

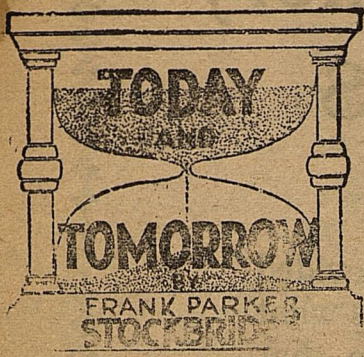

FOOD

The late J. Orden Armour once boasted publicly that he intended to control the world's food supply. The other day his estate was settled in Chicago. There wasn't enough money left to pay debts, by some \$2,000,000. In Orden Armour's time it might have been possible for one man to send the price of food up or down as he willed. It is impossible today, and it will be forever impossible when the food producers of the nation fully avail themselves of the opportunity to control their own markets which is open to them under the Federal Farm Board Act.

RADIO

Somebody has to pay for radio broadcasting. In England the listeners pay, by an annual tax on receiving sets, and the Government controls the operation of the broadcasting stations. That is a system which Americans would never tolerate. There is too much Government regulations of the spoken word as well as of print, even now.

In this country it is the advertisers who pay for broadcasting.

Advertising and the distribution of news and information are a proper function of newspapers. Some newspapers now operate broadcasting stations, and their programs are among the best on the air. In the natural evolution of things, newspapers will some day take over all broadcasting.

RAILROADS

Automobiles have been competing with the railroads for twenty-five years, but average train speeds have not increased in that period.

It took the airplane to stimulate the roads to higher speed. The Pennsylvania railroad promises electric trains between Washington and New York at speeds of from 90 to 100 miles an hour. That is as fast as most commercial airplanes can fly safely.

Eventually all railroads will be operated electrically between important center and train speed of 100 miles an hour will be common.

CHICAGO

Count Keyserling, the German traveler and philosopher, says that Chicago is the most typically American city. Raymond M Hood, president of the New York Architectural League, told his fellow-Architects the other night that they hadn't seen any real American architecture until they had seen Chicago's new skyscrapers.

Every time I go back to Chicago I feel as if I were getting a fresh inoculation of Americanism. No other city so completely expresses the American spirit of to-day. In no other city of which I know do the ordinary people have so many and such wonderful opportunities to get the most out of life. New York still looks to Europe and the past for its traditions and culture; Chicago is developing a culture of its own which will set the American standard for centuries to come.

Sul Ross Gains Admission as First Class College

ALPINE:—That the Sul Ross State Teachers College has made great progress since its founding less than ten years ago is shown by its admission last week as a first-class college to the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, which convened for its annual meeting in Lexington, Ky., Dec. 2-7. The news of the admission was brought by Dr. H. W. Morelock, president of Sul Ross, who went to the meeting to represent the college. Dr. Morelock returned here early this week.

The Southern Association is the third standardizing agency to recognize Sul Ross, as the college is already a member of the Texas Association of Colleges and the American Association of Teachers Colleges. Credits from the Alpine College are accepted at face value all over the country.

The Southern Association is composed of the leading colleges and universities of the thirteen Southern states, and is the most important standardizing agency for schools in this part of the country. Its standards are very rigid.

SCREEN GRID GIVES FARM NEW RADIO



One Example of the Newest Battery Sets Which Offer Really Modern Radio to Unwired Homes.

"The real split between the require-
 ments of rural and city listener-in-
 came with the introduction of the
 loud-speaker in place of head-phones,"
 says E. A. Nicholas, Vice-President
 of the Radio-Victor Corporation of
 America. "Until then the usual bat-
 tery radio set, especially when oper-
 ated with dry cells, could serve both
 rural and city family equally well.
 With the loud-speaker there arose a
 demand for more power and better
 tone, with a decrease in operating
 cost, all of which led to socket-power.

"Now radio engineers have turned
 to the requirements of the unelectri-
 fied home, eager to duplicate what has
 been achieved for city and town.
 Starting with current conservation as
 the ideal, they have evolved loud-
 speakers supplying ample volume and
 rich tone from a minimum input.

"The recent development of the
 screen-grid tube, with an amplifica-
 tion factor several times that of the
 usual three-element or standard bat-
 tery tube, also has been a step in
 the direction of the ideal battery set.
 Indeed, with a single screen-grid tube
 operating between two and three of

the usual tubes for the radio-frequen-
 cy end, and, when also used as the
 detector, replacing the first audio tube
 as well, battery current consumption
 has been reduced to new low levels.

"These current economies, combined
 with the possibilities of greater volume
 and better tone through refined loud
 speaker design, have made possible a
 battery-operated radio set about on a
 par with the average socket-power
 radio set, plus the advantage of a
 noiseless background for tuning dis-
 tant stations.

"The combined engineering and re-
 search forces of the Radio Corpora-
 tion of America have been at work
 on this new conception of an efficient
 battery-operated radio receiver. After
 many months of intensive effort, such
 Radiolas have been developed. These
 new sets are not simply revamped
 versions of old storage battery or dry
 battery radio sets. They are entirely
 new conceptions of battery-operated
 sets, designed to establish rural radio
 more on a par with metropolitan
 radio. In sensitivity, selectivity, sim-
 plicity, economy, tone and power,
 there is little more to ask."

NEW RADIO TRENDS STRESSED IN SHOWS

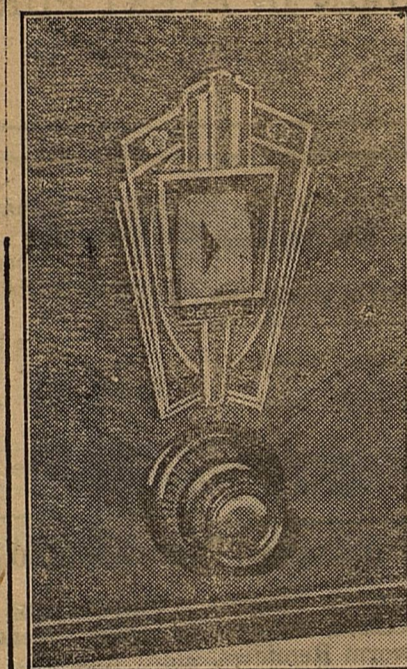
Simplified Tuning and Screen Grid Tubes Are the Big Features.

Simplification in tuning, popularity of screen grid tubes and exceptionally artistic cabinets for radio receivers are among the outstanding features of the radio shows which now are in progress throughout the United States. Quantity production has brought the greatest values ever offered.

An innovation is the offering by one of the largest manufacturers of the first battery operated Radiolas whose performance is comparable to those of socket power. This development, made possible by loudspeaker refinements and the increased efficiency of the screen grid at a low current consumption, is being welcomed by owners of homes unwired for electricity.

Although the screen grid leads in the new models as a radio frequency amplifier, another new Radiotron, the UX-245, is used widely as an outstanding part of the audio systems. The UY-227 and other standard tubes also retain their popularity for the specific uses for which they are best suited.

The famous super heterodyne circuit is employed in one of the newest Radiolas, attracting attention at the shows, but quantity production has put this model for the first time in a price class within the reach of the vast majority of listeners.

Simplified tuning in some models exhibited takes the form of tuning and volume control from one combination knob. 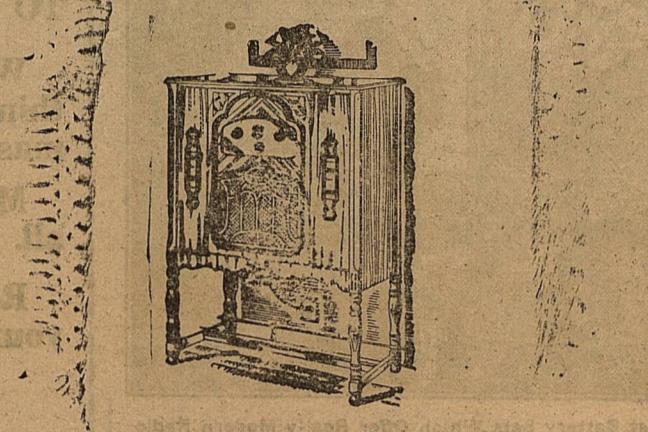

Similar historical exhibits of radio are being placed by Radio-Victor in other shows. George Clark, manager of the Exhibition Division, is secretary of a committee cooperating with the Smithsonian Institution and government officials in creating a national museum of radio, which eventually will house many of the exhibits being shown by his company.

Television demonstrations under the auspices of the Radio Corporation at the New York show indicated real progress, but the engineers whose brilliant work was responsible for the improvements were careful to point out that other problems still remained to be solved before television would be practical for home sets.

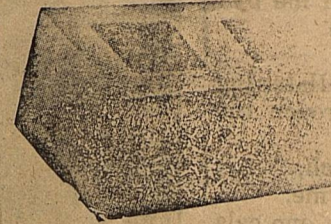

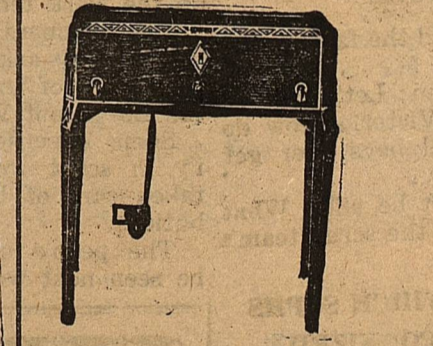

Radio Reaches Out To Many Other Arts

In addition to transoceanic service, radio, now being developed as a point-to-point communication system, promises this year to add considerably to the transcontinental telegraphic facilities of the United States, according to David Sarnoff, Executive Vice President of the Radio Corporation of America.

"Radio as a service to the home has been reaching out for association with other established arts of entertainment and education," Mr. Sarnoff says. "In the refinement of musical and speech reproduction, in combination with the modern phonograph (to render the two distinct services involved in broadcasting reception upon the one hand, and in recorded, selective programs upon the other), in the field of sound-motion picture development, radio faces another season of progress.

"It includes in its scope both sound and sight, both color and perspective.

"It is the first system of communications that has largely removed the limitations of time and space from the distribution of music and speech; it promises eventually to transmit the spectacles of life by sight communication. No channel of transmission offers a greater field of expression to the entertainment art."

FURTHER GAIN FOR RADIO IN SCHOOLS

With the beginning of the Winter school term the radio loudspeaker has taken its place beside the blackboard as an aid to teaching. According to Quinton Adams, Vice-President of the Radio-Victor Corporation of America, thirty schools in various parts of the country have begun the new term equipped with centralized radio apparatus for the distribution of educational programs to the classrooms and between sixty and seventy other schools are planning similar installations. Every school year brings an extension of education by radio.
