At race tracks, the favorite wins fewer than 30 percent of all horse races.



## Citizen's pursuit results in federal charges against San Angelo man

Vicky Davila of San Angelo pursued a suspected automobile burglar from Goodfellow Air Force Base across San Angelo and southward into Schleicher County last week. That pursuit ended in the arrest of David Crites, 52, of 110 E. 33rd St. in San Angelo.

At 8:05 a.m. on Friday, March 27th, a 9-1-1 call to the Schleicher County Sheriff's Dept. reported a female subject had trailed a car from San Angelo because she suspected the driver of burglarizing her van.

Sgt. George Arispe responded to the call and met Vicky Davila at Shot's convenience store on South Divide Street. There, he took Davila's statement and learned that she had witnessed the burglary of her van and had followed the sus-

pect to Eldorado. Davila told Arispe that she was leaving the commissary at Goodfellow Air Force Base when she noticed a man exiting her van. She said she yelled at the man to stop and when he didn't she got in her van and pursued him as he sped away from the commissary in his car.

Davila said she was concerned because she couldn't remember if she had left her purse in the van.

According to Davila's statement, she chased the suspect across San Angelo and followed him south on U.S. 277 into Schleicher County. Davila said she flashed her lights and blew her horn in hopes that a police officer would intervene. Finally, Davila stopped at Shot's to call 9-1-1.

Sgt. Arispe said Davila was able to provide him with the suspect's license plate number. He immediately notified area law enforcement agencies to be on the lookout for the car and checked tag number in the statewide database. That check revealed Crites to be the car's owner.

Arispe noted that Davila's purse was found later that day in Eldorado near the intersection of East Street and Cottonwood Street.

Tom Green County officers intercepted Crites vehicle as he was headed north on 277 and took him into custody.

A Schleicher County warrant in the matter was dropped, however, when Goodfellow Air Force Base police took custody of Crites and filed federal charges against him.

A knock on the door:  
 "Hi, I'm Payton Manning. I play for the Tennessee Volunteer's football team and we're havin'" a raffle to pay travel expenses to the games. Would you be interested in buying some tickets?"  
 When was the last time the Kansas State letterman's club had a car wash in the Co-op parking lot to make money to buy the basketball team new jerseys?  
 You reckon any Big Ten, Big Eight, Small Sixteen, IVY league, Industrial league, WAC, SWAC, Thwack or Humpback athletic conference has to send their players out selling cookies or magazine subscriptions to fund NCAA team expenses? More to the point, would any athlete worthy of his scholarship and pampered status even consider it? Not likely.  
 Unless, of course, it was the rodeo team.  
 Oh, well, that's different, you say.  
 From what, I retort. Woman's soccer? The tennis team? Gymnas-

tics, hockey, sculling, water polo? It is different, I guess, in that individuals can win money. But the best way to put rodeo earnings in perspective is a short conversation I overheard at a rodeo watchin' a bare back rider get his laundry aired out;  
 "Boy, that's a hard way to make a living."  
 "Yup. but it's even a harder way not to make a living." Maybe it's not fair to compare rodeo to football or basketball. Those two sports are supposed to generate enough income to finance a natatorium for the swim team, a trainer for the baseball team, and swords for the fencers. But that reasoning is no longer valid since the advent of equal opportunity funding; i.e., a student golfer should be treated as well as a student running back. After all, what are they in college for.  
 Yet, most college rodeo teams are required to pay for a big portion of their own expenses. But some teams are lucky. They have an active support group in the community who help. They organize fundraisers, raffle prizes, have workdays, lend equipment, horses, facilities and encouragement.  
 They even give advice.  
 Alumni, parents, friends, teachers. All fans of rodeo and young people. But the students are usually in the thick of the fundraising projects... not the brains but the brawn, and it's good training.  
 Now days you see pro-rodeo champions promoting jeans, shirts, ropes, pickups and all manner of cowboy paraphernalia, and it looks so easy.  
 But remember, they learned it the hard way, "Hi, I'm Tuff Hedeman and I'm on the rodeo team at Sul Ross State University and we're havin' a raffle..."

"What did you learn in school today?" a father asked his young son.  
 So, the child climbed in his dad's lap and filled him in on all the details. There were multiplication tables, vocabulary and spelling words. And, there was reading...lots of reading.  
 The man praised the lad and encouraged him to apply himself the next day and learn even more.  
 "You don't understand," the boy told his father. "Before I can learn any more tomorrow, I've gotta forget something today."  
 As I sat at my desk this morning trying to absorb yet another computer manual, I felt much the same as the little boy.  
 The manual is for a computer program which is supposed to reduce my work load, thereby making my life simpler. Trouble is to learn all the things the program will do, I must devote even more time, I already don't have, to

**Greeting Cards For Truckers**

**Rolling Along With**

Vicki Scofield of Amarillo weighs 110 pounds. She was in college in 1992, but wasn't getting the satisfaction she was looking for. She dropped out and enrolled in truck driving school. Soon she was steering a huge 18 wheeler across the country.  
 She came to appreciate the sacrifices truckers have to make. They are frequently away from home on holidays and special occasions. They sometimes spend Thanksgiving or Christmas in a truck stop cafe. They miss celebrating birthdays and anniversaries with their families.  
 She fell in love with truck driving and looked forward to the day when she could tell her grandkids about some of her experiences on the road. Vicki met a truck driver named Stan. They got married and became a truck driving couple.  
 Vicki got accustomed to using the CB Radio, talking to truckers late at night or early in the morn-

ing. "You develop a special bond," she says. "We know we're out there, sometimes driving alone with just our thoughts. The CB Radio keeps us from feeling so lonely."  
 Vicki has always written poetry. Occasionally, during some of those dark lonely hours, she would read one of her poems over the CB Radio. Truckers would respond,

wanting copies of the poem they just heard. Vicki started taking copies with her on her trips, and when someone said they wanted a copy she would give them to truckers at truck stops.  
 Soon she had so many requests she decided to make some cards. She was surprised to see her husband Stan turn into a super salesman.  
 Vicki, who calls herself a shy person, sometimes would find Stan talking to a truck stop manager, trying to persuade him to take on Vicki's line of cards.  
 She calls her card business Rambling Prose.  
 "A lot of men have trouble telling their wives how much they appreciate what she's going through back home, raising those children with him out on the road," says Vicki.  
 At first, Vicki would write the verse on typing paper, fold the page in half and make sample cards. "I thought it looked very amateurish,

like someone might make in kindergarten, but Stan was proud of them and would show them off and brag," says Vicki.  
 Vicki's cards are now in 43 states. She has a distributor. "We put out 26 different types of cards the first year," says Vicki. "We pulled a couple that didn't sell the way we wanted them to and reprinted the ones that were selling. My first card, written for the truck driver's wife was a big hit. We had trouble keeping it stocked. It sold ten thousand copies in less than nine months."  
 That card was titled "The First Trucker's Wife." Vicki says the stereotype image of a trucker is macho, "but they're really sentimental and sweet when it comes to their wives and children."  
 Vicki spends most of her time these days writing greeting cards and telling others how they can start their own business by finding a need and filling it.

**Texas to get \$1.9 billion for transportation**

AUSTIN — A six-year spending plan that would give Texas \$1.9 billion for highways, bridges, buses and rail systems was unanimously approved by the House Transportation Committee last week. It is part of a total spending plan of \$218 billion that is expected to win approval from the full House next week, but still must be merged with a similar bill passed earlier by the Senate.  
 "This bill is a major victory for the people of Texas. The committee vote means that Texas should finally get its fair share of funding for badly needed infrastructure projects," said House Majority Whip Tom DeLay, R-Sugar Land.  
 Both bills give states, much more money than they received under the previous six-year plan, primarily because a 4.3-cent gasoline tax would be dedicated to highway construction rather than general government spending. And, both bills offer new formulas for disbursing the tax money so that Texas receives a greater share.  
 "For years, Texans have dutifully paid federal gas taxes, and for years we have not received our fair share of highway funds — only 77 cents on the dollar," said Max Sandlin, D-Marshall, a member of the House Transportation Committee.  
 Under the committee's new plan, Sandlin said, every state would receive at least 90 cents for every dollar they send to Washington in federal gasoline taxes.  
**Utility Hearings Under Way**  
 The state Senate Interim Committee on Electric Utility Restruc-

Mike Williams, president of the Texas Electric Cooperatives Association, said co-ops doubted all customers would benefit from competition. "One of the ways you keep rates low for everybody is not letting everyone come and go as they please," Williams said.  
 Meanwhile, the Clinton administration is supporting efforts to bring nationwide competition to the industry with the promise of saving electricity consumers \$20 billion a year and helping the environment.  
**EnviroMedia Wins Contract**  
 The Austin-based firm, Tuerff-Davis EnviroMedia Inc., beat out eight Austin-area and national advertising agencies for the Texas Department of Transportation's \$1.5 million "Don't Mess With Texas" anti-litter campaign.  
 Doris Howdeshell, director of the travel division for the highway department, said she was impressed with EnviroMedia's plan to recycle the existing campaign and improve it. Although most Texans have heard the "Don't Mess With Texas" slogan, some think the ads are about Texas pride, not litter prevention, Howdeshell said.  
 "Our ads will focus on the remaining litter that's out there," she said.  
 The year-old agency, which specializes in environmental advertising, takes over the campaign created by GSD&M Advertising of Austin.  
 Last year, EnviroMedia orga-

nized the first national "America Recycles Day." Its clients include the Recycling Coalition of Texas, H-E-B Food Stores Inc. and the City of Fort Worth.  
**Other Capital Highlights**  
 • The 3rd Court of Appeals in Austin is scheduled to hear a case in May that could affect the ability of the public to watchdog agencies that regulate the insurance industry and many other industries. The case stems from insurance industry efforts to keep confidential certain reports it gives to the Texas Department of Insurance. The reports allegedly contain information identifying neighborhoods where insurers award or deny auto coverage.  
 • About \$500,000 in refunds from Farmers Insurance will be split among about 8,000 Texans under an agreement between the company and state regulators. The Texas Department of Insurance accused Farmers of overcharging some customers from July 1996 to January 1997 based on how long policyholders had insurance before applying for coverage from Farmers.  
 • Former Housing Secretary Henry Cisneros' one-time mistress Linda Jones was sentenced last week to 3 and a half years in federal prison for obstruction of justice and bank fraud. Jones, a star witness in an independent counsel investigation of Cisneros, became a target herself in 1996 when prosecutors caught her in a series of lies about evidence.

If you are to visit the halls of Eldorado High School during the next few weeks, you will be seeing quite a few teenagers with babies.

Why? The High School is offering the Parenting Child Development (PCD) course for those who want to experience a real life situation in which an unwanted pregnancy occurs and how hard it is to take care of a child at a very young age.

The students involved in the PCD classes will be taking on the responsibility of adopting plastic babies to get an impression of what a real baby is like. Sounds easy? Well, these aren't your ordinary plastic babies.

They are programmed to cry when wet, hungry, tired, or even sick! They don't do all of these things of course, but they do

enough to give one an idea of what responsibility taking on a baby at such a young age would be.

Every Friday, course director Chris McCravey gives three babies to three students to nurture until Monday morning. These babies aren't to be taken lightly. There is a microchip inside the baby's head that records if the baby is being neglected, or abused in any way. If any of these

situations occur, the student will fail the project.

The "parents" must keep a journal on what time the baby cries and how they feel about the baby's timing.

Mrs. McCravey said, "I value this project as an extension in the classroom because it gives the students an opportunity to learn how much responsibility goes along with the caring for children, espe-

cially infants."

She feels that she needed to bring attention to how much living students have left to live, without being tied down to a baby.

Mrs. McCravey also stated that there has not been one student, that she has asked, that has indicated they are ready to have a baby. "It's demanding work," she said, "once a parent always a parent and you can't ever change that."



Since that time, the cast of the volunteers has grown and the stage now covers the side of the mountain and includes nine levels, several miles of electrical cables and a sound booth where readers and sound personnel work to coordinate the words and music with stage actions.

All participants, from the director and actors, to stage hands and wardrobe mistresses are volunteers.

The pageant annually attracts several thousand spectators from throughout the United States, and some foreign countries.

Most watch from cars parked

under the direction of Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts who also distribute free programs. Local scouts have been providing this service since the pageant began.

There are no reserve parking areas, but the spectators are welcome to park their cars early, beginning at 3:00 PM Saturday.

Free coffee will be served by the Junction Volunteer Fire Department. The local EMS will operate a concession stand with food and soft drinks. Many spectators come early and picnic on the grounds.

There is no admission charge, but free-will offerings are gratefully accepted. Boy Scouts will take up a collection from those who wish to contribute during an intermission. These funds are used to add or replace or repair equipment needed to produce the pageant.

## The soldiers are coming!

Fort Lancaster State Historical Park will come alive with frontier soldiers on Saturday, April 11, 1998. Authentically uniformed and equipped volunteers from Old Fort Lancaster Memorial Regiment will portray infantry soldiers of the mid to late 1850's from 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. The soldiers will perform uniform and weapon firing demonstrations, and will be on hand to answer questions and give tours of old Fort Lancaster.

Fort Lancaster State Historical Park is located 8 miles east of Sheffield, Texas on U.S. Highway 290, and is open Thursday through Monday 9:00 AM to 5:00 PM. For further information and fees, call the park at 915/835-4391.

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


