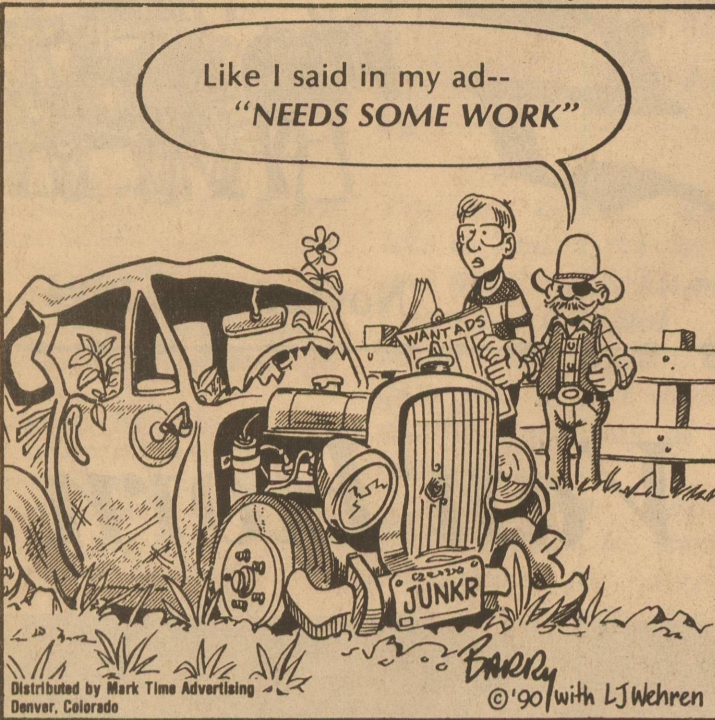

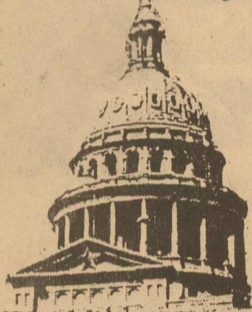

The Federal Emergency Management Agency has received more than 15,000 applications for disaster relief and approved more than \$2 million in aid, The Associated Press reported.

Meanwhile, the Texas attorney general's office is investigating complaints of price-gouging by businesses that rent water-removal equipment.

State Gets Federal Funds

Texas will receive \$71.4 million in federal funds for three business projects, the governor's office announced.

The projects and their funding include:

- \$20.9 million to establish the Texas Manufacturing Assistance Center. The center will assist Texas' 20,000 small manufacturers on the use of new technologies.

- \$25 million for a Texas Instruments Inc. project to develop affordable infrared technology for military and commercial markets.

- \$25.5 million for a Texas Instruments-Raytheon project on field emission display technology.

Sharp's Welfare Reform Plan
The state comptroller's office is developing a welfare reform plan to present to the Legislature in January.

"Welfare regulations discourage self-reliance and encourage long-term dependence, and this has got to stop," Comptroller John Sharp said last week.

In 1993, more than 2.6 million Texans received \$2.2 billion worth of food stamps and more than 250,000 families qualified for \$533 million in Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

At the present time, 48 states are actively pursuing some sort of welfare reform. Controversial initiatives include limiting time on welfare and denying additional benefits for additional children.

\$160,000 Grant, No Police

Vice President Al Gore says he will investigate the crime bill grant given to a tiny eastern Oklahoma town, despite not having a police force.

Moffett, a city of 340 people, just across the border from Fort Smith, Ark., received a \$106,000 grant earlier this month. The town doesn't have a police department and some residents don't think that the town has a crime problem.

Mayor David Carolina told The Associated Press that the biggest problem the town had was speeding. He said the town needs one part-time policeman.

Also, the town would need to come up with \$106,000 to get the "matching grant" money.

Other Highlights

- Gov. Richards said last week she will name Elyse Lanier, wife of Houston Mayor Bob Lanier, to the University of Houston System Board of Regents to replace outgoing Regent John Moores.

- Secretary of State Ronald Kirk is encouraging Texas' 5,204,496 registered voters to vote early. Kirk said citizens can avoid standing in long lines on Nov. 8 by casting their ballots before early voting ends Nov. 4.

This week the Success will continue to announce its endorsements for elected office.

For **Texas Agriculture Commissioner**, we endorse incumbent Republican **Rick Perry**. In his first term as Ag. Commissioner, Perry has resuscitated an agency that had stagnated badly. He is a favorite of farmers and ranchers around the state and has a positive vision for Texas agriculture. **Rick Perry** should be re-elected as Texas Ag. Commissioner.

For **Commissioner of the General Land Office**, we endorse the Republican challenger **Marta Greytok**. While serving as Land Commissioner, her opponent, Gary Mauro has been more concerned with his own legal and financial difficulties than with those of Texas. He came late to the ball on the private property rights issue and for all those reasons we believe he should be replaced. **Marta Greytok** should be elected Texas Land Commissioner.

For **Schleicher County and District Clerk**, we endorse Republican **Pat Ragsdale**. Ragsdale has a long record of public service in Schleicher County and strongly advocates reforming the election administration role of the Clerk's office. The position encompasses more than elections, but with the continuing miscues relating to ballots and polling places, we feel the office needs someone committed to righting the ship. **Pat Ragsdale** should be elected Schleicher County and District Clerk.

For **Schleicher County Justice of the Peace**, we endorse Republican **Robert Parker**. Parker is a local rancher and he managed Parker Foods until a fire destroyed the family business in 1988. Having met a payroll, Robert Parker understands the burden that an activist government be upon taxpayers. While he is a strong conservative law and order candidate he also understands that justice must be tempered with compassion. **Robert Parker** should be elected Schleicher

County Justice of the Peace.

For **Schleicher County Commissioner, Pct. 2**, we endorse Republican challenger **Matt Brown**. Brown, a local rancher and an ardent conservative is committed to representing the people of Precinct 2. Though Brown has refused to make an issue of his opponents many absences from commissioner's court, we feel that the people of Precinct 2 deserve a commissioner who will be on hand, representing them, when important decisions are made. **Matt Brown** should be elected Schleicher County Commissioner.

For **Schleicher County Commissioner, Pct. 4** we endorse Republican **C.R. Sproul**. Sproul is retired from Halliburton Services and is a local rancher and oil producer. He has been in business for himself and clearly understands that well intentioned government action often has unwanted results. Sproul was and is a member of the Schleicher County Medical Center Board of Directors. As such, he led the battle to keep our hospital open and viable. He is a fiscal conservative and a prudent money manager. While it may be a toss up as to which of the two candidates in this race are stingier with the taxpayers money, when overall experience is considered, Sproul is clearly the best choice. **C.R. Sproul** should be elected Schleicher County Commissioner, Precinct 4.

YOU WON'T HEAR THIS!

The national media machine is in high-gear election-mode---meaning they've started acting like a really BIG P.R. Firm! They're going to save their favorites if it kills them! One thing you won't hear them talk about is the latest Census Bureau data on the decline of the middle-class income.

The government's black and white figures show, at the conclusion of the decade of robust "Reaganomics" --expansion in 1989, the median household income began declining. The '92-'93 cycle brought your income another \$300 lower in the current downward turn.

Don't expect to see this in an AP wire story, but the latest *National Review* recites government statistics that show even the income of the poor between '82-'89 shot up by 14%...but not anymore.

MEDIA GETS RELIGION!

Whether you've worked in the criminal justice field or not, you may know that defendants very frequently "get religion" just before sentencing. The habit is notorious in law enforcement circles.

Dallas-based religious freedom's lawyer, Kelly Shackelford recently stated that his caseload has greatly increased since Clinton appointees have taken over the government. Religious leaders were stunned earlier this year when the Justice Department voluntarily insinuated itself into a private lawsuit over tithing money.

The Justice Dept. filed a brief taking sides against the Evangelical Free Church in Minnesota by comparing [any] church's retention of tithing money to the ill-gotten gains of a drug dealer. (!) The Appellate Court decision will have widespread effect.

Then suddenly, just weeks before midterm elections, the Clinton Administration ordered a withdrawal from the case. One hates to be cynical, but it's awfully coincidental.

But the White House is not the only place that suddenly "got religion". Sam Donaldson's *Prime Time Live* show actually showed people identified as Christians (as opposed to radical-right, etc.) and named them "heroes" for the rescue of a suicidal man. The list of positive religion stories is endless this month. As Saturday Night Live's Church-Lady would say, "How conveeeneent!"

Just enjoy it while you can, folks!!

oops, NEVER MIND

One of the most valuable publications in America is (*Forbes*) *MediaCritic*--The

Best and Worst of America's Journalism. If you've ever thought it may behoove you to KNOW your information-provider, this quarterly booklet will satisfy your curiosity.

This is not some dry treatise on the field of journalism. This publication sets the record straight on stories you read and rely on. Exposing gaffes, bias and negligence, as well as crediting excellence, this review of the news is first-rate. [As a public service, here's their phone #: 1-800-825-0061.]

The latest issue has one story bound to make every journalist squemish: It largely credits Anna Quindlen (*NY Times*) with forcing the issue and spurring the Somali intervention--which, of course, carries with it as well, the horrifying share of responsibility for the tragic conclusion. Quindlen herself wrote a column-confessional attributing her advocacy to naiveté.

Reading this story ought to remind every American of our own responsibility to demand non-political, policy-oriented military decisions of our leaders rather than passion-driven fleeing fashion.

FACTS DON'T LIE

The American Conservative Union released their 24th annual tabulation on the 103rd Congress re: who voted conservative and who voted liberal, regardless of Party-affiliation.

Calculating in the already known resignations of 61 legislators, it is inevitable that the Democrat side will be more liberal and the Republican side more conservative. Thus, in deciding on your candidate, you need to first decide if you want the country to go more to the left or more to the right. Each member added to one side or the other, will increase its numbers and therefore its power.

ACU measures only votes where the ideological difference is clear. Thus, they didn't include NAFTA because conservatives were on both sides. Besides measuring votes on legislation, ACU also measured votes on nominations where the ideological distinction is stark.

For example, Clinton's nomination of Sam Brown Jr., the anti-Vietnam war activist, is included in the tabulations. Sam Brown's nomination to become Ambassador to the Conference on Security and Cooperation in Europe had conservatives adamantly against and liberals for. [Incidentally, the nomination failed but he's over there anyway--details in a future column.]

In the scoring system, a perfect conservative is "100" and a perfect

liberal is "0". Averages: Senate Demo---"10"; Senate Repub---"78"; House Demo---"20"; House Repub---"85". East Coast Republicans took a steep numerical dive by year's end. They were 20 to 30 points more liberal than last year.

[ACU didn't say, but other data indicates, heavily pro-White House media coverage pressured legislators. For example, if news reports repeatedly say someone is against lobby reform but they fail to tell viewers that the only lobbies positions adverse to their own constituents.]

Some individual results: **Biden (D-DE)**---a perfect "0" (poised to take over Demo. Senate leadership). **Gingrich (R-GA)**---a perfect "100" (potential Repub. House leader).

Levin and Reagle (D-MI)---both "0". (Thus, making Mich. a part of the liberal East Coast bloc.)

Baucus (D-MT)---"0", but **Burns (R-MT)**---"92". (Thus, a wide distinction between Montana's parties.)

Gramm (R-TX)---"100" and **Hutchison (R-TX)**---"96". Texas

had seven of 32 in the "100" rating and only one in the "0" rating (the liberal voter being Rep. Washington---D).

JUSTICE, YOUR SLIP IS SHOWING

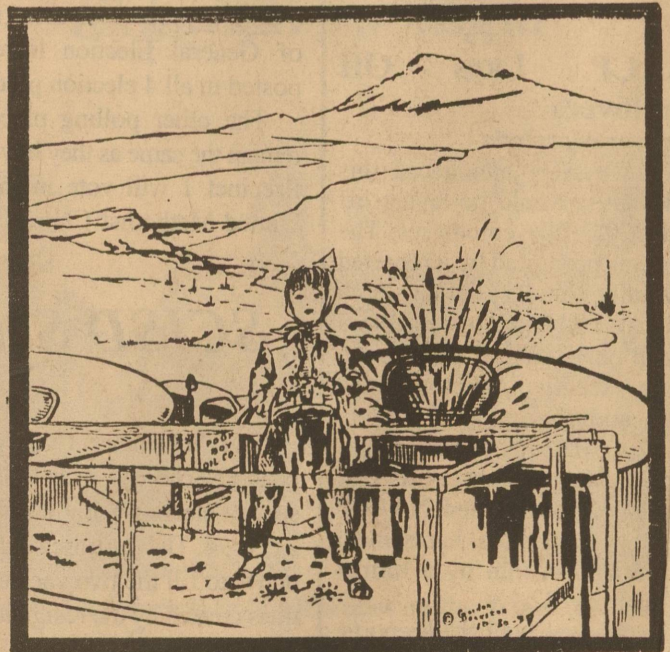

In 1972, the U.S. Supreme Court banned the death penalty completely. Before it could be reinstated, death row inmates like mass-murderer, Charles Manson and the Union Field murderers (execution-style killing of police officer) were given parole dates instead of the gas chamber.

Nominee Ginsburg was not well questioned during her confirmation hearings. Republicans were probably skittish about being called "sexist" by



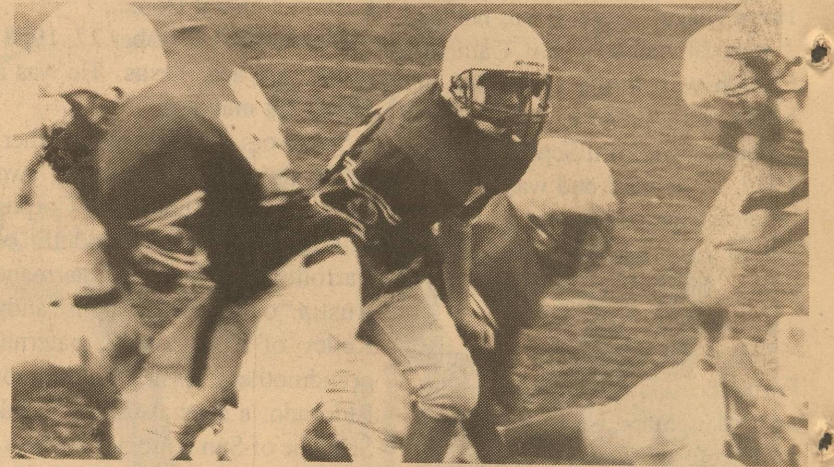

Snelson connected on 3 of 4 passes with Jason Richters hauling in one for 40 yards and a score, and Justin Leggett catching the other two for 10 yards.

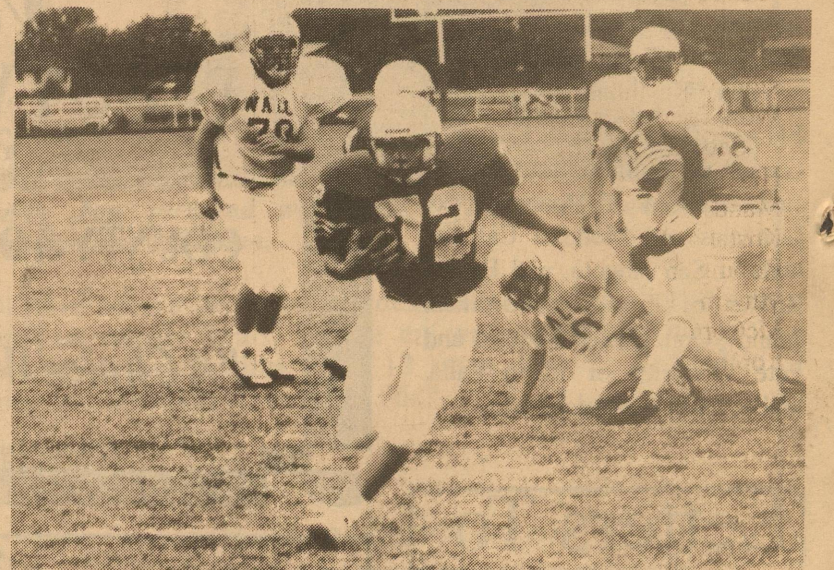

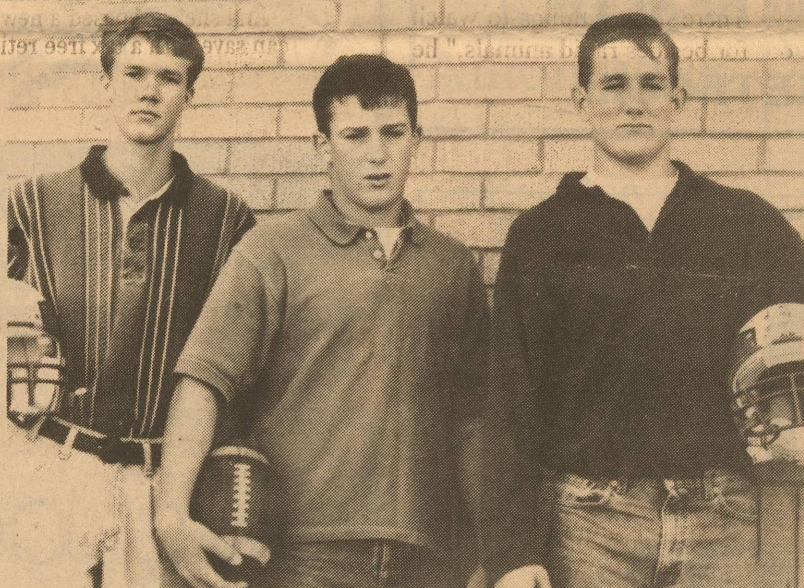

Tips For Dealing With Rabid Animals

More than one million deer hunters are expected in Texas this fall and winter. Many will head for the Texas Hill Country where deer may not provide their only wildlife encounter.

Fox rabies cases have been cropping up across much of the state's prime deer hunting area. Tom Green and McCulloch counties have been hardest hit with 69 and 67 animal cases confirmed this year, respectively.

Dale Rollins, wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in San Angelo, said that with a little common sense and caution the hunt shouldn't be spoiled.

"Odd behavior in wildlife should be your biggest red flag," he said. "Be aware of animals that don't show fear of humans. Any nocturnal animal seen during daylight hours should be suspect."

"If confronted, shoot the animal, but don't touch it unless there has been some human exposure. The Texas Department of Health receives a flood of specimens for testing. To lighten their load, don't send them more unless there's been a possible exposure."

"If bitten, treat the situation as if the animal were rabid. These tips offered by the health department could save your life:"

- * Identify the animal.
- * Immediately cleanse the wound with soap and water. Rinse and disinfect with alcohol, iodine or other disinfectant.

- * See a doctor immediately. The physician will decide your best course of action.

- * Report the incident to the local health officer and animal control agency.

- * If possible, have the biting animal tested for rabies.

"If you are a bird hunter or run hounds, have your dogs vaccinated annually by a licensed veterinarian," Rollins said.

"There's other things to watch out for besides rabid animals," he added. "Don't be in such a hurry to enter your deer blind the first time. Cautiously check it out first. A lot of animals including snakes, bees, yellow jackets, spiders and even bats view these queer structures as prime nesting boxes."

"With a little horse sense this year's hunt should be the best yet."

Deadline For Low Interest Loans

Businesses in Edwards, Gillespie, Kerr, Kimble, Mason, Menard, Schleicher and Sutton Counties have until November 17, 1994 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from drought which occurred July 1, 1993 and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply. 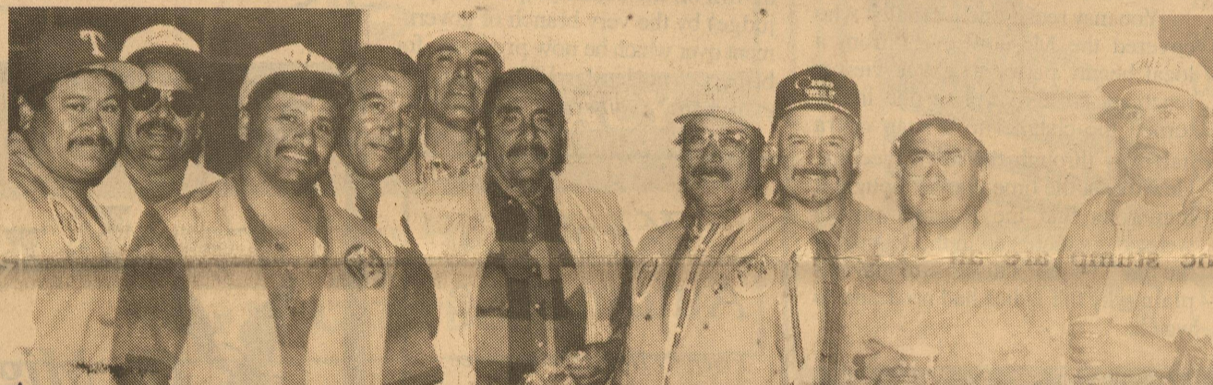

"RADICALIZED" MEDIA BIAS

A week later, Vladimir Pozner returned from a regular trip to Russia and appeared on his CNBC show with the real Donahue. Pozner revealed what no one in the huge media entourage happened to mention. The Russian people told Pozner that the "town meeting" was staged, contrived. They said the "townspople" were not only not from the town, but strongly suspected of not being Russian citizens! (The handshake was probably scripted by Hollywood pals, Bloodworth-Thomson.)

[On C-SPAN, the US News & World Report Russian correspondent confirmed the allegation.] Pozner said the Russian people found the whole episode unpleasantly reminiscent of KGB propaganda tactics long used in their country.

While repeating their criticism may sound gratuitously inflammatory, the fact is that all of us rely on the national press to do their job diligently. We can't afford to tolerate a journalism standard which will go along with such a charade.

You may recall one journalist who covered the Moscow event from a local beauty parlor to gauge viewer reaction. To his surprise, the ladies turned the channel to a soap opera half-way through the town meeting. He wrote at the time that he thought it humorous that the Russian people were so disinterested in the "issues of the day." Pozner's disclosure may explain why the ladies had no desire to watch.


